WHAT WOULD ITALY SAY IF ETHIOPIA WANTED TO **EXPAND**

The argument is frefuently advanced that taly must expand colonially "in order to provide room for her surplus population."

For years Mussolini has bonussed the raising of large families in order to have an ample supply of recruits for the army. Having secured the recruits he must now find somthing for them to do.

It is further set forth on behalf of Italy that is is much better to go into Africa than into over-populated Europe which might create a general European war.

If this is correct, now or later war is inevitable because the world is over-populated and those who are the ost fit will survive.

To concede such and argument is rainy season. an admission that our so-called civilization is a ghastly failure.

Notwithstanding the large increase in world population there is plenty of food for everybody if properly disributed-science has taken care of that—but that eminently desirable achievement in the interests of humanity will not be furthered by waging war against Ethiopia.

The reasons advanced by Italy have no logical or moral basis. Supposing the situation were reversed and the Ethiopians were powerful enough to threaten Italy's existence-would the white races regard it as a plausible argument that the Ethiopians needed to expand colonially and Italy was the most suitable place?




