400 students riot

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Jason Fisher, a witness at the incident and past chair of the Bridges social committee, says that the "demonstration" was a result of a feeling of frustration on the part of the students towards the administration of the residence system. Bridges House had their annual Chuck Cosby social cancelled because of a previous liquor infraction, and were not allowed to present the accompanying "Asshole of the Year Awards".

Fisher believes that much of the damage done to the house, which includes numerous smashed windows, broken showers, and vandalized bathrooms, was done by visitors to the house, and not by Bridges members.

The cancellation of the social and the abolition of the companion awards was said by Steve Williams, BOG member elect, to be the "straw that broke the camel's back. He continues, tension "has been building up for two years. Students on campus, and particularly on Friday night, the students at Bridges House, feel that their way of expressing themselves through legitimate channels doesn't work."

Fisher objects to the way the decisions to cancel the social were made. "I feel personally that we do not have any rights in this residence community. The administration is a dictatorship and it's basically wrong."

The "Asshole of the Year Award," feels Fisher, was beneficial as it "gave certain order to the house. People didn't want to get it so they behaved better.

Dean of Residence, Mary Lou Stirling, does not agree with this opinion she has concluded, from interviews with former residents of Bridges House, that the awards had very little positive value. She says that members of the residence met with Residence Administrators in mid-March to discuss the Chuck Cosby awards and

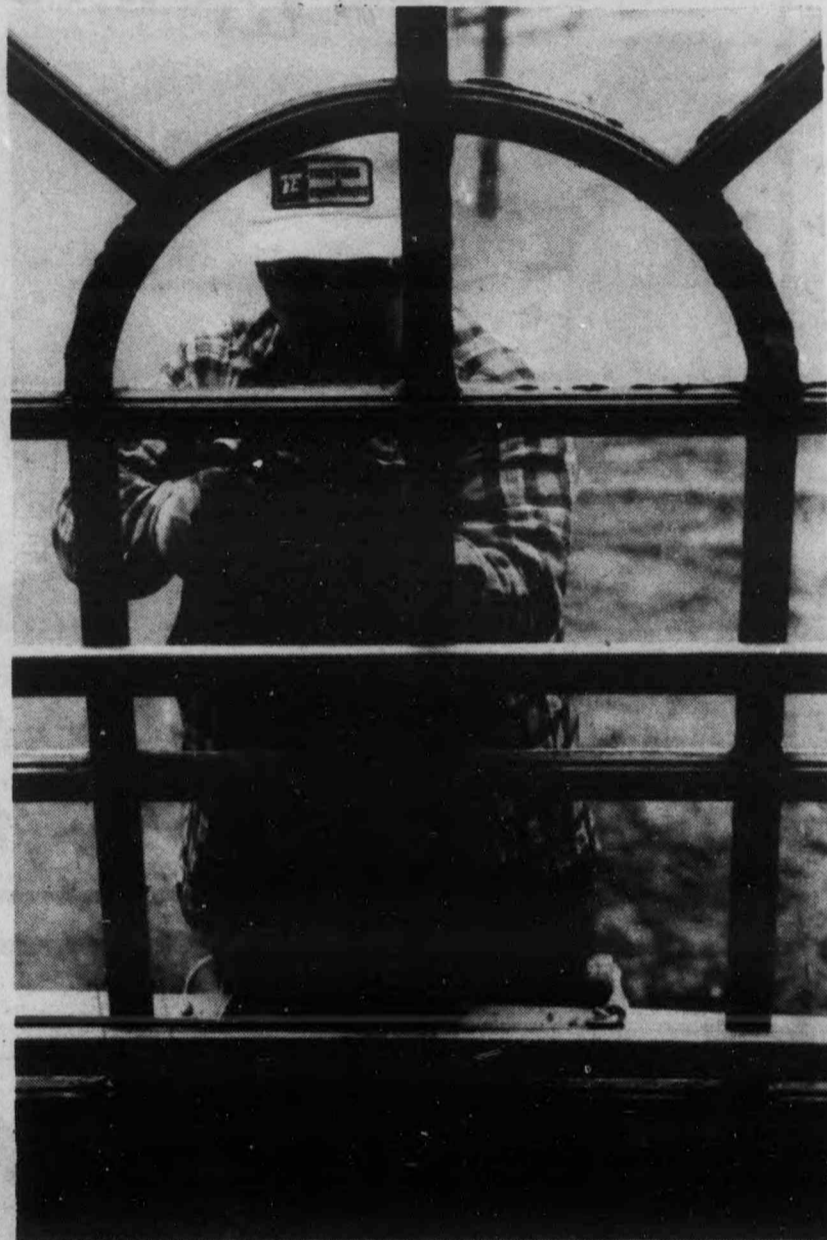
that they knew "well in advance" the administration's position.

Stirling says that many students have come forward expressing their opposition to this kind of behaviour, and says "we are continuing to look into it and they (those students responsible) will be dealt appropriately."

The Residence Representative Board, in a recent press release, stated "The RRB does not condone the actions of the Residents responsible for the actions at Bridges House and in no way will support any such action in the future.

"A simple compromise by the administration to allow some of the less offensive events that occur on Chuck Cosby Day could possibly have avoided the needless damages that the returning students of '92-'93 could be held liable to pay for."

Decisions on what action will be taken against the House have not yet been finalized but two students have been expelled from residence and two students are facing charges of assault presumably resulting from an incident in where a CP was pushed, sustaining a knee injury requiring medical attention.

CHSC general meeting held

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Elections for these seats resulted in Randy Hickey and Beth Galley returning for additional two year terms on the board, together with Derrick Weaver (1 year term) who replaces Eric Drummie. All three candidates, who were recommended to the assembled members by the boards Nomination Committee, were elected unopposed.

Interest in the elections was

marginally higher than in previous years, probably because of the U.N.B. Student Union's earlier attempts to restructure the club. Outgoing S.U. President, Kevin Bourque, who was at the forefront of the so-called "take-over", was present at the meeting, and was less than pleased with several aspects of the proceedings.

In a later interview, Bourque expressed disappointment with the way the meeting was run. In particular, the meeting did not follow the accepted practices regarding how motions should be adopted (Roberts' Rules Of Order).

Motions were proposed by the chair, seconded by a fellow member of the board, and never put to the members for a vote.

To Bourque the whole affair appeared to be simply "a

standard meeting of the BOD with an audience present, rather than an AGM of members."

He was also unhappy that the lawyer for the CHSC was not at the meeting, because he had wished to enquire how \$8,000 of members money could be spent by the club on the take-over incident when the Student Unions legal bill was \$1,295.

Providing evidence that this indeed was the final expense, he challenged the Social Club to provide details of their expenses, adding that "the whole affair regarding the restructuring of the CHSC board was an attempt to make the BOD more accountable and open to its members" and that clearly this is still not the case. "The CHSC still appears to want to hide something."

Bourque's other complaint regarded the "conflict of interests" which could band certain individuals from standing for the BOD. Confusion existed at the meeting when the chairperson detailed an outdated list of "conflicts", but Bourque was more concerned that this list was discriminatory, and therefore illegal.

In particular it states that no director may be a member of, or hold any executive position with "any other corporation or organisation whose objects and goals may be in conflict with the objects and goals of the Company (Club)."

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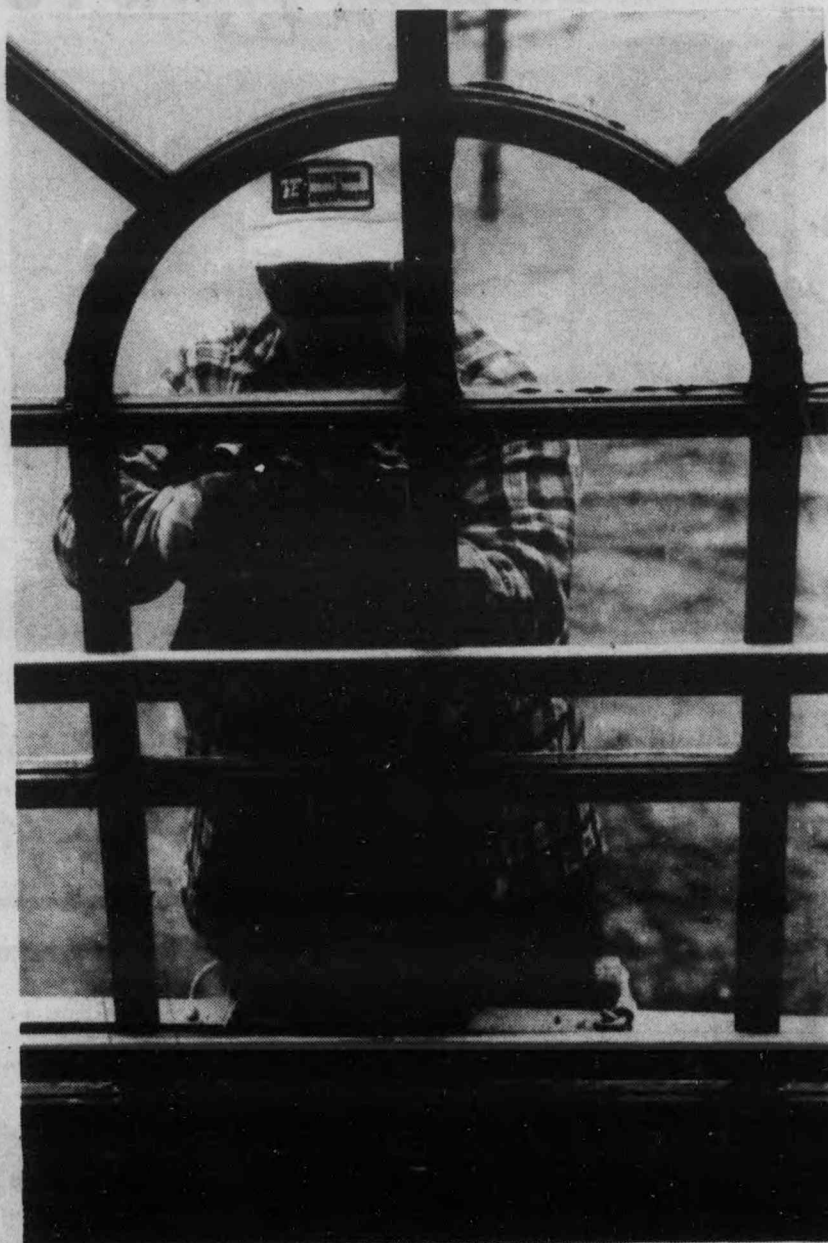

Article says women "silly and shallow"

"I can understand where he's coming from. . .he and his girlfriend broke up. . .he hasn't picked up anyone or had any for awhile."

That statement was made by UNB's Jones House out-going President, Greg Potten, to justify an attack on women in general, and Mary Lou Stirling

in particular, by a resident in the recently published house newsletter, Rolling Jones.

In the article entitled "Vicious Rumors" the author states that he keeps his "bim" around "out of necessity, cause there are some things a guy just can't do for himself (i.e. dishes)". He continues later in the article by saying, "women are silly, shallow, annoying

clinging and generally just not as smart as us, and that's the way it is."

In the article there was also mention of a girlfriend of a male resident. The author asks other male residents to stop staring at her and suggesting other male resident were having bondage fantasies about her.

Potten said "I do not have a problem with the article." It was "not meant to be taken seriously the whole paper was done as a year end thing in fun. I really don't see what all the fuss is about," he said.

Potten seems to be relatively alone in his view. Stirling, Dean of Residence, said "My initial reaction is sadness. I think it falls into the category of violence against women."

Deserie Harrison, President of Maggie Jean Chestnut co-ed residence, said "I find this par-

ticularly surprising because this house (Jones) is supposed to be a house for more mature men of all the male residences."

Harrison also said "Displays such as this newsletter, the Bridges brawl, and the attempt to vandalize Aitken House at their social, prove that Mary Lou Stirling is perfectly justified in taking away the rights of house committees to organize in-house activities."

Dean of Students, Tom Austin, said the article "does not speak to the kind of images that we wish to promote of women, of people in general, and to the degree of civility that we expect of university students."

Austin feels that Sterling and Henry Llambias, the Don of Jones House, should become involved and "they (the stu-

dents responsible for the newsletter) should be called to account for what they've done." He also hopes "it was written in ignorance, not in belief."

When contacted on Tuesday before a special meeting of the dons Llambias said "We're investigating and taking action. . ." but did not wish to comment further.

Harrison feels articles like this one "hurt everyone in the residence community because displays of immaturity such as this destroy the image of all students in residence. . ." and that "it's wrong for them to take their anger at the Dean of Residence out on women in general."

In response to the issue a special meeting of the dons was held last night to discuss

ever meets again." The advisory board was set up earlier in the year as an additional assurance of accountability for the BOD, and includes representatives from the UNB and STU student unions, the graduate student association, and the university administration. However problems are ongoing with respect to the scheduling of these advisory board meetings, with both sides blaming each other for the delays.

In replying to the allegations of improper procedure at the meeting, Eric Drummie, past chairperson of the Social Club BOD said that "according to the by-laws of the club it is only necessary to have a motion seconded. As it was possible for over

what action should be taken.

It was recommended that the author and editor of the newsletter would be fined and an educational component would be set up.

Apparently this component would include discussion on the power of language and violence against women.

The recommendations have been approved by the residence administration.

2,000 members to be in attendance, to call and count every vote on every motion would be impractical."

Regarding the chair proposing motions, he conceded that this may have been improper, but that "the floor was always open for anyone to object to any procedures, but no-one, including the Student Union, did so at the time." He added "We haven't got a copy of Roberts' Rules, but we try to follow them to the best of our knowledge. If we failed to do this, then we apologise."

On the matter of the conflict of interest, John Townsend, lawyer for the Social Club, maintained that the rule "was made, pursuant to a by-law by the Board," and that this "was quite in order." The rule simply "embodies common sense." Matt Harris, manager of the Social Club

explained that these rules had been in place for several years but had never been written down. On the advice of their lawyer this had recently been corrected, and this showed that the BOD was being more open in its affairs.

With respect to the \$8,000 legal fees, Harris provided evidence of three payments to the clubs lawyers relating exclusively to the "take-over" question. These payments totalled \$7,746.

Additional legal fees over the year took the cost well over \$8,000. These records were not clearly itemised, but Harris pointed out that all the accounts had been verified by the clubs auditors, Bourque and Moffatt, and no irregularities had been uncovered.

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In another letter received by the Brunswickan the Jones House Committee apologized to anyone offended by the article and regret the oversight in the editing of this article.

In their letter they state that they are taking "active measure to ensure that this does not occur in future publications."

Dear Friends,

Many of you probably remember Mark Michalica. He graduated from UNB Physical Education and Recreation in May 1988 with a 3.0 Grade Point Average. It was apparent to several of us even then that there was something wrong with Mark. He was extremely thin and was losing his strength. We have much background on Mark's medical problems from 1983 to the present time and we will share this with any of you as requested.

Mark has experienced many symptoms since the onset of the condition in 1983. Headaches, digestive problems, dizziness, cold hands and feet, low back pain, night sweats, food allergies, ears ringing, pain in muscles and connective tissue, etc. All this accompanied by weight loss of 50 lbs. from an already thin frame.

Mark can't work. At the present time his days are filled with study of medical journals, etc. as he tried to find a possible answer to his health problems. His present physician, Dr. Paul Smith is guiding his treatments and referrals. He has already seen approximately 30 doctors and no one has been able to correctly diagnose his condition. All obvious diseases and illnesses have been systematically ruled out. These trips across Canada and the U.S. have caused a financial and psychological drain on Mark and his family. He needs to seek advice further afield and this will require money.

Fishy business

Dear Editor,

There is something fishy going on here. A professor at STU acquires a criminal record for - by his own admission - assaulting a student with a weapon and threatening to kill her. Because, amongst other things, he is "active in the community and at St. Thomas University," his lawyer asks that he be given a discharge and the judge gives him a probationary sentence. The University President, in turn, considers it would place the professor—a teacher of social psychology—in "double jeopardy" to remove him from the classroom.

Double jeopardy or a double break? First, the professor gets off lightly in court. Compare the sentence of the professor - a wrist-slap fine of \$345, counselling sessions, and six months probation - with that of another man issuing a death threat to a woman student on the UNB campus last spring who got 4 months in jail. And remember, the professor brandished a yard-long iron poker within inches of the head of the victim (his wife), while the jailed man was unarmed. Remember, too, that the professor was accused of two charges of assault (though he plea bargained down to just one), and that a wife does not walk out the door until she has suffered, on average, 42 beatings (NB Advisory Council on the Status of Women statistic).

Furthermore, the judge presumably did consider the professor something of a menace to society since she ordered him to attend special classes for controlling abuse. Does the University administration also think him something of a liability in the classroom—the psychology classroom—at least until his therapy runs its course? Apparently not, although it has banned him for a year at a time from STU pubs because of scuffles with campus police—including one incident involving force against a female student officer.

The fact that the student who was assaulted in the court case was the professor's wife should not be allowed to mitigate the crime. If anything, she is the one in "double jeopardy." Like most abused wives, she could stop the abuse only by leaving her home and her marriage. Despite the fact that her mother's money has allowed them to put the down payment on the house and that she contributed every month to the mortgage, she—the victim—ended up with no marriage, no house, no car, a history of abuse, an unfinished degree, and thousands of dollars of legal fees incurred to separate from her

abuser. The professor—the guilty one—gets to keep the house, the car, his salary, and the job—where, ironically, he teaches about human relationships. This man is a social psychologist!

In Newfoundland, the good brothers at Mount Cashel were found guilty of criminal offences and lost their orphanage. In the US, Jimmy Bakker was found guilty of criminal offences and lost his congregation. In BC, Bill Vander Zalm was found guilty of conflict of interest and had to resign his political office. Malpractice? Doctors lose their licence. Criminal record? Lawyers get disbarred. Can't get bonded? Don't apply for work with King's Landing or Molly Maid, but, what the heck, find safe haven as a professor of psychology at STU.

Double jeopardy, double break, or double standard? Why does STU President O'Brien condemn Professor Clow who speaks for peace during the Persian Gulf War but condone Professor Fish who is convicted of violence at home?

Locked out

Dear Editor,

I am pleased to see that the *Brunswickan* is looking at the issue of media bias during the Bosnitch era, thinking back in retrospect to that time period I can say yes that the *Brunswickan*, and as well CHSR were very anti-student movement, unfortunately their attitudes affected the way they presented the facts to the student body and to some extent the community at large.

My involvement in student politics started in 1979 as Vice President Internal for the Saint Thomas University Student Union. During the next seven years I held other elected positions, from President of the Saint Thomas Student Representative Council to CHSR Station Director. Over this period of time I seen a steady deterioration of Student Voice in student affairs. It appeared that the new breed of student politicians were more interested in their own well being, either while they were students, or what employment benefits would they receive after they graduated if they did not offend the University administrators. With these motives, it was difficult for them to work for the interests of the student at large.

One student leader who did not follow the norm of selling fellow students for personal gain was student leader John Bosnitch, even though we differed on many issues

and his methods of solving some of the political problems that were at hand, we did agree on one principle, and that was, a Democracy for Students in its strict sense.

At its peak the pro student movement led by Bosnitch forced the University to make decisions that were for the benefit of the students. One slap in the face for the University was when the Bosnitch student government forced the University to return \$10.00 of student fees back to the student, this represented \$50,000 the University had to give back!

With the student movement having this kind of power, the University had to start a counter movement to discredit Bosnitch influence.

In 1985 while I was station director for CHSR, I was told by Ken Quiggly who was the Editor in Chief for the *Brunswickan* that the *Brunswickan* was going to start an Anti-Bosnitch campaign, would CHSR follow suit, I refused to partake in such endeavors, the game plan was to only broadcast the Bosnitch failures and ignore the success that he and the student movement had, while at same time broadcast the success of James Downy and the University. This became the catalyst for my unlawful lockout of the radio station.

Hopefully the medias of the present and the future will never slant their communications towards the benefit of one party or the other.

House woes

Dear Editor,

It is 5:30pm Friday, April 5, and the Ladies of Tibbits are outside enjoying a barbecue which they have been invited to by the men of my house. I am a member of the house committee and therefore feel I should be down representing the house, but I am not because I am so frustrated and upset due to the orientation meeting that I have just attended. I feel I must relay these feelings to the student population.

The board of Dons (chaired by Mary Lou Stirling, Dean of Residence) has successfully taken all control over orientation week away from the students, and given this control to the dons. I have spent the previous hour arguing and

complaining to the Don of my house about the way the administration is abusing their power, and not considering the students wishes or desires on the subject. The discussion came to an end when my don stated, "This is quite a change over previous years where each resident elected house committee had all the control over the activities and therefore it is very difficult for me to accept."

The original system was not only completely changed, but the students were given no previous notification of the changes until they were presented to them in a meeting where the Board of Dons simply stated "These are the changes, so get used to them!" The Board of Dons did not even give an indication to the students what was to be discussed at the meeting and actually took measures to hide it from them.

The changes were so drastic that the RRB organized a protest of resident students larger than any other protest the whole campus has organized all year. There were some changes brought about as a result of the protest and the RRB's efforts but when everything that was lost is considered, no resident can honestly admit that our concerns were actually taken into consideration.

I was extremely upset with what went on, but decided to try and make the best of a bad situation, so when I was asked by the Don to be a member of the committee I gladly accepted as I saw it as an opportunity to have my views considered.

After I presented the events that Neill House had organized at an orientation meeting with committees from all houses, I entertained a large number of questions as to what the events were composed of, and how they were to be run. I also made attempts to justify the events but was reminded that this meeting was not to decide which events would be accepted but instead only to present the ideas.

The meeting to accept or reject the ideas was carried out at the Board of Dons meeting shortly after the presentation meeting. All decisions were made by giving each member of the Board of Dons one vote and the majority rules. No students, other orientation committee members, or any other representatives were asked to attend this meeting.

The Board of Don's is an advisory board to the Dean of Residence and the RRB is also an advisory board. No part in any of the decision-making, from the original procedure to what events were kept, was left up to the RRB, in fact it is quite evident that the students were kept in the dark and neglected from the decisions on purpose.

One example of the events which got rejected was the water runs. A

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water run is when the female residents, dressed in bathing suits under T-shirts and shorts, run by the front of the male residents as the male residents throw warm water on them. Participation for events such as these are strictly voluntary. The reasons I have been given for the rejection of the water runs include that the university would be liable if someone was to fall and hurt themselves, and there was no justifiable purpose for these runs.

The university is not liable due to the voluntary assumption of risk the students who participate would be accepting, and as for justifiable reason, I wonder if the Board of Don's has ever heard of FUN.

To end I would like to not this is not an isolated incident, and seems to have transpired do [sic] to the attitude the Board of Don's and Dean of Residence seem to possess. They act as if we students are just children and not capable of accepting responsibility or making responsible decisions. I wonder how these administrators, of infinite wisdom, expect us students to be able to learn how to deal with responsibility if we are never to be permitted to accept it? This attitude is definitely demeaning, and very much insulting. I must remind the Dean of Residence, and the Board of Don's that we students are the people who this university is here to accommodate, and benefit from, and at least our concerns, desires, and opinions on all issues pertaining to us have a right to be expressed.

Residence students are forced, by the proximity of our living quarters, to cooperate with each other and to be considerate of our neighbors interests. The Board of Dons, by closing its ears, is stripping residence life of its paramount redeeming quality. Please open your eyes; the collapse of the community has begun.

Residence violations

Dear Editor,

I sit at my desk at 3:00 am, April 7, 1991. Two men from Bridges House are in my room. I do not know them but they are zealous, they feel violated and cannot understand why they have been treated so badly. They were told by police that if they left their room they would not be allowed to return even though they have committed no offence.

I have lived in residence for four years and have seen several periods

of turmoil. At the end of my residence life I see disturbing trends and attitudes developing in my peers. These trends and attitudes developed in the past six months and I believe they are a direct result of an apparent terrible lack of foresight or consideration by the residence administration specifically Mary Lou Stirling who ultimately enacts all residence wide policies.

The first indication of an insensitive administration was last year. The Residence Administration wished to ban offensive house songs. As Chairman of the Residence Representatives Board I agreed but was left with a feeling of not being consulted adequately. In the end a suitable agreement was reached as all concerned were pleased with the result.

As my term in office continued, I tried to bring the two advisory bodies for the dean of Residence, the Board of Dons, and the Residence Representatives Board, closer together. Joint meetings were held and they were quite productive.

In the past four months, two actions of the Residence Office have created widespread discontent throughout much of the community. The first was the Orientation policy which was brought down by Dean Stirling with the air of a dictator. No student was involved with the policy until after it was unveiled. A diplomatic and media battle was mounted by the RRB and in the end several dons had lost respect in their houses, and the dean had suffered a severe credibility blow in the eyes of many students.

This past weekend, Bridges house suffered from vandalism. The vandalism was a product of frustration caused by the actions of the Residence Administration. The Bridges Social, Chuck Cosby Award and Chuck Cosby day activities were all banned by the administration. Although I can see the problems with the award, I cannot understand why any administrator would deal such a blow to a group already frustrated by the orientation week changes and a very disrespected and non receptive don. Surely they should have anticipated some form of retaliation. At the time of writing, the Bridges House committee was been dissolved for about 10 days. The building is in a shambles and several students have been evicted close to exam time. Although they did break the rules, a more tactful approach by the administration could have relieved the problems surrounding the Chuck Cosby award, avoided severe hardship for students and an estimated \$2,000 damage, a bill that may be placed on the shoulders of the 1992-1993 residence students.

I was once told by a mentor at an engineering firm that it is much easier to clean dirt with many short pushes of the broom than one big sweep. I believe that "Stirling's big sweep" has risen for too much dust and it could take years to settle. The Residence Administration may see themselves as a monolith unscarred by the past days events. They may believe that the methods they have used to avoid

the pain caused to the recipient of "Chuck" were very effective. The administrations methods only served to cause much more pain to many people than any one "Chuck" recipient could have endured. I see the monolith has a huge gash in its side and virtually no support from the students it administers.

At the close of the debate over orientation policy, a round table discussion was held for the students and administrators involved. At that discussion I suggested that the administration had reinstated the classic "us vs. them" attitude and that they would have to work hard to gain respect. They agreed but obviously have succeeded in opening the gap to a new maximum.

As I prepare to leave UNB for another institution, I feel sad. The residence community I had grown to love is no more. The spirit is gone and nobody seems at ease. I had once hoped to send my children to UNB residence where they could learn valuable lessons about comradery, spirit and true friendship. As I leave, I can't see those lessons being so easy to learn.

In closing, I ask the administration to please consult students more often and try to act in a manner becoming a reasonable group. At times students feel as if they are at war with the residence administration when we haven't fired a shot. Bridges started to fight back with what they thought best. The problems we have seen over the administration that residence students are not receptive to dictatorial rule. It trivializes our role in our own government and demeans us. Residence students have valuable opinions, I hope all readers consider mine although I feel some of my words fall on deaf ears.

Bosnitch interest

To The Editor,

The recent interest the Brunswickan has expressed in the "Bosnitch era" of the mid-nineteen eighties has once again brought to the forefront the issue of the student movement for democracy and free speech on university campuses. While it is unfortunate that these issues seem, at times, to be clouded by the controversial nature of the "cult of the personality" around former Student Union President Bosnitch, it is nonetheless heartening to see a willingness to investigate the actual facts of this period. It is my hope that this investigation will not degenerate into the sort of revisionism which characterised the Brunswickan's reporting during that era, and to that end, I provide the following observations about the changes which have resulted from the university's actions.

It is certainly clear that the university at large has changed drastically since the mid-eighties, with a substantial loss of democracy within many student organizations (and in particular, the student representative council and CHSR-FM radio station). When the university administration physically locked out the elected executive of the Student Union, headed by John Bosnitch, and proceeded to appoint and authorize a new executive of a puppet council, it gave confidence to right-wing individuals across campus whose agenda included the disabling of all effective student organizations that were democratically operated.

Thus, in the term following the illegal dismissal of the Student Union Executive in the Spring of 1986 by James Downey's administration, I was denied the right to take the seat of Comptroller of the Student Representative Council, to which I was elected in the fall that year by a majority vote of the students at large. Downey's administration, and the puppet council headed at that time by Larry Hansen, were able to blacklist me and challenge in court my fitness to obtain office, while blackmailing the Brunswickan and other student press into distorting their coverage of the events. At one point, the Brunswickan, in a front page quotation, took a phrase out of context which appeared to credit my lawyer with referring to me as a communist and a fascist in the

same sentence (although I admit quite proudly to the former designation, I abhor any thought of being referred to in the context of the latter). While I finally won in court the right to take the seat to which I had been elected by a substantial majority, I was impeached in literally the same meeting in which I was seated on the puppet council. Further legal action declared my impeachment null and void, but the puppet council at that point immediately declared an election for my position... I was by this time financially drained and unable to fund further legal challenges. Simultaneously, the puppet council acquiesced to an administrative demand to take the finances of the Student Union out of the hands of the elected representatives, and thus the "Foundation for Students, Inc." was created by the University to allow Downey's administration to maintain control over the purse strings of the students. From this point on, all expenditures by the student council have had to be approved by this university administration dominated "Foundation". Students, and their elected representatives, no longer have the right to spend their own money as they democratically decide upon without asking the permission of the university administration.

The completion of the right-wing agenda to destroy student democratic movements was not confined to the Student Union Council. The elected Director of CHSR-FM, André Faust, together with myself and another student, were barred from the premises of the radio station for politically organizing students and advocating an internal system of democracy for the radio station. During the time of Mr. Faust's directorship, elected student officials exercised the majority of the power in the radio station, with regular meetings of the general membership of the station at which executive decisions could be over-ruled by a majority vote. Soon after the banning of Faust and myself, the station abandoned the practise of electing an executive comprised of students, in favour of the current procedure of all appointments being made by a full-time paid non-student station manager. General meetings of the membership of the station at which votes were taken and decisions made were abandoned in favour of token "information sessions" at which the paid station manager, together with a clique of officials appointed by him, would "inform" the membership of decisions. Again, democracy was defeated in favour of a top-down bureaucratic system.

It is important to recognise that during this period, the only vocal voice for student democracy was from those associated with the Bosnitch "camp". And without exception, each of the individuals in this group were blacklisted from further studies at this university. Although from time to time I have had serious political disagreements

It is my hope that contemporary students will gain such a vision, one which can only materialize through student action and militancy.

Perhaps we can draw a lesson from the students in Prague, Czechoslovakia and Paris, France during 1968, whose struggle for democracy and free speech encompassed not only the universities, but also the factories and the working class. Perhaps we can learn from the students of China, who have continued a fight for democracy at the cost of thousands of lives. In Korea, Burma and South Africa, student's struggles have taken to the streets. It is time that the complacent "Canadian way" of accepting the status quo is shown as a strategy of defeat which will only result in power being held in the hands of the tiny elite who currently control our country's wealth.

All lip service

It is difficult to believe that you pay more than lip service to feeling sympathetic to any victim of abuse when that one sentence is the only support you offer to Professor Fish's victim. You have minimized her completely out of any existence by your one reference to "any victim." One the other hand you demonstrate, not only in words, but in your actions in submitting your letter for publication, your support for her abuser.

The newspaper account, if anything, minimized and trivialized the seriousness of the offense. You write of the dangers of making assumptions and then imply that the newspaper account was exaggerated and one-sided. Your statement sounds objective and tolerant but contains a hidden insult. Is there another side to the story? Did Professor Fish's wife ask for it? Is she somehow lacking as a woman or wife, and did she fail to meet his "needs" or provoke him? There is, I think, only one side to this story and that is that men batter women because (1) they can, and (2) they can get away with it.

You are correct in saying that

one should look at the whole picture and all aspects of a person, and it is for precisely that reason that serious consideration should be given to dismissing Professor Fish. A willingness to assault a woman is an integral part of the batterer's belief system, and while you may be able to divorce Professor Fish's actions at home from his actions in the classroom, he carries the same value system with him wherever he goes.

Yes, no doubt Professor Fish teaches with enthusiasm, shows concern for his students and makes his classes interesting. He has learned, as you have not, that psychological manipulation will serve him well. You like him, he has done nothing to harm you, so of course it logically follows that if he harms another human being in the privacy of his home that is none of your business.

You are not alone in this attitude. I recently listened to a school board official explain why a teacher who had admitted to molesting children was still teaching. The teacher had taught his children who liked him, he said. He has known this teacher all his life and liked him, he said. He was a good teacher because his students liked him, he said. Yes, of course they do, some

of them, he doesn't harm them all, only the helpless and vulnerable. It is to his and Professor Fish's advantage to be well-liked; it gives them enormous credibility and sympathy even in the face of the most damning evidence.

If you are indeed sympathetic to the victims of abuse, put yourself in one's place for a moment and think what it would do to you to be told, "Well, he never hurt me or mine, and I always liked him, so I intend to give him every benefit of the doubt." There are a great many rapists, wife batterers, and child molesters out there masquerading as normal, enthusiastic, concerned men. As current statistics reveal that at least one woman in four will be a victim and will probably not report it, you should be able, by consulting three of four of your friends, to find at least one and perhaps three or four who can tell you what it feels like to be defined as non-existent as a human being, by both the abuser and the public.

You, I think, owe Professor Fish's wife an apology. In your letter to the Brunswickan she exists only as an abstract object of abuse. He, on the other hand, is portrayed by you as a full and complete human being — concerned, enthusiastic, and interested in others.

If Professor Fish can demonstrate that he has changed his attitude and is now both willing and able to teach the causes, implications and consequences of family violence, then let him teach. If not, then you would do well to learn instead from his wife who can teach you something of value about courage.

Three corrections

Dear Editor,

I was very pleased to see my letter in your last issue. Regrettably, you had to edit out my responses to inaccuracies contained

in your previous article about the Student Union. I believe that there are three specific corrections which should not wait until next year to be made.

First, you wrote that in 1984, President Downey refused to give the Student Union its budget until we "returned" \$50,000. The implication was that the Union had "taken" University money.

Our 1984 Union fees of \$250,000 were frozen because the Union refused to force students to donate to the University. At registration, the University made all students pay a "mandatory donation" to the Third Century Fund. We objected to supporting a fund over which students had no control. The Student Union refunded the donations to students despite the objections of the Administration. Refunding the money and getting receipts exactly equalled the amount of money we refused to "donate". An embarrassed President Downey eventually announced that the Student Union was not holding any money belonging to the University. The donations were cancelled and the Student Union budget was released.

Secondly, you wrote that the police conducted an "investigation of the SRC funds". You left the impression that there was something illegal going on.

The six month investigation, costing thousands of taxpayers' dollars, resulted in a finding that there was no impropriety or unlawful activity. The police declared, in August 1985, that the Student Union and its officials were "completely exonerated".

Thirdly, you wrote that the lockout occurred "after an audit of the Student Union books revealed a \$174,000 deficit". That is incorrect.

The lockout occurred months BEFORE the Administration produced their trumped up "audit". The fact is that the University closed down the Student Union not because it was poorly run, but because it was too WELL run. Our operations were cutting into the earnings of University-run services. Our photocopy centre along was taking over one hundred thousand dollars of business away from overpriced University-owned copiers in the libraries. The deficit that the Administration tried to pin on us was actually spent not by students, but by the Administration itself, paying for lawyers to defend their takeover of the Union.

Unfounded allegations of financial impropriety are still being repeated, despite the fact that New Brunswick courts long ago dismissed the accusations as groundless. The three false charges addressed in this letter were used for years to create an elaborate hoax about financial irregularities in the Union.

The truth is an incredible powerful thing. I wrote to you because I detected a real spirit of honesty in your Brunswickan editorials. I believe that an investigative review will uncover many of the wrongs committed so many years ago. If the Brunswickan conducts such a review, you will be doing a great service not only to the students of my generation, but also to your present day readers. John Bosnitch

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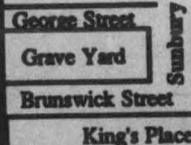

Premier unveils new tourism plan

New Brunswick Premier Frank McKenner and Minister of Tourism Rollin Blolieu unveiled New Brunswick's new tourism strategy entitled "Break-Free in New Brunswick" to the media at a press conference in Fredericton on Thursday afternoon. The two discussed at length the government's plan to boost the province's sagging tourism industry by marketing New Brunswick as "the world's largest quit smoking clinic."

An extensive media blitz promoting the "Break-Free in New Brunswick" idea began today,

reaching audiences throughout North America through television, magazine and newspaper ads. The 3.8 million dollar promotional effort is hoped to more than triple the number of tourists coming to the province during the summer months with the promise of assisting them to break the smoking habit.

"The government is making every effort to create an environment that will make breaking the habit easy for visitors to our province, and hopefully fill the provincial coffers some in the process..." said an enthusiastic McKenner. "This could be the biggest thing since that portable computer gizmo..." he continued.

Visitors to the province will find many advantages to kicking the smoking habit. The sheer cost of cigarettes in the province, the highest on the planet, will serve to encourage many to curb their habit, but the encouragement does not stop there. Smoking will be banned at all interior touristic attractions, such as museums, and municipalities in the province are being encouraged to ban smoking in public buildings.

Also, government cutbacks in funding summer jobs for students combined with the poor economic situation are likely to result in high unemployment amongst students in the province during the coming summer. Department of Tourism

officials are counting on a large number of these unemployed students to hang-around recreational sites in the province begging for cigarettes, which they can no longer afford themselves, from tourists. The government feels that after a few days of this most tourists will avoid smoking in public for fear of being swarmed by nicotine craving locals.

"All in all, it will be pretty annoying to be a smoker here," said Blolieu. "But in order to get a lasting effect those who wish to quit will have to spend at least a couple of weeks here, longer than tourists usually do, so we expect people to spend more time visiting

the province than they have in the past. This, combined with the enormous tax revenue we expect to generate from those poor saps who are unable to stop smoking, should go a long way towards revitalising the province's economy."

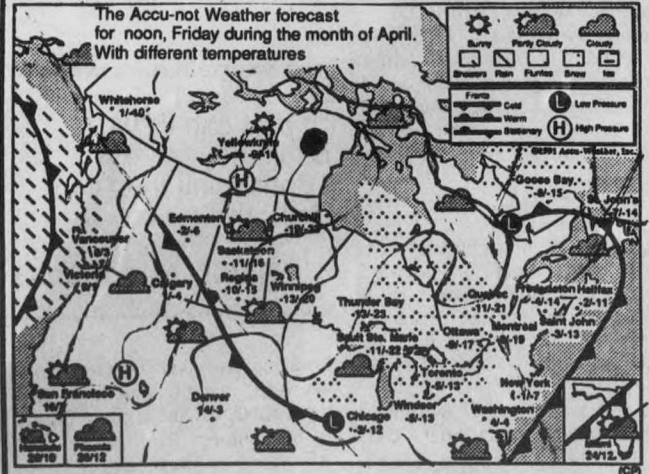

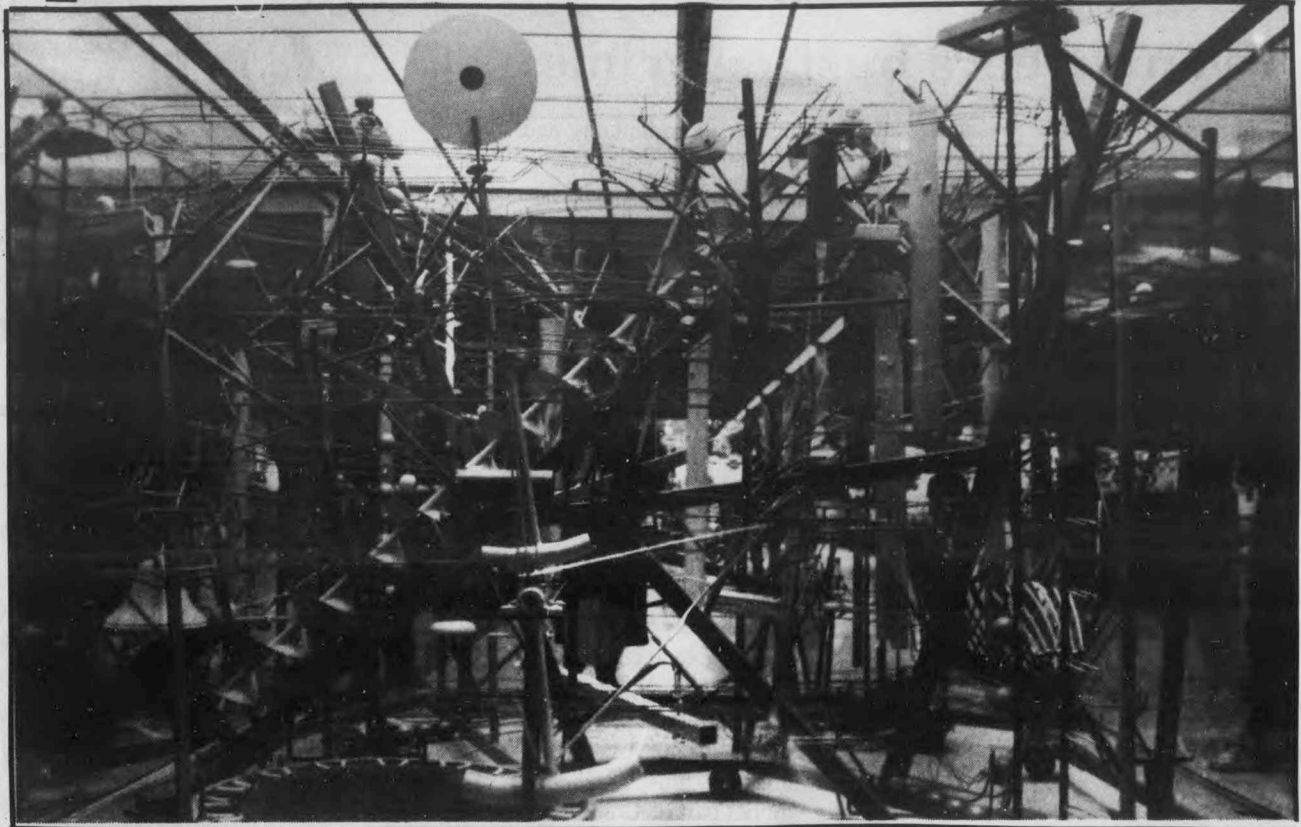
The new design, which has recently been patented, is quoted in their press release as "The engineering breakthrough of the century".

Billiter, however, has some competition. Arch "send them back to Quebec"

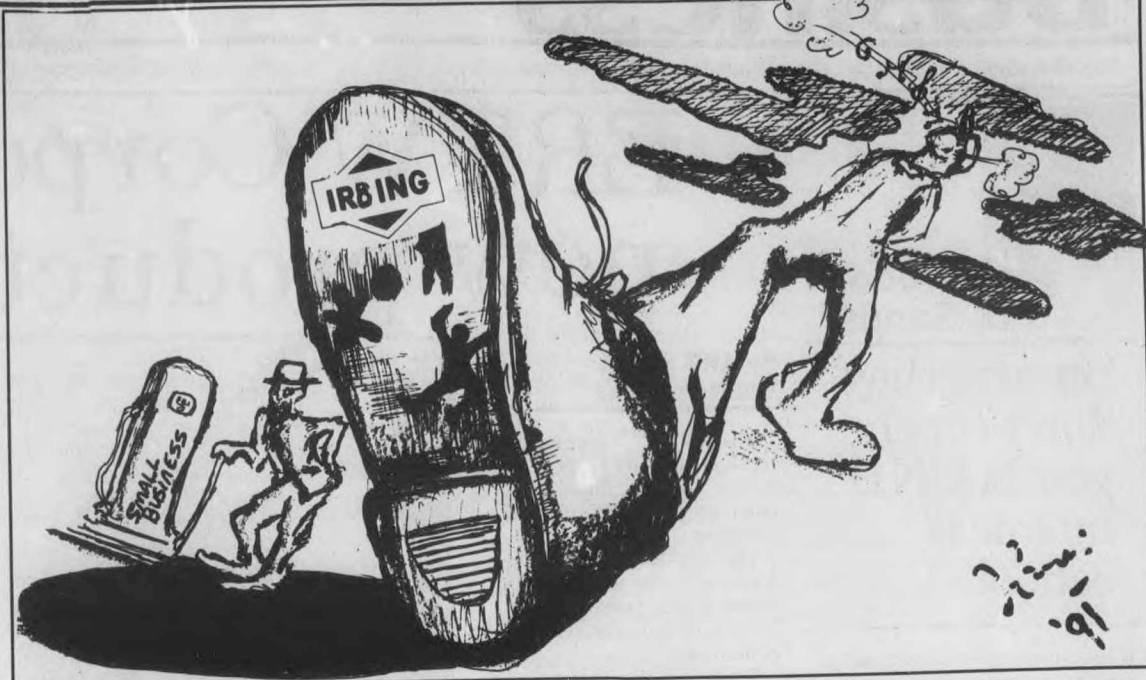
Tafford can put his two feet in his mouth just as well as Billiter.

10 Beans and their flatulence levels

Concern about food shortages around the world has caused increased attention to be paid to beans as a source of inexpensive protein. 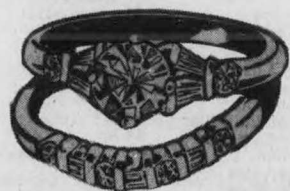


Divorce

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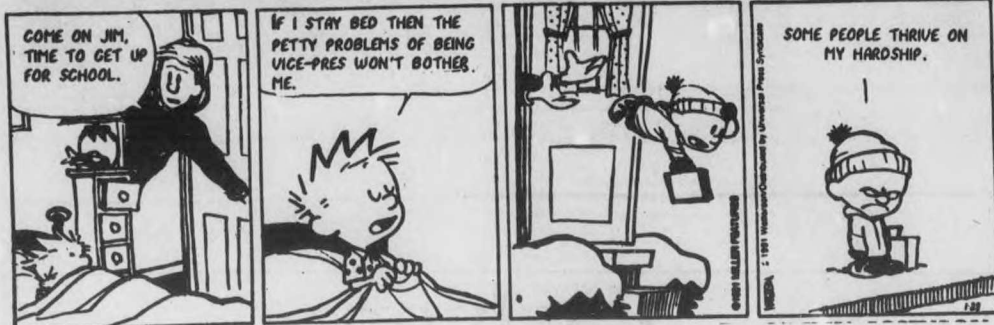
