





Mr. Davis operates with a cold businessman's logic. "I realized pretty early in the game that we would have to use older, cheaper planes, that could be written off.

WHO WAS GEORGE WASHINGTON CARVER

vas one of America's greates! scientists. His parents were Negro slaves o man called Moses Carver

n Missouri. Soon after leorge was born his fatch ied. A few months later th aby and his mother wer idnapped by bandits. Mose Carver was able to buy George back, but his mother was never found, so the Carvers raised George themselves.

George showed a love for growing things at a very early age, He used to care for and cure sick plants, and the neighbors called him the plant doctor. He wandered about the United States seeking an education, doing all kinds of work to pay for his schooling. Finally he entered Iowa State College. He was thef irst Negro to graduate from the college, and he became their first Negro teacher.

In 1896, he joined the staff of Tuskegee Institute, a new Negro college in Alabama. He was appointed to head the school's agriculture department. With the aid of his students, Carver biult a homemade laboratory, using for equipment pots, kettles, and whatever else he could find that might be useful.

For nearly 50 years Carver taught a Tuskegee. In his laboratory he worked long hours, seeking ways to help the poor southern farmers. He introduced the peanut, pecan, and sweet potato to the cotton farmers, and showed them how these crops would enrich soil worn out by years of cot ton planting.

In his laboratory he discoverad new uses for these plants. From peanuts he made butter, coffee, ink, and soap From sweet potatoes he made flour, cereals, glue, dyes and rubber. He also made synthetic marble from wood shavings

Carver gave his discoveries his great work kis carried on to the world, asking no profit through the George Washingfor himself. He gave advice ton Carver Foundation which freely to all who consulted he set up with money from him. He received offers of his savings. His was not an isolated view. Many people foresaw the development of Communist and capitalist spheres of influence in Africa, perhaps even the appearance of satelite states, and American policy was largely rooted in a fear of Soviet or Chinese dom-

Ten y ears later it is clear that no great power has been able to impose its will in Africa as fully as it might wish.

The former colonial powers - Britain, France, Belgium, and Spain — have retained considerable economic influence in the territories that were once their possessions. But the Belgians in The Congo, the British in Tanzania, the French in Mali, have had to accept political and economic developments that they did not like.

France has probably built the strongest position, with troops still stationed in several African countries. There are several reasons: small size and economic feebleness of most of her former colonies, Gen. Charles de Gaulle's gift for personal relations with African leaders and the appeal of French culture for the African elite.

The British created a large corps of civil servants in their colonies; the French educat-ed fewer people but turned out black Frenchmen who love Bordeaux and Baude-


