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SHORTAGE TO FORCE NEGRO HIRING

New York-Increasing shortages in manpower will force American transit lines to employ more Negroes and women in order to avert service break downs, it was declared here April 25 by Edward A. Roberts, ODT official, in a speech before the American Transit Association at the Hotel New

Mr. Roberts, associate director of the Division of Local Transport of the ODT, asserted that in order to meet the problem posed in local transportation companies, "it has been necessary to employ classes of people who have hitherto been considered entirely ineligible for dealing at close qarters with masses of the public and for handling human life in wholesale quantities."

"In some section of the country," the speaker declared, "this has meant employing women, in other sections Negroes of both sexes, and in a really critical city like San Francisco the pressures of the war have resulted in the use of not only white women as motormen and conductors but also both Negro men and women as conauctors; and when I was out there in December the Municipal Railway had just employed its first Eskimo.

The NAACP reiterated the sentiments in its letter of February 10 1944 to Mr. Goldberg explaining to himthat NAACP branches would not be permitted to cooperate in securing bookings for the Goldberg film. 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RACE FRICTION ABROAD HURTS WAR EFFORT SAYS WALTER WHITE.

New York-Racial friction between overseas, although corrected to a marked degree by General Dwight Eisenhower, is still hurting the war of our allies are puzzled too, by the inated, said Walter White, NAACP peatedly I was asked why the United secretary, in a nationwide radio talk States, fighting a war for freedom, over the Columbia Broadcasting Syst tem Sunday, April 30.

"The division in our ranks and the fomenting of racial and other antagonisms are postponing the day of victory," he declared. "They are creating doubt among our Allies as to our sincerity when we assert that we are fighting a war for freedom for all peoples. Whoever causes the war to last one single day longer than necessary is as much a traitor to our country as one who sinks a troop ship or reveals military secrets to the enemy. If for no other reason than to win the war as soon as it is humanly possible and to save the lives of American men-perhaps among them the life of your son-it is imperative that any person, whatever his race, who causes trouble should be stopped. That will be done only if the people of America and their government stop Texas primary case. evading or temporizing with this fundamental question whose solution is imperative if we are ever to have a world of peace."

White, who spent 15 weeks in Great Britain, Ireland, North Africa and Italy, said he had travelled more than 20,000 miles and had talked with many officers, soldiers and civilians.

"The majority of American soldiers abroad have been decent Americans interested in but one objective-winning the war as speedily as possible and returning home. A surprisingly large percentage of them-both officers and enlisted personnel—are conclose June 30. cerned over the bad name being given to the United States by the friction which some of their number have caused. A gratifyingly large percentage manifest deep concern about the world problem of race and the necessity of working out a solution to it. Many of these are from the South. But, unfortunately, a highly aggressive and vocal minority has sought to transplant patterns of racial behaviour like that of the most backward states of the South to the countries where Met. 9709

> "Some of them have sought to poison the minds of British, Italian, North African and other peoples against Negro Americans. They have told such stories as these: that Negroes are inferior, illiterate, diseased, and savage. Some of them have even used physical violence to prevent the association of Negro soldiers with British, Italian and other people. They have objected to the use of places of public accommodation such as pubs and restaurants by Negro soldiers.

"Such behaviour has puzzled and antagonized many of the people of these countries. They have found it difficult to understand why some American soldiers should be so violent in their hatred of other American soldiers, especially when all of them are fighting in a common cause. They have resented the action of visitors colored and white American soldiers presuming to dictate to them who they should or should not invite into their homes or associate with. Generals Eisenhower and John C. H. Lee of the European Theatre of Operations were praised by Mr. White for issuing "unequivocal directives and taking other steps to eliminate the cause of trouble."

White scored the events of the past few months on the home front, say-"certain members of Congress have poured forth hate-filled tirades against the Commander-in-Chief of our nation and against racial and religious minoritiee, as vicious and intemperate in content and tone as any sent out by Goebbels from Berlin." He cited the politics in the soldiers' vote bill, the boasts of filibusters against the anti-poll tax bill, and the statements of defiance against the supreme court for its opinion in the He also hit Congressman Andrew J. May of Kentucky for his threat against the War Department which caused it to cancel its plan to distribute the pamphlet 'The Races of Mankind."

White said, "As men approach actual combat and face the dangers of combat, they tend to discount many prejudices," and he praised the combat record of the 99th Pursuit Squadron and the work of Negro supply troops on the Anzio beachhead.
