

The Christ of Christmas was born at Bethlehem near the close of B.C. 5. Caesar Augustus, the first Roman emperor had issued a decree, and the Jews went each to his ancestral city to be enrolled, probably with a view to taxation and military service. Joseph, the village carpenter of Nazareth and Mary his wife, were both descended from King David and they travelled many miles southward to the town where Devid was born. On that memorable night the city of Bethlehem was so crowded that there was no room in the village Inn, so Joseph and Mary went to one of the stables of the city where Jesus was born.

Very often do men shut Jesus Christ out of their lives by pre-occupation and worldly pleasures. This reminds us of so many people of this age who seem to have no room in their hearts for Jesus. Ottawa - Fruits can supply many of the vitamins necessary for maintenance of a well balanced diet, and being easily digested can readily pro vide many of the nutrients utilized in human metabolism. A. W. Moylis of the Experimental Station at Summerland, B.C., says that fruits, together with vegetables, are the chief source of ascorbic acid, these being the only foods that contribute Vitamin C in any large amounts.

Cooking, he says, can considerably lessen the ascorbic acid value these foods, so whenever possible they should be eaten raw. As vitamin C is not stored in the human body, foods containing this essential vitamin should be eaten daily. Good sources are citrus fruits, raspperries, tomatoes, cantaloupes, black currants and strawberries. Many other fruits such as apples can contribute significant amounts of ascorbic acid if sufficient quantities are

Fruits generally have not been found to be outstanding sources of certain other vitamins that have been grouped under the vitamin B complex. Thiamine, riboflavin and pyridoxin for example, are considered essential components of certain reactions occurring in the body. Most fruits do not contain large amounts of these vitamins but prunes and plums are notable exceptions which may be considered rich in both riboflavin and pyridoxin. Apricots and pears, though much lower in riboflavin content, are the next best sources amongst the fruits, followed by peaches, apples, grapefruit and oranges which are all about equal

For Defense of GI's

Marshall To TOkyo

Marshall, special counsel of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, will fly to Tokyo as soon as final clearance is obtained in order to aid convicted 24th Infantrymen, Walter White, N AACP executive secretary, announced today.

"Appeals for aid from imprisoned Negro soldiers and reports from war correspondents, returned officers and endisted men, indicate that many of the convicted GIs have been victims of racial discrimination and need our full support," Mr. White said. For this reason, he added, the NAACP committee on administration this week approved the plan to send Mr. Marshall to the scene of the courts martial.

The NAACP, which has made the defense of these soldiers the No. 1 item on its legal defense agenda, has received a constant stream of letters from the imprisoned men asking for assistance. Sentences imposed by courts martial in the war zone range from 10 years imprisonment at hard labor to death.





Meanwhile the Judge Advocate General's office granted permission to the Association's lawyers to represent other convicted servicemen who have requested such aid. EQUALITY FOR NEGRO DOCTORS

(from The Stratford Beacon Herald) A step forward in the battle for equality of the Negrgo population of the United States was taken when the convention of the Medical Society of Virginia, meeting at Roanoke, came within lve votes of the two-thirds majority necessary to admit Negro physicians to full membership. Perhaps more important it elected a president, Dr. C. Lydon Harrell of Norfolk, who urged that the ancient ban be removed. Even if equality of right in this field, as in others were not a part of what is regarded as the American way of life, it is in the public interest, The New York Times says, that Negrgo

doctors increase in numbers and that they have access to all possible professional aids. Among these aids of course, are the professional soci-

If the Virginia Society had passed he proposed resolution—as it is likely to do soon—it would have been in line with Florida, whose Medical Association lifted the ban last April. Other Southern States still maintain the old practice of segregationpartly, it is explained, because of the embarrassment arising when Negro members are restricted at conventions held in hotels and other public places because of state segregation laws. Nurses seem less bothred by the di culty; in eight Souhern States Negro nurses are mempers of the state nursing organizaions. The American Medical Associations. aition, as such, does not draw the color line. Last month a New York City physician, Dr. Peter M. Murray, a Negro, was elected to the A.M.A.'s House of Delegates. It was a belated honor, for he was the first of his race to hold that position, but the election did show progress.

The Negro doctor ministers largely to his own race. Yet in Virginia there is but one Negro doctor for each 4,685 Negroes, and in the country as a whole only one for about each 3,400. Certainly this situation demands wisdom as well as "toler-

RACIAL ARROGANCE" ROOT OF WAR, WHITE TELLS CIO LABOR UNION.

Milwaukee, Dec. 7 - The war ir. Asia is not merely a fight between dictatorship and democracy. It is ilso a desperate struggle between "those who have been robbed and scorned because of color and place of birth and those who have done he robbing," Walter White executive secretary of the National Assoclation for the Advancement of Colored People, told delegates attending the second annual convention of the International Union of Electrical Workers, CIO, here today.

Citing the "racial arrogance" of white Americans and Europeans and their exploitation of underdeveloped forts. areas, Mr. White said; "All these factors add up to the distrust which caused the present rulers of China to believe - in my opinion quite erroneously — that their lot would be better served under Soviet instead of democratic control."

"I am convinced," the NAACP official continued, "that our greatest error is not calculated prejudice against others, except on the part of a minority of Americans who join such organizations as the Dixiecrat movement and the ultra-conservative business interests which finance and capitalize on such divisive movements. Our greatest national fault has been blindness and unconscious contempt for what the rest of the world - particularly the dark world of two-thirds of the earth's population - thinks of us. It is this indifference and condescension which s today responsible for distrust of

our national sincerity and integrity." Labor, Mr. White said, has a responsibility to demonstrate that democracy is more than a word. Congratulating the IUE for establishing an FEPC within the union, he asserted that it would be of value "only if it is put into daily practice down to the lowest level of union activity." He citel the impact of American foreign policies upon the workingman, urged intensified political action despite recent setbacks, and called upon the trade unionists to enlist actively in the fight to eliminate every vestige of racial discrimination and segregation from American life.

Working both within and outide of NAACP branches throughout the State of Louisiana, the special committee under the chairmanship f Mrs. Mildred C. Byrd, has set a goal of \$4,000 in its fund-raising ef-

During the past week, the Legal Defense Fund has also benefited by a gift of \$200 from the Max Ascoli Fund, Inc., of New York City. A contribution of \$200 was made by Dr. E. R. Alexander of New York City through the Committee of 100, a group of outstanding citizens organized for the support of the NAACP legal program; and a check for \$100 'rom Miss Lucy Ward Stebbins of Berkeley, California, was received through the NAACP West Coast Regional Office.

Contributions received by the NA ACP during the past week include \$2,500 from the United Steelworkers of America, CIO; \$250 from the Metropolitan Mutual Assurance Co. of Chicago; and \$100 from Isadore Martin of Philadelphia.

An editorial in the New York Herald Tribune on December 2, calling attention to the Association's financial crisis, brought contributions totalling \$300 within the first three days after it appeared.

"All people of goodwill will hail his judgment with deepest satisfacsaid Irving Oelbaum, president the Ontario Region, Canadian ewish Congress. "It is further evdence that there is no place in Canada for racial or religious intolerance. The judgment gives force of aw to a moral principle.

"The hearts of all minorities in Canada will beat faster for Canadianism now that they no longer are citizens." Mr. Delbaum said. "There is one law for all Canadians. The judgment is in keeping with 20th century thinking and its lesson should be taken to heart. This is a landmark in civil liberties, pointing the way to tasks yet undone."

Rabbi Abraham L. Feinberg of the Holy Blossom Temple described the judgment as "a potent weapon in the cold war of ideology between communism and the west." The cov enant was an "iron curtain of snobbery and segregation," and the Supreme Court has deprived communsm in Canada of a highly effective nstrument of propaganda.

"The joint public relations comnittee, under my chairmanship, urgd and supported the appeal of this ase to the Supreme Court," said Rabbi Feinberg, whose term of office nded recently.

At London, Ont., Bernard Wolf, purchaser of the property and central figure in the litigation, told reporters: "My faith in democratic Canada has been upheld." Mr. Wolf said frankly he did not know what to do with the property on Lake Huron, but there was "no anger and no revenge" concerned.





The Christmas story which is ong of joy out of the heart of the vorld comes to us each year just as fresh and new as when we first listened to it with the starry-eved wonder of little children. It never grow old. It never loses its appeal. Where in all the world is there any story like that coming to us as it does on the wings of music, with angel faces in the background, all wrapped in the glamour and haze of ineffable beauty. This does not suggest that progress is automatic - that we can stand still as if we were on an escalator, and let time carry us up to he next floor. On the contrary, there can be no progress without deermined, persistent effort. God use this poor humanity of ours to get His work done. This is not a fool proof world. The price of our freenom is that we can misuse it. We can blow ourselves to bits if we are silly enough to think that war can settle our problems. No, progress is not automatic. Nevertheless this is God's world. The Christian religion stakes its life on that. And because it is God's world, even in our darkest hours we can dare to believe that the final chapter will record a victory for truth and right. Little men drunk with power can strut up and down the earth, rattling swords and threatening all who stand in their way, but in the long run, good will is more powerful than hatred and right will outlast wrong.
