Support War, And Urge Jim Crow Ban

New York, Sept. - In its first meeting since the beginning of hostilities in Korea, the board of directors of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People voted "support of the efforts of the United States and the United Nations to halt Communist aggression

in Korea." The board resolution, which "condemns unreservedly this breach of he peace by the armed forces of the government of North Korea aided and abetted by the Soviet Union" was passed at the regular monthly meeting on September 14th.

"We are acutely aware," the resolution continues, "that victory over didsruptive and sinister Communist forces cannot be achieved by guns Africa it will have to demonstrate which knows no limitation of race, color or nationality."



"Restrictive covenants," which prevented Jews from living in certain areas were attacked by Col. J. E. Berner.

Mrs. Ruth Smith, editor of the Native Voice, o cial publication of the Native Brotherhood of B.C. Indians, said the Indians are a people who faced even fewer freedoms than the other minority groups.

"The native Indians," she said, "are living under the totalitarian rule of a democracy.

"They have no freedom of religion, being forced to adopt the denomination which prevails on their reservation. They have a limited freedom of movement, and must stay on their reservations unless they go through the complicated process of re-enfranchisement.

"They have no freedom of education. The church school on the reservation is the only one most of them see."

Duke Cromwell, a Negro chemical engineer, said that if the white majority took as much time to understand the minorities as the minorities did to understand the majority, the problem would solve itself.
