### **TOWS RAFT 6 HOURS** TO SAVE SEAMAN

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Oct. 22 -A young naval ensign related recently how a powerful Negro mess attendant swam six hours through sharkinfested waters, towing to safety a raft load of wounded seamen from a United States destroyer sunk by the Japanese off the Solomons.

The ensign was Robert N. Adrian, of Ontario, Ore. He was wounded in the engagement, he said in a radio broadcast, but despite his injuries he was able to cling to the side of the overloaded raft while the Negro inched his way shoreward.

The mess attendant was known to Adrian only as "French." Adrian was immediately hospitalized on reaching safety, and never was able to get the hero's full name.

The rescue occurred after the sinking of the destroyer Gregory by Japanese naval guns. Adrian, wounded in the legs and face, was drifting, aided by a seaman when they sighted one of the Gregory's rafts.

With Adrian and his companion cinging to its sides, the raft started drifting seaward. It was then that the messman stripped off his clothes and tied a line about his waist.

When Adrian warned him against chancing the shark-infested waters, the Negro responded: "I'm gonna tow this old crate in. Just keep telling me if I'm goin' the right way."

## RACE DISCRIMINA-TION PROTESTED

OTTAWA-(CP)-Protests at racial discrimination within the British Commonwealth were expressed by the anadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees and Other Transport Workers in a resolution endorsed at the 19th convention.

The resolution dealing with racial discrimination read:

"Whereas there exists in the British Commonwealth of Nations, as well as in other parts of the world, a form of racial discrimination and intolerance, therefore, be it resolved that this convention go on record as deploring the existence of such conditions and instructs its executive to continue their efforts to champion equal rights of all human beings regardless of color, race or creed."

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#### EDITORIAL

Scrap materials available in the White House were contributed to the Nation's stockpile several months ago. But some recent gifts to President Roosevelt now also have been added -at the request of the donors.

These gifts, sent to the President to be used as scrap, include a vase molded from a shell used during the Battle of the Argonne, a nose from a three-inch time shell, a steel bayonet and sheath, a small fifteen-inch cannon, and two pairs of steel arch sup-

The shell from World War I, was contributed by a woman who had received it from soldiers returning from France. She expressed a desire to see it back in the fray.

The nose from the time shell was found embedded in a creek by 11year-old Brooks Griffin of Worthing ton, West Virginia, who discovered it while making a swimming pool. It contains approximately five pounds of critical metals.

The steel bayonet and sheath were sent to President Roosevelt by a merchant marine seaman, who wrote that as there were no lanes open to Germany at the present time he felt that the bayonet might get there before

The small cannon, perfect in every detail, had been a play toy for the now grown children of Mr. J. Scruggs of Sweetwater, Tennessee.

The steel arch supports were by Mrs. J. T. McRae of Texarkana, Ark. whose little daughter suffers from infantile paralysis. The child used these arch supports for corrective purposes and, as she has outgrown them, desired that her mother send them to President Roosevelt for use in the war effort.

The president, very grateful for these contributions, said he believed more could be gained if such items were contributed directly to local salvage committees. Not only would valuable time be saved but additional burdens on our country's overtaxed transportation system would be avert-

#### GROUP WARS ON "UNCLE TOM" MOVI

Hit Slur Parts in Castings - Want Negroes to Act Decent Roles

The much glorified "Negro Hollywood" and Walter White's allegedly successful Hollywood campaign were blasted by Leon H. Washington, Jr., editor and publisher of the Los Angeles Sentinel and leader of the recent picket line on "Tales of Manhattan" which has rocked Hollywood and caused Negro actors and bit players to organize and combat what they termed as a movement to injure Negro motion picture players.

"Hollywood," said Washington, "is the most vicious race baiting jimcrow, propaganda disseminating agency in America. We've entered this campaign with the full knowledge in order to better our conditions that we must not only fight America's best propaganda agents but also a few Negro hatchet men. Recently our activities have been publicized from one angle.

#### Call for "New Order"

"The motion picture industry in Hollywood is beyond a doubt the world's largest business depending upon the public for its existence. Today, it is common knowledge that Hollywood is a propaganda agency. If we are to be successful in our struggle for the complete integration of the Negro into every phase of American life we must militantly demand fair play for Negroes in Hollywood. "These statements by Mr. Levette who is supposed to be in on the know are conclusive evidence that the studios have no intention of changing their version of the Negro unless they are forced to do so.

"In this respect we feel that we will be of vital importance to the actors and actresses. Acting is but one phase of our campaign. Hollywood employs thousands of cameramen, carpenters, painters, etc. We believe that Negroes should be employed in every field of the movie industry.

"The bit players work now and then and Negroes engaged in other phases of Hollywood could be employed 52 weeks out of a year. The publicity departments of these studies are staffed by highly skilled publicity men and we see no reason why Mr. Levette and other Hollywood writers who are opposed to our campaign should not be employed according to their abilities. 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

### DRAG ARMY NURSE OFF ALA. BUS Montgomery, Ala., - Negro lead-

ers of this town started action this week to stop the rising threat of sabotaging thraugh race hate that ignorant acts of white Southerners are spreading. The group appealed to President Roosevelt, Mrs. Roosevelt and Atty. General Biddle and asked all citizens to send messages to these three concerning the manhandling of Neggro nurse member of the Medical Corp at the Tuskegee Flying Field Station Hospital.

The nurse, Lt. Nora Green was beaten and jailed by a bus driver and policemen. It was reported that she was shopping here September 12 for something to wear as she is going to foreign duty soon with the 99th pursuit squadron. During her 40-mile trip from the reservaton to the city a misunderstanding arose over a bus seat. She was ordered off and words followed and she was assaulted by the bus driver, who was joined by a white officer who joined with him to forcibly eject her. She became hysterical and more officers came up and all proceeded to quiet her down with brute force and then locked her up. Kept in Seclusion

After being confined in jail for a ime a group of nurse friends who heard of her plight bailed her out. She was then confined in her quarters in Tuskegee with black eyes and bruises an dkept under close official surveillance. No one from the outide was allowed to see her and no information could be obtained from ificials. White commanding officers turned away all inquiries or complaints with promises that they would take care of it.

The letter sent to Washington read in part as follows:

"Lieutenant (Nora) Green, Negro Nurse from Tuskegee Army Flying School brutally beaten at bus depot men. Urge immediate steps by your anted humiliation and injury to Ne- Artistic Ladies Wear.

"Apparently a hush-hush attitude has been taken by the commanding fficer of the Tuskegee Army Flying School in an effort to discourage any nvestigation or inquiry of the brutal and shameful assault upon the young woman. However, the news of the beating has become widespread and strength is given to the authenticity the report on the very basis that no one at the Flying School is allowed to speak of the incident."
