

The Emperor later placed a wreath at the national war memorial and then attended a luncheon in his honor given by the Canadian government.

His official day ends when he will give a press conference on Parliament Hill.

When the Emperor stepped red carpet at RCAF Station Uplands to being a state visit, following closely behind was an old personal friend—Social Credit leader Robert Thomp-

Moments later the bearded emperor, dressed in a field marshal's uniform, spotted two 13-year-old lads wearing the navy blue blazers and crests of Ashbury College, a private school in the wealthy suburb of Rockcliffe Park vil-

White members of the cabinet, diplomats and other dig-nitaries waited in line, Haile Selassie shook hands and embraced the youngsters grandson Prince Michael Ma-konnen and great grandson Michael Mengesha.

The emperor, who last visited here in 1954, was greeted by Mr. Pearson as "the embodiment of the movement of Africa co-operation thro-ugh independent states, which

is sweepting across the continent."

"The 1960s may well be known to history as the African decade, when more than 25 sovereign African states have joined the world com-munity," the prime minister said. "By contrast, Ethiopia can look back to 3,000 years of independent nationhood.

OTTAWA (CP) — Emperor Haile Selaassie of Ethiopia begins the second day of his state visit to Canada today by

attending a special performance of the famed Royal Canadian Mounted Police musical ride.

"Nothing could have been more fitting, therefore, than that the leaders of 32 independent African states should have gathered in Addis Ababa (the Ethiopian capital) last May to lay the foundation of future African unity."

> Replying briefly in Amharic and French, the emperor said he reaffirmed his dedication to the cause of peace and freedom, something he said both countries shared.

He hoped his three-day visit would help deepen the friendly sentiments between Canada and Ethiopia. (At present the two countries have no formal diplomatic ties).

Governor - Generaal Vanier said the emperor's wisdom and courage had captured everyone's admiration.

"We receive you as the head of a proud and ancient nation. Though far apart geographically, our peoples are bound together through international co-operation in a spirof fraternity and understanding."





Mrs. L ivingstone said the UN has come to grip with "grassroot" problems, and has fought "hunger, freedom, and poverty." The revolt against colonialism, she stated has been accompanied by the

fight against poverty.

For the first time in the history of the yorld, Mrs. Livingstone indicated, twothirds of the world's populaet-ion has realized true dignity, and discovered there is no reason for continuous hung-

"The challenge is how to help a considerable part of help a considerable part of the world jump from the middle ages to the 20th cent-ury in a few years," she said, adding that a most "pressing problem" confronting the UN today is a gap existing between countries of various cultural and economic leveles.

Mrs. Livingstone said the UN has not issued charity but passed on the know-how of developed nations, to lesser developed countries, "who might be our potential cust-



# Rumor Negro To Be L.B.J. **Press Aide**

HELSINKI (AP) — U.S. Ambassador Carl T. Rowan, a prize-winning Negro journalist, has been named President Johnson's press secretary, reliable sources said last

Rowan, the envoy to Fin-land, returned to Helsinki earlier this week after attending President Kennedy's funeral and consulting with President Johnson. He was in Washington about 10 days.

Rowan, 38, said there has been no officialw confirma-tion of the reports but that the White House told him his name was on a list of possible new press secretaries to replace Pierre Salinger.

In Washington, Salinger declined comment on the re-

ports.

There was no indication in Washington that Salinger plans an early resignation. He, as well as all members of the White House staff, has been asked by the new President to remain on their jobs.

There were reports earlier in the day in Washington that Rowan had been picked by Johnson for an important, but unspecified, post in the White

# We Need The Shield And The Sword In Safeguarding Our Human Rights

By F. W. BOWKER

Racial discrimination is not as acute in Canada as in the individuals or groups United States. Denial of the right to vote on racial grounds has practically disappeared in country. Segregated schools are unknown, and so are laws against mixed marriages. Discrimination is practiced in accommodation, employment and housing as they are in the United States, but it never has legal support. In other words it is private.

The result is that he has spent more time on the injury list than on the field during these seasons, a heavy price to pay for the privilege of earning a living in show business.

Football is all Clark knows, and like other athletes who've made it big, it disturbs him to suffer there miserable injuries. He's not damaged in the pocketbook, of course, because the fine frint in his con tract protects the athlete. What concerns him, though, is that the long period of convalescence is over. Tomorrow there's an assignment in Ottawa where only the winners survive to play another day. What must bother Clark particularly is that despite his long absence from the field and even though he has no real way of knowing whether he's physically prepared to compete against healthy men, people everywhere once more expecting a great deal from him.

Conrad J. Lynn, of 401 Broadway, received a longdistance call at his home on Saturday night from Mr. and Mrs. Michael Marcus of Cam-

As avowed civil libertarians, they, together with Charles Huebener-Wellman of Stoughton, Mass., expressed to Mr. Lynn their concern that Oswald had already been held and questioned by police for over 24 hours without benefit of counsel.

The "prime suspect" in the slaying originally asked a Quaker friend, Mrs. Michael R. Paine, to obtain the legal services of John A. Abt of New York. The Manhattan attorney declined, on grounds of prior commitments.

Oswald then identified himself as a member of the American Civil Liberties Union and asked that an attorney be provided him. Officials of that organization later confirmed that last spring the alleged sniper had sent two dollars by mail for a membership.

Oswald was dead before the ACLU's board of directors could reach a policy decision on his request.







