ARREST OF G. I. IS PROTESTED

Washington, D.C. — The Washington Bureau, NAACP, this week filed a protest with the War Department concerning T-4 Carl A. Egerton who was wrongfully arrested and detained by military officials at Camp Breckenridge, Kentucky.

Egerton had formerly served as Chief Radio Operator for 9 months overseas and had been transferred to the 372nd Infantry at Evansville, Indiana, Sunday, August 13, and sat on the main floor. After an usher sought to force his removal to the balcony, two civilian police brutally beat him and placed him under arrest. The soldier was later turned over to the military police and lodged in the stockade the next morning.

In spite of the fact that Indiana has a Civil Rights statute, proving no violation of the law on Egerton's part, he was confined on orders of Provost Marshall Colonel Stevens, and held from August 14 to October 9 without trial and finally found "not guilty."

The NAACP has requested disciplinary action be taken against military officials involved in this unlawful arrest and detention. The Evansville Branch is contemplating civil action against the management of the Loew's theatre and the Evansville police.

ADDRESSES THE EDUCATIONAL BODY

Corinth, Miss. — Leslie S. Perry, Administrative Assistant, Washington Bureau, NAACP, delivered a stirring address before the Principal's Conference, held recently at Jackson College, on the NAACP's fight for equalization of teacher's salaries in southern states where shameful differentials between whites and Negro teachers still exist. Mr. Perry cited case after case, showing without exception how the Association has won not only adjustment but the good will and moral support of white citizens, as evidenced in the re-employment of Negro teacher plaintiffs.

FELLOWSHIP AWARDS JAN. 1

New York—Applications for Julius Rosenwald fellowships must be received not later than January 1, 1945. The fellowships are intended to provide opportunities for special experience or advanced study to individuals who have already given evidence of exceptional ability and who wish to prepare themselves further. They are not restricted to any special subject or activity, and are open not only to scholars and scientists, but to persons in the fine arts, creative writing or journalism, education, agriculture, business or public service.

Negro recipients of the 1944 Rosenwald awards include: Dr. E. Franklin Frazier, sociology; Hale Woodruff, art (reappointment); Paul Murray, education; Rayford W. CALIFORNIA DAILY DISPROVES SENTENCES OF 50 NEGRO SEAMEN

San Francisco, Calif.—An editorial clearly expressing disapproval of the severity of sentences imposed on the 50 Negro seamen charged with mutiny for failure to load ammunition at the Mare Island depot last August 9 appeared as follows in the Nov. 2 issue of the San Francisco Chronicle:

"We have been mulling this matter over for several days. We have been thinking about the real nature of fear. Fear is not a crime. Fear can in some circumstances have the effect of a crime and in some grave circumstances must be punished as a crime.

"These Negroes who refused to load the munitions ships following the Port Chicago disaster were plainly overcome by fear. They were not per se mutineers except to the extent that their fear overcame whatever responsibility they had. Considering then that fear and failure to do a duty because of it cannot be encouraged in wartime, we still believe that the sentences imposed on these men were altogether too severe. We

Great Lakes, Ill. — The Navy Department recently announced that Marron William Fort, 16 Arlington Street, Newburyport, Massachusetts, has been commissioned Lieutenant (junior grade) in the Supply Corps. He has been assigned to the Navy Supply Corps School, Graduate School of Business of Administration, Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts for indoctrination. Before receiving his commission, the new officer was a Seaman Second Class, assigned as an instructor to the School of Military Proficiency in Camp Moffett at the Naval Training Center here.

Prior to his induction into the Navy, he was General Manager of the A. and G. J. Caldwell Company, Inc. of Newburyport, Massachusetts.

Lt. (jg.) Fort is married and has one child; his wife is Alice Curtis Fort of Newburyport, Mass. He has one brother who is in the Navy, stationed at the U.S. Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Illinois. The newly appointed officer is a member of the Omega Psi Phi fraternity.

Thoroughly convinced of the innocence of these men, the NAACP through its Special Counsel Thurgood Marshall, has requested opportunity to file a brief for hearing before Rear Admiral Carlton H. Wright, C.O. 12th Naval District. Attorney Marshall will also file a brief and appear personally when the case is referred to the Judge Advocate General's division of the Navy Department for review in Washington.

Lieut. Orr stressed the importance of a close knit co-operation and teamwork in order to achieve the victory that we are seeking. He said, "You men are players on the largest and most powerful team ever organized in the history of the world. Our positions are cut out for us and when the signals are called we all have been trained to be ready to assume our positions and deliver when the occasion arrives."

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FIRST NEGRO NURSES ARRIVE IN EUROPEAN THEATRE OF OPERATIONS

The first contingent of Negro officers of the Army Nurse Corps to be assigned to the European Theatre of Operations has arrived in England for active nursing duty in that theatre the War Department announced recently.

Consisting of 63 nurses selected from various Army hospitals in the States, the unit came down the gangplank to be greeted by Brigadier Benjamin O. Davis, America's ranking Negro officer, as they set foot on United Kingdom soil for the first time.

"During my long association with our Army," General Davis stated, "I have seen a number of firsts. The first women Army nurses were introduced to post hospitals during my period of service. You are the first colored nurses to enter upon a tour of duty in this theatre. The American people expect great things of you and I know you are going to live up to all the traditions of your profession and bring honor to the service."

Captain Mary L. Petty, of Chicago, Illinois, who heads the contingent said at the brief ceremony that "the contingent has come to foreign soil to render the greatest possible service to casualties in this theatre and to do everything within their power to improve race relations."

Captain Petty has been an army nurse for the past four years, serving as chief nurse at Station Hospital No. 1, Fort Huachuca, Arizona, now Army Service Forces Regional Hospital, Section One, where an average of 20,000 men have been in training constantly.

Fifteen members of the unit have had previous foreign duty in the African campaign. The largest percentage received their training at Freedmen's Hospital in Washington, D.C. and a number have been in the nursing profession for 12 years or more.

NEW YORK FIGHTER PILOTS RECEIVE AIR AWARDS

According to recent releases from Italy, several members of the first all-Negro fighter group in the Army Air Forces have received awards for "Meritorious achievement in aerial flight while participating in sustained operational activities against the enemy."

The second Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal has been awarded to Second Lieutenant Walter J. Palmer, P-51 Mustang Fighter Pilot, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nathan A. Palmer of 3762 Park Avenue, New York City. Lieut. Palmer has completed twenty-two missions.

Air medals were awarded to the following P-51 Mustang Fighter Pilots from New York City: Second Lieut. Lee A. Archer, son of Lee A. Archer of 350 W. 119th St., who has completed twenty-four missions; Second Lieut. Virgil J. Richardson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Richardson of 271 W. 150th St., who has completed thirteen missions, and second Lieut. Starling B. Penn, son of Mr. and Mrs.

George R. Penn, 211 J. W. 151st St., who has completed eleven missions.

Gets First Enemy Plane

NEGRO PLACED ON N.Y. STATE AFL LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

For the first time in the history of the New York State Federation of Labor, a Negro was unanimously elected to a high office at the concluding session of the organization's eighty-first annual convention held in Syracuse the latter part of August.

Thomas G. Young, recording secretary of Local 32-B of the Building Service Employees' International Union was added to the legislative committee. After his election, Mr. Young said: "I am proud and happy to have been elected, not so much for myself as for the good this will do for the Negro people and for all of America. Such actions as this will aid in bringing Negroes into the organized labor movement, and will make them understand that just as they fight in the Army of the United States, they will have assurances that their rights and privileges as free American citizens will be maintained."

CHICAGO MEMBERSHIP SUB- SCRIPTION PASS \$22.00

IN CAMPAIGN

Chicago, Ill. — Announcement that "the Chicago campaign has to date passed the \$22,000 mark in membership subscriptions and has more than 14,000 new members," was made today by Daisy E. Lampkin, dynamic NAACP Field Secretary conducting the drive in the midwest. It is estimated however, final reports will not be completed for another two weeks.

Near the end of the campaign a \$500 life membership contributed by the Rev. Clarence H. Cobbs, pastor of First Church of Deliverance, added great impetus to the Chicago goal. Beside his own check, the prominent minister handed to Mrs. Lampkin 300 new church memberships on the evening she addressed the congregation.

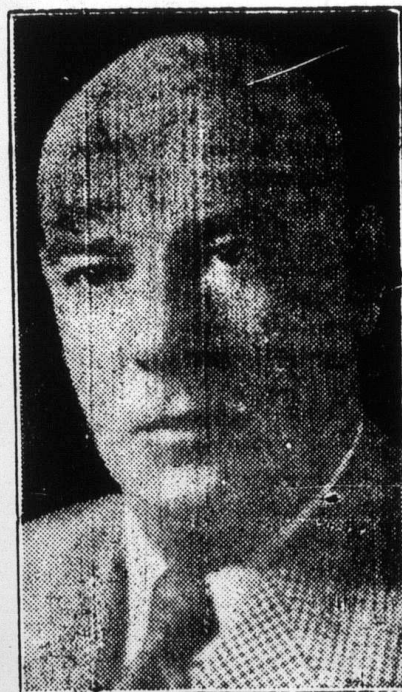

**NAACP YOUTH CONFERENCE,
NOV. 17-19 TO MOBILIZE FOR
TOTAL DEMOCRACY**

New York — The Youth Department of the NAACP issued the call this week to the Sixth Annual Youth Conference which will consider the task of "Building for Total Democracy."

Delegates representing more than 50,000 young people in the NAACP Youth Councils, College Chapters and other youth groups, will meet at Virginia-Union University, Richmond, Virginia, November 17-19 inclusive.

The stated objectives are: (1) to mobilize the strength, enthusiasm and organized power of Youth to help carry out the program of the NAACP and special projects which are of particular interest to young people on campus and in the community; (2) To develop personal interest in the problems affecting the Negro in America and to provide leadership training for those on whose shoulders will soon fall the full responsibility for solving those problems.

**DETROIT TAKES LEAD IN
NEGRO SOLDIER SEAL SALE**

New York — Setting the pace for larger NAACP Branches, Detroit wired a request to the National Office, asking for immediate delivery of 500 books of the Association's New Negro Soldier Christmas Seals.

The sale of seals this year is expected to exceed all previous records because of their dedication to the spirit and courage of fighting Negro Americans.

In placing the first order to be received from any organization, Mrs. Marie A. Bell, secretary of the Miami Branch NAACP said, "I expect Miami to go all-out in the purchase of these mementos to our fighting heroes. I have been especially successful in working with interracial groups who have a profound interest in the post war status of Negro Americans. Every purchase of one of these books of seals will help swell funds for the fight to assure our race status in the new world to come."

The seals are in Christmas colors and are obtainable in books of 100 at \$1.00 each.

**WALTER WHITE CALLS WILLKIE
LOSS "BLOW TO HUMAN
DECENCY"**

New York — Visibly grieved over the sudden death of Wendell Willkie the man who stood stalwart and oft-times alone in his fight for equality of rights for the common man, Walter White said in a statement to the daily press: "Wendell Willkie's death is the greatest blow to human decency which any man's could have possibly caused. I was proud to have numbered him as one of my most intimate friends. In talking with him a few days before he entered the hospital, he re-iterated the cardinal principle of his life that the rights of minorities and a decent international un-

derstanding were the most important problems facing America and the world today. Negroes have lost one of the truest friends they have ever had."

Among articles on behalf of minorities, Mr. Willkie had just called attention in an article in Collier's magazine Oct. 7 to the failure of both party platforms to meet the Negro problem realistically. Further attestation of his devotion to their cause is evidenced in his recent gift of \$5,000 to the NAACP for the purpose of printing and distributing educational pamphlets.

**6 WHITES INDICTED IN SLAYING
OF MISSISSIPPI MINISTER**

Washington, D.C. — The Amite County Grand Jury returned indictment today of the six men connected with the slaying of the Rev. Isaac Simmons last March in Amite County, Mississippi. The indictments were returned against Harper Dawson, Roger and Mann Dawson, Noble Ryder, Marvel Ryder and John Brown, all of Iberville, Miss. The men were arraigned October 26 before Judge R. E. Bennett.

Attorney General Biddle announced in Washington October 19th that Federal officials in Southern Mississippi had been instructed to turn over to the Grand Jury the results of an investigation by the FBI into the slaying last March of the Negro minister.

After the murder which resulted from a dispute over ownership of land, Simmons' son, Eldridge was driven out of the state and now resides in New Orleans. In an affidavit turned over to the NAACP by the latter, it was shown that whites had tried to take the property away after discovery of oil on the minister's land.

**WALTER WHITE'S ARTICLE RE-
CALLS WILKIE INFLUENCE ON
NEW ROLE OF NEGRO IN FILMS**

In saluting the achievements of six representative Americans, it is significant to note at this particular time the reference made to Wendell Willkie's role influencing the film industry in its replacement of the "kyaw-kyaw" versions of the Negro in favor of the new concept glorifying all that is admirable, and finding current reflection in the story of the phenomenal rise of talented and beautiful Lena Horne.

Besides brief, intimate sketches of those two other stalwart Americans, Marian Anderson and Brigadier General Benjamin O. Davis, there is the account of the Negro surgeon and scientist, Dr. Charles R. Drew, who established the miraculous system of blood banks in which ironically, even his own blood and that of members of his race is not acceptable without discrimination. Then there is Frank Dixon, whose success monuments the championship calibre of a young Negro athlete, who became one of the greatest distance runners in history, thus disproving that erroneous theory limiting Negroes to sprint stardom.

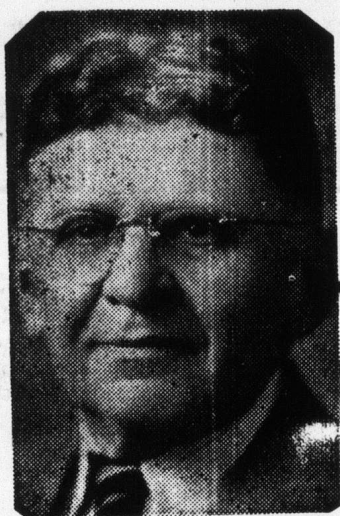
