VATICAN CITY, (Reuters) -Pope Pius has urged business executives to "contribute" to help to "destroy the roots of hate which feed the class struggle."

In an address made public today, the Pope told members of the Italian Federation of Business Executives that they were called upon to make their contribution in order "that the clash of classes may be contained, that all may in confidence resolutely take the road leading to the hoped-for aim of dynamic co-operation among all living forces of the nation for the common good and that the social doctrine of the church may be recognized and applied as being really able to destroy the roots of hate which feed the class struggle."

AMPANELLA WINS MVP TITLE FOR THIRD TIME

NEW YORK, Dec. 8 - (AP) -Catcher Roy Campanella. who made a tremendous comeback to lead the Brooklyn Dodgers to another pennant and their first World Series victory, today was named the National League5s most valuable player or 1955.

By the narrow margin of five points, the stocky, 34-year-old receiver nosed out Teammate Duke Snider - 226 to 221 - to become



the second player in league history to win the prized award three times. Stan Musial, the great St. Louis Cardinal outfielder, received the honor n 1943, 1946 and 1948.

Campanella won it previously in 1951 and 1953.

Only two other players ever won his distinction more than once, Rogers Hornsby in 1925 and 1929 and Carl Hubbell in 1933 and 1936.



FIVE MEMBERS OF PARLIA MENT SPEAK FOR WEST

CAUX, Switzerland, - Five West African parliamentarians stood on the platform together and unitedly pledged themselves "to make Africa a continent with an answer, that unity be our greatest export to the world." They are from four different political parties and one independent, from Nigeria and the

They were introduced by the Tolon Na, a Chief, and representative from the North in the Gold Coast House of Assembly. "The future of Africa hangs in the balance," he "Cnly committed men and women can turn that balance. We love the Gold Coast and have decided to fight for it to be what it should be. In order to do this we must make the four standards the guide and compass of our daily

Mr. Michael Ogon of the Nigerian Legislative Assembly, who is a Catholic, spoke of the many parliamentarians he had met at Caux. 'All our problems are the same,' ne said. "We have put our own political careers and ambitions before our country's needs. Together we have taken the decision to be different and bring a new principle nto politics.

"If Nigeria achieves her self-gov ernment by the use of hate, she will nave to maintain it by fear," said He spoke of the great hope he had for Nigeria since many Nigerians including Cabinet Ministers had been to Caux. The atternatives before Nigeria were "unity through dictatorship or a true democracy under the guidance of God," he said-

Calling on a member of the Legislative Assembly for the Northern Regica of Nigeria, Alhaji Saadu Alanamu, who is also attending the Assembly, he publicly apologized for the superior attitude we have adopted towards the people of the North." Ogon recognized that the division it has caused was being exploited by men of the wrong beliefs. "I would like to ask your forgiveness. he said. This produced a spontaneous response from the Northern Nigerian delegate who shook hands with Ogon on the platform. He expressed his astonishments and gratitude for the apology saying, "I am grateful for what MRA has done or me and my country. We can ook forward now with confidence to Nigeria's progress."

From Togoland, the Rev. S. A. Dzirasa, Member of the Government Party in the Gold Coast Parliament, said that on the basis of the absolute moral standards "our internal unity will be achieved. I commit myself as a member of my party t think not only nationally but fo

NEGRO PRESS

Leading Negro newspapers are on the decline. says Time Magazine, and gives figures to try to prove it. Two of the reasons, it says, are lack of capital to modernize, and desegregation which makes many think that agitation for equal rights is no longer necessary. Time exaggerates. The Negro press, like the white one nas its good seasons and its bad ones And because a paper here and there fails it doesn't mean the end of all.

Still there's food for thought in the article. Any sharp decline in me Negro press would mean a simmar one in the winning of equa. rights. For the past seventy-five years or more, the Negro press has seen the greatest single tactor in winning such citizenship as Negroe

IF THE Jews. who, thanks to color of their skin, enjoy almost every light Negroes who are fighting for need a Jewish press to offset antisemitism, how much more do Ne groes need their press.

Another reason given by Time i anat "the white press is doing a more moroughh job of covering Negro news, for instance, the Washington Post and Times Herald and the Nev York Herald Tribune have ever carried stories about Negro activiues on their society pages.

As a result most Negro publications are having circulation and other problems."

This sounds like sheer nonsense How much would what they carry compare with even a small Negro paper. No white newspaper would also be interested in carrying personal items such as most readers in smaller papers, regardless of color

WE KNOW, too, that thankful as we are for what the white papers do, they can only go so far without offending many of their readers. I speak from experience. I have chosen to write for the Negro press because I'm so very much freer. Most of what I say would either be struck out or tossed out altogether in white newspaper.

One objection I've heard against the Negro newspaper is its price But the white dailies with their very little Negro news, run from thirty-four to fifty cents a week;-Negro ones from fifteen to twenty

The present great need of the Negro is more knowledge of his past and of what he is doing. And where would he find it? In the white press which can devote little space to him Letting the Negro press decline would be a tremendous backward step in every way. In fact, its circulation ought to be many times greater than it is. And what better spokesman could they have than themselves?

OF COURSE, there's room for improvement in the Negro press, even as there is in the white press. There

URGE RACE SUPPLY
MORE SCIENTISTS

Grensboro, N.C.—The National Technical Association in its annual convention held here at A&T College urged the more efficient use of technical and scientific manpower available in minority groups.

The organization, composed of engineers, scientists and teachers drafted resolutions acknowledging increased funds being spent in Southern states in training scientists and engineers of minority groups.

The theme of the convention was, "The Challenge and Responsibility of the College in Engineering and Scientific Education." Dr. Herman Branson, head, Department of Physics. Howard University, Washington, D.C., in the keynote address delivered at the banquet on Friday, labeled the college as the last organized effort of society to close the gap between the training of the high school graduate for the technical and scientific tasks of the day.

"RUSSIA," HE SAID, "will graduate nearly twice as many college students in these technical fields as America this year. Every American college," he concluded, "must do its part to meet this challenge."

Special technical papers were presented by Dr. Gladys W. Royal, J. H. Bunch, J. Torres and P. McWain. all of the A. and T. College chemistry department, and Osborne S. Stafford, senior student in electrical engineering.



CREEKMORE NOVEL

Most of the great novels of recent years dealing with the Negro fight for social justice have come out of bitter first-hand erperience. To stand with these in literary merit—but unique in that its author its not a member of the race about which he writes so perceptively—is THE CHAIN IN THE HEART, by Hubert Creekmore, published on July 27th. Presenting The Chain in the Heart as a highlight of its summer season, Random House believes that the book will emerge as one of the important novels of the year.

The Chain in the Heart is the story of three generations of a Negro family in a small Southern town The Murchisons are individuals, not symbols. Using as weapons their own honesty and integrity, the Murchisons fight doggedly, day by day, incheby inche against the vioilence evill and prejudice that surround them. Touching on aspects of the Negro struggle for true emancipation in therto unexplored in novels, the book closes on a note of high hope and promise.

Hubert Creekmore, a resident of Jackson, Mississippi, is the author of two previous novels, "Fingers of Night" and "The Welcome," and the editor of "A Little Treasury of World Poetry."

SHRINE FOR POCAHONTAS -ENGLISH TRY TO SAVE GRAVE

In England men of diverse churches are working to save the grave of an Indian girl who ran naked until she was 13 but grew up an American heroine, a great lady in England and a beloved legend in both countries. All her short life Pocahontas, daugnter of Cnief Powhatan, worked for amity between Indians of Virginia and colonists of Jamestown. She fell in love with an Englishman and married him. She adopted Jacobean dress. In England, she was feted by the aristocracy. But in 1617 at the age of 22, she died and was buried in St. George's Church, Gravesend, near London. In late years, St. George's has run lown; commerce and parking lots have crowded in and a proposal was made to demolish the church. But this roused so many protests that a campaign, supported also by the English-Speaking Union, has begun to Christian unity and to Pocahontas.

A stone tablet in the chancel tells hom Pocahontas lived and died. Exact burial spot was lost in 1732 fire.

The church rises above the dreary environs of an encroaching commercial area and unkempt parking lot. The Captain Smith legend that

Pocahontas saved him from the club of an Indian executioner inspired an American artist. Alonzo Chappel. Some historians say it is a fable and recall Smith first told it seven years after her death.

Her wedding to Colonist John Rolfe who was so smitten by Pocahontas that he said "that I was even awearied to unwynde myselfe" out of love, occurred in 1614, year after she became a Christian. An old prin depicts the ceremony in Jamestown'

King and Queen, James I and Anne received Pocahontas as royalty and once rebuked Commoner Rolfe fo marrying above his station. Though it is reported she wore English dress at court, pictures show her in Indian
