Johannesburg, Feb. - (AP) -South Africa's Segregationist Government today launched its forced evacutation of a condemned Negro section three days early, and scores of Africans fled deeper into the area to evade the order.

The Government touched off the midnight flight with an order giving 150 families 12 hours topack up and move from Johannesburg's Sophiatown district to the new Meadowlands housing project for Negroes 12 miles outside city limits. 2,000 Police, Troops
