

Predates Christianity

Although the actual observance of Easter as we know it began with Christ's Resurrection, the holiday was observed without its religious significance by celebrations greeting spring. History tells us that many elements which have been integrated to come out of the shell of the wininto the celebration of Easter had ter. And how better celebrate than their origins in civilizations which predated Christianity by thousands of years. Testament about the Easter festival, but the origin of the feast as it is celebrated today is generally traced to the time of the Apostles. Although the Apostles continued to observe Jewish festivals, they did so in a different spirit, considering them to be the fulfilment of the prophesies which the old Jewish festivals had honored. After the coming of the Redeemer, the Paschal lamb was made to symbolize Christ, the lamb of God, offering up His sacrifice to save people from death through sin, In those days, both the Crucifixion and the Resurrection were commemorated in a single Easter celebration, but the day gradually evolved to its present meaning.

The exact date for the celebration of Easter was set by the Council of Nicea in the year 325 A.D. A rather complicated procedure was set up for determining the date: it is the first Sunday after the full moon following the vernal equinor. Always regarded as the most important feast on the Christian calendar, Easter Sunday at one time was considered the first day of the year. It was the Emperor Constantine who designated it thus and it was celebrated in some countries, notably in France, as the beginning of the new year well into the 16th century.

Where the name "Easter" originated nobody is quite sure. According to the early English historian, Bede, the name came from a Saxon festival in honor of Eostre, their goddess of spring. SENATORS MOVE TO PROTECT GIS FROM ATTACKS PY BIGOTS

Washington, March - A move to nd violence against members of the armed services came Wednesday, February 28, when ten senators, at the urging of the National Assocation for the Advancement of Colored People, introduced an amendment to S. 1, the pending legislation on universal military training.

Sponsors of the amendment are Senators Lehman, Humphrey, Dougas, Ives, Hendrickson, Benton, Murray, Kilgore, Green, and Pastore. A plea to branches to make an all out effort to get the amendment passed was made by Walter White, executive Secretary of the NAACP, after Senator Lehman, chief sponsor, called on his Tellow senators to vote favorably on the recommendation.

In his speech introducing the legislation, Senator Lehman said: There have been reports that members of the Armed Forces, who are Negro Americans, were set upon and beaten up while local police officers stood by abetting the attack. Such incidents would be punished under Federal law under the terms of the amendment. I can see no justification for opposing this amendment."

STORY TELLS HOW ETHEL WAT-ERS GOT THAT WAY

-Ethel Waters, whose singing and acting have brought honor both to her and her race, is the subject or at rticle in the current (March) issue of The Atlantic Monthly which describes in detail the incident which she herself considers the turning point of her career.

Under the title "Mamba's Daughter," the magazine features the portion of Miss Water's recently published autobiography which traces the history of her appearance as Hagar in the stage production of Du-Bose Heyward's "Mamba's Daughters."

Introducing the article with the words "Ethel Waters is a great American artist, but few who saw the triumph that she scored as Hagar in 'Mamba's Daughters' realized how closely that play touched on her own life," the magazine traces in Miss Waters' own words the comparison between the trials experienced by her own mother, Louise, and the fictional Hagar.

Identifying the part of Hagar as "the most exciting prospect" of her career and admitting her early knowledge that "Mamba's Daughters" would be a theatrical knockout," Miss Waters adds:

"But even more exciting was its being a play ripped out of the life I'd always known and waws still living. Even when I read it for the first time I understood instinctively that there could be no greater triumph in my professional career than playing Hagar. All my life I'd burn ed to tell the story of my mother's despair and long defeat. 'Mamba's Daughters' was a tragedy and a story of courage, with Hagar, like my mother, meeting it all with her heart up, never once doubting her God. and furiously intent on staying a person no matter how tricked and buffeted and besmirched and bruis-



12 LEADERS ASK PRESIDENT TO END CAPITAL JIM CROW

Washington, March - A six point program for executive action to abolish discrimination and segregation was presented to President Harry S. Truman by a group of 12 Negro leaders who met with the President at the White House on February 28th.

Speaking for the delegation, A. Philip Randolph, president of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, AFL, asked the President:

1. To use the power and influence of his office to abolish racial segregation immediately in Washington; 2. To appoint Negroes to adminstrative and policy making posi-

ions in government service;

- 3. To integrate Negroes into all new agencies established as a result of the national emergency;
- 4. To appoint Negroes more widely in the foreign and diplomatic service of the country; 5. To issue an executive order
- setting up an FEPC with enforcement powers; and 6. To eradicate racial segregation

from the armed forces.

During he course of the conference Walter White, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, told the President of the findings of Thurgood Marshall, NAACP special counsel, who has just returned from five week of intensive investigations. in Korea and Japan into the circumstances surrounding the convictions of Negro GIs. These investigations, Mr. White told the President, revealed that the convicted GIs, all members of segregated units, had been victims of racial bias.

The NAACP executive also expressed the displeasure of the Association and of Negroes generally at the President's appointment of Millard Caldwell, former governor of Florida, as chief of civil defense, Mr. Caldwell's anti-Negro bias, as re-affirmed by the Foridian at the Senate committee hearing on his appointment, made him unfit for such a position. Mr. White said.

Johnson, President, Fisk University Benjamin E. Mays, President, Morehouse College; Channing H. Tobias, Director Phelps-Stokes Foundation Willard S. Townsend, President, United Transport Service Employees of America, CIO.

WILMINGTON NAMES MARCH 3 NAACP CIVIL RIGHTS DAY

Wilmington, Del., March 1 -Mayor James F. Hearn this week issued an official proclamation declaring Saturday, March 3, as NAACP Civil Rights Day in this city and asking all citizens to become members of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.



NAACP VHURCH SECRETARY TELLS DANGERS OF BIAS IN U.S.

Perth Amboy, N.J., March 1 -Rev. Walter P. Offutt, Jr., church secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, told a Brotherhood Week luncheon meeting of the local Kiwawnis Club that discrimination in this country is the greatest threat to success in the battle against Com-

Declaring that brotherhood should be observed "on every day of every year," the NAACP church secretary said that if bias were wiped out, 'Communism couldn't get within thousands of miles of this country . . because there would be nothing in this country on which Communism could build."

NO RACIAL BIAS

HERE - MAYOR (Rouyn Noranda Press P.Q. Nov. 50) Mayor Maurice Caouette yesterday mode a statement in relation to the Marooon Lounge incident recently when a group of Negroes was ordered out.

"I am sure," he said "that there was no discrimination intended on the part of the Albert Hotel management.

"To my knowledge, there is no business or organization in Rouyn which discriminates against any race, creed or color. This is one of the most creditable features of the town.

"From where I stand, I see that the incident might have resulted from individual antagonism," continued Mr. Caouette.

RECIPES Roquefort Cheese Biscuits

To flour-fat mixture, add 1-4 cup rumbled Roquefort or blue cheese stir in milk and proceed as directed. Pimento-Cheese Biscuits

Melt 2 ounces pimento cream cheese and 2 tablespoons butter over hot water slend well. Pour over tops of unballed biscuits, bake as directed.

Marmalade Crescents

Roll dough about 1/2 inch thick; brush with 2 tablespoons melted butter; spread with marmalade. Cut into 3-inch squares, then cut each square diagonally in half to make triangles. Roll each triangle jellyroll fashion, starting with the langedge of the triangle; shape into a crescent. Place on greased baking sheet and bake in a hot oven (425 F. for 12 to 15 minutes.

Pineapple Crescents

Add 2 tablespoons sugar to sifted dry ingredients in preparing biscuit dough. Substitute well drained crushed pineapple for marmalade or

Deviled Pinwheels

Roll biscuit dough into an oblong about 12 inches long and 1-4 inch thick. Spread with 2 tablespoons melted butter and a mixture of 1/2 cup deviled ham, 2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper and 1 tablespoon chopped pimento. Roll lengthwise as lightly as possible, jelly roll fashion; pinch edge to roll. Cut into 1-inch slices and place cut side down in muffin pans; bake in hot even (400 F.) 15 to 18 minutes. Tomato Biscuits

Substitute tomato juice for milk in recipe. These are especially good for that Valentine Day luncheon. Biscuit Patty Shells

Roll dough about 1/2 inch thick; cut into rounds 21/2 inches in diameter. Cut out centers from one-half of the rounds, using a 2-inch cooky cutter; place one of these rings on top of each round of dough; brush with melted shortening. Place on greased baking sheet and bake in a hot oven (425 F.) 15- 18 minutes. Fill hot shells with creamed fish or vegetables. Makes about 6 shells.

The Bell System has come a long way since Alexander Graham Bell first sent an understandable sentence over an electric wire. At first telephones were released in pairs. You could speak to your neighbour but no one else. The commercial switchpoard (1878) started mass commun-

Today there's a telephone for every three persons in the 230 largest cities in America. Telephone service is furnished by a "city" of about 6.500 buildings. More than 33 million miles of wire link this netwowrk. The facts are amazing. Almost as amazing is the unique telephone spirit. It prompts employees to volunteer for work in emergencies. It prompts them to serve in strange offices when disaster prevents them from reaching their own It even inspires heroic deeds.

Despite what the onlooker might consider a taxing, confining job. the average telephone operator has been on the job from 8 to 10 years and likes it.

Wages, Condition Good

The company knows its workers must be happy if their service is to be given with a smile. For this reason wages are good, safety is stressed and benefits provided. Also it has a medical department, excellent cafeterias, recreation and educational programs.

Negroes have been employed by he New York Telephone Company for at least 30 years. The emphasis on "white collar" workers started in 1942 and progressed rapidly. In mid-1944 a survey found Negroes employed in a wide variety of white collar jobs. However, the first Negro switchboard operator wasn't hired until late in 1944. Always sensitive about morale and teamwork on its switchboards, the company had approached the hiring of Negro operators cautiously. Once they were hired fears and doubts in and outside the company vanished quickly.

In April, 1946 the New York State Commission Against Discrimination and the New York Urban League health. At that time the company employed over 300 colored girls as switchboard operators and clergs. Since then the number has increased. When the Commission released its findings Carl Whitmore, president at the time, informed the whole company, candidadtes would be selected only in terms of job qualifications. Keith S. McHugh, president re-emphasized the policy and is carrying it out. You can see why jimcrow gets a wrong number at the New York Telephone Company.







FOSTER MOTHER'S SUCCESS TORONTO, March 2nd - (CP)-Mrs. Mary Alice Mann, of suburban Lakefield, mothers eight babies of mixed nationalities ranging in age from a few weeks to nine months.

Answering routine, official questions at the time she took the first baby, Mrs. Mann said she had no prejudices regarding race or religion. She was given a Negro baby and a little later an Indian child.

Before long she was given the care of seven boys and one girl. Among them are a 51/2-month-old boy of Greek parentage, a Chinese boy of seven months and a Mulatto boy 21/2 menths old.

Mrs. Mann, a trained nurse with 11 years' hospital experience, has a 16-year-old daughter.

There are individual cribs for the babies in the large, sunny nursery. Weather permitting, they are put outside every day. Mrs. Mann now has two assistants — one laundering dozens of diapers daily and the other assisting with baths.

Tall shade trees grow in the two acres of property surrounding the home and Mrs. Mann is planning an enclosed play-yard with sand piles

Asked if she would get substitutes if some were adopted, the foster mother replied emphatically:

"I don't want to give any of them up, I want to keep them all until they grow up and get married. It doesn't make any difference to me what color they are -I love babies."
