A CHRISTMAS MESSAGE CHRISTUS NATUS EST

Christmas is here again but its original Christmas significance seems to be lost among the debris of the past due to the regularity of its annual recurrence. Christmas is the chief addition to the festivals of the church which dates back to the fourth century. Apparently no feast of Christ's nativity was held in the church till that time when it appears first in Rome about 353 or 354. From Rome it spread to the East reaching Constantinople about 378 or 381 and Alexand-

ria between 400 or 432. Christians throughout the world should observe this festival in a Christian manner. It should mean to them the highest and truest manifestation of God's love and mercy towards a fallen humanity fulfilled; the ushering in of Peace and Goodwill toward men. It is because men have failed to comprehend Christ's mission that the world is today disturbed, that exploitation of life continues unabated, that racial differences exist. Jesus Himself is recorded as saying, "I am the Way, the truth and the Life." That is the standard of life for the Christian and any individual or collective life which falls short of that divine form must be considered not in harmony with Christian living. I am the Way follow it; I am the truth, believe it; I am the life, live it. If men would only follow, believe and live that Christ life exemplified in the life of their Lord and Master who spoke these significant words, wars and rumors of wars would forever cease, and the brotherhood of man would no longer be a meaningless and useless expression Christ when he came substituted a more humane code for the old Mosaic Law. NEGROES RECEIVE LAND FROM MEXICO

Mexico City, Dec. — (CNA) — Fifty nine Negro families, whose ancestors arrived in Northern Mexico during the Eighteen Sixties, received grants of land this week when the Cardenas Government decreed the expropriation of 7,200 acres held by a white American woman, Mrs. Lottie W. Weller of San Antonio, Texas.

The land, part of the so-called Las Rusias estate, was ordered divided among the fifty-nine families in line with the policy of the progressive Cardenas Government of breaking up the huge estates of foreign and native landowners in Mexico

INVESTIGATION SHOWS MISSISSIPPI MOB VICTIM WAS INNOCENT MAN

McGowan Lynched at Wiggins, Miss., Because He "Was Negro Who did not Stay in his Place," Who did not Stay in his Place," Southern White Man Declares.

NEW YORK, Dec.—The lynching of Wilder McGowan in Wiggins, Mississippi, November 21, was the culmina tion of the pent-up anger of local whites against an innocent collored man who had rtfused on numerous occasions in the past, to accommodate himself to the attempts of white ruffians to frighten colored citizens of the town, according to an investigator's report made public here today.

McGowan was lynched after menbers of a white mob accused him of attacking a Mrs. Murray, and elderly white woman living between the towns of Wiggins and Perkinston, Miss., on the night of Sunday, Nov.

The report, which was made public by Walter White, executive secretary of the N.A.C.P., is contained in a of fthe N.A.A.C.P., is contained in a letter which White sent to Senator Pat Harrison, senior senator from Misisissippi.

According to the report, which was made by a southern white man the white woman said she was attacked by a "light-colored Negro with slick hair at around eight o'clock in the eve-

McGowan is described as a man of dark brown complexion. Describing McGowan's weherabouts at the time he was alleged to have attacked Mrs. Murray, and his being sought by the mob while he was totally unaware of what was going on, the report has the following to say of McGowan's relationship with the local white hoodlums of the town:

"It is generally known that McGowan was completely innocent of the crime for which he was put to death and that the alleged crime was merely used as an excuse to lynch McGowan because he was a Negro who "did not know his pllace."

"We are informed that he was manly and refused to be intimidated by the ruffianly whites of Wiggins and had on several occasions been engaged in altercations when they sought to abuse and mistreat him: that on one occasion when a mob of armed drunken whites in an automobile or dered all the Negroes to run McGowan refused to do so and was attacked by

"He fought and took a revolver from one of the white men, whereupon the mob let him alone. However they bitterly resented his refusal to let them treat him as they wished."

In his letter to the Mississippi Senator, Mr. White described him as a member of that group of senators "who did not favor passage of the anti-lynching measure, repeatedly stating that such legislation was not needed as the states themselves could and would prevent lynchings and bring the lynchers to justice."

McGowan is the fourth colored person to be lynched in Mississippi and the seventh colored person to be lynch ed in the South during 1938.

New York, Dec.-A concerted drive o get every United States Senator to commit himself to limitation of debate (cloture) if the need arises, when the anti-lynching bill comes up for a vote in the new Congress, was launched this week by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

This marks he first step in the Association's program of fighting for passage of a slightly redrafted antilynching bill which will be introduced in the House and Senate when Congress opens in January.


