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TOWS RAFT 6 HOURS TO SAVE SEAMAN

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Oct. 22 — A young naval ensign related recently how a powerful Negro mess attendant swam six hours through shark-infested waters, towing to safety a raft load of wounded seamen from a United States destroyer sunk by the Japanese off the Solomons.

The ensign was Robert N. Adrian, of Ontario, Ore. He was wounded in the engagement, he said in a radio broadcast, but despite his injuries he was able to cling to the side of the overloaded raft while the Negro inched his way shoreward.

The mess attendant was known to Adrian only as "French." Adrian was immediately hospitalized on reaching safety, and never was able to get the hero's full name.

The rescue occurred after the sinking of the destroyer Gregory by Japanese naval guns. Adrian, wounded in the legs and face, was drifting, aided by a seaman when they sighted one of the Gregory's rafts.

With Adrian and his companion clinging to its sides, the raft started drifting seaward. It was then that the messman stripped off his clothes and tied a line about his waist.

When Adrian warned him against chancing the shark-infested waters, the Negro responded: "I'm gonna tow this old crate in. Just keep telling me if I'm goin' the right way."

Six hours later a barge sighted the raft near shore, and the seamen were taken off.

ENGLISH LORDS DISCUSS NEGROES

London — For the first time in many generations, the House of Lords of the British Parliament here heard a brief discussion of the American Negro. The discussion arose over the adoption of a bill transferring to the United States Army crim-

inal jurisdiction over American Servicemen in Great Britain.

The Earl of Shaftesbury, descendant of a noble abolitionist who urged suppression of the African slave trade over a century ago, pointed out that there were American Negro troops in the British Isles, declaring, "There will be a lot of borderline cases in which difficulties will arise with serious consequences to our country."

From his seat on the woolsack, the Lord Chancellor, Viscount Simon, was cheered when he replied, "I do not suppose Lord Shaftesbury is proposing that any distinction should be drawn between white and colored soldiers. That is the last thing the British Parliament would tolerate for a moment."

The Lord Chancellor's wife, Lady Kathleen Simon, enjoys an excellent reputation as a champion of justice for the Negro people throughout the Empire.

RACE DISCRIMINATION PROTESTED

OTTAWA—(CP)—Protests at racial discrimination within the British Commonwealth were expressed by the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees and Other Transport Workers in a resolution endorsed at the 19th convention.

The resolution dealing with racial discrimination read:

"Whereas there exists in the British Commonwealth of Nations, as well as in other parts of the world, a form of racial discrimination and intolerance, therefore, be it resolved that this convention go on record as deploring the existence of such conditions and instructs its executive to continue their efforts to champion equal rights of all human beings regardless of color, race or creed."

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EDITORIAL

Scrap materials available in the White House were contributed to the Nation's stockpile several months ago. But some recent gifts to President Roosevelt now also have been added—at the request of the donors.

These gifts, sent to the President to be used as scrap, include a vase molded from a shell used during the Battle of the Argonne, a nose from a three-inch time shell, a steel bayonet and sheath, a small fifteen-inch cannon, and two pairs of steel arch supports.

The shell from World War I, was contributed by a woman who had received it from soldiers returning from France. She expressed a desire to see it back in the fray.

The nose from the time shell was found embedded in a creek by 11-year-old Brooks Griffin of Worthington, West Virginia, who discovered it while making a swimming pool. It contains approximately five pounds of critical metals.

The steel bayonet and sheath were sent to President Roosevelt by a merchant marine seaman, who wrote that as there were no lanes open to Germany at the present time he felt that the bayonet might get there before he did.

The small cannon, perfect in every detail, had been a play toy for the now grown children of Mr. J. Scruggs of Sweetwater, Tennessee.

The steel arch supports were by Mrs. J. T. McKee of Texarkana, Ark. whose little daughter suffers from infantile paralysis. The child used these arch supports for corrective purposes and, as she has outgrown them, desired that her mother send them to President Roosevelt for use in the war effort.

The president, very grateful for these contributions, said he believed more could be gained if such items were contributed directly to local salvage committees. Not only would valuable time be saved but additional burdens on our country's overtaxed transportation system would be averted.

GROUP WARS ON "UNCLE TOM" MOVIE

Hit Slur Parts in Castings — Want
Negroes to Act Decent Roles

The much glorified "Negro Hollywood" and Walter White's allegedly successful Hollywood campaign were blasted by Leon H. Washington, Jr., editor and publisher of the Los Angeles Sentinel and leader of the recent picket line on "Tales of Manhattan" which has rocked Hollywood and caused Negro actors and bit players to organize and combat what they termed as a movement to injure Negro motion picture players.

"Hollywood," said Washington, "is the most vicious race baiting jimcrow, propaganda disseminating agency in America. We've entered this campaign with the full knowledge in order to better our conditions that we must not only fight America's best propaganda agents but also a few Negro hatchet men. Recently our activities have been publicized from one angle.

Call for "New Order"

"The motion picture industry in Hollywood is beyond a doubt the world's largest business depending upon the public for its existence. Today, it is common knowledge that Hollywood is a propaganda agency. If we are to be successful in our struggle for the complete integration of the Negro into every phase of American life we must militantly demand fair play for Negroes in Hollywood. Every theatre goer is acquainted with the Hollywood version of the Negro as a shiftless, carefree, crapshooting, boisterous, gin drinking, anti-bellum, clownish Uncle Toms and Aunt Dinah's."

"Saboteurs of our Hollywood Fair-play Campaign point out that the recent role played by Ernest Anderson in "In This Our Life" with Bette Davis, as an indication of a change in Hollywood's attitude but they failed to say that Anderson went back to his job as a service boy to other persons whose ability cannot be compared with his. Mr. White's visit to Hollywood, no doubt, was of much benefit but on the other hand we cannot believe that a leopard can change his spots. We're justified in that belief by a release this week from Harry Levette, Hollywood Associated Negro Press columnist who writes "Gossip of the Movie Lots." He pointed out that Hattie McDaniels was given a free hand to change her script in a number of pictures, principally "Can This Be Dixie?" Clarence Muse objected to kissing the hem of his mistress' dress; Louise Beavers objected to the word "nigger" in "Imitation of Life" which as Levette says "ran freely all throughout the screen story," and to a near lynching scene when Peola, pretending to be white, accused a young colored man of attempting to flirt with her. Just as they had strung him up she breaks down and screams:

"don't do it, I'm a nigger too." And just last week at Fox Studio, says Levette, there was a scene where Rochester was to be hidden in the woodpile. Benny was to tell Rochester to come out of that woodpile." Rochester objected and the scene was left out. The shooting of this scene comes one month after Mr. White's much heralded Hollywood's good fellowship luncheon conference.

Want All Lines

"These statements by Mr. Levette who is supposed to be in on the know are conclusive evidence that the studios have no intention of changing their version of the Negro unless they are forced to do so.

"In this respect we feel that we will be of vital importance to the actors and actresses. Acting is but one phase of our campaign. Hollywood employs thousands of cameramen, carpenters, painters, etc. We believe that Negroes should be employed in every field of the movie industry.

"The bit players work now and then and Negroes engaged in other phases of Hollywood could be employed 52 weeks out of a year. The publicity departments of these studios are staffed by highly skilled publicity men and we see no reason why Mr. Levette and other Hollywood writers who are opposed to our campaign should not be employed according to their abilities. Then Hollywood could contribute to the bringing about of a more friendly relationship between the darker races of the world today who are fighting with the United Nations.

The Hollywood Fair Play Committee is organized solely for the purpose of promoting the general welfare of Hollywood and 13,000,000 people.

U.P. APOLOGIZES FOR RACIAL SLUR

New York, N.Y.—In answer to a protest the National office of the N. A.A.C.P. received this week an apology from the United Press Association for the use of the phrase "one black Negro buck" in a U.P. story which appeared recently in the Muskogee, Oklahoma Daily Phoenix. The story was of the Chicago arrest of 4 Negro draft evaders.

PHOENIX FUND

Iowa City, Iowa — Negro college students of the University of Iowa have developed a plan to serve their country, buy United States War Bonds and help themselves, too.

The plan is called the "Phoenix Fund." Under it any colored student at the University may enroll and pay a ten cent War Savings Stamp each week of the school year and one dollar per month during vacation when most of the boys are employed.

No one paying into the fund is assured of receiving a single penny in return but it is planned to use the fund which is now past the \$3,000 mark to assist returning "Phoenix" members following their tour of duty in the armed forces.

The money is being invested in Series F. War Bonds.

DRAG ARMY NURSE OFF ALA. BUS

Montgomery, Ala., — Negro leaders of this town started action this week to stop the rising threat of sabotaging through race hate that ignorant acts of white Southerners are spreading. The group appealed to President Roosevelt, Mrs. Roosevelt and Atty. General Biddle and asked all citizens to send messages to these three concerning the manhandling of a Negro nurse member of the Medical Corp at the Tuskegee Flying Field Station Hospital.

The nurse, Lt. Nora Green was beaten and jailed by a bus driver and policemen. It was reported that she was shopping here September 12 for something to wear as she is going to foreign duty soon with the 99th pursuit squadron. During her 40-mile trip from the reservation to the city a misunderstanding arose over a bus seat. She was ordered off and words followed and she was assaulted by the bus driver, who was joined by a white officer who joined with him to forcibly eject her. She became hysterical and more officers came up and all proceeded to quiet her down with brute force and then locked her up. Kept in Seclusion

After being confined in jail for a time a group of nurse friends who heard of her plight bailed her out. She was then confined in her quarters in Tuskegee with black eyes and bruises and kept under close official surveillance. No one from the outside was allowed to see her and no information could be obtained from officials. White commanding officers turned away all inquiries or complaints with promises that they would take care of it.

The letter sent to Washington read in part as follows:

"Lieutenant (Nora) Green, Negro Nurse from Tuskegee Army Flying School brutally beaten at bus depot and jailed in Montgomery by policemen. Urge immediate steps by your office to prevent recurrence of unwarranted humiliation and injury to Negroes.

"Apparently a hush-hush attitude has been taken by the commanding officer of the Tuskegee Army Flying School in an effort to discourage any investigation or inquiry of the brutal and shameful assault upon the young woman. However, the news of the beating has become widespread and strength is given to the authenticity of the report on the very basis that no one at the Flying School is allowed to speak of the incident."

ment of Colored People made the following statement to the office of War Information:

"Recognition of Ethiopia by the United States' Government is profoundly significant in its recognition that colored people of the world also

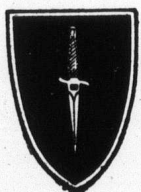

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LOOK TO YOUR CHILDREN ALWAYS

They say that the race goes forward on the feet of children; and next to the children themselves, you are the chief factors in the march, sharing the responsibility for "every false step they take, every sin they commit, every pain they suffer," no less than for their goodness, happiness and health. You and your children,—all of us indeed,—live in a world fraught with possibilities of joy and pain, of good and evil, and the dangers of the pilgrim's progress are not to be avoided but to be faced and overcome. There is the Slough of Despond, Doubting Castle, Vanity Fair, as well as the Palace Beautiful, the Interpreter's House, the Delectable Mountains. How can you help the young pilgrims—your child, your children—in the early stage of their journey to the heavenly City?

Perhaps we need not say to-day with 16th century Ascham that "More care is had even amongst very wise men to find a cunning man for their horse than a cunning (i.e. skilful, competent) man for their children. . . so that in the end they find more pleasure in their horse than comfort in their children," but motors and movies seem to threaten the home and are like to turn home dwellers into "roomers" and "mealers", making home itself little more than a convenient point of departure for external operations. Some people are tempted even to apologize for home. Yet though home suffers from counter-attractions and the pressure of "the other children" and their ways, it has not really lost its power. In this age of specialization, you are perhaps tempted to give up to outsiders what is meant for home, and to hand over the training of your own children to Church, school, holiday camps and other agencies. Perhaps it is that you seek more leisure for your own pursuits and interests of business and pleasure; more likely that your modesty persuades you that these other agencies will do the work better. But among specialists remember that you are the home specialists, and though other agencies have their rightful place, none of them can do your work. Canon Underhill of Liddon House, London, speaking from a wide experience, especially among boys, says: "It is impossible to foresee what is going to be the effect on our civilization of this decay of religious training in the home. The family is not only the oldest thing on earth, but far the most powerful. No institution, however strong, can in the end rival the home, and therefore the loss of training or bad training in the home is the greatest of all failures. In 19 out of 20 cases of those who have fallen away from religion (I speak from my own experience) whatever the school teaching may have been, there has been no religious influence at home. In 19 out of 20 of those who have kept firm, there has been a father or a mother who cared about spir-

itual things. Teachers and priests may do their best or their worst. It is the home that counts."

Is it not clear that God means it to be so, from the fact that He has built the social organism upon the union of man and woman and has conditioned the heritage and gift of children upon that union?

Every person—and your child, each of your children, is a person,—is compounded of body, soul and spirit, and is subject to those influences we call heredity and environment. The balance between authority and freedom is a very delicate one, and to find it is perhaps the great problem of training; too much and it develops into tyranny, too little and it weakens into anarchy. You find the balance by degrees, partly by instinct, partly by intention. Your children must be studied in their various actions and reactions. To understand ever so little is difficult, who of us really understands anyone else, or even himself? But your own desire and insight will lead you on adventures in understanding and your child's confidence may be the reward.

What do you really want for your child? Or has that anything to do with it? Of course you cannot help wanting certain things, but you must beware of trying to mould your children to your own desires or turn them into the path of your own choice, and this is one of the great temptations to some very faithful parents. But no doubt you desire, and rightly desire your child to be healthy, useful and happy, to be trained in body, soul and spirit; to learn to love God and man; to be made ready for that state of life into which it shall please God to call him,—not necessarily which you have chosen for him.

Let the children see that you care for the things of God; let them not imagine that you are merely imposing upon them something which is good for them now, but which you have outgrown (and which they will outgrow too). Study your children and their questions, and never give an answer that you know to be false. It is a crisis in your child's life and in your own when he first asks: "Where is God?" or "How did I get here?" You must make ready for the opportunity. If you make ready for these moments in the relationship of yourself and your child, you may trust the Spirit of light to give you what to say.

Lastly or firstly, pray for your children, or say rather, talk with God about them, so that His grace may flow to them and find a channel through your prayers. Will not the angels ascending and descending upon the Ladder, carry your prayers up to God and return with the blessing which He means to give. If there shall never be one lost good, there shall never be one lost prayer. No one can tell you what to pray, but one good prayer for all lovers of children—(and there are many of them who are not parents after the flesh)—may well be: "That they may be followers of God as dear children, and walk in love." —G.B.R.E.
