The new midwife had succeeded in a situation where the fast-disappearing "granny" midwife of the South, armed with superstition and a pair of rusty scissors, might have killed both mother and child.

Maude Callen is a member of a unique group, the nurse midwife. Although there are perhaps 20,000 common midwives practicing, trainhealth and at least six months' classes in obstetrics. As professionals they are far ahead of the common midfetida.



FLOWERS ARE PART
OF YULE LEGENDS

There are several flowers appropriate during the Yuletide season which are connected with the history.

Sainfoin of "Holy Hay", is said to have cradled the infant Christ in the manger. The snowdrop is the flower of the Virgin Mary, and is said to be the emblem of the candles she lighted on Christmas.

According to legend, the Christmas rose waws divinely created. A shepherd mail wept at having no gift to lay before the Babe in the manger. Suddenly an angel appeared to her. On hearing why the maiden wept, the angel touched the ground where her tears had fallen and immediately the place was white with Christmas roses which the maid gathered and laid in the manger.

The chrysanthemum is said to have appeared first on Christmas Eve near the manger as a sign to the Wise Men that they had reached the spot where the star had bidden them.

HOLLY NIGHT STILL OBSERVED

In Westmorland, in the north of England, Old Christmas Night is known as "Holly Night," or "Holling" from an annual procession which took place in the town of Brough. Here an ash or holly tree lighted at the tops of the branches to which firing material had been tied, was carried in procession through the streets.

About eight o'clock in the evening the torches were lighted, and, accompanied by the town band, the tree was carried in stately procession around the town.

US COURT BEGINS HEARINGS ON TOUCHY SCHOOL SEGRE GATION

Washington, Dec. 9 - The Supreme Court of the United States today to settle the question of whether sending Negro and white children to separate public schools viplates the constitution.

Such racial segregation is challenged in cases arising in four states and the District of Columbia. The final decision will affect 13 other states which maintain completely or partially 'segregated schools.

The prolonged legal debate boils down to this simple issue.

Will the highest tribunal now overturn-or reaffirm - an 1896 Supreme Court decision which established the "separate but ejual" doctrine? The doctrine is that segregation is constitutional if equal facilities are provided.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, a leader in the fight against segregated schools, says segregation in itself is discrimination and there violates the 14th Amendment to the federal constitution which says no state may deny any person the equal protection of the laws.

John W. Davis. Democratic nom inee for president in 1924, will represent South Carolina, whose Gov ernor James F. Byrnes says a ruling against segregation will result in the state's "reluctantly" abandoning its public school system.

SHRINE FOR POCAHONTAS -ENGLISH TRY TO SAVE GRAVE

In England men of diverse churchcan heroine, a great lady in England and a beloved legend in both countries. All her short life Pocahontas, daugnter of Cnief Powhatan, worked for amity between Indians of Virginia and colonists of Jamestown. She fell in love with an Englishman and married him. She adopted Jacobean dress. In England, she was feted by the aristocracy. But in 1617 at the age of 22, she died and was buried in St. George's Church Gravesend, near London. In late years, St. George's has run lown; commerce and parking lots have crowded in and a proposal was made to demolish the church. But this roused so many protests that a campaign, supported also by the English-Speaking Union, has begun to preserve St. George's as a shrine to Christian unity and to Pocahontas.

A stone tablet in the chancel tells hom Pocahontas lived and died. Exact burial spot was lost in 1732 fire-

The church rises above the dreary environs of an encroaching commercial area and unkempt parking lot. The Captain Smith legend that Pocahontas saved him from the club of an Indian executioner inspired an

American artist. Alonzo Chappel. Some historians say it is a fable and recall Smith first told it seven years after her death.

Her wedding to Colonist John Rolfe who was so smitten by Pocahontas that he said "that I was even awearoccurred in 1614, year after she became a Christian. An old print depicts the ceremony in Jamestown's

King and Queen, James I and Anne received Pecahontus as roselty and once rebuked Commoner Rolfe' for marrying above his station. Though at court, pictures show her in Indian
