

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More services now offered in SUB

With the last of the construction workers putting the finishing touches on the new SUB, many services never before available to the Dal student are coming into - operation.

Here are some of those changes:

Games Room-Already proving to be one of the most popular areas in the building, the games room offers you a choice of billiards, snooker, pool, table tennis, and shuffleboard all at the most reasonable rates in town. Regular hours are:

Monday to Thursday 10:30 a.m. to 11:30 p.m.

Friday and Saturday 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 a.m. Sunday and holidays 12:00 noon to 11:30 p.m. The Card Room-This room is exclusively for the card addicts. Ten four player bridge tables are presently available and an 8 player poker table is expected to arrive any day now. Hours for this room are the same as the general hours of operation. Men's and Women's locker rooms-Over two hundred lockers each for men and women are available at a low rental charge (includes the lock). These rates are:

\$1.00 per term plus \$1.00 refundable deposit for the lock.

\$.50 per week plus \$1.00 refundable deposit for the lock.

\$.15 per day plus \$1.00 refundable deposit for the lock.

Again hours of operation are the same as those for the building. Details available at the Games Room Control Desk.

Special Notices Board-In the basement lobby a glass case notice board is available to students and faculty members with something to sell, trade, buy, request and offer rides, as well as other miscellaneous no-tices. Forms available in Publicity Office, Room 212, Second Floor.

The Stereo Room-Located on the main floor, this room is already crowded and its opening was only an-nounced by word of mouth. By depositing your University ID card with the Enquiry Desk, you can borrow a headset plus stereo 8 cassette of your favorite recording and plug yourself into the "true stereo sound" from any of the six cassette players in the Stereo Room. Our tape library presently has 65 tapes, plus another 45 on order. Because of its tremendous popularity, we will be ordering a further thirty tapes plus ten tapes a month to the end of the

academic year. If you'd like a particular tape we don't have fill out one of the suggestion forms available in the Stereo Room, Music Lounge or the Enquiry Desk.

Hours for the stereo room and tape lounge are: Monday to Thursday 10:30 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. Friday 10:30 a.m. to 1:00 a.m.

Saturday 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 a.m.

Sundays and holidays 12 noon to 11:00 p.m. The Music Lounge-This is easily one of the most adaptable room in the SUB. The stereo amplifier unit will operate on no less than six separate channels. AM radio, FM radio, stereo record player, 4 track stereo tape cartridgeplayer and recorder and stereo tape recorder and player (variable speed). Students may use this equipment during regular operating hours. If you wish to reserve ahead of time simply sign the Music Lounge book at the Enquiry Desk. Although tapes may be borrowed from the Tape Library, students are welcome to bring their own records, tapes and tape cartridges.

As a special service students may also use the equipment for tape recording sessions. Those wishing this service are requested to arrange a time through the enquiry desk or the Reservations office, Room 210, second floor.

Reading Lounge-On order and expected in soon, many magazines and newspaper subscriptions have been ordered, as a result of a preference poll taken before Christmas. For a complete list see the posters in the Building.

News Services at the Enquiry Desk-In filling its role as information centre of the building, a number of new services have been started here.

It is now possible to reserve facilities in the SUB for any time period up to one week ahead of the pre-sent date. Complete information on all meetings, events, dances, films, etc., for daily and weekly per-iods is available from the personnel on duty.

Unfortunately, this year the "Student Directory" will not be published. However, the Desk has a bound copy of the computer lists of student names, ad-dresses and telephone numbers. This list is by no means completely accurate but information will be means completely accurate, but information will be given upon request. This information can also be obtained by calling 424-2140 (the Enquiry Desk number). Has something in the SUB made you angry? Or would you like to make some recommendations or suggestions about changing or adding something? Fill out

a convenient form at the Desk and we will contact you to take action to satisfy your request or complaint. Any action taken on suggestions and complaints will be posted on bulletin boards and possibly announced in the Gazette.

Do you want literature on some subject? We have pamphlets, flyers, booklets, etc., on such topics as CUS Life Insurance. We also have a supply of current editions of the Gazette, Sublicity, Dalhousie Newsletter, The Ansul, The Alumni News, and many other free publications of various departments within the university.

The Cafeteria-Under the operation of Versa Foods, the Cafeteria attempts to offer good food at low prices. Week day specials for lunch and supper offer a complete meal at a special lower price. Hours of operation are:

Monday . Friday 8:00 A.M. to 6:30 P.M.

Due to low demand, the Cafeteria will not be open weekends. However, the vending machines area is open at all times during regular hours of operation of the building.


General Services-Popular movies will be shown on most Sunday evenings for the rest of the term, usually double features.


For ballads, beat, rhythm and pop - to go along with their frenetic dancing ability and just per dash of light h nor - there probably is no other you ult cafe act ar which grew out of the hot rock era of the late 1950's, to match Anthony and The Imperials, Successful since 1958 when as Little Anthony and The Imperials they rushed the record heights with their initial million-selling disc, "Tears On My Pillow", Anthony Gourdine, Ernest Wright, Clarence Collins and Samuel Strain, intelligently realizing the overall importance of presentation and performance, finally decided that they were in show business — for good. To that end, in 1966 they dropped the adjective "Little" from their billing to project to all their new image of an adult cafe act and continued the pursuit of right material and staging for their nightclub, college and one-nighter appearances.

All Brooklyn, New York-born, the quartet hasn't always been this strongly in accord. Follow ing their initial disc smashes they parted for two years in order to find the proper grooves Anthony doing a single and the others continuing as The Imperials. But it was only upon regroupin did they actually find that "proper groove". It is this groove which is propelling them to cafe stardom and achieving for them the accolades of adult audiences as well as satisfying their

The group has made many outstanding TV and club appearances including spots on the Ed Sullivan Show, Today Show, Shindig, Murray the K Special, Mike Douglas Show, "What's Happen-ing, Baby?" and Hallaballoo and engagements at the Top Hat in Windsor, Canada and the Hollywood Beach Hotel in Hollywood, Fla. February of 1967 found them at the Holiday House in Pittsburgh

followed by a March engagement at the Flamingo Hotel in Las Vegas, They have also been a smash hit at most of the major colleges and universities across the country. Their recent outstanding record hits include the current "It's Not The Same," and such previous singles as "Better Use Your Head," "Hurt", "Going Out Of My Head," "I Miss You so," "Hurt So Bad," "I'm On The Outside Looking In" and "Take Me Back". They record for United Artists Records.


There will be a well stocked bar for the thirsty throats and platters of sandwiches for the starving stomachs.
