



Downey to push for not collecting fees

On Monday, April 7, Dr. James Downey, President of UNB, held yet another meeting with several UNB students. The purpose of the meeting was to further discuss taking action against the Student Union.

Downey has decided on a definite plan of action. On May 21, he will make a proposal to the Board of Governors. He will propose that the administration discontinue collection of Student Union

fees. In its place, he has suggested that a student activity fee will be collected. This new fee will be dispersed to student organizations and clubs by the administration.

Downey said "The Student Union is no longer able to perform its duties to the satisfaction of the administration and the students." He added that

he will reverse this decision before the May 21 meeting if the Student Union "cleans up its own house."

Downey does not feel confi-

dent that the Student Union will change enough to warrant a reversal of his decision. He said if they do, it will be a 'miracle'.

Bosnitch said that he is discouraged about this letter. He said "I had hoped Dr. Downey would have addressed

the real issues, specifically the continued student fee collection, and to deal with the status of the Student Union."

Both of these letters are printed following this story.

April 9th, 1986

To Members of the Student Union:

In November 1985 I was re-elected President of the UNB Student Union. The Student Council has just recently defeated an attempt to impeach me, and my political opponents have failed to collect a petition of the student body calling for my removal.

The President of the University of New Brunswick, James Downey has stated that he may not collect the regular \$30 Student Union fee that every full-time undergraduate student is required to pay to the Union each fall. Dr. Downey proposes instead to collect an "activity fee" which he will administer and distribute to CHSR radio, the Brunswickan and various other student organizations.

The possibility of funding being diverted from the Student Union without general student consent disturbs me. As a result, I offer my resignation as President in return for a guarantee that the University will sign a permanent contract to collect the \$30 Student Union fee (not to be confused with any "activity fee" which would not be turned over to the Student Union) from every full-time undergraduate student, said Student Union fee to be turned over directly to the Student Union Inc. without delay upon collection at registration.

Such a guarantee, coupled with the permanent preservation for the Student Union of the offices now occupied by Student Union organizations in the SUB, would presumably put an end to the recent campus conflicts.

Dear Mr. Bosnitch:

On September 21, 1984, I wrote to you concerning your unacceptable behavior and providing written warning that any further misbehavior could result in your suspension and expulsion.

I am aware of your admitted role in the creation of several posters which were placed in prominent locations on campus during the week of March 16, 1986.

These posters were intemperate, libelous and completely unacceptable. They were obviously aimed at ridiculing and denigrating the SUB Director, certain students and the President of the University.

I am writing now to notify you that your behavior will be subject to an inquiry and that I may invoke the powers of this office to suspend you with a recommendation to the Board of Governors to exercise its powers of expulsion. You will be further advised in due course.

Bosnitch petition near completion

Whereas the UNB Student Union Council has, by majority vote, called for the resignation of John Bosnitch, President of the Student Union, this petition shall, under the By-laws XIV "Removal From Office":

7. (b) Subject to 7. (c), an elected officer is deemed to have offered his resignation upon presentation to Council of a petition asking that he be removed from office, signed by at least twenty-five percent of his constituents.

(c) If more than twenty-five percent of the signatories are from one of the faculties or schools listed in By-Law XI (s.11) only enough of the signatories from the faculty or school to constitute twenty-five percent of all signatories shall be used (sic) whether twenty-five percent of the constituents have signed the petition.

The names signed herein agree that Mr. Bosnitch has lost the confidence and respect and trust of Council and of the students of the University of New Brunswick.

We, the undersigned members of the University of New Brunswick Student Union do hereby call for his removal from office under the By-Laws and Regulations of Student Union.

the recent poster campaign attacking students and staff of UNB.

Last Friday, April 4, a group of concerned student councillors began circulating a petition call for the "removal from office" of SRC President, John Bosnitch.

This action is being initiated by: Steven Smith, Terry Young, Eric Semple, Jackie Hatherly and others because they feel that "Mr. Bosnitch has lost the confidence and respect and trust of Council and of the students of UNB."

This decision has been based on John Bosnitch's contempt of Student Council and the students of UNB displayed by his denials of involvement in

the petition calling for the removal of John Bosnitch from office requires 1,750 signatures from the students of this campus. On Friday, April 11, a booth will be set up in the lower lobby of the Student Union Building, cafeteria entrance, "so students who wish to add their name to this petition may have the opportunity" said Semple.

Once the petition is filled, according to the Constitution, it must be presented to the Chief Returning Officer and Mr. Bosnitch must leave office immediately. A copy of this petition will also be submitted to the University Secretary, James Woodfield.

Downey said that his position of fees is open for discussion. He said "If a council that had its affairs in order came to me and wanted to discuss an agreement, in regards to the collection of fees, the handing over of fees, and other matters, I would be prepared to do so. But I repeat that I am not prepared to deal with Mr. Bosnitch."

Also on Wednesday, Downey sent a letter to Bosnitch. This letter deals with Bosnitch's "unacceptable behavior", especially in regards to the posters issue Bosnitch admitted involvement in. This letter informs Bosnitch that his behavior is under inquiry which may lead

Social Club elects new board members

The Annual General Meeting of the College Hill Social Club was held on April 7, 1986, to elect new members of the Board.

At the beginning of the meeting, a proposal was put forth to change the terms of office of Board members. The proposal called for electing three members for two years, and two for one year. This is to ensure continuity; when the one year terms expire next April, the two new members will sit for two years.

One of the reasons for the change was to stop a takeover of the board at any one time. Rumours had been circulating that Student Council members were attempting to take over the Board to distribute profits to organizations on campus. However, no such attempt took place.

Following acceptance of the proposal by members, elections were held. The three two-year terms were won by

Janice McConnell, Dan Desarmeau and Barb Whitenect. The two one-year terms went to Vincent Daigle and Anna Sainz.

A release was given at the meeting to announce that a court action has been taken against the Social Club by

Keith Keane, former Club manager, for unjust dismissal. No further information was obtainable.

After several questions concerning the financial statements, they were accepted as given.

In closing, the Chairperson

(Janice McConnell) commended the new Club manager, Allyson Woodside, for her performance. Departing Board members Mike Horgan, Steve McGill and Jim Haley were thanked for their involvement. Haley was praised for work done with the Woodshed. His

committee saved the Club over \$6000 in three months.

Haley has been a Board member for seven years, serving as Chairman for five. Phil Dickson, who resigned earlier due to a conflict of interest, was also thanked.

Differentials: standpoint and another view

As differential fees increase so does the discouragement experienced by international students who plan to, or who would like to, attend UNB. The province of New Brunswick, like other Canadian provinces, has jurisdiction over education and therefore may introduce the fees they feel are best suited to them. Not only must the foreign student entering our university system and country go through a culture shock and perhaps be away from home for the first time but also must face ex-

tremely steep tuition fees on top of a high cost of living and insurance fees. In Quebec the increase in the cost of tuition for foreign students has risen by an astounding 2000 per cent alone since 1978.

Foreign students are frustrated because they feel there is a contradiction in Canadian policy that says that Canadians should send millions of dollars in money to feed the starving children in third world countries but when an African student is deprived here in Canada, they are not offered financial assistance or even the oppor-

tunity to work in our country. Canada is a well respected and humane country, but why than can she not offer to

educate some of the third world students so they can indeed learn how to manage

Friedman suggests gov't "covering up"

On April 3rd, Stanton T. Friedman, Nuclear Physicist and lecturer, gave a lecture titled "Flying Saucers are Real" at UNB. The lecture was accompanied with slides. The near capacity audience consisted of students as well as non-students and included a number of families.

The lecture, which was originally scheduled for 8 pm, started at 8:15 pm because VP Services Hugh Brown was late and there wasn't anybody available to collect tickets before the lecture. At 8 pm Brown asked everybody to leave the auditorium so that tickets could be collected.

Friedman started his lecture with "UFOlogy", stating that there is an enormous amount of data proving that UFO's exist. He said most people are unaware of this because of limited availability of data and government secrecy. He quoted what he called "the largest government sponsored scientific study which investigated more than 3000 cases." The study was completed in 1955 and the results were compiled in "Project Blue Book, Special Report No. 14" - a report including more than 240 charts and graphs.

"Every case was labelled and placed in one of 6 categories: balloons, astronomical aircrafts, miscellaneous, psychological, insufficient information, and unknown. There were 21.5% of the cases classified as unknowns and they were described as metallic, disk shaped objects, bigger in diameter than thickness, some of them with a row of windows. It was argued then, that at least 50 companies can build such objects, however, their behaviour was an indication that they weren't built here (on earth). They had unusual flight behaviour such as moving at very high speeds (10,000 mi/hr), making almost right angle turns, making no noise,

no blinking lights, no wings, no tail, and no external engine. Sometimes there were flocks of these objects, and in 1955 no company could mass produce things like them. If they weren't built here, where were they built?" he asked.

According to Friedman, the reasons for not believing in UFO's are: ignorance, fear of being ridiculed (ego) and complete unwillingness to use today's technology to prove that the observations are real.

One of the slides showed some statistics of education versus believing in UFO's and showed that the greater the

their own state of affairs and become less dependent on our Canadian tax dollars. There are many benefits that come along with educating a foreign student from political, commercial to cultural levels.

A foreign student returning to his/her native land is a walking brochure of information on Canada. Many of them return to careers in trade and knowing Canada, will pick us first if they are involved in trade related matters.

Ahmed Ferej, from Kenya, the outgoing chairman of the Board of International Students says "a university like UNB is really fortunate to be able to have drawn students

from all corners of the world. Upon returning to their countries these students consciously or unconsciously act as ambassadors. The extent to which they would express goodwill and remarks about Canada depends upon their experience here. Differential fees has been one negative aspect that would mar a generally good opinion of this country."

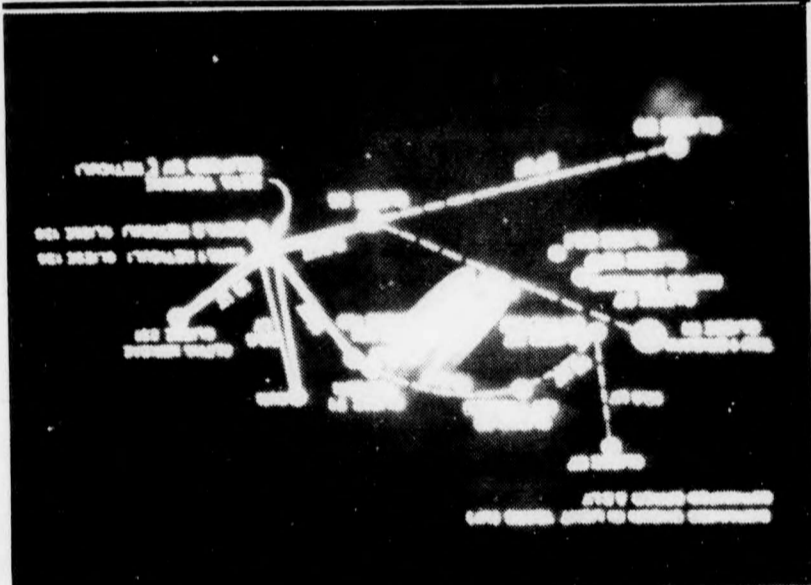
Education is currently under provincial jurisdiction, thus it is up to the provinces to decide who pays more and how much. The differential fee for foreign students varies from province to province, and may range from the \$1700 fee charged for attending UNB to the \$5800 fee for graduate students in Ontario.

At the same time trade, in which foreign students find themselves involved in upon returning to their country is under federal jurisdiction. The two are separate entities, and therefore do not work together making decisions which would benefit foreign students, lowering differential fees and thus encouraging them to study here.

On the other hand, Canadian students feel that foreign students should indeed pay a fee. Many are quick to admit to their lack of knowledge on the matter but are still strongly

in favour of differential fees for foreign students. They cannot understand why our government should subsidize foreign students when our country is already herself in dire needs of financial aid for her own citizens, and when are themselves living below the poverty line. The Fredericton Food Bank for example is feeding approximately 200 families this month. With rising tuition costs for Canadians it is becoming increasingly more difficult for the less than because their nations already have real ambassadors who discuss trade issues in Ottawa.

well-off Canadian student to obtain a university education. Student aid does not cover full expenses and if the student is not fortunate enough to come from a financially secure family, they are faced with no alternative other than to forego a higher education. It is also felt that it is time that less emphasis was placed on the plight of the foreign student and efforts were concentrated on ensuring that Canadians bordering on or below the poverty line are aided. Also, the argument which states foreign students become goodwill ambassadors is redundant

education, the wider the belief. Friedman added "cream of the crop, not bottom of the barrel."

Friedman also mentioned some ufological research and a case where a shepherd heard a strange noise, saw an object hovering 250 ft. above ground. After the object left, he observed a ring shaped area (where it had landed) which was glowing. The ringed area numbed fingers when touched and soil samples collected from the location had higher levels of minerals; it wouldn't absorb water and seeds wouldn't germinate.

For an example of aliens kidnapping and examing earthlings and dropping them back to earth, Friedman used the famous story "The Abduction of Betty and Barney Hill." According to this story, in 1961, Betty and Barney are driving late at night towards New Hampshire in Atlantic Canada. They see a UFO, 60-80 ft. in diameter, hovering quietly with no blinking lights. They get out of the car. When Barney looks at the double rows of windows with binoculars, he sees aliens inside the craft and is scared. Then he remembers seeing a road sign saying 75 miles to New Hampshire when it should have been

only 15 miles. They both see psychiatrists. Using regressive hypnosis treatment, the doctor makes them (separately) remember the experience and tapes their stories. These tapes indicate that they were taken on board by the creatures on board and then let out, and creatures hypnotized them so that they wouldn't remember.

WHERE IS THE EVIDENCE? Betty, under hypnosis draws a map of distant stars which she has seen while on board. The map which was later published in the New York Times shows where the aliens are from. Later on, Marjorie Fish built a 3-D model of stars. The model contained 256 color coded beads in the proper locations. The aim was to see if there was a pattern that matched Betty's. There was one and only one matching pattern. All the stars connected by lines were of the right kind for planets and life. Where did Betty, a social worker, get the right data - that no one knew at the time - about the stars? The obvious answer is the aliens.

Barney, under hypnosis also described what his kidnapers looked like. They were short

humanoids with big eyes, small noses and a different skull. "Creatures like this don't live around here. I don't know. If any of you have been abducted or have a missing time experience, tell me afterwards", said Friedman.

Friedman ended his lecture saying, "We are dealing with a cosmic watergate (a cover up of cosmic proportions). The Roswell incident set the cause for the cosmic watergate. There are 160 classified documents which aren't even released to judges, one of them is 80% blacked out (showing the document to the audience) and data is being withheld."


The 90 minute lecture was followed by a 30 minute question and answer period. One of the questions raised was "Have you ever seen a UFO or any of those creatures?" Friedman answered: "No, I haven't, but I haven't seen a neutron or a gamma ray either. I've been chasing those for 30 years. I haven't seen Australia either, but I know it's there - a lot of people say so. We have to take the word of our teachers at school."

GSA sees battle with gov't

The National Graduate Council, an organization representing graduate students across Canada, is appealing to its members to support its efforts in lobbying government. The NGC has successfully opposed an attempt by Revenue Canada to disallow visa students at U of T to claim the personal exemption on paycheck deductions, a measure that would have cost these students about 25% of their income. Next year, however, there are plans to exclude all students from the personal exemption by taxing all scholarships at source. This would mean a large tax deduction on your scholarship cheque.

Another issue is the Federal PC support for the research councils. While claiming to increase support for these councils, a closer look reveals that Federal support for NSERC, MRC, and SSHRC has been reduced to 1983-84 levels. The discrepancy is a result of unreasonable expectations, on the part of the federal government, of increases in private sector contributions. The UNB Graduate Student Association is working with national student organizations in lobbying governments on these and other policies, and would welcome input and assistance from anyone concerned with these issues. A letter or petition sent to your elected representatives can go a long way in influencing government actions.

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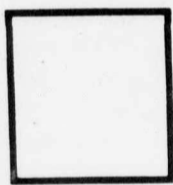

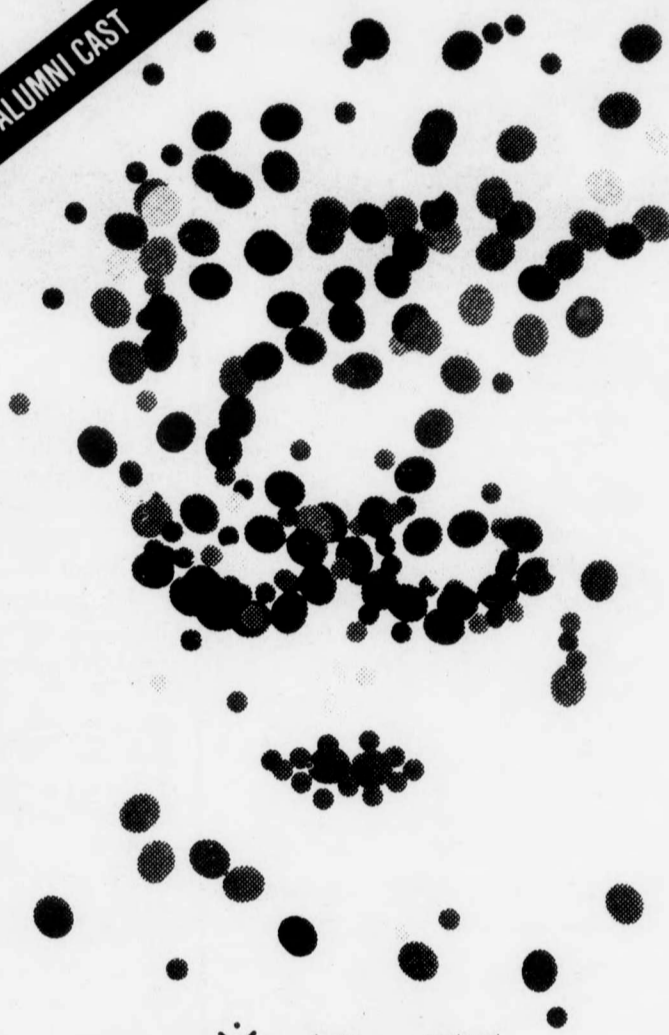


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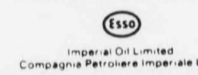

Such a process took place and the council saw the reinstatement of Mr. Michael Bennett as Chairman. Confidence in his impartiality however has been shaken in the last two council meetings.

Regardless of these reports, Mr. Bennett, from his position as chairman, chose to malign the Brunswickan on Wednesday night. Even if the charges were founded, Michael broke about every rule in the chairmen's ethic book. I am not calling for his resignation for he has proved over the years, to the council and the media, his competency to do the job.

I'd like this to serve as a gentle reminder to Mr. Bennett, and as a strong suggestion to Mr. Faust. Both of whom, if they put aside their conflict of interests, can contribute greatly to the needs of the students of UNB.

 taxes and foreign students reap



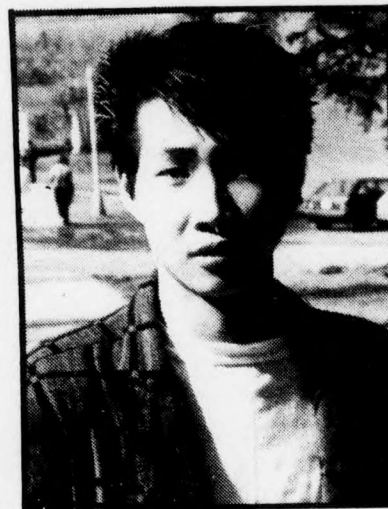
the benefits. I understand that

 what he had to say about Dif-
 ferential fees, an issue which

"The tax argument is indeed

 Canadians pay tax when they
 are students?" Even if they do
 they actually claim it back.
 The money flow from foreign
 students exceeds the billion
 dollar level each year and this



also helps economic prosperity
 in numerous cities. In Toronto,
 for example, one can see that
 foreign students pack up the
 theatres, restaurants, and
 practically every money-

spending place which provides
 employment opportunities for
 Canadians.

There is a common
 misunderstanding among
 Canadian students that all
 foreign students are wealthy,
 and that simply is not true.
 The average background of
 foreign students is middle-class
 and if they are not lucky
 enough to get a scholarship or
 their government's support,
 their parents must pay for the
 whole thing which in some
 cases can cause incredible
 hardships. And as students, we
 are not allowed to work in the
 summertime so if you cannot
 afford to go back home you
 must stay in Canada to either
 go to school or travel around
 the country."

 final results of the summer residence fee hikes set by the Board of Govern-
 nors.

Dear Editor,

Since the issue emerged, I have attempted to remain scrupulously neutral on the subject of Mr. Bosnitch's resignation/impeachment. While I intend to retain this posture, Miss Maher's comments in last weeks Mugwump, while by no means deserving of a reply, have compelled me to clarify my stand.

In arriving at my decision, I was aware that it would make more enemies than if I had voted either way. After all, as anyone knows who has had the unfortunate experience, fence-sitting does involve some pain in the posterior parts of one's anatomy. Harboring no illusions about this, I was not overly dismayed at Miss Maher's attempt to aggravate this discomfort. It is somewhat ironic, however, that following the almost unanimous denunciation of Mr. Bosnitch's regrettable attacks on fellow students, Miss Maher has chosen to adopt his tactics.

Over the past year, I have come to the conclusion that the interests of the graduate students cannot be served in an undergraduate dominated Student Union, regardless of who is President. This became obvious when, as the only graduate rep. on council, I could not even get a second for a motion on behalf of my constituency. As a result, most of my work in student government is done for the Graduate Student Association.

It was with considerable reluctance that I accepted the position on the SRC, and I only submitted my nomination after I was sure that no one else was going to. (This should be some indication of the importance that the graduate students of UNB accord to the Student Union.) Once seated, however, I fulfilled my obligations, keeping abreast of the issues being debated, attending meetings regularly (more regularly, incidently, than Miss Maher), and entering into debate when, and unlike many councillors only when, my comments could contribute something. Finally, I voted as my careful consideration and conscience dictated. I am not, contrary to Miss Maher's recollections, given to abstaining, and only do so when to vote would be contrary to the interests of my constituency. To do otherwise would be worse than immature; it would be irresponsible.

This brings us to the events of Wednesday night. The call to order was followed by two and one-half hours of procedural motions, and if at the end of this Miss Maher thought

that I looked bored, than it was probably an accurate observation. Miss Maher failed to notice that I voted on every one of these motions, and always in a manner that would contribute to quickly reaching the main motion. In fact, I abstained only once in the entire meeting.

The decision to do this reflected what I considered to be the best interests of the graduate student body. These interests, as I have said, will be best served by an autonomous Graduate Student Association. Thus, I have directed most of my time to achieving this. It is essential, I think, for this to occur with the utmost cooperation and goodwill between the GSA and the SRC. As far as I know, this has largely been the case so far, and I would like it to continue. I did not deem it appropriate to endanger these negotiations by dealing with a president whom I had voted to impeach, or conversely, with one, two-thirds of whose council I had opposed. It would be most appropriate, I thought, to let the council decide the matter, and then deal with whoever was in power.

Whatever the shortcomings of Mr. Bosnitch, and however much he has contributed to the present predicament of the Student Union, I would not be serving my constituency well if, as I was incessantly pressured to do, I had voted to impeach him. He has been one of the only members of the SRC who actively supported the graduate students, and although he has fought continually for the interests of the Student Union in our negotiations, they are proceeding. He can be difficult, and sometimes seems uncertain about what constitutes a fact, but he is not impossible to deal with.

Miss Maher is correct in saying that it is my duty to represent the graduate students. I am doing this as best I can, and if she presumes to be able to do better, then I suggest she do so. All she has to do is become a graduate student and run for the position on the SRC. She probably won't have much competition.

If there was any seriousness at all in Miss Maher's comments regarding my impeachment, I will welcome a motion to this effect at the next council meeting. If there was not, then she should not be using her position at the Brunswickan as a platform for her infantile and erroneous ravings. My constituents, about whom she professes to be so concerned, have already lost confidence in the Student Union, and with people like Miss Maher on it, this does not surprise me. (The fact that I was asked to refrain from even going to the meeting when it was discovered that

my anti-Bosnitch sentiments were not strong enough indicates that her alleged concern that graduate students be represented are not widely shared on the SRC.

Finally, Mr. Quigley, the references to Angela DeLong are completely unacceptable and I am surprised that you let them be printed at all, let alone by one of your staff in an official capacity. Miss DeLong obviously struggled long and hard in coming to her decision, and to malign her sincere and heartfelt comments demonstrates a complete lack of responsibility. Miss Maher's comments conjure up images of an alley cat in heat with all claws fully extended... MEEEEEOOOOOOW!

KGB thwarts campus security

Joe Smith, a member of the UNB Student Council, was placed under political arrest last Tuesday night. The RCMP have confirmed reports that he is a KGB agent.

Smith was arrested after being caught by Thomas Johnson of UNB Security in the computer room of the Student Union at 3:00 am. Johnson held Smith at gunpoint until police arrived.

Miss Clarah, is reported to be in seclusion after the discovery of her diaries by

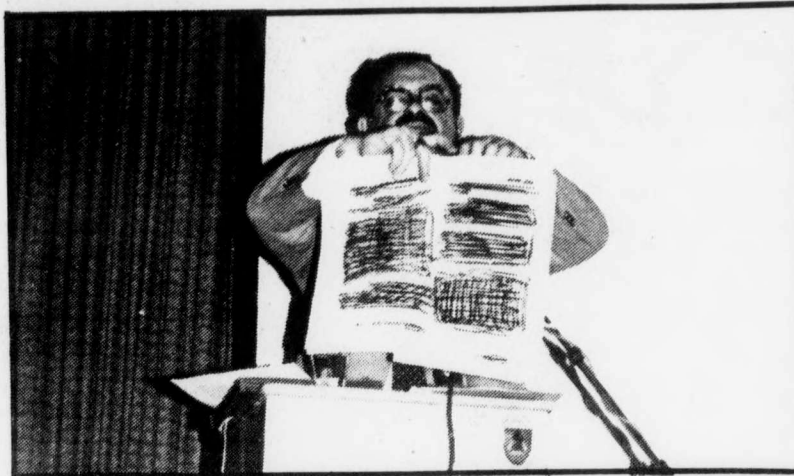

Produced for less than \$350,000 Sayles's latest venture suggests that a small group of versatile, unknown actors working with a witty, insightful script can create a more vivid and engaging work than all the most experience special effects Hollywood can muster.

Certainly, *The Brother From Another Planet* is the kind of story in which the viewer might expect a barrage of pyrotechnics: fleeing from two interplanetary bounty hunters, a black extraterrestrial crashes to Earth in New York City and seeks refuge in Harlem. But instead of using that outlandish premise as the basis for a silly spoof or high tech fireworks display, Sayles builds a warm and humane comedy. The audience shares the fear and curiosity of the mute and nameless alien - who looks like an ordinary black man - as he encounters the excesses of New York's street life. When he hears the blast of a portable tape machine approaching him, he hides in a doorway, terrified of what is apparently a rancorous monster. The alien watches the craziness before him in wide-eyed wonder. It is clear that to him New York must be one of the most bizarre places in the entire universe.

The fugitive has a luminous finger which can regenerate limbs, heal wounds, repair video games and open cash registers. He can hear conversations from long ago in empty rooms and leap halfway up tall buildings in one bound. But the brother is no superman. He is almost unendurably sensitive to the sufferings of his black brothers and sisters in Harlem, that ghetto of the universe where he naturally finds a home. Like a mute messiah, the Brother assumes the pain and oppression of those he walks among. He is a gentle and defenseless stranger in a land that must not be so terribly strange to him; a slave's life on the other planet is clearly no piece of cake. Two white bounty hunters are on his tail, but as bad as conditions may be around 125th street, the Brother desperately wants to stay on earth.

The team also added awards of appreciation to manager Kathy Cleveland, and Coach

Mike Power.

As for summing up how successful a season it was, one only has to look at the final statistics released by the team as a number of new records were established. Individually, Diane Leblanc established a team mark for games played as she was in all 48, her defense partner Carol Cooper set new

records for assists (40), and points (56), as well as game tying goals (5). Anne Campbell established a new team high for goals with 20, including a record 8 powerplay markers. Sandy Ward shattered the team record for penalty minutes with 83, and rookie Charlene Arsenault had the highest end of season plus-

minus rating with +20. Goalie Sue Keirstead took over the record book in the goaltending department as she set new marks for: games played (37), shutouts (7), save percentage (87%), and end of year goals against average (3.09). The Red Blazer's 24 wins also represents a new team high.

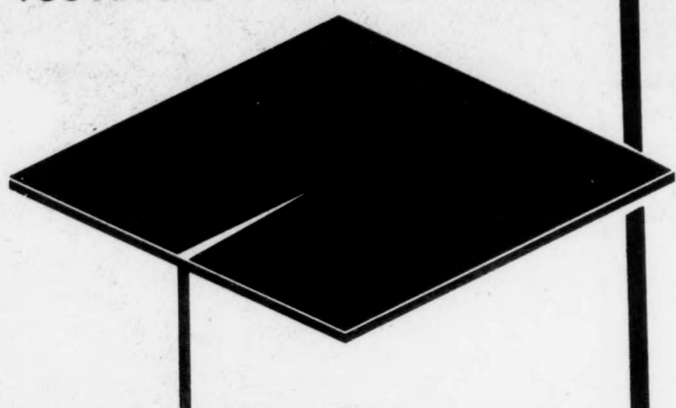

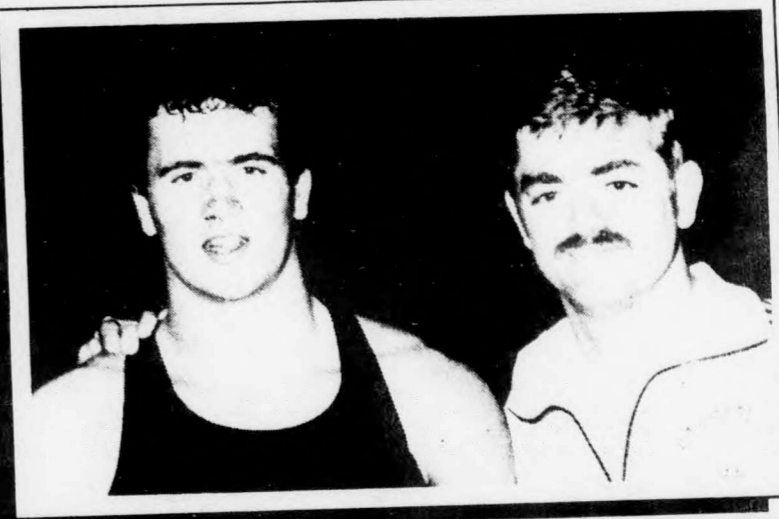
