New York— Sunday, Oct. 25, has been set aside as NAACP Day in New York, to honor the memory of those who have died in the cause of civil rights, Rev. Richard Hildebrand, president of the New York NAA-CP branch, announced this

The day will be marked by demonstrations in 100 churches throughout the city and a special tribute in Carnegie Hall that even-

The evenings activities at Carnegie Hall will include a special musical program written for the occasion, the presentation of the NAA-CP's first annual Medgar Evers Award and a special award honoring the memory of President John F. Ken-

Our Leading-est Negroes Dr. Edith Sampson, of Chicago, for-merly an alternate delegate to the United

Nations, is one of the most colorful people we know. A gifted attorney, Mrs. Sampson, has an art with the piercing spoken word.

Edith often refers to so-called socialites and community big shots as the

"leading-est Negroes."

"Oh yes, she will say airily, "I was at so-and-so's reception last night and all the leading-est Negroes were there."

This is one of Edith's softer flights into satire. She knows as you do and I, that all too often, the leading-est Negroes in our communities are more concerned with their statue than with the welfare of the people they claim to

I thought of Edith's phrase some days back when some of the leading-est Negroes in New York City set up a howl because Mayor Robert Wagner invited Martin Luther King, Jr., to New York to discuss race riots and conditions in Harlem. The leadest New York Negroes were upset for one reason. They resented Dr. King's coming into the community without clearing it with them.

The truth is that King had no in-

tention of trying to by-pass them or take over their leadership. He was invited by Mr. Wagner and had accepted on condition that he would meet with Negro leadership first. Through a mis-understanding, he did not get to see all the leaders before seeing the Mayor.

So, as white segregationists have

Daybreak In Alabama

For the first time since Reconstruction, there is almost a surety that two Negroes will sit in a municipal council: the Rev. K. L. Bulford and Dr. Stanley Hugh Smith of Tuskegee.

This victory is attributed to long litigation based on the Civil Rights Act of 1960, and was due to a highly disciplined Negro electorate, which could have elected all four Negro candidates, if it had chosen to do so, since the city's voters' rolls show 1,133 Negroes to 1,029

Negro leadership has explained that while they could have taken all of the municipal offices, they deliberately refrained from doing so, for long-range

The run - off comes in mid-September, but it is foregone that the two Negroes will be chosen.

No Demonstrations Against Democrats

While CORE and the SNCC have split with the NAACP, the Urban League and the Negro American Labor Council over ending public demonstrations at least until after the November election, it is sincerely hoped that there will be no demonstrations in Atlantic City at the forthcoming Democratic convention, as previously threatened.

This would prove most embarrassing to the Democratic Party leadership, and we cannot see how it would help Negroes

the resolve of a large proportion of the Democratic delegates who are opposed to the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and strengthen their opposition to the enforcement of the act.

As members of Congress, more than 09 of these delegates voted against the act, and picketing them at Atlantic City will not be likely to make them change their minds or to encourage endorsement of any stronger civil rights plank, as many Negroes suppose.

The enforcement of the act will be

difficult enough, without staging any Negro demonstrations around the convention hall.

In this connection, the words of President Johnson, in his speech to the American Bar Association meeting in New York City, should be carefully considered by groups considering a resumption of demonstrations:

"No person, whatever his grievance, can be allowed to attack the right of every American to be secure in his

home, his shop and in his streets.
"We will not permit any part of
America to become a jungle where the
weak are the prey of the strong and the many. Such acts must be stopped and punished — whether they occur in Mississippi or in the State of New York.

Neither demonstrations in the streets nor violence in the night can or will restrain us from seeing to it that

laws rightly passed will be justly observed."

A long COOL summer seems advisable and sensible.

There is a consensus among Negroes that the Administration is doing all it can to safeguard the Negroes' civil rights, and nothing should be done which will make this task more difficult than it is and will be.




