Prairie earthquake disaster

Three suburbs of Toronto were ravaged yesterday by a massive earthquake which registered 9.5 on the Richter scale. British Columbia, Alberta, and Saskatchewan, and their populations, were sucked into the Pacific ocean in this minor disaster. Several thousand people are estimated drowned.

Rescue workers are already at the scene of the earthquake, and are working to provide first aid to survivors. They do not, however, predict that their efforts will be very successful. "We came too late," said one paramedic. "This is a long way from Toronto."

Ministers missing; War measures enacted

TORONTO

While attempting to reorganize a flailing federal cabinet, Canadian Prime Minister Mr. Brian Mulroney has lost at least two western ministers in the shuffle.

PM Mr. Mulroney enacted the War Measures Act late Tuesday in hopes of finding Foreign Affairs Minister Joe Clark and Agriculture Minister Don Mazinkowski the two ministers lost in the

cabinet shuffle.

"I forgot why I started shuffling, then stopped to ponder this unusual thing and started asking myself what is a cabinet shuffle anyway, then suddenly there were ministers all over the place nobody knew what was going on," PM Mr. Mulroney said, adding he doesn't know what good the War Measures Act will do. "I heard it was the thing to do in times of emergency, so I followed the trend," he said.

Although PM Mr. Mulroney

has called an emergency meeting set for June 6 to discuss the situation with the remaining members of cabinet, he said he is not overly worried and concerned about the situation. "Well I think those guys were from out west somewhere anyway, I think from that place... uhhh Alberta... yahh, and so they weren't too useful. I mean really who cares about farms and stuff, and Mr. Clark well he probably wants my job or something," PM Mr. Mulroney said.

Mr. Clark's wife Ms. Maureen

McTeer said she last saw her husband shortly after he heard a cabinet shuffle was planned. "He left in search of dance lessons... He's never been good at this shuffle thing."

Meanwhile, PM Mr. Mulroney has said there is no time for looking back or remorse, it is a time to move forward.

However, Minister of Unintentional Trade John Crosby said going forward is not the only option for the Progressive Conservative Federal government. "We could sidestep, retreat, waffle, stand still or go in several directions at once."

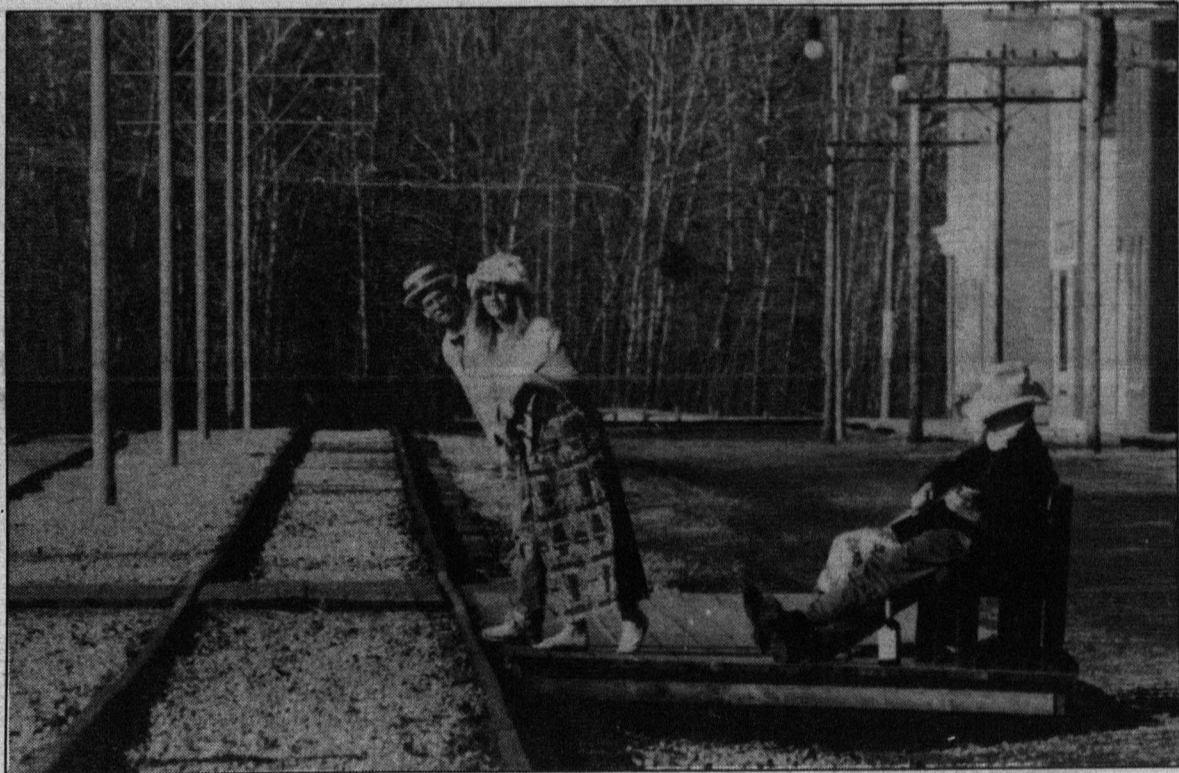
Advanced Minister of Cultural Evasion Pat Carney said she is not competent to say which direction the government should go. "I still haven't figured out which way is up," she said.

Otto Jelinick, whose portfolio was lost in the shuffle, was unavailable for comment. The important minister was, however, last seen going in his own direction.

PM Mr. Mulroney said if nothing on this eminent and important issue can be decided at the June 6 emergency meeting, it will again be discussed at the next emergency meeting scheduled for Nov. 10, 1989.

Showdown looms over transportation rivals

Via Rail Canada Inc. and its western rival, the intercity stagecoach industry, are heading for a showdown over Via's federally subsidized pricing policies and marketing strategies.

It's a dispute the stagecoach companies say could end up in court if National Transportation Agency (NTA) chairman Erik Schmielson rules today that Via does not have to tell their secrets. A court case could seriously tie up the NTA probe into Via's operations and a subsequent government decision on whether to shut down the passenger railway.

According to Jon Wayne, spokesman for the Stagecoach

Industry Association (SIA), Via uses its federal subsidy to undercut stagecoach fares and siphon off passengers from the stagecoach industry. For years, the SIA has been calling for a federal probe of Via's pricing policies and how it uses its federal subsidy of about \$600 million annually.

Wayne contends Via uses unfair marketing practices to draw customers away from the stagecoach industry. "They hire people in three piece suits to ride our stagecoaches and then complain to the other passengers about the lousy ride and service, telling everyone they should have booked with Via," said Wayne, adding, "We lose more customers that way."

Wayne also contends Via uses its federal subsidies to offer cheaper rates than stagecoaches

and subsidies help Via maintain repair costs on its fleet.

"It's hard to compete with Via's pricing policy, and we can't compete with repair costs because we don't get a federal subsidy," Wayne said. He noted that stagecoach repairs can be extravagant because craftsman are hard to find. "Not very many people can repair wagon wheels any more," he said.

The SIA has been lobbying Schmielson for years for their own federal subsidy, but Schmielson has consistently refused, saying the federal government does not want to flog a dead horse. Wayne takes exception to that line of thinking, saying "Buffalo chips".

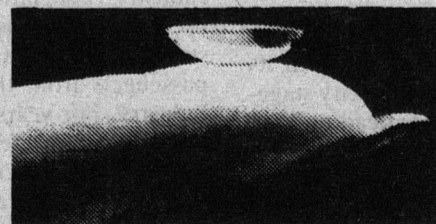

Toronto fire officials coaxed seven quivering student journalists off the CN Tower last night as they prepared to jump to a grisly death.

The students, editors of the University of Alberta newspaper *The Gateway*, had been devastated by an accusation that they misquoted a prominent member of their university's Students' Council in a front page article which appeared in last Thursday's issue.

"We couldn't live with the thought of telling an untruth, even an unintentional one," said Editor-in-Chief Dragos Uriuiu. "We came to a group decision that the only solution was to jump."

The seven editors, a short, slimy, mealy-mouthed lot carrying pens and notebooks, chose to jump from the Toronto tower as they felt their suicides would go unnoticed in the small suburb of Edmonton, where their university is located. "We wanted national coverage," said Randy Smatterings.

The Students' Council member responsible for the editors' collective guilt is Chuck Vermin, Vice President Academic. 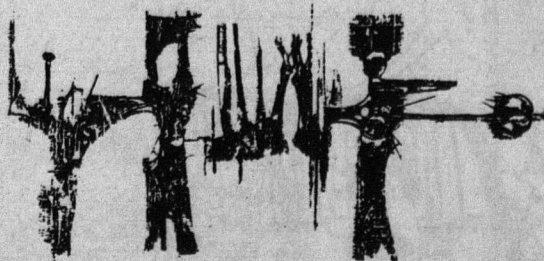

Deep philosophy from Bill & Ted

Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure Bay-Bloor Cineplex

If one is willing to suspend one's disbelief for the 90 minute duration of *Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure*, one will find oneself in turn laughing uproariously at its subtle humour and pondering philosophically its profound thematic content; never for a moment does the film become at all tedious, repetitive or boring. Stellar performances are given by two promising young actors in this innovative new film which examines the problems so often faced by adolescents as they struggle to pass into adulthood: Alex Winter, as Bill, is appealing as a young man battling against his overbearing, domineering father: Ted, played by Keanu Reeves, is also exceptional as a boy in the throes of an Oedipal complex.

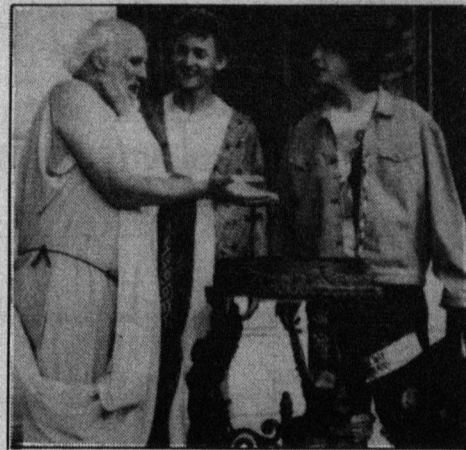
A number of famous literary and historical figures arise in this film; from the philosopher Socrates, of ancient Greece, to Sigmund Freud, the inventor of psychoanalysis. Through facetious portrayals of these figures, the film brings to light the misconceptions which our youth hold of those who have shaped history; sadly, it reveals the ignorance common to schoolchildren whose greatest interest is the opposite sex and whose only ambition is to star in a rock band. Bill and Ted pronounce Freud's name "Frood" and Socrates' with the emphasis on the middle syllable; this points to the fact that our society must redouble its efforts to educate its youth.

One of the film's most interesting and significant attributes is its use of symbolic imagery, the most blatant of which is the phallic corn dog which Freud points menacingly at two young, blossoming women in the shopping mall. The AT&T phone booth, in which Bill and Ted travel, is again a Freudian psychodynamic image, signifying a womb in which the characters are forced to curl in the fetal position. When Bill and Ted journey into their future, the characters whom they meet in the domelike structure wear gowns and sunglasses, thus fulfilling their infantile desire to imitate their mothers. Bill and Ted themselves attempt to pursue their ego ideal, represented by Van Halen, the contemporary popular pseudo-musical band whose members operate only according to the impulses of their id.

Each character in this film has a clear, purposeful function delineated by the director, who is, by the way, a pure genius

at the art. They are all dramatically engaging, acting their roles with clarity, precision and energy. Joan of Arc stands for womanhood everywhere: as she watches the vivacious, dictatorial aerobics slavedriver, she becomes overwhelmed by her own desire to lead the women, finally losing control and pushing her rival unceremoniously off the pedestal.

Mongolian rebel leader Ghengis Khan expresses impotent, frustrated rage which suddenly bursts out as he seemingly calmly browses through a sporting goods store. Viciously, inhumanly, coldly, he fatally swats a mannequin until it is left to a tragic end, a mere shell of its former self. At the same time, classical composer Beethoven wreaks havoc in a music equipment store as he creatively adapts his piano pieces to synthesizer.



Bill and Ted with Socrates: not your typical vacuous American youth, interested only in the opposite sex

One of the most poignant moments of the film occurs when Bill and Ted save Billy the Kid, a mythic cowboy hero, from perishing at the hands of uncivilized Western louts. Billy demonstrates his eternal gratitude by assisting Bill and Ted in cleverly and adeptly capturing other famous philosophical and historical personalities. Napoleon, the French leader of the 18th century, is mocked, ridiculed and likened to a swine in the scene in which he discovers the joys of the American ice cream parlour. This typifies the uninformed, biased opinion Americans have of other cultures. How unfortunate that the glorious Napoleon could not have been portrayed in a more respectful manner. Americans truly need a lesson in history.

The quintessential moment of this film occurs when Billy the Kid and Ted convince Socrates to accompany them into the future. Ingeniously using the analogy of dust in the wind, Ted relates to Socrates on a powerful, nonverbal level. Socrates' message is not only passed along to his followers in ancient Greece, but to modern-day high school students whose lives are sadly lacking philosophically prior to Bill and Ted's dissertation.

Let us not forget to mention the unique costumes, the spectacular special effects

Another mega-concert, to hit North American venues early next year, is now in the planning stages. The concert, tentatively titled "Dead Aid," is planned to raise money for lost souls now bitterly imprisoned in purgatory.

Benefit organizer Shirley Maclaine says the concert will be the first of its kind ever, featuring such famous names as Janis Joplin, Jimi Hendrix, Jim Morrison and Keith Moon. Maclaine wants to first conjure up these spirits during a massive seance to be held at the Houston Astrodome. "The Texas climate will make most of the musicians feel more at home," she explains.

Stealing a page from pre-reformation theological doctrine, Maclaine hopes that with the proceeds from the concert she will be able to purchase enough indulgences to spring literally millions of souls from purgatory — souls that are now in limbo, torn between heaven and hell. "I just got off the horn with the Pope yesterday, Maclaine reveals, "he seems to think that if we can raise enough money to build a new Basilica in Managua, we might just be able to reach our set target of a million souls. I'm following his advice because, after all, who am I to argue with the Pope?"

Several contacts have already been made. Hendrix and Morrison are genuinely perplexed as to the reason Burton isn't with them right now. accentuated by futuristic music, and the captivating cinematography apparent in this film. It is the absolute pinnacle of the modern-day cultural and intellectual experience of movie-going. The final scene of the film, in which Bill and Ted discover their true potential, is awe-inspiring, although it could be more moving. Finally, good/rock/future/youth triumphs over bad/classical/past/age in this stunning *piece de resistance*.

A bitter Sid Vicious is upset by how quickly Morrison and Hendrix have forgotten about him. "That stuff about me not being able to play bass is bollocks," he pouts. "They'll never make it unless they do it my way! How I wish I could get out of here. Nancy's driving me crazy! I thought I'd be rid of her after I killed her, and now she lives down the block! All I hear all day is 'Siiiiiiiiid...' If I hear 'Siiiiiiiiid' one more time I'll go insane. I'll get you Malcolm!"

But apart from the affirmative responses of Morrison and Hendrix, things aren't going as smoothly as Maclaine had hoped they would. "We're having a little trouble locating Elvis," she says, "word on the cloud has it that he's still down here with us. And even though I'd like him to perform, if he's not dead I have no use for him."

Also noticeably absent from the bill is ex-Beatle John Lennon. Speaking to me from his home at 666 Lucifer Drive, Lennon had this to say: "I'm morally opposed to this concert. First of all, the whole idea of purgatory is absurd, and I don't believe in God, Satan, heaven, or hell. Phew, is it hot in here! Will this heat never let up? And besides, I've already told the organizers I wanted top billing, but they tell me I'm no longer more popular than He is."

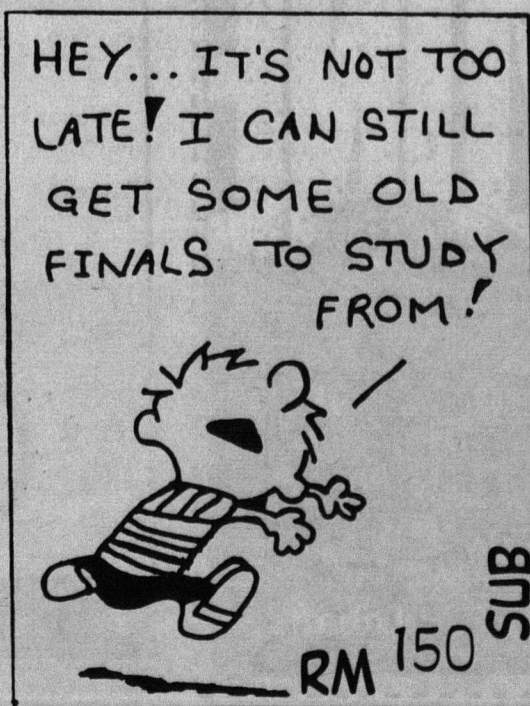
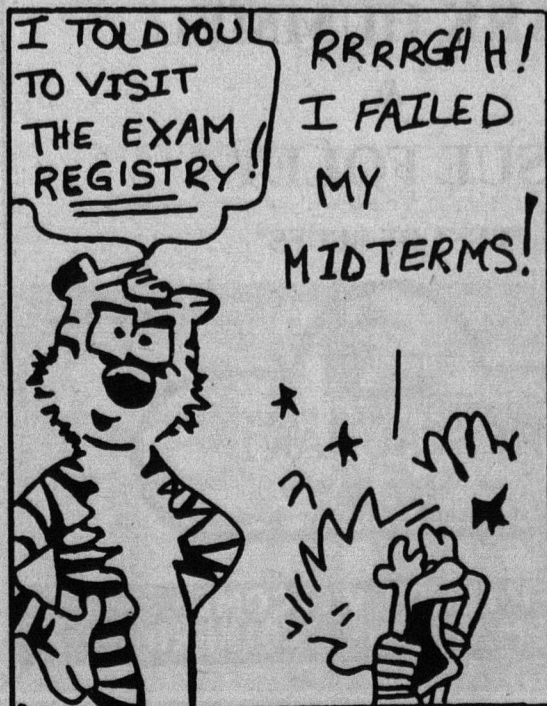
On a more positive note, it appears that Maclaine has come close to signing drummer Keith Moon. "There are just a few details yet to be worked out," she explains. "Before Keith will play he wants a guarantee that he will receive an upgrade in living accommodations. Apparently his flat is too hot right now, and the air-conditioner is always broken."

The only major obstacle yet to overcome is Satan. "Heck ya, I oppose this concert he exclaims. "I don't want to lose any more souls than the next devil. If this concert goes, I demand compensation. 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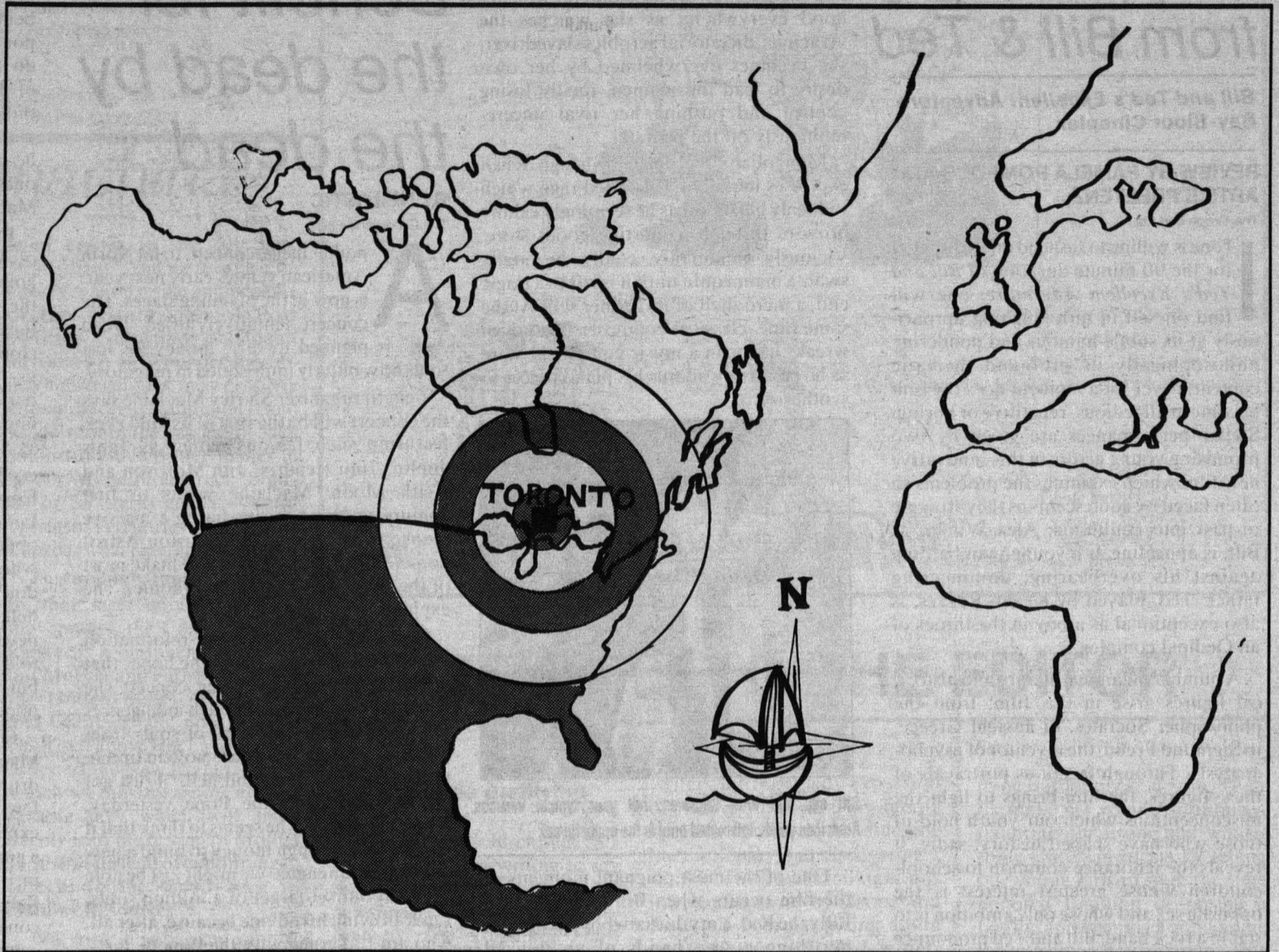
Toronto is the centre of the universe

Amid controversy, heated debate, disagreement and dispute at the United Nations Assembly somewhere outside of Toronto this week, representatives from the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR), the United States (US), the United Kingdom (UK), France (F), and the Peoples' Republic of China (PRC) finally agreed to accept the undeniable fact that Toronto is indeed the centre of the universe.

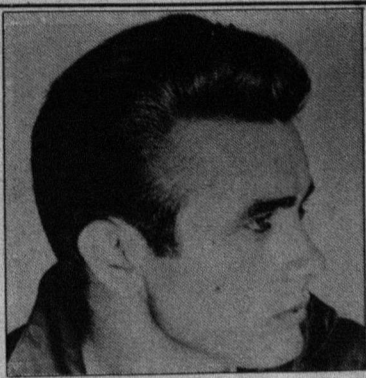

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Mr. and Mrs. Jones are off to a fun-filled Saturday afternoon of wife swapping at one of their bigger condos — West Edmonton Mall.



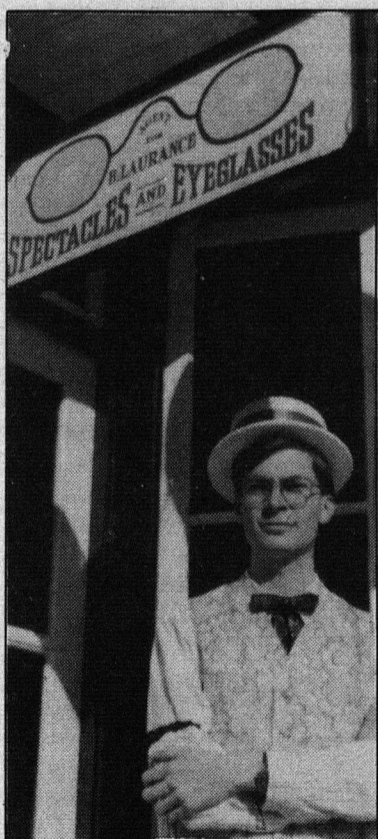

Ex-Leaf's Cup hopes excite T.O.

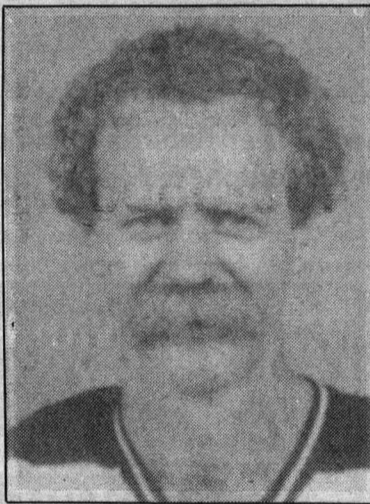

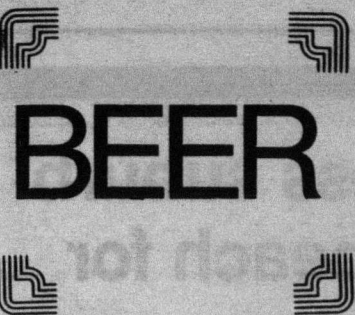

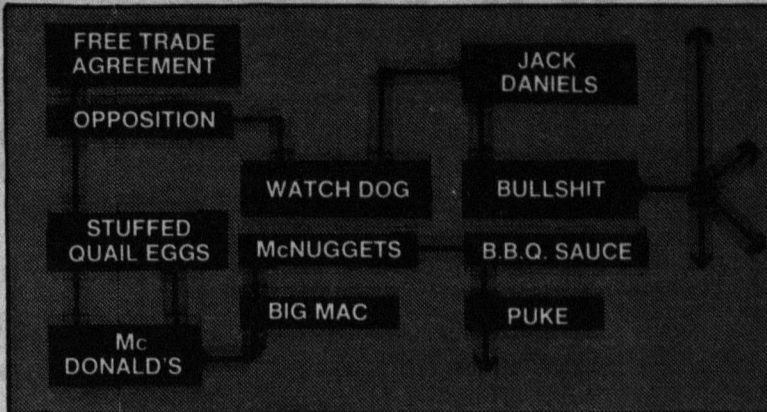

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Useless suburb now beach for gleeful Torontonians

WINNIPEG

During what has been called the great Toronto "beach-grab", Torontonians lined up yesterday to purchase beach-front property created by the recent earthquake.

Miles and miles of virgin beach, running from Winnipeg to Churchill, became available to Torontonians after outermost regions of

Toronto — Alberta, British Columbia, and Saskatchewan — slid into the Pacific ocean.

Realestate officials reported that Toronto businessmen have already purchased 90 percent of the area.

"If you had this property yesterday, your net worth went up 300 percent in 24 hours," said Toronto real estate tycoon Ronald Trumpcard.

"And not only that you got yourself one hell of a beach," said Trumpcard. "Having a beach for Toronto is a great idea. Real entrepreneurs should have thought of it sooner."

However, the beach grab has also caused a stampede in local land prices. Oceanside views in Winnipeg, west of Toronto, were supposedly selling for 300 and 400 times their original price, while Churchill — north of Yonge street — was quickly auctioned off for an estimated \$75 million, sources said.

"Resorts like Las Vegas and Reno will have to share the spotlight with places like The Pas and Lake Winnipegosis," said

Toronto real estate official Gordon Gekko called the quake a "brilliant business move" that will shake up a "stagnant Toronto housing market."

"The land was useless before," he said. "All you could do was grow stuff. The chief export of the western Ontario region was wheat, an edible investment that was a risky proposition."

"Now Torontonians have the opportunity to invest in important goods, like hotels and resorts. Because let's face it, food is a dying industry."

Gekko, who has purchased land that stretches from Lower Ft. Garry to Flin Flon, plans on starting up a Club Med near the scenic village of Portage la Prairie.

Meanwhile, the beach-grab has also put into motion plans to re-claimize Toronto.

Following yesterday's quake and resulting real estate scramble, prime minister Myron Baloney promised emergency funding to Environment Canada. Plans include shifting the Earth's present axis so the equator runs through Toronto.

"This will be our government's number one priority," said Baloney. "Who cares if Canada goes bankrupt twenty years from now. The weather doesn't care how rich you are when it's 40 below. We all freeze the same."

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
