

This collection of writings is by native peoples from coast to coast. It consists of stories, folk-lore, and short poems. It starts with contribution by West Coast Indians telling of their potlatches and other ceremonies

Then there are the mountain peoples, who seem to have adjusted better to the new conditions, and who provided the Indians with their first Canadian MP. One of them wrote:

What am I doing here Among these strange people Sitting in these funny desks Staring at this paper?

Next come the people of the great Blackfoot Confederacy, who provided the first Indian member of Canada's Senate, and with them their neighbors, the Crees, the Sioux and the Stoneys.

A chapter is given to the people of the plains and to Riel and his rebellion which sought to secure for the people of mixed blood, the Metis, rights which they felt threatened by the migrants from Eastern Canada.

Different again are the people of the great Northern crescent, and the Ojibways of the region north of the western Great Lakes, and the Iroquoian peoples of this part of Canada. Finally there are contributions by the MicMacs and Walecites of the maritime

region.
Plenty of people have tried to tell the story of the Indians. Here, in verse and prose, a variety of Indians tell their own tales.—John K. Elliott.




