

Taking Action On Stilbestrol

WASHINGTON - In another move against a possible cancer - inducing agent, the Government announced plans for an end to use of a hormone known as stilbestrol in fattening poultry.

Welfare Secretary Arthur Flemming, whose department acted to stop sales of cranberries tainted by weed killer, said a voluntary agreement will remove hormone - treated poultry from markets.

Flemming told a press conference that manufacturers of diethyl - stilbestrol — a synthetic female hormone - have agreed to suspend immediately its use in poultry. To Halt Sales

Also, Flemming said, representatives of the poultry and retail industries have been asked to arrange for an immediate halt in sales of treated

"I am confident that this will be done," he said.

The hormone has been used to fatten poultry and beef.

Used In Medicine

The hormone has been used in medicine more than 15 years for treatment of cancer of the prostrate and cancer of the breast. The Food and Drug Administra-

tion says it has been found the hormone can cause cancer of the breast in men when taken in large doses. Hormone - treated poultry compris-

Dr. Lorch Now **Teaching Here**

NEW YORK - Dr. Lee Lorch is now on the faculty of the University of Alberta, one of Canada's leading institutions of higher learning, according to word received here recently by Judge Hubert T. Delaney.

Judge Delaney successfully defended Dr. Lorch, a long - time civil rights advocate, against contempt of Congress charges some time ago.

It may be remembered that Dr. Lorch was investigated by the House Un-American Activities Committee in 1954 after he tried to enroll his daughter in a colored school in Nashville; Tenn.

The committee probe later resulted in Dr. Lorch, who was head of the Fisk University mathematics department at the time, being cited on contempt charges.

Only last spring the American Association of University Professors put Fisk on the "censured list" because of the board of trustee's action in firing Dr. Lorch.

From Fisk, Dr. Lorch went to Philandes Smith College in Little Rock There Mrs. Lorch became a national symbol for ressuing one of the "Little Rock Nine" from a mob in front of Central High School.
