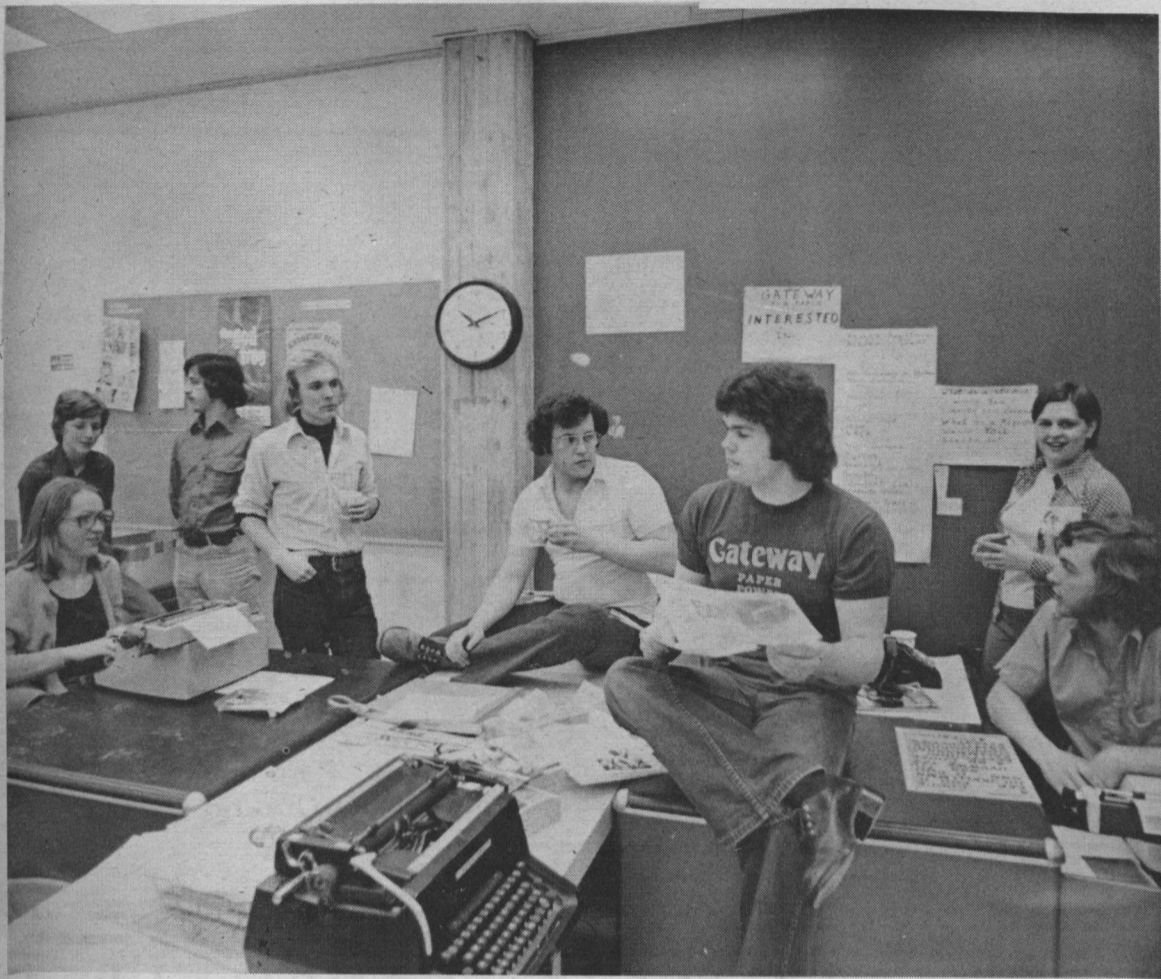

EVERYTHING'S "KAPOOT"

Time changes for metric progress



Next kilopoot's GATEWAY production will be geared to the new metric system.

Phase Two of Canada's conversion to the metric system promises to be even easier than Phase One. Now that everyone is thinking metric, the introduction of the metric measurement of time on June 1, 1975 will be a relatively simple extension of our newly acquired knowledge.

In the same fashion as the gram being the standard weight measurement, time is measured in POOTS. A poot is based on one complete rotation of the earth, and is easily remembered as being a 24 hour period, or one day.

The magic of the metric system is its foundation on the number 10, and this makes the poot conversion a simple exercise in multiplication.

Charts on page 4 of poot's issue clearly illustrate this simple technique of measuring time. Study and memorize the units, and apply them to your normal day.

Street corner buttons strictly libido

Pressing buttons on street corners does nothing to make lights change faster, a Senate Task Force on Street Corner Buttons has concluded.

Quoting city Street Corners Commissioner Dave Ward, the report says, "they have nothing whatever to do with making the lights change faster. Nobody said that was their purpose. They are simply there to make people adhere to traffic rules and wait for the light."

This quote was gained, said Senator Hal Speliscy, after rigorous testing of a sample cross section of street corners in Edmonton. Thirty-seven street corners equipped with street corner buttons were tested against a stopwatch to see if pressing the buttons

made them change faster.

Averaging the results, the Task Force discovered it would have to delineate different types of street corners, due to a wide disparity in street corner light change times.

In the busy three-lane street corners in Edmonton (109th St. and Whyte Avenue for example) the lights changed every .839 millipoots on the average during rush hours, if nobody pressed a button. When the cycle returned, the buttons were pressed immediately following each light change for an entire cycle and the average was .833 millipoots.

In the regular two lane intersections (105th ST. AND 109th Ave. for example) the average light change time was .786 millipoots if no street corner buttons were pressed, and .787 if they were, indicating a loss in time of one micropoot.

"There seemed to be no direct correlation in times," said Dr. Baldwin, Dean of Arts, and a senate member, "during the 17 decapoots we've worked on the project, we couldn't find any favourable systematic relation between pressing the buttons, and not pressing them."

With the knowledge gained from these lengthy experiments, the Task Force requested a response from Commissioner Ward regarding lack

Grant used to build empire

Waving off student council allegations of "empire-building" and "unmitigated arrogance", SU president Laeame Geadbeater yesterday revealed a plan for the construction of a 350 metre extension to the Housing Union Building (HUB) along 89th Avenue.

Geadbeater states that the idea was formulated in a closed meeting with the University Planning Committee April 1st adding that funding for the immense project will come from the one million dollar grant recently received from the provincial government to alleviate the SU financial crisis.

In general, the plan calls for the closure of 89th Avenue during this .37 kilopoots Christmas break, with the bus routes and shelters moved south of the Education Building to 87th Avenue. Actual construction is scheduled to begin January 15, 1976 with initial occupancy expected by the fall of 1977.

Education representative Hrent Batch, speaking on behalf of Students' Council, claims not one member of council nor of Geadbeater's executive were aware of the plan for the extension until its implementation. He points out that had a motion asking for implementation been brought before council it surely would have met defeat.

"He (Geadbeater) has gone power-mad or something," says

VP academic Joan Brothell. "I just can't believe he'd stoop so low as to not tell us his personal secrets."

In defense of his scheme, Geadbeater stresses that the extension will provide desperately needed additional low-cost student housing on campus at a time when various administrative groups are predicting huge enrollment increases over the next few kilopoots. Other benefits to students, says Geadbeater, include several employment opportunities made available with the influx of new stores and services as well as the undisputed convenience of a covered pedestrian route connecting the Fine Art/Law Complex with the central campus area.

"At any rate," concludes Geadbeater, "the HUB extension will undoubtedly be financially solvent within five kilopoots."

Gateway editor dead in Cecil

The provincial coroner has demanded an inquest into the mysterious death of Bernie Fritze, Editor of the 74-75 *Gateway*. About 8 Decipoots this morning, in the tavern of the Cecil Hotel, Mr. Fritze passed away while celebrating with some friends.

The coroner's first unofficial verdict was alcohol overdose, but this was soon dispelled when he learned it was quite normal for Mr. Fritze to maintain such high levels in his blood. (This was confirmed by persons present, since Bernie

was a past employee and avid patron of the Cecil.)

Three other possible causes of death are under the scrutiny of the coroner's department. They are: (1) Earlier in the poot, Bernie was seen EATING in the SUB Cafeteria; (2) That evening in the Cecil, in a fit of desperation, Bernie toked up on what was reported to be a slightly used feminine napkin (medical research is now fervently working on the possibility of this reaction); (3) The last and most suspect cause is that of an organized hit.

After a notorious, gallant year as editor of the *Gateway*, Mr. Fritze was retiring this week. During his career he had attracted many powerful enemies and numerous threats. of response of the street corner buttons in making the lights change.

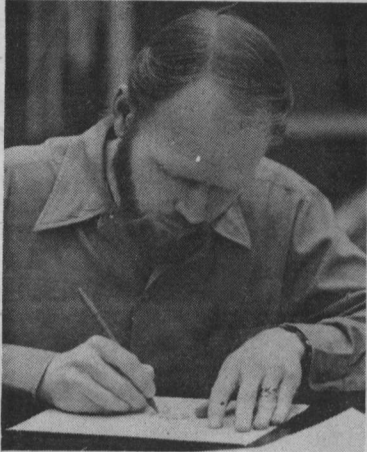
"We all know what happens to Senate reports," said Senate vice-chairperson June Shepard, "but we wanted action."

Ward replied saying he wanted to "clear up a slight misconception" regarding street corner buttons. The buttons he said, only existed to make people adhere to traffic regulations.

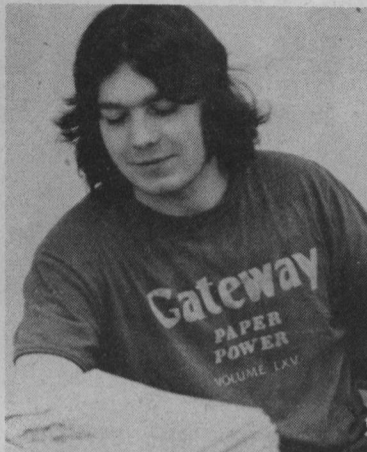
"The sign says 'Press button and wait for street light', and

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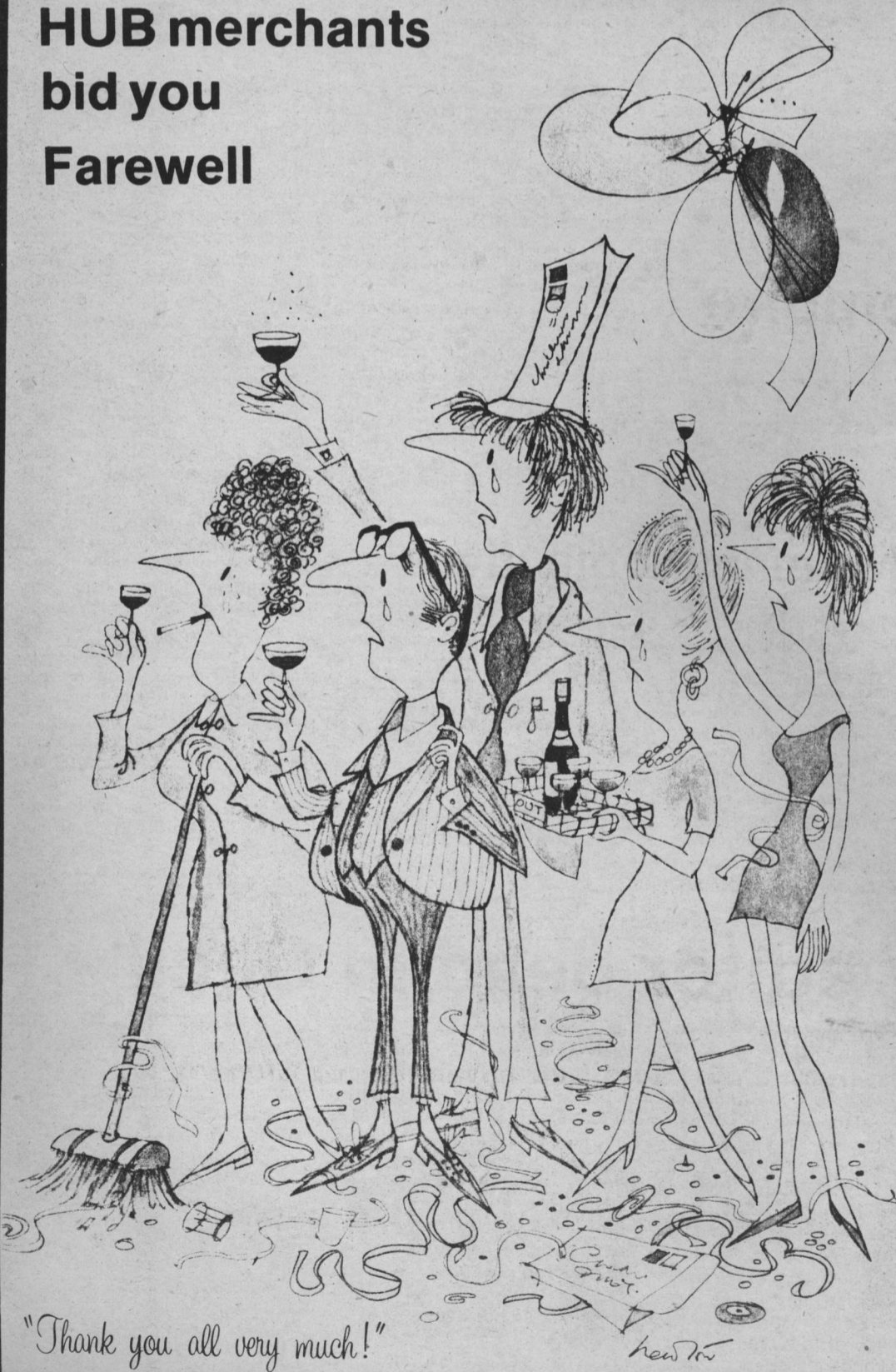

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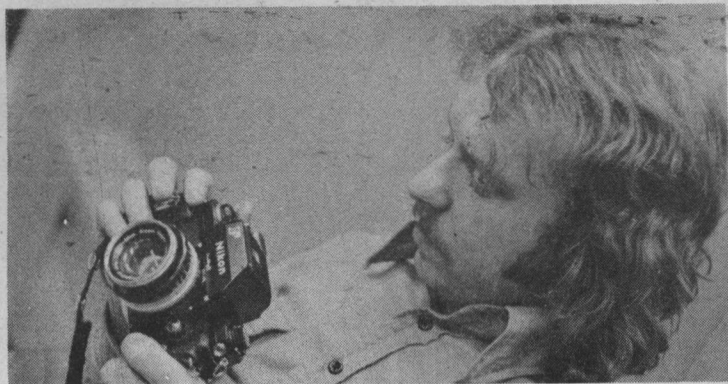

Croc Rock in Zoology labs

Several zoology students have expressed their concern about the prospect of having to handle fully-grown crocodiles as lab animals in a new zoology course this fall.

Zoology 410 which is described by the calendar as "an introduction to the vertebrate animals of the class Reptilia", will be offered for the first time this fall and will be a new requisite for zoology

honours students. The course will cover crocodiles, alligators, turtles, lizards, snakes and tuatara.

Student opposition mainly focuses on the last two laboratory sessions of the course which will involve work with three crocodiles of the African species *Osteolaemus*. Assignments for these labs include the measurement of the reptiles' claws, their tongues

and their tails. Zoology students believe that these assignments will endanger their health.

A third-year honours student who did not want to be identified, said in an interview with the *Gateway*:

"Have you seen these mother... yet? They're almost 15 feet long! These are sure not rubber ducks! I don't mind to kill rats or frogs and I've even worked with skunks but crocodiles... oh no!"

Another second-year student questioned the decision of the zoology department to make this course a requisite. "I don't mind if a course like this is offered. If somebody wants to have some excitement and takes it, that's fine with me. But why does the department force us to take such a dangerous course?"

A spokesman for the zoology department explained the decision to make this course a requisite by referring to the need for "real life instruction."

"The future zoologist cannot expect to chase butterflies or study Alberta's fish all the time. He or she must be willing to face the dangers involved in working with nature. Zoology 410 is a course designed to provide this experience."

The zoology department received the three crocodiles three weeks ago from the University of Cairo, Egypt, in exchange for five Canadian beavers. The animals can be seen in room CW 312 of the Biological Sciences Building.

Selling secretaries cause exam cancel

The noonhour activities of three secretaries has caused the cancellation of all exams in the English department. And, according to a source in the Dean's office, there is a good chance no exams will be given.

The cancellation is due to availability of all exams, which the three secretaries have been selling during their noon breaks. Ranging in cost from \$5 - \$15 each, the exams include all 200 and 300 level tests typed by the department secretaries.

Secretaries Hazel Schmidlapp, Gertie Snickwop, and Alvina Booper have been relieved of their positions as a result of the discovery.

"We thought we were doing (students) a favor" was the statement issued by Gertie Snickwop. "All these exams were so silly anyway."

An unofficial count shows that twenty copies of each exam were duplicated and sold. With all departmental typing being done by the same people, the Dean's office had no choice but to cancel the scheduled exams.

"There simply is not enough time to make up new tests. This has never happened before... I knew I should have stayed in bed today," stated the department Dean on learning of this nefarious plot. "Whatever are we going to do?"

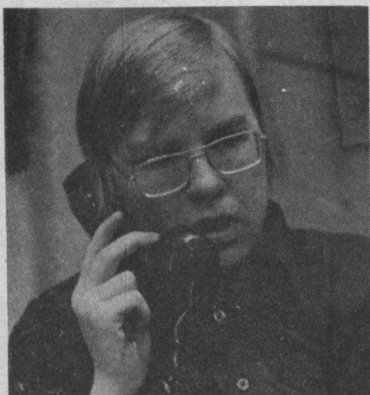
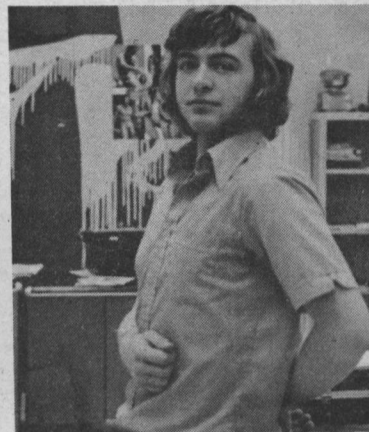
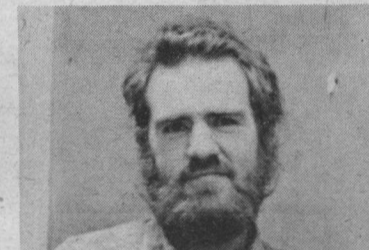

What time is it?

The first conversion to the metric time system will naturally be the timeclock. Because one poot is equal to one day, there is 10 decipoots (DP) each day. A decipoot is equal to 2 hours, 24 minutes by the old system. Perhaps the new system can be more easily remembered in this fashion:

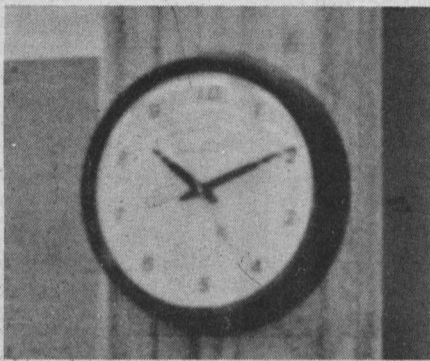

3 DP - Rise and Shine
 5 DP - High noon, Lunch
 7.5 DP - Suppertime
 10 DP - Hit the sack.

As you can see, this system is a snap to learn. The next step is just as simple. Referring back to chart #1, we see a decipoot is divided by 10 centipoots. Each centipoot is roughly equivalent to a quarter of an hour (14.4 minutes to be exact). And continuing further, we find the millipoot to be a very valuable measurement to remember in everyday cooking duties. For instance, rather than the three minute egg, you'll simply cook a 2 millipoot egg, and if your preference is hard-boiled, 5 millipoots is sufficient. A 2 kilogram roast cooked at 137° C will be juicy and rare in only 1 decipoot.

How old are you?

Anyone who owns a dog knows that his years are not measured as years, but rather as 5 decapoots. In metric time, the human still differs from the dogs in that we measure our lives in KILOPOOTS (1000 Poots).

For instance, if you were born in 1900, you would be 27 kilopoots (KPS) old in 1975. Likewise, if you were born in 1950, you would be 9.1 KPS old. The average lifespan of a Canadian would be 25 and 26 KPS respectively. A pregnant woman would carry her foetus 2.7 decapoots. The oldest man in the world, a Russian peasant, lived to the ripe age of 50 KPS.

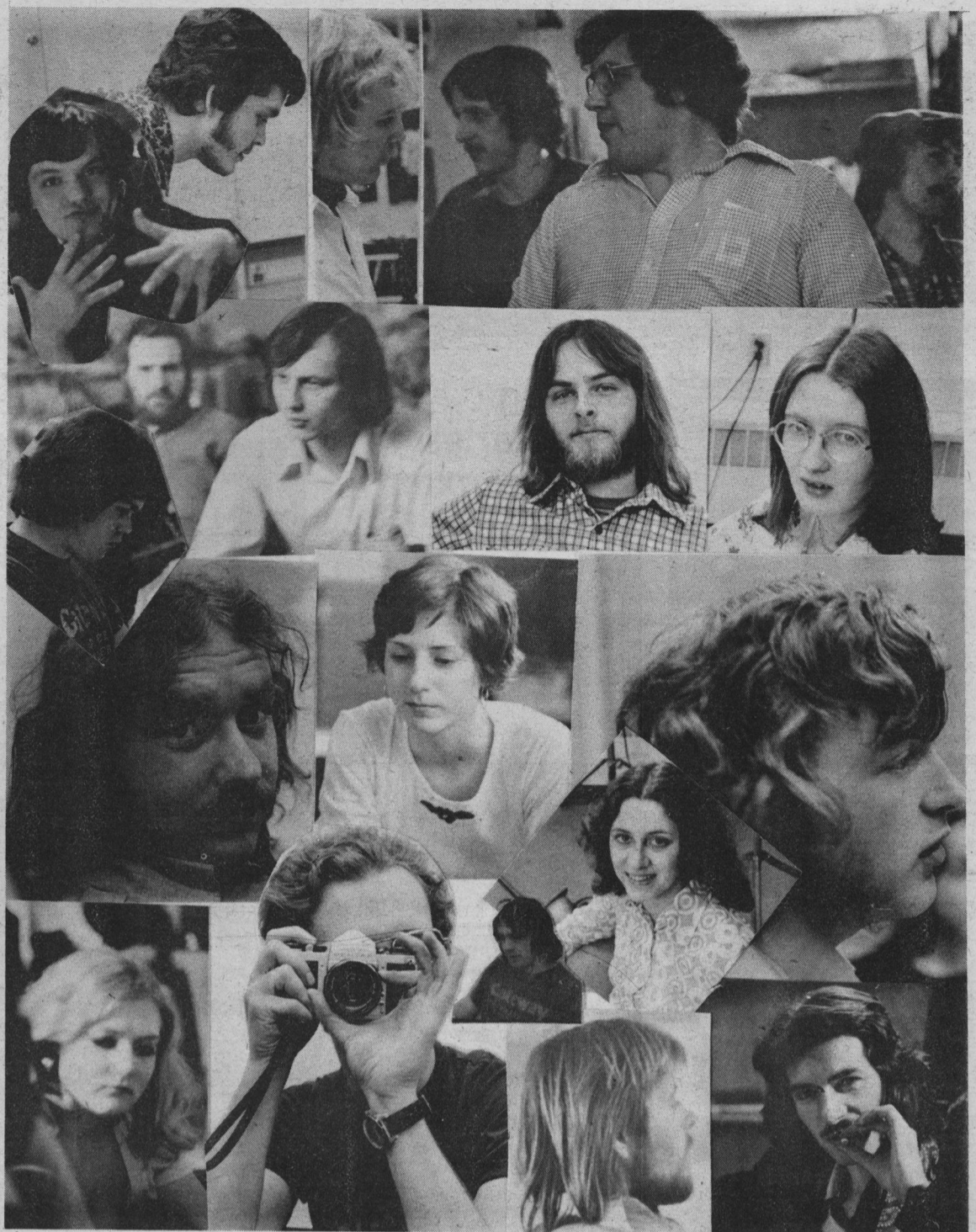
No frustration, no trouble

See, there's nothing to it. The conversion date is June 1, 1975. Make sure you do not buy a wristwatch before that date, because that would really be built-in obsolescence.

Here's another handy hint. Rip the minute hand off your wall clock and throw it away. Next, superimpose a new face on the clock, one with 10 at the top, and 5 at the bottom. Now fill in the appropriate lines, running through center, with the numbers 9-4, 8-3, 7-2, and 6-1. You now have a metric poot Clock, as illustrated in Chart #3.

Metric conversion need not cost Canadians hours of their time to learn, nor billions of dollars to promote. These easy to follow charts and household hints should be read each night, preferably right after the evening prayers, and Canadians will not experience the frustratons of learning how to "Think Metric."

Edmonton gets NHL franchise

A group of Seattle businessmen today unwrapped plans to purchase a financially-troubled National Hockey League team, and move it to Edmonton.

The consortium, headed by multi-millionaire industrialist Justin Case, claim that an agreement has already been reached with the league, and that the only obstacle in their path is a working arrangement to use the new Edmonton Coliseum as the team's home.

Case waved off the suggestion that there may be legal action taken by the WHA's Edmonton-based club. "I don't think we have anything to worry about there," he said. "If their (Oilers) intent was to ban a second major-league hockey club from competing here, I think they would first have to prove that there is one operating here at the moment."

Asked which club his group was planning to purchase, Case said he would be considering

tenders from the seven NHL owners who are attempting to unload their franchises at the present.

Does he think an NHL club can prosper here? "Oh, definitely," he responded. "I believe the people of Edmonton will welcome professional hockey back to this city. As you know, they haven't had pro hockey here since the Flyers were in the Western League 20 years ago or so."

Case suggested that the University of Alberta's coach Clare Drake would be a prime candidate to coach the new team, tentatively named the Edmonton Golden Ducks.

"Not only does his name fit right into our scheme," chuckled Case, "but he has been very successful at the U of A, and is well respected as a coach, which would be quite a change for a pro team in this city."

Asked if he would consider the Ducks' offer, Drake commented, "Well, of course I

Hunt causes UAB rift

Outgoing President of Men's Athletics, Jerry C. Hunt, on the eve of his reign's end as Chairman of the UAB, has caused a serious rift in the Board's inner circle, by overruling all opposition to a proposal which would allocate vast sums of money to the Golden Bear hockey team, for a skate allowance plan.

Hunt's unprecedented move brought cries of "dictator" and "nasty fellow", as well as "woolen-headed guffin" from several members of the Board, particularly from Grad Students' rep Harold Nogas.

Nogas was especially upset over what he termed "the principle involved here."

Hunt appeared shaken by the outbreak of name-calling and insults, but he defended the actions which led to the incident. "I had no idea of the plight of the people of India and Siberia, and I'm sure the Board will take these problems into consideration the next time we have a proposal involving this much money, but as it stands right now, I still feel my actions were justified. After all, the discussion was entering its third hour, and six of the members were asleep - I just wanted to end the argument," said Hunt.

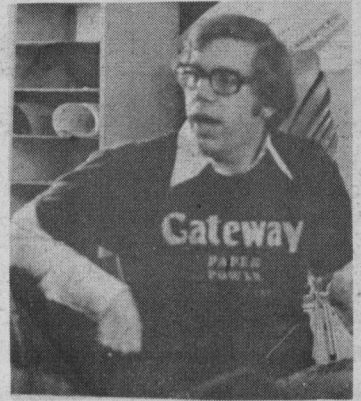
The saga of Ernest Hebert is full of legend and folklore, but it has been one of the truly remarkable sports stories of the last half-century.

Since then he has defended his title 37 times, most recently earlier this year against J.Q. (Cueball) Horcoff, who will likely succeed to the throne left vacant by Hebert's retirement.

His journey will last several years, and will parallel his journey from adolescence into manhood. He will have strong moral convictions, and will win the hearts of all readers.

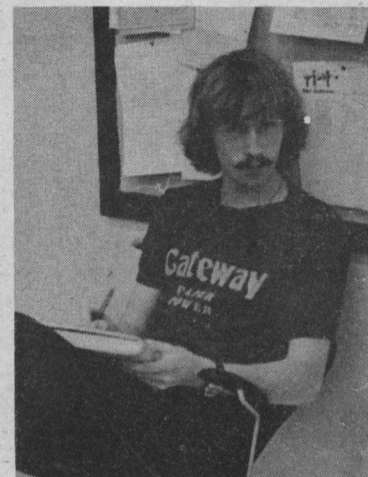
The story will go farther than just being entertaining. It will also be an exercise in

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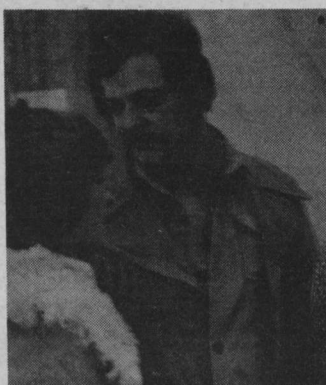

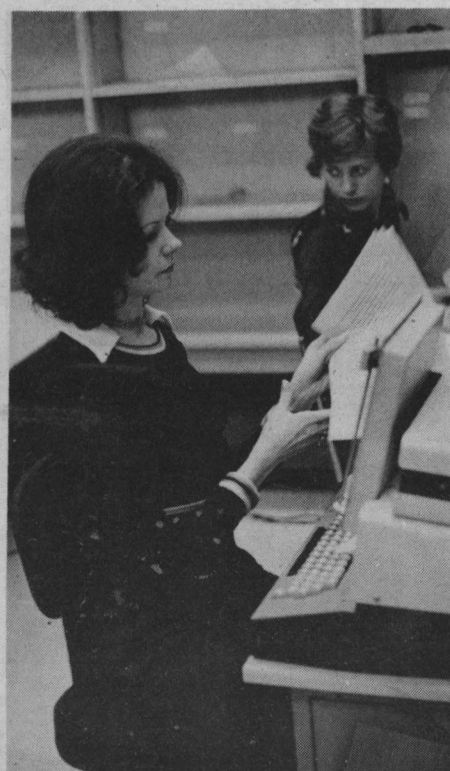

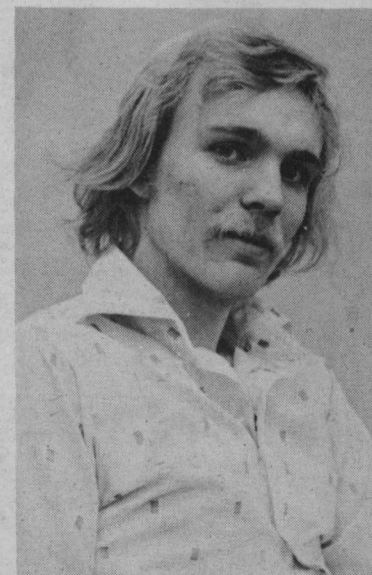
