Present Warehouses of John Macdonald & Co

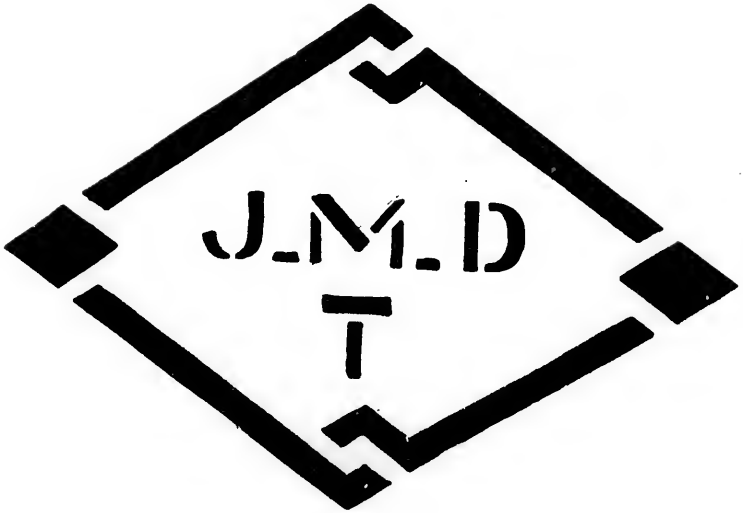

It is not our intention to do so by the blast of trumpets, neither have we any slaves to set free, nor alienated lands to revert to their former owners, but only to present you with a Souvenir of an epitomized compendium of our inception, progress and success, with illustrations; added to this the photographs of a few of our true and tried employees, men who are held in high esteem by us, and we hope by every one with whom they do business, also items of interest with our spring Catalogue for 1899—all of which we hope you will kindly accept.

WHAT WE WERE AND WHAT WE ARE.

It is a remarkable fact that the foundations of the greatest dynasties of the world, and discoveries in art, science and religion were laid in small beginnings

On September 27th, 1849, John Macdonald & Co. opened their store door to the public for a share of their patronage. The store at that time was designated the large 103, it was situated on Yonge Street, west side, second door south of Richmond Street.

The late Honorable Senator John Macdonald was sole owner—his stock was staple and fancy dry goods, which amounted to about two thousand dollars. His assistants were a young man of considerable experience, and a youth between thirteen and fourteen years of age. The first year business was retailing, and so successful, that the following year wholesaling was entered into to some extent. This venture also proving profitable, the firm decided on going into wholesaling exclusively, which we did in the year 1853, by moving from the large 103, Yonge Street to Wellington Street, opposite the site upon which our present warehouses are situated, and as business was still increasing, more space and better accommodation was demanded, so, in the year 1862 the premises which with enlargements and improvements are still occupied, were built, and are among the most handsome, convenient and commodious in Canada. The warehouses extend right through a block from street to street, having their main entrance on Wellington Street, and the shipping and receiving entrances on Front Street. They are six stories high and the floors on

each story are parallel throughout the warehouses. The semi-basement or ground floor is occupied by our Letter Order, Entering and Shipping Departments. The first floor, by the Linen and Staple Department and General Offices. The second floor, by the Woollens and Tailors' Trimmings Department and Mr. Macdonald's private office. The third floor, by the Silks, Dress Goods, Muslins, Laces, Hosiery and Glove Department. The fourth by the Men's Furnishings, Haberdashery and Fancy Goods Department. The fifth by the Carpet and Housefurnishings Department.

The operations on each floor are so systematized that the goods shown thereon are as much a specialty with us as if situated in different parts of the city, each having a buyer and an assistant buyer, who are thorough experts in the requirements of the trade and the markets of the world, in their respective departments.

On the 4th of February, 1890, the founder of our firm passed from this world of time and sense to the great future of eternal reality; having an earnest desire that the business he had built, to such proportions, on the solid foundation of integrity, should increase and be continued in the firm name of John Macdonald & Co

Three years and four months before the late Mr Macdonald's death he admitted his eldest son, Mr. John Macdonald, the present head of the firm into partnership, and immediately upon the death of his father, his brother, Mr. James Fraser Macdonald, was admitted a partner, it being the expressed wish of the late Senator. On December 1st, 1895, we admitted our brothers, Mr. Duncan

M. Macdonald and Mr. Arthur N. Macdonald, the firm name still remaining John Macdonald & Co.

That memorable year 1890, the first year of the firm under its new head, made us feel keenly the tremendous responsibility of our position. We at once decided to pursue business success along the lines which had already been marked out so plainly for us, Integrity and Honor. This year of 1890, although commencing in gloom, ended in the brightness of successful business. The years 1891, 1892 and 1893 were also successful, but 1894, 1895 and 1896 were very discouraging. Capital, ability in financing, fidelity of our employees and the confidence of our customers, enabled us to weather the storm of business depression that covered, we may say, the whole world during those years, and left much wreck and ruin in its track. With the dawn of 1897 the clouds of commercial gloom gradually disappeared, and as the year advanced the sunshine of prosperity commenced to spread its rays over the business horizon. Farmers, who are the bone and sinew of our country, harvested bountiful crops, and reaped satisfactory returns for their labour. Capitalists invested their money more freely. Mechanics and labourers procured employment with greater ease, hence a greater circulation of money in the business world. The results from this year's business were more encouraging than for many years. We are glad that the year 1898 has brought us a greater increase in business than we expected. In this our Jubilee Year 1899, we are looking forward with still greater hope, expecting, to exceed considerably the volume of business ever done during a single year in the history of our firm.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES.

Without egotism, but with a desire to satisfy those of our customers who would like to know more of the personnel of our firm, we mention a few biographical notes :

Mr. John Macdonald (bachelor) born at Oaklands, November 4th, 1863. Educated at Upper Canada College, he entered the warehouse (of which he is now the head) August 11th, 1880. Received into partnership June 1st, 1887. In politics, a Liberal, and in religion, a Methodist.

Mr. James Fraser Macdonald (married) born at Oaklands, November 2nd, 1865. Educated at Upper Canada College, he entered the warehouses (of which he is now a senior partner) February 5th, 1890. In politics, Independent, and in religion, a Presbyterian.

Mr. Duncan Macgregor Macdonald (bachelor) born June 6th, 1873. Educated at Upper Canada College, he entered the warehouses (of which he is now a partner) October 5th, 1891 ; was received into partnership December 1st, 1895. In politics, Independent, and in religion, a Methodist.

Mr. Arthur Nimmo Macdonald (bachelor) born at Oaklands, October 6th, 1874. Received a partnership in the firm December 1st, 1895, but is not an active member.

LAWS OF BUSINESS.

1. Negotiable paper. It consists of written requests or promises to pay certain sums of money at a specified time to some certain person or bearer. They are negotiable when made payable to the bearer, to a certain person or bearer, to a certain person or order.

2. Paper payable to a bearer is negotiable by delivery, but paper payable to a person or order is negotiable by indorsement and delivery.

3. Classes of negotiable paper:--

- i. Promissory notes.
- ii. Bills of exchange (drafts and cheques).
- iii. Bank notes.
- iv. Deposit receipts.
- v. Coupon bonds.
- vi. Letters of credit.
- vii. Warehouse receipts.
- viii. Bills of lading.

4. Parties liable on negotiable paper.

(a) Principal debtor, or one who is primarily liable.

(b) Surety, or the one who agrees to pay, if the principal debtor fails to pay. As the indorser of the note.

5. Maturity. Paper is due on the last day of grace, or if that be a holiday, on the next business day following.

6. Title. The holder has an absolute title to the paper if he receives it for value before it was due, and believing the title to be good; but if he received after it is due his title is subject to any counter claim by the maker; if he received it knowing the title to be bad, his own title is accordingly bad.

7. A promissory note is an unconditional written promise by a person, to pay a certain sum of money at a specified time to a certain person or bearer.

8. Requisites of a promissory note:--

- i. There must be an absolute promise.
- ii. The promise must be unconditional.
- iii. It must be in writing.
- iv. It must be payable in money.

v. The time of payment must be stated definitely, or so stated that it may be easily calculated.

vi. There must be a certain sum either named definitely or easily computed.

vii. It must be payable to some person, either a person named or a person that bears it.

viii. Maker. The person who signs the note is called the maker. He is the principal debtor. He may or may not write the note so long as he signs it with pen or pencil.

ix. Payee. He is the person in whose favor a note is made, or to whom it has been made payable afterwards by indorsement or delivery.

x. Innocent holder, bona fide holder, or holder in due course. He is one, not the original payee, who has bought the note before it became due, and given value for it not knowing of any defect or fraud in it.

xi. Joint note. This is one in which two or more parties promise to pay jointly a sum of money.

xii. Joint and several. This is one in which the makers promise to pay the amount jointly, and each severally promises to pay the amount himself if necessary.

xiii. Interest bearing notes. No interest can be collected on a note before maturity, unless mentioned in the note. After maturity 6 per cent. per annum can be collected until paid.

A note may be drawn:--

- (a) Bearing a certain rate of interest.
- (b) Bearing a certain rate of interest till paid.
- (c) Bearing different rates of interest before and after maturity.

(d) No rate of interest being mentioned until maturity, and bearing a higher rate than 6 per cent. after maturity.

xiv. Legal interest. Any rate of interest that has been mutually agreed upon can be collected. Six per cent. can be collected on all overdue debts, whether it has been agreed upon or not.

xv. The rate of interest depends upon:

1. The value of the use of money.

4l. The value of the risk of losing it.

xvi. Accommodation note. It is one in which one person lends his name to another person to enable the second party to borrow money on the surety of the first party. The form of the note is the same as that of an ordinary one.

9. Provisions of a lien note.

I. That note, receipt, or agreement in writing will hold the property in case of manufactured goods and chattels even if sold or mortgaged by the purchaser to other parties, if the name and address of the seller is painted, printed, engraved or attached to the article.

II. That the purchaser is entitled to full information as to his claims within 5 days of his asking for it.

III. That goods re-taken by the seller may be redeemed by the purchaser paying arrears, interest, and cost within 20 days from the time possession was re-taken.

IV. That if goods worth \$30 or more are re-taken, 5 days' notice may be given the purchaser before they are sold.

V. That this act will not apply to ordinary household furniture. It will apply to organs, pianos, sewing machines, implements, etc., and that a copy of the lien may be filed with the clerk of the County Court.

VI. That the seller must leave a copy of the lien with the purchaser of the article within 20 days.

10. Negotiation consists in transferring commercial paper from one party to another so as to make the receiver the legal holder. A bill payable to bearer is negotiable by simple delivery. A bill payable to order is negotiable by indorsement of the holder, and is completed by delivery.

11. Requisites of indorsement.

1. It must be made on the bill and signed by the indorser.

ii. It must be indorsement of the entire bill.

iii. If payable to two or more persons all must indorse it unless one has authority for all.

iv. It is usually written on the back of the instrument.

ITEMS OF INTEREST.

Valuable Suggestions to Clerks and Workingmen.

Never consider time wasted that is spent in learning rudiments. In acquiring a knowledge of any art or handicraft the greatest difficulty is experienced at the beginning, because our work then possesses little or nothing of interest. Our first lessons in drawing, music, or with tools are very simple; indeed, so simple are they that we are disposed to undervalue their importance. The temptation is to slip a few pages and begin further on in the book, but such a course is fatal to success. To learn principles thoroughly is to succeed. Be content to learn one thing at a time, whether it be to push a plane square and true, or draw a straight line. Whatever you learn, learn it absolutely without possible question. This will enable you to advance steadily, step by step, year after year, and some day you will wonder why you have been enabled to distance the geniuses who once seemed so far in advance of you.

Set your heart upon what you have in hand. Valuable knowledge is acquired only by intense devotion. You must give your entire mind to whatever you undertake. Otherwise you fail or succeed indifferently, which is little better than failure. Learn, therefore, to estimate properly the value of what is called leisure time. There is entirely too much of this in the world. Do not mistake our meaning. Rest is necessary and play is well in its place, but young

men who hope to do something in life, must not expect to play one-third of their time.

While you resolve to acquire a thorough knowledge of your art, be as anxious to know something beyond it. A craftsman ought to be ashamed of himself who knows nothing but the use of his tools. Having the time to acquire it, be careful to properly estimate the value of knowledge. Remember of what use it will be to you in ten thousand instances as you go along in life, and be as conscientious in learning rudiments here as elsewhere. Learn to spell correctly, to write a good, plain hand and to punctuate your sentences.

Do not dress beyond your means; never spend your last dollar, unless for food to keep yourself or someone else from starving. You will always feel better to keep a little money in your pocket. At the earliest possible opportunity save up a few dollars and place the amount in a savings bank. It will serve as a magnet to attract other money that might be foolishly spent.

SAVE A LITTLE.

Every man who is obliged to work for his living should make a point to lay up a little money for that "rainy day" which we are all liable to encounter when least expected. The best way to do this is to open an account with a savings bank. Accumulated money is always safe; it is always ready to use when needed. Scrape together five dollars, make your deposit, receive your bank book, and then resolve to

deposit a given sum, small though it be, once a month or once a week, according to circumstances.

Nobody knows without trying it how easy a thing it is to save money when an account with a bank has been opened. With such an account a man feels a desire to enlarge his deposit. It gives him lessons in frugality and economy, weans him from habits of extravagance, and is the very best guard in the world against intemperance, dissipation and vice.

SILK STOCKINGS.

Silk stockings were first worn by Henry II. of France, 1547. Howell says: In 1560 Queen Elizabeth was presented with a pair of black knit silk stockings, by her silk woman, Mrs. Montague, and she never wore cloth ones any more. He adds that Henry VIII., that magnificent and experienced Prince, wore ordinary cloth hose, except there came from Spain by great chance, a pair of silk stockings; for Spain very early abounded in silk. His son, Edward VI., was presented with a pair of Spanish silk stockings by his merchant, Sir Thomas Graham, and the present was then much taken notice of. Consequently the invention of knit silk stockings came from Spain. Others relate that William Rider, a London apprentice, seeing at the house of an Italian merchant a pair of knit worsted stockings from Mantra, from thence ingeniously made a pair like them, which he presented to the Earl of Pembroke, and were the first of the kind made in England, 1564. The weaving of them was invented in 1589.

FIRST CLASS MATTER LETTERS.

Register all valuable letters.

Address all complaints and inquiries respecting late or incorrect delivery to the postmaster. With a view to facilitate investigation, always transmit the envelop of a letter which is the subject matter of enquiry.

Letters for the United States should bear the name of the State as well as that of the postoffice.

Letters containing gold or silver money, jewels or anything liable to customs duties cannot be forwarded by post beyond the Dominion, except to the United States.

Letters addressed to mere initials, or fictitious names, will not be delivered unless addressed in care of a resident or to some box in the postoffice.

Letters addressed simply to a street number or to a room number in a specified building, without the name of a person, firm, etc., may be delivered, provided there is only one household or firm in occupation of the premises indicated; otherwise, letters so addressed will be sent to the dead letter office as insufficiently addressed.

POSTAGE.

Letters addressed to places in Canada and United States, 2 cents per ounce or fraction thereof.

Great Britain and the following British colonies: Aden, Ascension Island, Bahama Islands, Barbados, Bermuda, British Central Africa, British East Africa, British Guiana, British Honduras, British India, Ceylon, Cyprus, Falkland Islands, Fiji, Gambia, Gibraltar, Gold Coast Colony, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Johore, Lagos, Leeward Islands, Malay States, Natal, Newfoundland, Niger Coast Protectorate, Niger Company's Territories, Sarawak, Seychelles, Sierra Leone, Straits Settlements, St. Helena, Tobago, Trinidad, Turk's Island, Uganda, Windward Islands, 2 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. or fraction thereof.

On "drop" letters whether posted in the city or at a suburban office, addressed to any point within letter carriers' delivery (including Yorkville, Riverside, Brockton and Parkdale) the rate is 2c per ounce.

The postage on letters for suburban offices is 1c per oz; from suburban offices to the city, 2c per oz. Suburban offices are all those contiguous to the limits of Toronto, viz.: Swansea, Toronto Junction, Carlton West, Dayenport, Doyereourt, Bracendale, Deer Park, Leaside Junction, Todmorden, Denegaster, Norway and East Toronto.

Drop letters posted at any suburban office for delivery therefrom, 1c per oz.

Letters posted at one suburban office for another suburban office are not considered drop letters; the postage on such letters is 3 cents per oz.

Letters addressed to places in Canada must be at least partially prepaid, and those addressed to the United States must be prepaid at least a full rate (2c). Otherwise they will be sent to the dead letter office.

Letters addressed to places in Canada and partly prepaid will be forwarded, subject on delivery to double the amount of unpaid postage.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

Re-directed letters are not liable to any additional postage if handed back to the post office with a changed address at the moment of delivery or as soon as possible thereafter, provided always the change in the address does not require the letter to be sent to any place to which the postage rate is higher than was at first payable. Thus, a drop-letter re-directed to a place outside the city or town becomes liable to a higher rate, and the difference, if not prepaid, will be collected on delivery.

Re-directed letters should not be dropped into a post office box or receiver unless additional postage has been put on to carry them to their second destination.

REQUEST LETTERS.

Letters from places in Canada, Newfoundland and the United States covered by envelopes bearing a request either printed or written that the letters be returned to the sender if not delivered within a certain specified time, will be returned as requested if not delivered in the time stated.

EXPRESS LETTERS AND PARCELS.

There is immediate delivery of "express" letters and parcels, so marked, addressed to the United Kingdom. Fee payable there, on letters is 1c a mile from addressee's postoffice. Fee payable on parcels, 10c, can be prepaid here.

POST CARDS.

For Canada and the United States, one cent each. For Great Britain, Newfoundland and all postal union countries, two cents each. Reply cards for Canada and United States, two cents each. Nothing must be attached to a postcard.

Private post cards, duly prepaid, one cent each, by postage stamp, may be posted in Canada for delivery within Canada and the United States.

Private post cards may have a reply card attached, bearing one cent stamp.

Private post cards may, if prepaid 2 cents,

be posted in Canada, addressed to any of the following countries: Austria, Hungary, Belgium, France, Great Britain, Italy, Newfoundland, New South Wales, Germany, and German possessions and Switzerland.

SECOND-CLASS MATTER.

Newspapers and periodicals posted from the office of publication are authorized to pass at the bulk rate of a penny or a cent per lb. to regular subscribers in Canada, the United States and Newfoundland.

An exception is made in favor of newspapers and periodicals published not more frequently than once per week, and addressed (for regular subscribers), to post offices situated within a circular area of 40 miles in diameter, the centre of which must either be the place of publication or some point not more than 20 miles distant therefrom. Such papers will continue to enjoy exemption from postage as heretofore.

The postage on newspapers and periodicals issued less frequently than once a month, and addressed to regular subscribers or news agents, and on all specimen newspapers, is 1c per lb., or fraction of a lb.

British periodical publications, and other foreign publications, can be re-mailed by newsdealers to subscribers in Canada and the United States, at the bulk rate of 1c per lb.

THIRD CLASS MATTER. NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Transient newspapers for any place in Canada or United States, 1c per 4 oz.; but a paper not more than 1 oz. will go for $\frac{1}{2}$ c. Local newspapers and periodicals not weighing more than 1 oz., for delivery in city 1c each.

BOOKS, ETC., AND MISCELLANEOUS MATTER.

The postage on books, pamphlets, occasional publications, etc., addressed to Canada, is 1 cent per 4 oz. to the United States, Newfoundland, Great Britain and all other countries, 1 cent per 2 oz. The postage on printed stationery, printers' proof sheets, maps, prints, drawings, engravings, lithographs, photographs, sheet music (whether printed or written, including music books, whether stitched or bound), etc., addressed to Canada, the United States, Newfoundland, Great Britain, or any European country is 1 cent per 2 oz. Manuscript to foreign countries with the exception of the United States, must be prepaid as commercial papers. No package must exceed 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. The limit of weight for

Canada, United States and United Kingdom, is 5 lbs.; for other postal union countries, 4 lbs. Limit of weight for a single book addressed to places in Canada is 7 lbs.

CIRCULARS.

are communications in print, or produced by a multiplying process easily distinguished from typewriting, which are posted to several individuals, and couched in identical terms. A circular may, without becoming liable to a higher rate of postage, be signed and dated in handwriting, and may also in the body of it contain the name of the addressee in writing.

The postage on circulars, wholly in print is 1 cent per 4 oz.; and on circulars produced by a multiplying process, 1 cent per 2 ozs.

The postage on circulars produced in imitation of typewriting is 1c per 2 ozs., when at least 30 copies in precisely identical terms are handed in to the post office at one time.

Circulars typewritten are liable to letter rate.

Seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots and scions or grafts can only be sent to the United States as 5th class matter: when posted for delivery in Canada, the postage is 1 cent per 4 oz., and the limit of weight 5 lbs.

Legal documents and commercial papers (including bank pass books), may be sent to Great Britain, Newfoundland, United States and all foreign countries at 5 cents for the first ten ounces, and 1 cent for every additional 2 ounces. Must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. These papers, when posted for delivery in Canada, must be prepaid at letter or parcel post rates—but deeds, mortgages, wills and insurance policies may be sent, if prepaid 1c per 2 ozs.

Commercial papers, samples and printed matter addressed to any other country of the universal postal union, may be enclosed in one package up to the aggregate weight of four pounds six ounces, provided that the weight of each class of matter does not exceed that which might be allowed if it were despatched separately. It is further provided that if a packet contains commercial papers there must be a minimum prepayment of five cents, and if it contains samples, without commercial papers, of two cents.

PATTERNS AND SAMPLES.

Bona fide patterns and samples of merchandise, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, may be sent to any place in Canada, at 1c per 4 ozs. Must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in exe-

cution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, not being actually trade patterns or samples, are not admissible.

Packages of tea, etc., posted as samples must not exceed $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. in weight.

The limit of weight to United Kingdom is 5 lbs.; limit of size 2 ft. in length by 1 ft. in width or depth.

The limit of weight to Belgium, Egypt, France, Hawaii, Roumania, Austria, Italy, Switzerland and Portugal, is 12 ozs.; limit of size, 1 foot in length by 8 in. in width and 4 in. in depth. If in form of a roll it may be 12 in. in length and 6 in. in diameter.

The limit of weight to other postal union countries, including the United States, is 8 ozs.; limits of size same as for Belgium, Egypt, etc.

The postage on sample packets to postal union countries is 2c for the first 4 ozs., and 1c for each additional 2 ozs.

FOURTH-CLASS MATTER. CLOSED PARCELS.

Parcels for Canada must be prepaid 6 cents for 4 ozs., and must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight, nor 2 feet in length, by 1 foot in width or depth. No correspondence must be enclosed.

Invoices, accounts, or receipts may be enclosed in parcels.

FIFTH-CLASS MATTER.

comprises such articles of general merchandise as are not entitled to any lower rate of postage. Postage 1 cent per oz., or fraction of an ounce. Limit of weight 5 lbs.; of size two feet in length by one foot in width or depth. Matter claiming to be 5th class must be open to inspection, and there must be no correspondence enclosed (except invoices and accounts). Packages of fifth class matter may be sent to the United States for the same prepayment as is required within the Dominion, but the contents will be liable to customs inspection and collection of duty in the United States. Sealed tins containing fish, lobster, vegetables, meats, etc., if put up in a solid manner and labelled in such a way as to fully indicate the nature of their contents, may be sent as 5th class matter within the Dominion, but no sealed matter can be forwarded to the United States under this head. Liquids, oils and fatty substances may be sent to places in Canada and the United States as 5th class, if securely put up.

PARCEL POST.

WITH THE UNITED KINGDOM, NEW-FOUNDLAND, JAPAN, RUSSIA, HONG KONG, JAMAICA, BARBADOES, LEeward ISLANDS, NEW SOUTH WALES AND CERTAIN OTHER COUNTRIES.

Closed parcels may be sent to places in Newfoundland, Jamaica, the United Kingdom, Japan, European Russia, Hong Kong, Barbadoes, Leeward Islands, New South Wales and all other countries and colonies with which the United Kingdom maintains a parcel post. No correspondence must be enclosed. A customs declaration of the contents and value of each parcel must be filled up at the post office or one of the branches by the sender.

Parcels for Newfoundland must be prepaid 15 cents per lb. or fraction of a lb., and must not exceed 7 lbs. in weight, nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth.

Parcels for Jamaica, Barbadoes, St. Lucia, British Guiana, Turks' Islands and Catoes Islands must be prepaid 20c per lb. or fraction of a lb., and must not exceed 7 lbs. in weight nor 2 ft. in length by 1 ft. in width or depth.

Parcels for the United Kingdom must be prepaid 16c for the first lb., and 12c for each additional lb. or fraction of a lb., and must not exceed 11 lbs. in weight, and 2 ft. in length by 1 foot in width and depth.

Parcels for Japan must be prepaid 20c per lb. or fraction of a lb., and must not exceed 7 lbs. in weight nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth.

Parcels for New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia and New Zealand must be prepaid 24c per lb., and must not exceed 11 lbs. in weight nor 2 ft. in length by 1 ft. in width or depth.

Parcels for Hong Kong and dependencies must be prepaid 16 cents for the first lb. and 12 cents for each additional lb. or fraction of a lb., and must not exceed 11 lbs. in weight nor 2 ft. in length by 1 foot in width or depth.

Information as to other countries to which parcels may be sent, and the rates applicable to each, may be obtained on application at the enquiry window, general post office, or at any of the branch offices.

REGISTRATION.

Every article intended for registration must be handed in at the window and a receipt obtained therefor.

The fee on all classes of articles addressed to countries to which matter may be registered is 5 cents.

The sender of a registered article addressed to any postal union country may entitle himself to a certificate as to the disposal of the said article by the postmaster at the office addressed, on prepayment of an additional fee of 5 cents. All classes of matter may be registered to all destinations in Canada and throughout the postal union; and letters may be registered to most of the countries not included in the union.

The public are reminded that registered letters are only carried on trains that are accompanied by railway mail clerk. Hence a registered letter and an ordinary letter posted simultaneously will often be received at different times.

POSTOFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

are established at the general office and most of the branches. Any sum over \$1 can be deposited. Interest 3 per cent.

MONEY ORDER OFFICE.

In sending money by mail it is best to transmit by money order when possible. Money letters should always be registered. Money orders issued and paid from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

COMMISSION ON MONEY ORDERS.

On money orders drawn by any money order office in Canada on any other money order office in the Dominion is as follows: If not exceeding \$2.50, 3c.

- Over \$2.50 and up to \$5, 4c.
- Over \$5 and up to \$10, 6c.
- Over \$10 and up to \$20, 10c.
- Over \$20 and up to \$30, 12c.
- Over \$30 and up to \$40, 15c.
- Over \$40 and up to \$50, 20c.

- Over \$50 and up to \$60, 24c.
- Over \$60 and up to \$70, 28c.
- Over \$70 and up to \$80, 32c.
- Over \$80 and up to \$90, 36c.
- Over \$90 and up to \$100, 40c.

No single money order, payable in the Dominion of Canada, can be issued for more than \$100; but as many of \$100 each may be given as the remitter requires. Limit on American orders, \$50; on English and foreign orders, \$50.

The rates of commission on British and foreign orders are as follows:

- If not exceeding \$10, 10c.
- Over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 20c.
- Over \$20 and not exceeding \$30, 30c.
- Over \$30 and not exceeding \$40, 40c.
- Over \$40 and not exceeding \$50, 50c.

For the easy transmission of small sums of money by mail, postal notes are issued for sixteen different amounts ranging from \$5 to 20 cents, on which commission from 3 cents to 1 cent is chargeable.

N.B.—Residents of Toronto are requested to bear in mind that money orders can be made payable to them at any of the branch offices, and it would be well to notify correspondents and to print on stationery the name of nearest office to your store or residence, where orders can be made payable.

POST BANDS AND STAMPED ENVELOPES.

One cent post bands for newspapers or book packet wrappers, and 1 and 3 cent stamped envelopes are issued by the department, and may be had at the stamp vendor's counter; also three cent perforated letter cards.

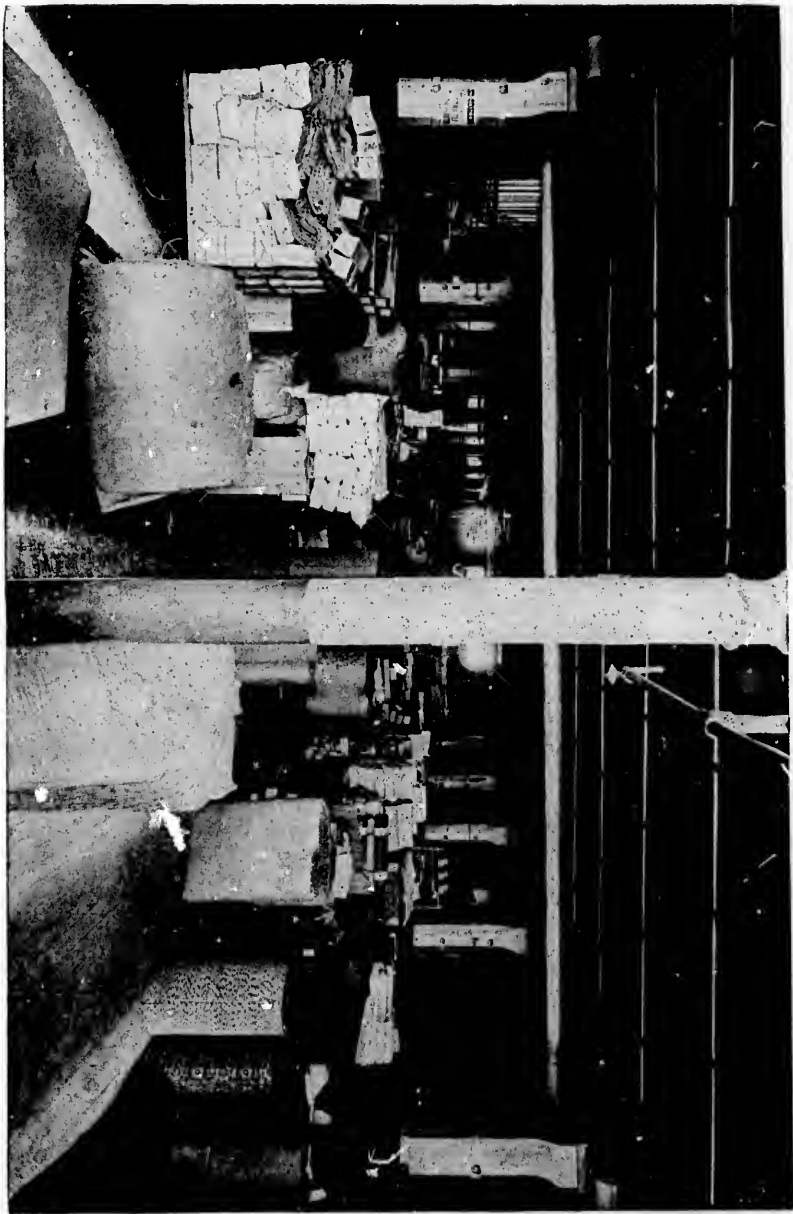
