As a result of the Maritime Reional Conference of the National Federation of Canadian University Students in Sackville on Feb. 9 and 10, the strength and actual functioning of the organization here was learned. It was unanimously resolved that NFCUS devote more effort to student benefits in Canada and less to international affairs and by so doing give something tangible in answer to the question "What is NFCUS doing for me?" Fully was it realized that recently it had not been doing this and hence the federation had become greatly weakened among the Maritime Universities. The actual resolutions will be published later in detail when the conference reports are available. It was, however, suggested that universities in this area exchange weekends conduct sponsored by NFCUS. A student at UNB might be interested in touring the art or music centres at Mt. Allison. 
Should the position of S.R.C. Prexy be mine next year it will be my task to see that all council proceedings are conducted in an orderly and efficient manner.




