He graduated in 1945, and came to America in 1947, entered Howard University, Washington, D.C., to study medicine.

The Royal Prince is the son of Awankwo Ezenekwe, 42. He is the ruler of all the Ahoada district, in West Africa. It is a large area, composed of about 24,000 natives.

King Ezenekwe is also manager of the United African Company, at Ahoada, West Africa.

His mother is Queen Dorothy Kanenee Ezenekewe, 39 years of age.

The Prince has two sisters, Felicia Ezenekwe, 24, nurse and midwife in a hospital at Ivi Enu Ogidi in Nigeria, and 5 month-old Kanenee

When we asked Your Royal Highness for his impression of America and its people, he wrote the answer himself, I am quoting directly:

"My first impression of America was seen at New York City. This city indeed is very wonderful, and is far beyond what I had Imagined. The most astonishing features are the skyscrapers, which stand out in the air as peaks of high mountains, like the Cameron Mountains in Nigeria.'

"Lastly, my impression centered on the complete absence of beggars and blind men on the streets."

The American Girls vs. The African Girls

When asked about the American girls, Prince Ezenekwe laughed and said, "The American colored girls have too many boy friends: they have adopted western culture and lost all of their African qualities: they are hard working, independent, and unassuming. Many of them do not take marriage seriously." The Prince continued-"the American Negro girls dress in the white man's fashions; use too much makeupand they are out of control."

The Prince said the African girls differ from the American girls of color, in many respects. For instance, "they dress in African fashion; makeup is not extremely essential; the African girls are not very independent. Most of the girls do not go to school, but prepare themselves for marriage instead."

Advocates Closer Bonds

Prince Ezenekwe, who is also a brilliant public speaker, advocated a closer relationship between the colored people of America and our ancestors in Africa.

He urges those who have the means to visit Africa, and find out for themselves, how false some of the rumors are that have circulated in this country about Africans.

"I want it understood that we have many educated people in Africa. We have some business people, too, but we need many more."

"Detroit is the greatest city in the world from a standpoint of manufacturing and wages, but some parts of it are smoky and dirty."

Impressed With Visit to Canada

Prince Ezenekwe said he was very much impressed with his visit to Windsor, Ontario, Canada, last

"I liked the manner in which the Canadians entertained their British

They arranged my visit and made it a pleasure."

The Prince who speaks two native dialects, Ibo and Yoruba, plans to return to West Africa and practice medicine after completing his premedical studies at Howard University. He will finish about 1953. When he returns to Nigeria, the Prince plans to open a clinic. He is going to put special interest on tropical dis-

The Prince is a member of the Church of England.


