## medical education and medical colleges in THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA: 176 G - 1889.

In an address delivered, as Chairman of the Section of State Medicine, at the session of the Amsrican Medical Association in $1886,{ }^{*}$ certain considerations, therein set forth, led to the following conclusions:

1. That the best interests of the pubiic welfare demand the h'ghest attainabie standard of edueational qualifications, sklli and ability, as woll as of professional and personal honor, integrity and morality, among those engaged in the practice of medieine.
2. That it is the duty of the State to exereise the inherent plenary power nud authority which it possesses for the protection and promotion of the publie welfare, to secure sueh standard.
3. That uniform State laws, exacting $c$ every one aspiring to practice medicine, proof of personai fltness and professional eompetency. would prove tie most potent agency in improving the standard of medical education and in enhaneing the dignity and usefulness of the medical profession.
In order to give practical effect to the foregoing conclusions, it was specifically suggested-

That the Ameriean Medicai Association should put itself upon record at this session as recommending the extension of the period of study to four years, and of attendance upon lectures to three full terms, with ample hospital practice and clinical instruction, as the requircments for graduation in medicine.

That the Section of State Medlcine be instrueted to frame a law for the regulation of the practice of medicine, which law, when endorsed by the Assoeiation, shall bo the standard with which ali existing legistation on the subjeet should be made to conform as speedily as practicable, and whieh shall be urged for adoption by those States where no sueh law now exists.
Two sessions of the Association have been held since these suggestions were made, and at the last one, in Cincinnati, May 8, 1888, the President of that body-the late Dr. A. Y. P. Garnett, of Washington,-devoted the larger share of his address to a discussion of the same general theme, and to emphasizing the mission and the duty of the Association in working out "a radical and thorough reform in the present medical education of the United•States." The marked prominence given to this theme in such an address was a timely and appropriate recognition of the general interest now felt in a subject to which the Lldinois State Board of Health is enjoined to devote its

[^0]efforts by the terms of its organic law-a law which was "designed to require a reasomable amomt of education to fit one for the practice of medicine before he should be allowed to enter that profession so intimately concerned with the lives, the health, and the happiness of the people."
In this, the twelfth year of its existence, the Board is fairly realizing that its labors have not been withont result. The changes, especially within the last few vears, in the scope and methods of medical instruction, and the standard of attainments, have been marked and beneficial; and the work of the Boand during the past decade has attracted an amount of attention and awakened an interest which is now to be seen, not only in the pages of medical periodicals and tine expressed sentiment of members of the protession, but in the columns of the sermlar press, and the utterances of thoughtful men of all classes of the community.
This interest is by no means confined to Anerica. High as is the standard of medical requirements in England and France, attempts are now being made to still further perfect the methods in those countries and to arrive at an understanding as to the hest course by which to prepare medical men for their duties. For this purpose commissioners are studying the systems of medical edncation, and medical teachers have been sent from France to other countries of Europe to study their systems and methods.

As to $\mathrm{m}^{-d i c a l}$ education in this comntry, the genera' drift of opinion to-day is decidedly in favor of "the extension of the period of study to four years, and of attendance upon lectures to three full terins, with ample hospital practice and clinical instruction," as rerommended in the address cited, and subsequently endorsed in the address of the President of the American Medical Association. Nor is this movement monopolized by any one school of practice. It the last annual meeting of the National Institnte of Homeopathy, Dr. T. G. Comstock, chairman of the Committee on Medical Edncation, and Dr. I. T. Talbot, chairman of the Inter-Collegiate Committee, strongly advocated four years of study and three terms of lectures; and resolutions were finally adopted unamimonsly in favor of three courses of lectures after the sessions of 1890 . Similar resolutions were also adopted by the National Eclectic Medical Association, at its last ammal meeting. The Minnesota law, which went into effect July 1, 1887, has also exercised a good influence in promoting the canse of higher medical education.

Comparison of this-the Fifth Report of the Lldinols State Boamd of Healith on Medical Education-with the Reports of 1885 and 1886, will show a marked and most gratifying progress in the direetion of a higher standard of instruction and of qualifications for the practice of medicine in this country. Many of the bars to the attainment of this result have been removed, others show signs of yielding, and the prospect of the
medical profession, and the public, in this respect is now a subject for congratulation. It is not alone in the pages which follow that this is shown, althongh the facts and figures are herein fully and authoritatively set forth.

In $n$ country having the form of government of the Gnited States, higher medical education has been necessarily a product of slow growth, and it was not mutil some of the methods and State regmlations of the practice of medicine had been tried, that the wisest and most practicable course conld be determined by which to secure results at all commens te with the necessity.
The effects of some of the State laws reg ing the practice of medicine, have now shown two things: - That there was and still is a necessity for such legislation. 2 . 'lant under this legislation the colleges that have failed to comply with the demand for better work, must improve their methods or shortly close their doors.
A study of this report will show that while there is an increased number of medical institutions that have recognizer their duties in this regard, there are still some which seem wedded to as low a standard as is at all compatible with even scant recognition by the medical profession. On the other hand, the improvements in the methods of instruction and in the practical facilities for study, not less thm in the exaction of a preliminary test of fitness for the study of medicine-have been more marked during the period which has elapsed since the publication of the last report of the Boaid on this subject thom during any similar period in the history of the eomitry.
Summarizing and comparing the tables which follow, it will be seen that-
There are 267 medical institutions embraced in this report, as against 252 in the report for $1886-2.51$ being in the United States. In the report for 1886 , the total nimber of colleges in existence was 129-117 being in the United States. The total number now in existence is 131; in the United States 118. In 1886 the number of extinct institutions in the United States was 120; the number now known to be extinct is 130 , including two that have been extinct for many years, but information concerning which has only recently been received.
In 1886 the number of colleges exacting certain edncational requirements for matriculation was 114 ; in 1888-89 it is 117 , against 45 in 1880. In 1880 the number of colleges requiring attendance on three or more courses of lectures was 22 ; in 1886; 41; and 47 in 1888-89. In 1880, 53 colleges recommended and provided for, but did not exact attendance on threr fr more courses; 48 in 1886, and 40 in 1888-89. In 1 , but 42 colleges had chairs of hygiene, and 61 had chairs o. medical jurisprudence; in 1886, 110 had chairs of hygiene, and the same number had chairs of medical jurisprudence: in 1888-89, 117 teach hygiene, and 112 teach medical jurisprudence.

There are now in the United States 12 licensing and examining bodies that do not give instruction. Since the report of 1886, the number of colleges for women only has been increased by one, and the number of colleges for both sexes has decreased by three.
The smmury of matriculates and graduates shows that there has been a gradual incrense in the number of matrimulates since 1884-85, both in the United States and Canadn, while the number of graduates in the United States has been abont the same. Thus the percentage of groduates to matriculates has ateadily diminished in the United States, from an aggregate average of 36.3 in 1881-82, to 30.3 per cent. in 1887-88. The percentage of graduates to matriculates in the different schools in 1887-88 was as follows:
Physiciar,* 29.6; homeopathic, 35.3; eelectic, 32.9; physiomedical, 36.5; miscellaneous, 45.4. Examination of the percentuge of matriculates to graduates in the individual schools in this country shows that the variation is very great, being for $1887-88$ from 6.6 to 52.1 per cent. The largest percentage of graduates of all schools by States is 45.4 for Indiana, the smallest $8+$ for North Carolina. Examination of the data in the following pages will show that the percentage of graduates to matriculates is kept at a high point largely by the colieges in Atlanta, Baltimore, Louisville, Nashville and St. Louis, and those in Indiana.

The average duration of lecture terms has increased since the report of 1886 . The average for all the physician schools-sessions of $1888-89$-is now 25.3 weeks, against $25+$ in 1886-87, and 25. 1 in 1887-88. For the 14 homeopathic sehools it is 26.2 weeks, against 26.3 in 1886-87. For the 10 eclectic schools the lecture-term is now 22.5 weeks, against 21.6 in 1886-87, and 22.3 i 1887-88. The lecture-term of the 3 physio-medical $\approx$.ools is now 23 weeks, having been 22 in 1886-87, and 23.3 in 1887-88. The average for the physician schools is cut down by the 17 weeks' term of the Medical College of Georgia, and the 19) weeks' course of the Woman's Medical College of Cincinnati. The number of schools having terms of five months and more is now 115, against 110 in 1886-87. The number having six months and more is now 66, against 63 in 1887-88, and 55 in 188(i-87.
Colleges, the titles of which are printed in italic in the following list, have provided for a three years' course and four years' study in the future; those printed in Roman have similarly provided for three courses of lectures.

A number of other colleges have also signified their intention of soon ronforming with the requirement of fomr years' study and three years' lecture comse; and it is probmble that it will be gemerally adopted.

## Schedule of Minimum Requibements.

'I. Condrtans of ammishion To ledture-courses.- 1 . Credible rertificate of good moral standing. 2. Diploma of gradnation from a good literary and scientific college, or ingh school-a first-grade teacher's certificate. Lacking this-a thorongh examination in the branches of a rood English eciucation, including mathematics, English composition, and elementary physies and matural philosophy.

Il. Branches of medical solence to be included in the course of mstruction.-1. Anatomy. 2. Physiology. 3. Chemistry. 4. Materia-Medien, and Therapentios. 5. Theory and Practice of Medicine. (6. Pathology, 7 . Surgery. 8. Obstetrics and Gynecology. 9. Hygiene. 10. Medical Dmisprudence.
III. Length of regular gradedating condsess.- 1 . The time ocenpied in the regular comses or sessions from which students are graduated shall not be less than five months, or twenty weeks, each. 2. Two full courses of lectures, not within one and the same year of time, shall be required for graduation with the degree of Doctor of Medicine.
IV. Attendance and examination on quizzes.- 1. Regular attendance during the entire lecture courses shall be requirod, allowance being made only for absences occasioned by the student's sickness, such absences not to exceed twenty per centum of the course. 2. Regular examinations or quizzes to be made by each lecturer or professor daily, or at least twice each week. 3. Final examinations on all branches to be conducted, when practicable, by competent examiners other than the professors in each branch.
V. Dissection, clinics and hospital attendance.-1. Each student shall have dissected during two courses. 2. Attendance during at least two terms of clinical and hospital instruction shall be required.
VI. Time of professional studies.-This shall not be less than three full years before graduation, including the time spent with a preceptor, and attendance upon lectures or at clinics and hospital.
VII. Instridetion.-The college must show that it has a sufficient and competent corps of instructors, and the, necessary facilities for teaching, dissections, clinics, etc.

Jiplomas of colleges whose educational requirements and methods of instruction fall short of the above Schedule are not recognized as entitling their possessors to certificates authorizing them to practice in the State of Illinois. (Thts does not apply to diplomas issued prior to the sessions of 1883-84, but only to those issued at the close of said sessions and subsequently.) The only way in which holders of such diplomas may legally enter upon practice in this State is by passing a satisfactory examination before the Board on the branches or subjects of the Schedule omitted.
This Schedule is, therefore, the test of the "good standing" of a medical college in Illinois. Only colleges which come up to this minimum standard are accounted as in "good standing." To determine the status of any given institution, it is only necessary to compare the summary of the institution set forth in the following pages with the above Schedule.
At the Aprii, 1886, meeting of the Boand, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The continuous graduation of forty-flve (45) per cent. of the total iumber of matriculates of a medical college-due allowance being made for the average annuai loss-must be accepted as prima facie evidence that, practically, every candidate is graduated without regard to competency or qualification; therefore, be it

Resolved. That no medical college be recognized as in good standing within the meaning and intent of the "Act to Regulate the Practice of Medicine in the State of Illinois," the aggregate graduates of which college amount to forty-five (45) per cent. of its aggregate matriculates during any period of five (5) years ending with a session subsequent to the session of 1885-86.

At the July, 1887, meeting of the Board, the following resolution was adopted:

## ALABAMA.

THE MEDICAL ASNOELATION OF THE STATE OF ALADAMA.
Jenome Cochran, M. D., Mobile, Sinior Censor:


#### Abstract

The Board of Censors of the Melical Association of the State of Alabama. and the Bonris of Consors of the severnl C'omint Mericul sometios in affliation with the Stat Medien Association, are, under the law, the anthorized Bonrls of Merlical Examiners The State Bourd is composed of ten members, eleced by the state Assoclation, and each County Board of tlve members. eleeted hy the County Soclety Diplomas of Medieal Colleges confer no right to practice medicine in Alabama. Nothing does exeept the eartitleate of one of che exmmining boards, based upon metina examination of the appli eants. The Coanty Boards exmmine none but the graduates of reputable medical Collepes, the diplomas serving slmply as a means for getting before the Boards. The Stat Board alone exmmines non-graduates. Tho rules for the government of the examininh bourds. including the standard of qualiflentions and the branches of mediecine to bo included in tho oxaminations. are all meseribed by the state Assoeiation. The examinations are both oral and written, bat the prineipal strests is placed on the written examination, whieh usually oceupies about one week. The unswers to the cuestions are valued accoriling to thoir completeness and acuracy, and an aggregate of $75 \%$ out of a possible $100 \%$ is necessary to pass the applicant. The examination papers are carefully written and bound. and are flled in the State Board of Health office. They are all cardfully reviewed by the state Board, which makes to the State Association a speeial report on the character of the examinntion of each separate applicant.

The Alabe na law to Regulate the Practice of Medicine was enacted in 187\%. It was applicable ons in counties having medieal societies holding charters from the State Association, and at the time of its enactment not more than one-half of the counties were thus organized. From year to year now societies havo been organized and at the present time ( 1888 ) there is a medical society and a board of examiners in every county in the State. This system seems to be very complex, but in practice is found to work well. A large number of incompetent and ignorant practitioners are still left in the State, becnuse the law was not made retrospective; all who wore actually engaged in

## San Francisco, Cal. Henry Gibbons, Jr., M. D., Dean, 920 Polk street.

Organized in 1859 as the Medical Department of the Unlversity of the Paeifle. Ceased to exist in 18if, but was revived in 1870 , nnter the snme name. In 1873 it became the Medical Department of the University : ollege of San Franciseo, and was given the specitle desiguntion of the Medieal College of the Pacitle. In 1882 the institution received its present name-The flrst class was graduated in 1860. No classes were graduated in the years 18(an- $\%$, inelusive. A class was graduat in 1870 and in eash suwiequent year.

The faculty embraces twelve chnirs, two adjuncts, a demonstrator of anatomy, and a demonst:ator of pathelogy.

Course of Instruction: Three annual suminer courses and one intermediate course are required to complete the curriculum. The regular courso begins June 1, and ends October 30; the intermediate eourse begins January 11, and ends May 4. During ihe irst yeur the student attends all didactic lectures, but gives speeial nttention to descriptive anatomy, physiology, chemistry, surgery, microscopy and practice of medieine

[^6]and is examined in these branches at the end of the term. In the second year, all lectures and clinles must be attended, and examhation in all hraucher are hold at the dose, thoso in deseriptive anatomy, physiology and chemistry helug flam. All leetures and elintes mast be attended during the third year, oxeept lectures on chemistry and physiology. if examination in these has been siceecssfully passed. sneeial attention mast be given to elinics. Final examimations, written and oral, in the third year.

The emriculum of stmdies remuired of a miversity, in order that its degrees may be meristered, is set forth In the following sertions of the Queber Medical Act, and are mplicable, with slight changes, to all the povinees:

It is ontiomul in Quehere with the provincial boand to aecopt or reject the derree of a university outside the province, and the test of an "xrmination is sometimes imposed mpon its holder.

In Ontario all. excent reqistored practitiomers of Grat Britain, must pass an examination in the requifed brunehes before registration. The remainder of the movinces necept recornized university deg!ees without examination.

Graduates of United States medient sehools, in order to repistar in a province of Cumada, mases hodding an athemical degree, must :) pass the matrieulation examination; 2) attend in Canalian selion one or more full winter ef ses, so as to complete the curriculam of the province; and 3) pase the professional es anintion.

Manitoba is an exception, the regulation thore boing as follows: "American students in medicine [meaning gradnates of medieal eolleges in the Uuited statrs] ohtain a license by passing a practicul examinition satisfatory to the boaril on the following subjects, viz: Anatoms, physiology, theory and pratice of medicine, surgery, midwifery and disenses of women and chifdren; chemistry: materin mediea and therapentics; medical jurisprudence and toxicology." For thim examimation, and subsequent registration, a fee of 8100 is charged.

## Students attending Cunadian colloges are subject to the following rules:

1. In the ease of disorderly conduct any student may, at tho diseretion of tho professor, ho required to leave the class-room. Persistence in any offense agitinst diseipline, after almonition by the professor, shall be reported to the dean of the faculty. The deminay, ut his discrefion, reprimand the stadent, or refer the matter to the faculty at its next meeting, and may in the inter al suspend from classes.

9 Absence from any number of lectures can only be excused by necessity or duty of which proof must be given, when called for, to the faculty. The number of times of absence, from necessity or duty, that shall disqualify for the kecping of a sesslon, shall in ench case be determined by the faenty.
3. While in the colloge students are oxpected to conduct themselves in the same orderly manner as in the class-rooms.
d. When students are brought before the faculty under the above rules, the faculty ay reprimand hmpose flues, distualify from eompethg for prizes and honors, suspend trom classes, or expel from the college.

All persons who have mule the practice of medicine and surgery their profession or usiness eontinuously for the perion of ten years, and ean furnish satisfactory evidenee ureof to the Board of Medieal Examiners, slabll receive a license to continue practice.
The meetings of the Board are hed quarterly, at the eity of Danver, the flast Tuesays in January, 2.e. il, July ind October.

The socond par, anatomy, dissections, physiology, pathology, materia medica and therapeutics, cory and practice of medicine, clinical medicine, obstetrics, surgery elinical surgery hird year, pathology, theory and practice of modicine, physical diagnosls, clinical edicine, surgery, clinical surgery, obstetrics, diseases of women and children, ophthalology, medical jurisprudence, insanity, nervous diseases, discascs of the skin, bacteriology, nitary science and public health, toxicology.
Requirements: For admission, candidates for admission to the course leadlng to co degree of Doctor of Medicine, must be at least eighteen years old, and must present atisfactory testimonlals of moral character from former instructors or physicians in ood standing. As evidence that he has had a suffeient preliminary education, each andidato must present proof that he has passed the matriculation examination of some cientific, literary, or professional college in good standing; or present testimonials fom the proper officer that he has pursued the course at some high school, academy. r preparntory school approved by the faculty; or he must nass an examination in the folpwing subjects: 1. Mathematics; algebra to quadraties; geometry, euclicl, two books or its quivulent: metric system of weights and measures. 2. Physics; Balfour Stewart's lementary Physics, or some equivalent work. These examinations are eonducted in riting. Grammar, spelling and construction are considered in judging of the papers. hese entrance examinutions are also held in Chicago, Cincinnati and San Francisco on he Thursday following the June commencoment. Students of any reeognized medical chool or of private preceptors of good standing, "may present themselves for examinaIon three weeks before commencement and enter the examinations of the flrst one or wo years, as they sec fit"-the result of such examination determining their admission.

For graduation: 1) twenty-one years of age; 2) good moral character; 3) three years nedical study, "two of which must have been in a recognized medical college and the ast of which must have been ut this school;" and 4) pass the required examinations in IIl the studies of the three ycars' course; 5 ) satisfactory thesis.

## An Act to lleoulate tie Practice of Medicine in the State of Illinois, Pussed June 15, mproved Jume 16, and in fored July 1, 1887 .

SEction 1. Be it puacted but the People of the State of Illinois, represputed in the Geupral Assembi, That no person slafl practice medieine in any of its departments in this state unless such person possesses the qualiflentions roupired hy this net. If a graduate In medicine, he whall present his dibloma to the State lsoard of Health for veriflentiou as to lts pemulneness. If the diploma is found gennine, nnd from a legally ehartored medical instifution in good atanding, and if the person namod therein be the pors a elaiming and prosenting the sume, the state Board of Health shall issue its eortifleate to that effect signed by atl the members thereof, and sueh cortifeate shall be eonehsive as to the rigit of the lawful holder of the same to praetice medieine in this state, If not apraduatc. the persoa practieing modicing in this state shall prenent himself befores sald board nad submit limself to such examination as the board may reciuire, and If tha examination be sutisfaetory to the bourd, the said board whall issme its certiticate in arcordance with the facts, and the lawful holder of such eertilleate shall be entitled to all the rights and wivileges herein mentioned.
82. The State Board of Health slull organize within three montha after the passage of this aet, it shall procure in seal, and shall receive through its socretary, applleations for certiflenten and examinations: the president and secretary shall have the nuthority to administer oaths, and the board to take testimony in all maters relating to its duties; It shall issue certiflentes to nil who furnish satisfactory proof of having received diplomas or licenses from legatly chartered medical institations la good standiag as may be determined by the bond: it shall prepare three forms of eertifleates, one for persons in possession of sach dipomas or lieenses, the second for candithtes examined and favorably mased on by the bord, and a third for persons to whom eertiflentes may bo issued as hereinafter provided in section it of this net: it shall furnish to the county elerks of the several countios ilist of all persons reefiving eertiflentes. In seleeting plaees to hole its meetings, it shatl, as far ins is reasomable, tecommodate applicants residing in different sections of the state, and due notlee shall be published of all its meetings for exnmination. Certifleates slabll be signed by all the members of the board, and the secretary of the bond shall receive from the applicant a fee of flve (5) dollave for each certiflcate issued to sueh mrabute or licentinto. Graduates or licentintes in midwlfery to pay the sum of two (2) dollars for each cortileate. All such fees for certillentes shall be mide by the secretary into the treasury of the board.
8.3. The veriflention of the diploma shalt eonsist in the affidayit of the holder and applieant that he is the lawful possessor of the same, and that he is the person therein named. Such affldavit may be taken before min berson authorized to atminister oaths, and the same shail be attested undor the hand and offielal seal of sueh offleer, if he have a seal; und any per:son swearing falsely shall be deemed quilty of perjury, and punishod aecordingly. Graduates may present heir diplomas and affilavits as provided in this aet, by letter or by proxy, and the State Board of Health shall issue its cortiflcate the sume as though the owner of the diploma was present.
8. A. All e mimutions of persons not graduatos or lieentiates, shall be male direetly by the board, nad the eertifleates given by the board shall nuthorize the possessor to prnetice medieine and surgery in tho State of Illinols.
85. Every person holding a ecrtileate from the State Board of Health shall have it reeorded in the offlec of the elerk of the eounty in which he resides, within three months from its date, and the dute of recording sland be indorsed thereon. Until sueh eertifleate is reecrded as herein providod the holder thereof slanl not exercise any of the rights or privileges conferred therein to praetice medieine. Any person removing to another county to prnetiee shall reeord the cortjleate in like manner, in the eounty to whieh he removes, and the holder of the certilleate shall my to the eounty elerk the usmal fees for making the reeord.

8 6. The eounty elerk shanl keep, in a book provided for the purpose, a eomplete list of the certiflentes reeorded by him, with the date of tho issue of the eertitleate. If the eertifleate be based on a diploma or lieens 3 . he shall reeord the name of the medieal institution conferring it, and the date when conferred. The register of the county elerk shall be opon to pubile inspeetion during buiness hours.
87. The fees for the examination of non-graduates shall be as follows: Twenty (20) dollars for an examination in medjeines and surgery; ten (10) dollars for an examination in midwifery only; and said fees shall bo paid into the treasury of the board. If an applieant fails to pass said examination his or her fees shall be returned. Upon sueeessfully passing the examination the certifleate of the bonrd shall be issued to the applieant without further charge.
88. Examinations may be made in whole or in part in writing, and shall be of an elementary and praetieal ehnraeter, but suffieiently striet to test the qualifleations of the eandidate as a practitioner.
89. The State Board of Health may refuse to issue the certifleates provided for in seetion 2 to individuals guilty of unprofessional or dishonorable conduet, and it may revoke sueh certifleates for like eauses. In all eases of refusal or revocation the applieant may appeal to the Goyernor, who may affrm or overrule the deeision of the board, and this deeision shall be final.
810. Any person shall be regarded an practicing medleine, within the meanint of this net, whe shant treat, opornte on, or preseribe for my physical nimment of mother. But nothing in this net shill be construed to prohibit service in eases of emergeney, or the domestic minmistration of fumily remedies. And this uct shall not apply to commisaloned surforons of the United States Army, Navy or Marine Hospital Service in tha rilscharge of their offeini dutles.
811. Any itinernat vendor of nuy drug, nostrum, olntment or npplanee of any kind intended for the treatment of disease or fijury, or who shall, by wrlting or printing or dny other method, profess to cure or trent discase or deformalty, by any drug, noutrum manipulation or other expedient, slanif pay a fleense of one humired (int) dollars per month into the trasury of the board, to be bollected by the staty Band of Heath, in the name of the leople of the State of Illinois, for the use of sald Honrd of Health. And it shal be lawful for the Stute Homrl of Health to fissuc sueh lleense on applleation made the State board of Henlth, such lieense to be signed by the prosident of the bonrd, and attested by the seerotary of the bond, with the seal of the bonro. Any such itinerant vendor who shall vend on sell my such dirgs nostrum, ointment or mplinnce Without huving a license so to do shall, if foum gullty, be flned la my sum not less than one hundred dolhis, mal not execeding two hundred dollars for meh offense, to be recovered in mation of deht before any court of eompetent jurisilietion. But anch board may for sufficient couse refuse sheh hectase.
812. Any person pratielng medieine or nargery in the state without the certithente issued by this bomrd in eomplingee with the provisions of this wet, shatl for emeh mul every instance of such prutice forfelt and pay to the leoplo of the state of lilinots for the use of the suid state Board of Health the sum of one liundred (tow) dollars for the
 recovered in and metion of debt before any court of competent jurishliction, and any person lling or attempthig to flle as his own the diplomi or eertiflente of another, or a forged iffldavit of identifleation, shall be guilty of a folong. mhl pon eonviction, shat be subject to such fine und imprisomment us are made mid yrovided by the statutes of the state for the crime of forgery. Provided, that all persons who have been practicing medicine continuously for ten years within this state brior to the taking effect of the act to which thls is an amendment, nnd who have not mher sald orifinal net obtained a ecrtileate from the suld Bonrd of Health to proctice medicine in this state, shail upon proper upplication to said Boaril of Henth rreeive sueh eertitlente, unless it shall be aseertained mind determbed by sadid Botrd of Health that the person so applying for a eertifeate is of immoral character, or grilty of unprofesshomi or dishonoruble conduct, in which case, sald Bomrd of Health miny reject such application: And Provided, that sueh appliention for a certifleate shal! be male within six monthis after the taking effect of this wet, and all persons hojding a eertiflente on account of ten years irnetice shall be subject to all the requirements and diseipline of this wet, mad the met to which this is minmendment, in regurd to thoir future eonduet in the practice of medicine the sames as all other persons holding eertifleates, and nil persons not having applied for or received such certifleate within six monthe after the taking effect of this wet, and ail persons whose unpllentions have for the causes hereln mamed been rejected or eertiflentes revoked, shmil, if they shail practice medieine, be deemed ghilty of practicing in violation of law und slmif suffer the penalties herein provided.
813. Upon conviction of either of the offenses mentioned in this met, the court shat as a part of the judfment, order that the defendant be committed to the common jail of the county until the tlac and costs are pald, and upon failure to phy the same immediately. the defendant shall be committed under said …lar Prorided. that either. party may appeal in the same time mal manner ns appeals be taken in other eases except that when an appeai is prayed in behalf of the peop, 'appeal bond shall he required to be llled, whether the appeal be from a justice the peace, or trom the county or circuit court, or from the appellate court. But it shall be sutticient, in behalf of the people of the Stute of Illinois, for the use of the State Board of Healdh, to pray an appeal, and thereupon appeal may be had without bond or security.
\$14. Ail acts and parts of aets inconsistent or in eonfliet with this act are hereby repealed.

Gwhates holdint cortifeates based unon diplonias of legaliy chattered medlical institutions la kood standing as deflned by the Boand. 2 Grulmates since the sesslons of $1 \mathbf{N K}$ - xi, whose diplomus were required to be supplemented by examination in orter to roaform to the standard of Minimum Requirements of the Boand. 3. Noh-gim ates who hate passan the exmanation preserlbed by the law. 4. Non-gralantes oxti it by reason of having been eagaged in practiee in the Slate upwards of wa уоня.

The mamber of rejected apmilinats shows a dimination of late years, as the requirements of the law cone to be nome elemerly dethed and more pencrally understood. For the entire priod the pereentase of rejections and withirawals has been 16 , but during tho past two years they have avoragen. only 12.1 per cent.-ha 1881 there were 117 in 697
 crants. la 1887 there were 69 in fosi applicants, and in 1888 there were 50 in the applleants. Refusals of certifleates are hased wion one or more of the following grounds:

1. Failure to pesent a diplomin from a legrally-chartered medleal institution in good stmading, as delined by the Boand.
2. Failare to sustain a satisfactory examination sumfeiently strict to test the qualifcations of the camblate for the practice of medicine.
a. Persomal or professional natecedents, habits or association, warranting the eharge of nimofessional and dishonorable condact.
J. I'roved intent to practle in an mprofessional ant dishonorable manner, as by claming to eare inemable maladies; to possess masmal skill, experience or facilities: and similar elams involving deceit and frand upon the public.

The Boand has revoked 41 certilleater for amprofessional and dishoncable conduct.
Non-\&raduate applicants for lisense to practice in Illinois are required to submit to exmmination, in aceordance with the following provisions of the Medical-Practice act:

The state board of Health * * * shall recelve through its secretary applications for ererticates and examimations. * * * If not a graduate the person practicing medicha in that State whalipesent himself hefore suid lBoAnd, and submit himself to such exambution as said hoard shall require; and if the examiantion be satisfuctory to the exmminers, the said loand shat issme its eertiflemte in aceordance with the facts. and the lawfal holder of sach certitcate shall be eatitled to ill the rights and priviloges herein mentioned.
83. * * * It shall prepare three forms of certifleates, one for persons in possession of diplomas or license: ear for enndidates examined by the loand: Had a third for such persons who have been ensared in the practice of modicine for upwards of 2 years, and shall furnish to the county clerks of the several counties a list of all persons rerejomg cortifleates.
88. Cumblides for examimation shall pay a fee of twenty dollars, in advance, which shall be retamed to them if a certitleate be refased.
89. Examinations may be mate wholly or in part in writing. and shall be of an etementary and practical character, but sumbently strict to test the qualitiedtions of the candidnte as a practitioner.

Ali examinations of persons not grahaters or licentiates mast be mate ilireetly by

Resolved, That no medical college be recornized ns in good standing within the meaning and intent of the Act to Regulate the Practlce of Medicine in the State of Illinols, the aggregate graduates of which college amount to forty-flve (45) per ei nt. of its aggregate matriculates during any period of flve years ending with a session subsequont to the session of $1885-86$.

## At the July, 1887, meeting of the Board, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the phrase "medical colleges in good standing," in the 1st gection of the "Act to Regulate the Practice of Medicine in the State of Illinois," approved June 16, 1887, is hereby defined to include culy those colleges which shall, after the sessions of 1890-91, require four years of professional study, including any time spent with a preceptor, and three regular courses $c$. lectures, as conditions of graduation, and shall otherwise conform to the Schedule of Minimum Requirements heretofore adopted by the Board.

Second yeur-surgieal anato: nd operative surgery, general pathology and pathologient amatomy materin mediea and therapenties, state medieine, physiend diarposis, medieal ehomistry, obstetries, laryngology and rhinology, laboratory work in hemiatry and pathologieal histology and hospital and disiensiny elinics. Third yearheory und practice of modieine, and clinieal medieine, theory and proctiee of surpery and elinical surgery, gyneeology, disenses of chittren, ophthatmology and otology, pervos and mental disenses, medienl jurisprudence nod eollege dispensdry and hospial clinies.

Lectures ombrace anatomy, physiology, ehemistry, materia medica. therapeutics, theory and practiee of medicine, pathology, surgery, obstetrics and gynceology, hygiene, medical jurisprudence, toxieology, pharmacy, dermatology, syphilis, diseases of the mind and nervous system, laryngology, clinieal medicine and surgery; ophthalmology, and otology. fenito-urinary and venereal diseases.

Requirements: For admission. 1) candidates, before commeneing the first year of study, must present to the faculty a eredible certitleate of good moral standing; 2) diploma of graduation from a good literary and selentifle eollege or high sehool, or state or county teacher's eertifleate. Or. lacking this, 3) a thorough examination in the branches of a good English edueation, including mathematies, English composition, and elementary physies or nntural philosophy.

For graduation, "He must produce satisfnctory evidence of good moral character, and of having attained the age of twenty-one years. He must fle a satisfactory certificate of hiving studied medieine for at least three years under a regular graduate, or a licentiate and practitioner of medicine in good standing, using the word 'regular' in the sense eommonly understood in tho medical profession. No eandidate shafl be eligible for flnal examination for graduation unless his term of three yoars' study shall have been completed, or shall expire at a date not later than three months after the close of the flnal examination. He must flle the proper offlelal evidence that during the abovementioned three years he has matrieulated at some affliated college or colleges for two regular sessions, and in the conrse of the same has attended two full courses of instruetion. The eandidate must have passed in personal eximination before the faculty in the seven essential branches of medicine.

As will be seen by readiner the "Act to Regulate the Practice of Melicine und Surry" in the State of Iowa, the physicinns of the state Bourd of Health and its SecreHy are made the State Board of Medical Examiners. Their duties are chtirely indeend nit of the State Bonrd of Health. By this Act. which went into effect April $!1886$, Fery person practicing medicine, surgery or olstetries within the state is required to ave a certitlente from the State Board of Medical Fximminers. These certifleates are of bree elasses: 1st. For graduates in medieine; 2d. For persons who haye been in eonnuous practice within the state flve years, threr of which bave been in one locality; A. For those who shall have passed an examination before the Board of Examiners, ving not less than $80 \%$ of correct answers to all questions.
At one of the enrly meetings of the Board, the sehedule of "Minimum Requirements" the Illinois State Board of Healith, as to the good standing of medieal colleges, fis adopted almost verbatim, also the list of medical eolleges recognized and not recoglzed by the same.
Tho laws of Iowa and Illinois being almost identical, the rules, regulations and forms dopted by the former are similar to those of the Illinors Boand.

Under the Pharmacy law of Iowa, Itinerants, apecialists and venders of drugh, trums or anythak to treat discases, or who profess to cure any diseaso, ure regu In addition to the certificate to practice, to pay 4 license fee of one hundred doliars yeur.

To December 15, 1888, the Boarll issmed 3,249 certifleates of all klnds, 2,430 on dif mas; 763 on longth of proctice: $: 30$ on examination, and 20 to midwives. The taw pera all women who had been engaged in the practice of midwifery for one year prior to enuetment, to continue such practiee without eertitente. The persons to whomeer eatem to practlee midwifery were issued, presented diplomas showing graduatlon midwifery, or examination hefore a State Board of Medical Examiners, Tegaily eonst. ed us mueh. The law was so nmended by the last legislature as to permit the Bour issue certifleates to those furnishing satisfactory evilence of having pussed a c.ating tory examination before a legally eonstituted State Board of Medieal Examinurs.

Be it pmarted ing the Ciemeral Assembly of the Commomeralth of Kentuchy, That an act, "ntithel "An net to protect the eitizens of this Commonwealth from empiricism," appoved February al, $1 \times i 4$, he so amended as to provide that it shall ber the duty of the County Clerk of cach county to murehase a book of suitable size, to be known as the "Modial Register" of the countr, and to set apart one full page for the registration of meh physician; and when any physician shall depart this life or remove from tha connty he shall make an note of the same at the bottom of the page; and said Clerk shall (on the thet divy of Januars in each year) transmit to the omed of the state board of Health a daly ceitifled list of the physicians of sheh countr, registered under this act, together wifh such other infamation as is hereinafter reduired, and perform such other lutirs as are reguired by this at, and such clerk shall reeeive the sum of fifty cents from each physioian su registercd, which shall be his full compensation for atl thates reduired mater this act.

8 2. That on and after the flrst day of April. 1889. it shall be malawful for any person to practioe medieine in any of its branches within the limits of this state who has not exhinited and registered in the County (leok's oftlee of the county where he is practieing or intends to eommenee the practice of medicine his athority for so pratieng medieine as preseribed in this act, the name and lechtion of the eollege issuing the same if it be a diploma, the date of same, togethor with his age, residenee, place of birth and the sehoel of system of medieine to which he professes to belong. The person so registering shall subseribe and vellfy by onth before stleh Clerk an iffledave "ontaining such facts. and that he is the person nimed in the authorits so regi tored, which, if wilfully false, shall subjeet the aflant to concietion and punishment for perjury.
83. That muthority to praetice medicine under this act shall be: (a) A diploma from a medieal school legally chartered umber the laws of this State, (b) A diploma from a reputable and legally chartered medieal sehool of some other state or comntry, eertifled atad endorsad as such hy the facealty of a legally chartered medical sehool in this state or ta legally inemporated) State Meilical socioty. (o) An alfilivit from the person claming the same that such pescon is exempted froms obtaining a diploma ubder seetion two of the apt to which this is and amendment, ind stating where he has so praetieed: Prorided, That no eollege shall charge or receive more than one dollar for the eertifleate and endorsement reguired by this section.
84. That nothing in this act shall be so eonstrued as to diseriminate against any peraliar system or sehool of medicine, or to prohibit women from practieing midwifery, or to prohibit gratuitons services in case of emergney, nor shatl this met apply to commissiened surgeons of the United States army, navy, or Marine Hospital service.
$\$ 5$. That sections three, fonme ther, six and seven of the act to which this is an monendment, and any portion of other sections of sad act in eonflice with the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed, and that seetion eight of said aet is hereby reaffirmed and made a part of this net.
86. Nothing in this act shall be construed to limit tho period for which a eertifleato hay run, issued in pursuanee of seetion eight (seven) of the net to which thls is an mendment, but said eertifleate may run the full period for whilh it was issued.
§ $\%$. This act to tako effect from and after its passage.

## Approved April 25, 1888.

Following will be found the portions of the original aet still in foree:
SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commommealth of Kenweky. That it shall bo unlawful for any person, for reward or compensation, within the imits of this State, to practice medicine in nny of its departments, or to preseribe, or o attempt to preseribo, medieine for any siek person, or perform or attempt to perform ny surgien operation upon any person within said llmits, who has not graduated at some chartered school of medieine in this or some foreign country.
8 2. Any person who has been regularly and honorably engaged in the practiee of medicine in any of its departments for ten years shall be teemed to have complied with hu provisions of this act. Any person having been so engaged for five years will be hllowed one year to comply with its provisions.
88. Any person living in this State, or any person coming into this state, who shall ornctice medicine or attempt to practice medieine, in any of its departments, or who shall perform or attempt to porform any surgien operation, for or upon any person within the limits of this State, for rewaril or eompentiation, in violation of the provisions of this act, shall, upon convietion thereof, be flncd tifty follars, ant upon each and overy subsequent eonvietion shall be thed ono humdred dollars and imprisoned thity days, or pither, or both, in the discrotion of the jury; and in no ease, where my provision of this net has been violated, shall the person so violating be entitled to recejvo eompensition for serviees rendered.

89, Provided. That nothing horein shall hr so eonstrued as to apply to persons maticing dentistry.
\$ 10. This net shall be in foree from its passinge.

Students who fail to bring with them proper evidence of theit preliminary edueation are required to pass a satisfactory examination, before a committee of the faculty, in mathenatics, English composition, elementary physies, ete.; any student liolding a diploma from a good literary or stientifie sehool, or a first-grude teacher's certifleate, will be excused from this examination."

For graduation: 1) twenty-one years of age; 2) gool moral character; 3) three years stuay of medicine und two full courses of leetures, the interval between the beginning of the flrst and the elose of the seeond course must be at least fifteen months, 4) "dissection of the severnl regions of the body;" 5) hospital clinies each year of atte "unce; (i) one course in practical chemistry; ;) examination on nll branehes taught in the eollege. "If, after examination for the degree, he be found to have received three negative votes, he shull be entitled to another examination. Should he deeline this he may withdraw, and will not be considered as rejeeted. The degree will not be eonferred upon any candidate who is often absent from the regular lectures of the college, or who absents himself from the public eommencement without special permission of the faculty."

Requirements: For admission-"Students wilt be required to satisfy the instruetors that they are possissed not only of 4 good conmon school edtacation, but alsomit such famitiarity with the Latin languge as may be nedured by the study of harkness Introductory Latin Book and of a knowledge of physies equal to that which may be gotten from Norton's Elements of Nutural Phylosophy. The fate of graduation from a college or from a high sehool or aciulemy, whose curriculum requires the study of these books or the equivalent, will be taken as evidence of these acquirements; but in the absence of such evidenee a written examination wilt be hetd in whieh the orthography and syatax will be takel into mecount. A practienl nequaintance with the metrie system must be possessed on entrance or made up within the first month of study in the school."

[^21]Requirements: For admission, 1) eighteen years of age; 2) good moral character; 3) no previons stuty of medicino required for admission, but candidates will be examint as to their elementary edueation, and their fltness to pursue properly and profltably the technical stady of medielne. The examination will be in writing. The candidate will be asked to give an aceount of his previous educational advantages, and will be examined on the following:

"In addition to the above requirements, which alone will be insisted upon, it is recommended that students obtain such a knowledge of the Latin language as will enable them to read und write eorrectly eurrent or ordinary preserintions, und appreciate the trebnical language of the matural seienees mod of medieine. It is also considered highly desimate that they huve a general grammatieal knowledge of the German and French hagnages. $\frac{2}{2}$ similar knowledge of Greek will also be serviceable, and is highly reemmended."
"Graduates or matriculates of $n$ university or college or of any academy or high school upproved by this faculty: persons holding flrst-class or approved eertiflentes from any reliable pulbic sehool board as being properly qualifled as teachers: and persons having eertiflentes, based upon an examination by some recognized medical socioty, of being pronerly qualifled to engage in the study of medicine, will not be re"uired to pass the above examination."

## An Act to liegulate the Practice of Medicine.

## CHAPTER 1X.

## Be if phacted but the Legislature of the state af Mimesota:

SECTION 1. The Goweroor of thls state shall apooint a hoard of examiners, to known as the State Board of Medieal examiners, consisting of nine (9) members, wh shall hold their offce for three (3) years after such appointment and until their sucep sors are apmointed.

Irocided, That the members thereof Arst appointed under this act shall be divil into three (3) classes, rach class to consist of three (3). The flast class shall hold offi umber shid appointment for the prod of one (1) year, the second elass for two (2) yedr nud the third elass for three sa) years from the date of their apointment.

It is further provided that no member thereof shall be apointed to serve for mor than two (e) terms in sume ssion, and no member of any colleqe or univorsity lanvint nedical department shall be apbointed to serve as member of said board, two of whit whall be homeonathic physicians.

Said buard of medical examiners shall hohl meetings for examination at the Capitol of this State on the flest (1) Tuestay of Jammery, April, July and Getobe of etwh year, and such other meeting as suid board mat from time to time andim Said bomed shall kepp a peodrd of all the proceedings thereof, and also a reeode register of all applichats for a license, togethur with his or her are, time spent in the

Sce. 3, All persons hereafter commencing the wactice of medicine and surgery, it any of its bramelles in this State, shall apply to said board for a bieense so to do, allo sueh apmichat, at the time and place desigmated by said hoard, or at the regular meet lug of said hoard, shall summit to an examination in the following branches, to-wit Anatomy, physiology, chemistry, histology, materia medici, therapeuties, preventiv medicines, practice of medicine, surgery, obstetries, diseases of women and children disenses of the mervous system, disenses of the eye and ear, medieal jurisprudenee, and such other branches as the board shall deem advisable, and present evidence of havin attended three 831 coupses of leytures of at least six ( 6 ) months each; said boart shal cianse such exemination to be both scientifle and pradical, but of suffleient severity t test the candidate's iltness to practice medicine and surgery. When desired, saidex amination may be conducted in the presence of the dom of any medien sehool or the pres dent of any medieal soejety of this State After examinntion, said board shall grint license to such applicant to practice medicine and surfery in the state of Minnesota: which satel license ean only he granted by the consent of not less than seven (f) members of sadd board, and which said lieensi shall be signed by the president and seere tary of suid bonrd, and attested by the seal theroot. The fee of such examination sha be the stim of ten (100 dollars, and whal be paid by the apphicment to the treasurer of said board, to be applied by shid board towards defraying the expenses thereof; and sut board may refuse or revoks a license for unprofessional, dishonorable or immoral abduct. In all cases of refusal or revocation the appleant may appeal to apointing pow of said boatel.

1at-The present Medieal school of mid University shall bo designated and known in this arrangement of ussorintion as Seetion No. 1, of the Medient Depmement of the Cniversity of the state of Missouri, und the mid Missouri Medieal College at St. Lonls shall be designated and known as Section No. 2, of the Medical Depmotment of the University of the state of Missouri.

2d-students who shall eomplete the prepmatory studies and aiso the whitles prescribed in the Jmior yemr of Section No. , shall recrive a certitleate to that effect. properly signed by the President, and also the tickets of the severnl professors of said scetion No. 1.

Bi-Anv stuitent, on the presentation of such certifleate and tickets to the said Missomi Medieal Collere, lesignated as Section No. a, shall be entitled to all the priviteres of suid seetion No. D, hut shall be required to pursue only the suljects of stuly not completr in Seetion No. 1, und shat be reauired to pay only for the mitrjeulition tieket, and for the tickets to the subjects of study and instruction required of him in section No. $\mathbf{2}$.
th-Each student, from Section No. 1, who completes the eourse of study and instruction in section No. 2, as provided in these nrticles of arreement, apon phasing satisfartory examination shall be entitled to a diphoma jointly issued by the authoritios controlling both sections, and all diplomas of section No. ns well as thit joint diplomas shall be signed and delivered by the President of sad University.
ath-In the event of prizes, meduls, or distinctions being awnrded, the stimding of students from section No. 1 shmill be erealited to them in mil such contests.

Gilh-The nuthorities controlling section No. 2 nre to exereise un iutive inflatnce in all eireulars and catulogues, to induce students to flrst complete their Junior course in Section No. 1 it Columbia.
[It shonld be observed that stutents are not compelled to attend the schood at Columbia, but may matriculate as heretofore at the College-thore being no change in the requirements for graduntion upon students so entering. The fivulty, however, "strongly recommend that as many as ean do so take the conrse of section Xo. .".

The faculty embraces thinteen professors, one adjunct professor, one demanstrator and seven chinical assistants.

Course of Instruction: The forty-eighth regular qradmating course began Octower $]$ l8ss, and will eontinue ilve months; the spring course will berin on the 11 th of March, 1889, and continue until June 1. The section of the aret to reorkmize the Media Soctety of New Jowney mil conferting this power, is as follow: "And he it enacted that the sumiety shan have the muthority to confer the degree of M. D. mader such mbe and reguhtions tas they may mont, which dogree shall be deemed sumbiont evidence a regularly eduented and quibitled pactitioner of the bealing net."

Regnations of the socicty conceming the eonferving of the degree of Doetor of Med dine and houorery membership:

SECTION 1. Candilates for the degree of Medicina Doctor may apply to any distrie socicty of this $\boldsymbol{r}$ :ate, and shall be admitted to rxamination under the following rules an regulations-

1st. Each dostrict socicty shall appoint annually, or pro re nata, a eommittee of $n$ less than the members, whio shatl condnet the examination.

2d. Al! examinations shall be in the presence of the soeiety at a regular meeting and no candidate shall be examined until he has given satisfactory evidence of having renched the are of twenty-one years, is of good moral character, and has pursued bis medical studies under the care of some regular matitioner for the term of three year including two courses of lectures in some medical institution in affiliation with the Amer can Medieal Association. If he has not graduated at some acade nie college, then the society shall be satisfled that his preliminary education has been such as to qualify hin for the study and practice of nedicine.
34. The exnmination shall extend to all the branches tanght in the medical sehol recognized as aforesaid; and the candidate shall then be balloted for by the socjety: an if he shatl rective the approving votes of two-thirds of all the members present, th presiding offeres shall give a certifleate to that effect to the candidate.

4th. This certiticate may be presented at the next or any subsequent regular mee ing of this society, not extending beyond the period of three years, with a written thes upon some medical subject and if upon a ballot they shall be approved by a majoril of the members present, the candidate, upon the payment of fifteen dollars, shall entitled to receive a diploma.

## NEW YORK.

An Aot to Regulate thi ridensing and Registhation of Physicians and iurgeons, and to Codify th Menical Laws of the state of New lohe.

The People
the State of Jiew York, represented in Senate and Assembly do ematl is follores:

SEction 1. No person shall practice physic or surgery in this State who slatl not have attained the are of twenty-one years; and no person shall pratice as aforestid untess he of she shail be, at the time this act shall take cifcect, a porson lawfally engaget in such praetice in this State under license or tuthority conferred by its laws then in foree, and lawfilly registered pursmant to chapter flvo hundred and thirtern of the laws of eighteen hunitred and eighty, and the nets amendatory thereof, or unless ho or she shall be lleensed or authorized so to practiee by the provisions of this art, ant? registered as herein preseribed.
8.. From and after the date of the aking effect of this act nu person mot theretofore lien ai al or athorized to practice physio or surgery in this State shall bo deemed so liecnsed or anthorized except one of the three following eltasses:

First. All who shat have been gradhated from an ineorporated medical sehopl or college in this Stato with the degreo of toctor of medicine, dittr substantial comrobiane with all the requirenchts of the general haws and of the chater of sald corporation regulating the lerm and amount of study, attendanco and attainment reduisite to obtain faid derree: provided that no person shall receive the dexere of doctor of medicine, or be liecused to practieg physie or surgery in this state mbless after the age of dirhteen he shall have pursued the study of medical seience for at least three years, in a chattered medical school or with somo physicin or surge practice physic or surgery; and shall have attended two eomplete conrsis of leetures in some le ally incorporated medical school or eollege, in goonl standing at the lime of sueh attentlance, prior to the granting to him or her of a diploma or license: provided. further, that two courses of leetures, both of which shall be bither leemon eompleted within the same calendar year, shall not satisfy the above reduirement.

Second. All who have received said degree from the regrents of the miversity of the state of New York, after substantial complianeo with the lecan requisites prelinihary to its attainment, and after examination by a legally constituted board of medical examiners of this state.

Third. All who, having been graduatod from incorporated medical sehools or eolleges without the State as doctors of medicine, or licensed to mactice physic or surgery ander the laws of those Eurovean countries in which said degree does not confer the right so to practice, shall procure their diphoms from said corporations or their lieenses from such eountries to be indorsed by the faculty of an incorpornted medical sechool or college within this State, of by the regents of the university on the recominendation of a legally constituted bourd of medienl examiners of this State. Every such indorsement shall be in form of sehedule $A$ or of schedule $B$ provited by the tenth section of
this act. Every eorporntion or hoard so indorsing shall keep a record of their hadorse. ments, and mov reanhre npplieants to verify their statements under outh; any horse ment mude w: h frabuldut hatent, or gross carelessmess or ignorame shall be deemed a mistemeantof, and shall subjeet the indorser or indorsers, upon eonvetion thereof to a flne of two hundred and flfty dollars.
8. Every person who, at the time this act shan take effect, shall be practicing hawfully physhe or surgery in this state, under the anthority and license conforred by the taws then in forer, but who shall not be then duly repistered in the county where he or she practioes; ind wery jerson who shall thereafter become lawfully anthorized or fiennsed to practiee whesie or surgery in this state, shall, resister in a bons to be kept in the clerk's ofle of the county in which such practice is carried on, his or her mame, residonce, bhee and date of birth, and anthority for practi :ug is aforesaid. Every per. son whe slath aphly to register ts athysictan or surgeon shall ho required before registathon, to subserib, and vorify by oath or afflrmation, before a person qualifed to mominister oaths In this State, an almbivit whik hayll be thed and preserved in a bound volmm. This athdavit shallhe in tho form preseribed in schedule c, provided by the tenth section of this aet. Every persen registering as aforesalid shalf exhibit to the county clerk his or her dighma or license, ir in caso of loss, a eopy of either, hesally certilled as are copies of docements ahnitfed in evidener, or a duly attested trumseript of the record of its conferment from the body eouferring it, upon which the said elerk shall indorse, or stamp, his meme and the words "lresented and registered as. authority to praetice physie and surgery by................. the.................ay of in the clerk's oflee ol.............eonnty." The said ele shall aiso give to every regis. tered physicinn or surgeon a certitcate in the form of schetale 1 , provided by the trath sertion of this act, for all of his said services the comnty elerk shan recelve, as a total fee for registrution, affidavit and eertilleate the sum of one dollat. It is provided, hew: evor, that nothing in thas act shatl require my physician or surgeon who shall have duly rerfistered lawful authority to practice as such, eonformably to the provisions of chapter flve humbred and thirteen of the haws of eighteen hundred and eighty, and the acts umendatory thereof, t.) register again under the provisions of this act, in any county where he or she shall have registered atready.
84. A pationg blaysidian or surgeon, having registered haful authority to practice physic or surgery in one county, who shall remoye his practice or part there of to or regularly engaged in practice of open an offlee in nnother county, whall exhibit in person to tho cletk of such other eomity, or shall send to him through the muil hy registered letter, his errtaleates of registration, int if such certitheate shows lawful authority to have been registered, said elerk therenpon shatl register sam applicant in said latter ounty, on weceipt of a fee of iwenty-flve eents. The clerk shall stamp or indorse upon sueh ceetifleate the words "Registered also in.............eounty," and returu the same; and every certitheate and indorsement made pursuant to the provisions of this act shall be prima forie evidence in any legal froceeding that the person named has registered in the oflle issuing the same the authority stated in the transeript.
\$5. Every person now lieensed to practice physic or surgery, in this State under the laws threef in loree at the time of the conterment of sueh liennse, maless he or she already shatl have resistered his or her name, residence, phace of birth and anthorits so to practice pursimat to the provisions of seetion two of ehmpter five humdred and thirteen of the liws of eiphteen hundred and eighty and the acts amematory thereof, shad comply with the recuirements of said chapter on or before the thest duy of October, dighteen hamdred and eighty-seven, and thereafter no person shall, be entitled to refister may anthority to practice missic or sumgery, excent the license conferred under this act, and the laws enacted hereafter, and no registration shall be eonsidered valid as such untess the anthority registered constituted at the time of registration a license muter the laws of this state then in foree; provided that nothing in this seetion shath be eonstrued to prolibit or suspend any prosecution for non-registration under seid seetion instituted prior to saidi irst day of Oetober, eighteren hundred and eighty-seria and further provided, that no diploma or license conferred upon a person not intually in attendanee at the lectures, instruetion and examination of the eorporation conferring the samb or not possessed at the time of its conferment of the redniremems then demanded of medical students in this State as a condition of their becoming hieensed so to practice, shall be deemed lawful authority to practice physic or surgery in this state.
86. No person shall be licensed or permitted to practice physie or surgery in this State who has been convieted of a felony by any court of competent juristiction; and if any person who is or hereafter shall be duly beensed to practice physic or surgery in this State, shall be convicted of a felony, as aforesaid, his or her license to so practiee, if any, shall be revoked by the fait of such convietion luving been had. Any person who shall wilfully swear falsely to any statement eontained in any athlavit made pursunnt to the provisions of this at shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and subject to convic: tion mul punishment for perfary; any person who falsely and without authority shall counterfeit, make or alter any diploma, certitleate or instrument constituting a license to practice physie or surgery within this state, or any edrtilleate or indorsement given in pratumee of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and be subject to eonshetion and punishment for formery in the sceond degree; any person who shall pracice physic or surfery moler a false or assumed name, or who shall falsely personate another pratitioner of a like or ditferent name, shall be deemed guilty of if felony, ind shall be subject to conviction and punishment for false personation; and any person guilty of violating any of the other provisions of this act, not otherwise specifically punished herein, or who shall buy, sell or fraudulently obtain any medical diploma, heense, record or registration, or who shall aid or abet such buying. selling or fratudulently obtaining thereof, or who shall practice physic or surgery in this state under eover of a diploma or license that shatl have been illegally obtained, or that shall have been signed or issued unlawfully or under fraudulent representations, or mistake of fict in material regard, or who, after conviction of a felony, as aforesaid, shall attempt to practice
physie or surgery ir. thls State, and any person who shall assume the title of doctor of medlelne, or append the lotters "M. D." to his or her" name, without having recelved tho degree of doetor of medieine from some school, college or board empowered by law to cenfor said degree or title, shall bo deemed ruilty of a misdemeanor, ind upon convietlen theceof shall be munlshed by a $11 n e$ of not less than two hundred and fifty dollai's. or imprisomment for six months for the first offonse, und upon eonvietion of a subsequent offense, by it fine of not less than flve hundred follars or imprisonment for not less than one veir or by both flne and imprisonnent. Any person who, not boing then lawfully authoriz al to practlee physle or shrgery, in this stato and so registered aceording to law, shall practico on or after the first day of October, eighteen hundred and elghty-seven, physie or suryory within this Siate without the license and registration provided for in this act, slatl be deemed guilty of a misdeneanor, amil on eonviction there of shall he punished by n flne of not less than flify dollars fre the thrst offense, and for each subserfoent offonso by a flne of not less than one hunilrod dollirs, or by imfrisonment for not less than one hundred days, or by both fiue and imjrisonment. When any proseeution under this act is mado on the complaint of a lawfully lncorpoated medieal soeiety of this State or a eounty socioty entitled to representation in a State soeiety or association, the flnes when collected shall be pald to the sooioty making the eomplaint, and any execss of the amount of flnes so mail over the expenso incurred by tho said soelety in enforcing the medical law of this State, shatl bo paid at the emf of the year to tho eounty treasurer, for the use of the poor of said county.
8. The duly incorporated medical societies of any county in whleh any person shall practice physe or surgery without lawful authority or registration may, upon proof of such pratice, recover from such protitioner, in an metion before any justice of the peace, a penalty of twenty-flye dollars and the costs of the action for the flrst judgment, and upon every subsequent julgment for the same offenso a penalty of tlfty dollars and the eosts of the action; provided that snid socioties shall pay to the connty treasurer for the use of the poor of said county any surplus that may aecrue in their hands from the exeess of flnes and penalties colleeted over tho disbursoments of said soejety for counsel fees and tho expenses incident to the onforcement of this aet by them.
88. Nothing in this aet shall be eonstrued to punish commissioned medient offeers servinf in the army or mavy of the United States, or in the United States mindine hospital serviee, while so eommissioned, or nny one while aetually serving as a member of the resident medieal staff of any legally ineorporated hospital, of any legally qualifled and registered dentist exclusivaly engaged in proticing the art of dentistry, or interfere with manuffuturers of nutiffeiai eges. limbs or orthopedieal instruments or frussers of any kind from fltting such instruments on porsons in need thereof; or any lawfully gualitled physicians ind surgeons residing in other states or eountries meeting registered bhysieinns and surgeons of this. State in consultation, or any physieian or surgeon residing on the border of a neighboring state, and duly authorized mider the laws thereof to praetico physic or surgory therein, whose practice extends into the limits of this State: providing that such protitioner shall not onen un offled or appoint a place to meet matients or recrive enlls within the limits of the state of Now Sork; or physicians daly registered in one county of this state called to attend isolated cases in another county, but not resirling or habitually practicing thorein.
\& ! . The following acts and parts of nets are hereby expressly repriled, to-wit: Sceticns cight to twenty-tw inelusive of title seven of chapter fonitecn of mart one of the Revised statutes; also of chapter one hmmered and thirty-eight of the haws of eight"'n hundred and six, that provided for the examination and admission of medieal students to practiec, and for penalties for practicing physie and surgery without a dibloma or othor Inwful authority; also section or purgeraph flfth of ehatper one hundred and four of the laws of eighteen humdred and seven; also seetions nine, trin, ciorhteen and ait of section eleven followind and including tho words "whose daty" of chapter" ninety-foxr of the laws of eighteen hundred and thirteen; also seetions one two, four and all of section three following nud ineluding the words "any three" of "hapter two mumbed and six of the laws of eiphteen hmalred and cighteen; nlso sectiontwo of chapter two hundred and thirty-seven of the laws of eightern hundred amd nimetean; also chapter one humdred and twenty-six of the laws of eighteen hundred and thirty; atso sections one two and four of ehapter flve hundrad and thirty-two of tho laws of cighteen hundred and thinty-six; also dhapter sixty-four of the laws of eighteen humdred and forty-ons: also elingter two hundred and seventy-five of the liws of eichtrom humdred and forty-four; also ehapter four hundred and thirty-six of the litws of eighteen himblred and seventy-four; also chapter flve handred and thirteen of the laws of eightend hundred and eighty; also ehapter one hundred and eighty-six of the laws of cighteen hundred and dighty-one: also elingters four hindred nnd eleven and four hundrea and forty-flve of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-fon'; also stetion threo humorad and flfty-six of tho Penal Corle. Aind alsa all aets ob parts of acts authorizing any incorported sehool or collegr to confer the degree of doetor of medicine ratusa houoris or ad eumemm, or otherwise, than upon duly mruduated studente in course; nnd all other ats or parts of acts inconsistent with this act ire breboy repealed. And it is provided thint the degree of doetor of medieine conferred cansa houoris or ad wumem aradura, shall not be a qualitlation for the practieo of physie and surgery in this State, And whereas. It is the purpose of this net to eodify the statutory provisions of this State regulating the admission of individuals to tho practice of physie nind surgery, and the pmishment of those praetieing either physic or surgery without authorlts. It is further provided that the speelfle repeal hereln of any portion of an act that may have been heretotore repenled, expressly or by implieation, shall not be construed to revive the remaining part theroof.

COLLEGE OF PHYSICLANS AND SURGEONS IN THE CITY OF NEW TORK.
(Medical Departmput of Columbia Gollege.)
New York City. John G. Cuntis, M. D., Secretary, 4 W Wes math street.
Ondanized in 1807, by the regents of the University of the state of New York, as their medical department, under the mame of the College of Physianas and surgeons in the City of New York. The institution was connected with the Commbia Collegefor a short perior in 181t, and becamo permanently eonneeted with it in lsion, when the Medical Department of Columbia College was added to the originat title. The original Medioal Department of Columbia Colloge was orgnnized in 1 Tif; it was suspended daring the war of the lavolution, and became extinct in 1shit. The thrst class was graluated by this college in [xl1. Classes hive been graduated each subsequent year.

The faculty embraces sixtecn professors, two adjumet professors, seven clinical professors, two dinical lecturers, awo aljmet lecturers, one demonstrator, six assistants to chairs, one instructor in histology, one director of labortory, nine ehicfs of clinies and thirty-three clinical assistants.

Course of Instruction: The segcion of $1888-89$ began October 1, 1888 , and will end Jue 15, 188: . Instruetion consists of didactie lectures with demonstrations, elinical tomehing, recitations, and proctical teaehing in subjects involving manibulation. Clinies at hospitals and dispensaries free to matricuates and optional. Many spechal courscs, fees varying from $\$ 12$ to $\mathbf{2 0}$. A three years graded course is required.

Instruction embraces: First vear-Didactic lectures in: 1) anatomy; a) physiology; 3) physies and chemistry. Practical work in: 1) dissection; 2) nor mal histology; :i) physiofogieal and medical chemistry. Second yrar-Didactic lectures in: 1) anatomy: 2) physiology: 3) physies and ehemistry ; t) materia medica and therapeutics, incluting hysiene; 5) tathology and practieal medicine; (i) principles and pructiow of surgery; ${ }^{3}$ ) obstetrics and gynecology. Dissection. (linical lectures at the Vanlerbilt elinie in: 1) general medicine; ©) general surgery. Proctical elinical work in: 1) general medicine; 2) general surgery. Third year-Didactic lectures in: 1 materia medicia and therapenties, ineluding hygiene; 2) batholosy and practionl medicine; 3) prineiples and practiee of surgery; 4 obstetries and gynecology; 5phthalmology. Clinical lectures at the Vanderbit elinic in; 1) diseases of the mind and nervonssystem; 2) gynecology; 3) diseases of chihhren; f) genito-urimary diseases, indeding syphilis; 5) fiseases of the skin; (6) (liseases of the throat; $\boldsymbol{i}$ ) diseases of the cye; 8) diseases of the ear. Prnctical elinical work in the eight subjects conmerated immediatcly above under the head of "elinical lectures," and in obstetrics. Practical work in pathology and pathological histology.
liequmements: For admission-For tho session of 1888-89, and thereafter, persons who seek to matriculate at this college for the flest time, are required to undergo examinations for admission, with the following exceptions, viz: 1) applieants who declare themselves not to be candidates tor the clegree of M. D. from this college; ap applicants whe present ecrtiffates of having been successful at examinations for admission to the School of Arts or School of Mines of Columbia Colloge; 3; applicants who present diplomas or certifleates of graduation in arts, philosophy, seience, or medicine, from recognized colleges or schools of science; 4) appliants who present certilleates from recognized colleges or schools of science, to the etticet that they have sthilied satisfactorily any or all the subjects required for admission to this colleqe, are admitted without examination in the subjects so certitled to. THE KEGENTS OF THE CNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK STATE．

## Office at AlmaNi，N．I．Davio Murady，Seeretary．

From the law eonfering the power of wanting diplomas passed in 1892，the follow－ ing is tiken．

The regents of the University shall not grant a diploma eonforring the degree of Doctor of Medieine uron any one who has not，for at least three yems，pursued the stuty of medieal scienee with sonte physician or surgeon duly nuthorized to praetiece．The ro－ gents of the University in the state of New York are anthorized to appoint nine or more Foards of examiners in medicibe．which shat eonsist of not less than seven regularly licensed physicians and surferols in the state．This board shall examine all eandidates refered to the mh，the ehaneellor，in anatomy，physiofory，materia medien，pathology， histology，elinienl medieine，chemistry，surgery，midwifery and thermeuties．

All persons who are orer twenty－one veurs of age，of gond morn eharacter，and ean produce to the chanedlor satisfatory proof that they have eompetent knowledge of all the branches of learning tanght in the eommon sehomes of the State，and of the latin lamgnage aud have diligenty stabied medicine for not less than three years，ean rpply to the chaneellor for an examimation by the board of examiners．The fee for an exmm－ ination shmll be shi．The regents grant，to any eandidate who has been reeommended be flve members of the homrd of examiners，a diphom conferring the degree of Doetor of Medicine from the Unipersity of New York，which diphoma shall be a lirense to prac－ tiee physie and surgery．Ten dollars must be paid for this diploma．

Cnder athority of the statute passed in 1892 the Board of Recrints has appointed three Medical Examining boards．The frst one pepresents the state Medical Society． It－headquarters are nt Albany．Dr．Abrahan．Tacobi of New Fork City，is president and Dr，Henry Hun of Albamy，Secretary．With the execption of Dr．Jucobi all the members reside at Albany．The Seond Board represents the Homeopathie State Medi－ eat Society．Dr．Searle of Brocklyn is President and Dr．Bacon of New York City is secretary．It holds its meetings for examination in New York City．The Third lourd represents the Eelectic State Mediea！Society．Dr．looskowitz of New York City is President．This Buard has not held any meeting for examination as yet．

The Board of Regents has only granted ten diplomas sinee the system was estab－ lished in 1872．One in 1880：one in 1881；two in 1882；three in 1883；one in 1884；two in 1886．Qnite a number of persons have been examined but failed to pass．The Secretary of the Board snys：The system is of small moment in our state，because the examin－ ation and lieensure nre not obligatory．Only thoso who desire an additional degree，or those who have practiced heretofore without a degree，and whom the stricter laws have driven to seek some kind of degree，apply to the Boards of legents for examina－ tion．

## NORTH CAROLINA.

## BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS OF NORTH CAROLINA.

## Wilmington, N. C. W. J. H. Bellamy, M. D., Seeretary.

Incorporated 1859. The Board of Modical Examiners of tho Stato of North Carolina is a body separate and distinct from the State Board of Health-its dinty being to oxamine all applicants for license to practlee medicine or surgery, or any of the branches thereof, in the State. It is composed of seven members, who are cleeted by the state Medical Loejety, and who serve for a meriod of slx yeurs. Its pors aro derlved from unts of the Legisiature, whieh huve been ame ded at different times sinee the year 1859. when the flrst ict erenting a Board of Meand Examiners was passed. No penalty orisimilly attached to the failure to comply with the provisions of the act, except inability to colleet a medical bill by luw. In the your 1880, an umendment was passed flxfing the penalty at $n$ minimum of twenty-flve or a maximun of one hundred dollars, or imprisonmont for each and every offenee.

Each apulicant for lle nse must give written evidence that he ls of good moral character and twonty-one years of age: must submit to an examination in 1) surgery and surgical pathology and diseases of tho eye and ear; 2) chemistry and pharmacy; 3) anatomy; 4) physiology und medleal hygiene; 5) materia medice and thrapenties; 6) obstetries and diseases of women and children; 7) practice of morlicine and medleal pathology. Applicants must answer seventy per cent. of all the questions satisfactornly.

Temporary lieenses may be issued in the interim between the regular annual meetings, by any two members of the Board, (examination cenn be eonducted by only one member, and papers forwarded to another for approval), to hold good only until the next annual meeting thereafter. The fee for temporary license is 5 ; for permanent license, \$10.

Tho annual meetings are held at the same time and place as those of the State medical society. At the April, 1888 , meetlng there were 53 applicunts; 36 wore granted 1 icenses. Of these 35 wero gradutes, und 1 non-gruduate; 17 wore rejected: of those 12 were graduates and ; non-graduates. The next meeting of the Board will be held at Elizaboth City, in May, I889.

Lectures embrace anntomy, physiology, chemistry, materia medica and therapeutics, theory and practice of medicine, pathology, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, hygiene, medieal jurisprudence, laryngology, ophthalmology and otology, diseases of elildere, dermatology and diseases of the nervous system.

Order of studies: First year-matomy, physfologs, geneml chemistry, and materia medka; second yeir-practical anatomy, medieal chemistry, physiology, pathological anmtomy, practice of medicino and surgery; third year-therupeuties, obstetries, theory and practice of mediche and surgery; fourth yenr-ophthnlmology, otology, dermatology, syphilis, laryngology, diseases of the nervous system, disenses of women, diseases of chidren, operative surgery, forensie medicine.

Requinements: For ailmission-"Applleunts must be at least eighteen years of age" and will bo required to pass a preliminary exmmination suffleient to show their fitness to enter upon the study of medicine, unless they ean furnlsh a certifleate of thelr pre-

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vious standing in school from some principal or president of a reputable institution of learning." A literary course of two years duration, prellminary to the medical course, has been establlshed by the univorsity.

For graduation: 1) twenty-one years of age; 2) good moral character; 3) four yoars' graded course; 4) dissect the entlre cadaver; 5) thesis; 6) satisfactory examinution, an average of seventy-flve per cent being required to pass.

Fees: Matriculation, $\$ 5$; lectures, $\mathbf{8 6 0}$; graduation, 810 ; incidentals, 83 .

Organized in 1819. The first elass was graduated in 1821. Classes have been graduated each subsequent year. In 1858 the Miami Medical College was merged into this institution, and contirued in this relation until 1865, when the Miami was re-established. (See Miami Medishl College, infra.) In $1887{ }^{\circ}$ t becane the Medical Department of the University of Cincinnati.

The faculty embraces ten professors, twelve asslstants to chairs, two adjunct professors, two lecturers and three demonstrators.

Course of Instruction: The colleginte year embraces a whter and a short spring course. The former, for the session of 1888-89, began September 25, 1888, and will close Mareh 1. 1889. The spring eourse will begin about the middle of Mareh and continue for six weeks. Clinies at hospital and dispensary, and private courses for advanced students and prnctitioners on special topics in medicine and surgery.

Lectures embrace ophthalmology, otology, anatomy, clinieal surgery, materia medica, therapeutics, clinical medicine, theory and practice of medicine, principles and pratico of suigery, obstetrics, diseases of children, fynceology, physiology, medical chemistry, clinical laryngology, pathology, dermatology, histology, hygiene und medical jurisprudence, Daily examinations or quizzes are conducted by the assistants to the respective ehairs. No fee is charged for this quiz, and all students are required to nttend regularly.

Requirements: For almission-"Applients for admission to the college must bring certifleates of good moral character, und must give evjdence of at least a good Finglish education, including mathematies and elementary principles of physies. An examination on these subjeets, as tuught in the common schools, will be condncted by a committee of the feculty. Graduntes of a literary or scientifie college, high school or meademy, gentlemen having a county or State teacher's certifleate, gruluates in merlicine will be excmpt from this exnmination.
"The general demand for a good preliminary ed ation of those abont to enter our profession is shown by the recent utterances of the American Medical Association and the enactments of several state bonrds of health. We desire to call special attention to the fact that in severnl states the diplomas of such sehools as do not require an examination preliminary to entrance are not acepted as qualifying for practice."

For graduation: 1) satisfactory evidence of good moral character, and having uttained the age of twenty-one years; 2) satisfactory certifleate of having studied medicine for at least the zo years under a regular graduate, or licentiate and praetitioner of medieme, in good standing, using the word "regular"'in the sense commonly understood in the medical profession. "No candidate shall be elirible for flal rxamination for graduation unless his term of three years' study shall have been completed, or shall expire at a date no later than three menths after the close of the thal examinations;"3) at least two full courses of instruction; 4) dissections of at least two regions of the body; 5) clinical instru?tion (hospital) dưring each year's attendance; 6) a satisfuctory examination in each branen taught in the colloge.

## After thessession of $1890-91$ four yea.s professional study and three regular courses of lectures will be required as conditions of graduation.

Onganized in 1843 as the Cleveland Medical College, Medical Depmrtment of Western Reserve College, by Profs. Ackley, Cassels and Delnmeter of the Willoughby University Medical Department: Pıof. Kirthnd of Cincinnatl and Prof. St. Jolm, Chemist of Western

Reserve College at Hudson. Reorganized in 1881 by a union of ilte faculty of the Cleveland Medical College and a majority of the faculty of the Medjcal Department of Wooster Universlty, as the Medical Department of Western Resorve Unlversity. Ia Maroh, 1882, the board of Trustees of Western Reserve University conferred the ad enndem degree of Doctor of Modicine upon all graduates of the Cleveland Medieal College, and upon sueli graduates of the Wooster Medical Departnent peior to 1881, as desired it.

The ficulty embraces fifteen professors, two leeturers, one demonstrator, three assistants to chairs and one prosector.

Counse of Instruction: Tho college year embraces a special spring and a regular winter course. The spring term of 1888 ypencd the first Wednesdny in April and continued twelve weeks; the regular winter term opened September 19, 1888, and will ciose Mareh 6,1889 . The phan of instraction includes leetures, elinies, recitations, quizzes and practicail demonstrations. Three sears' graded course required.

Lectures embrace: First year-The conrse will include deseriptive anatomy with dissections, physiology, witl exercises in the physiological lisboratory; histology with the exanination of the minute strueture of all the organs and tissues of the body practical mieroseopy with instruction in the preparation, mounting and examination of objects; in organic chemistry with laboratory exerelses and materia medica. Students will be examined at 1 te elose of the year in ehemistry, osteology, histology, inieroscopy, elementary phy: logy and dissections,

Second year-During the seeond year instruction will be glven in deserintlive anatomy, surgieal anatomy, plyysiology, materia mediea and therapenties, medical chemistry and toxicology, seneral pathology and morbid anatomy, prineiples and practiee of medicinc, prineiples and practice of sutgery, obstetries and diseases of children. Examinations will be held at the end of the year in toxieology, anatomy, physiology, materia medica and therapeuties, obstetrics and diseases of children.

Third year-During this year the instruction is directed to the practical departments of general medieine and surgery and their specialties. The course includes the principles and practice of medicine and clinical medicino, prineiples and pactice of surgery and clinical surgery. operative surgery and surgical pathology, gynecologs; ophthalmology otology, hygiene and medieal jurisprudence.

Students are required to attend the general medical and surgical clinics at least during the second and third years and the clinies in special departments only during the last year.

Requinements: For admission-1) eredible certificate of good moral standing; 2) diploma of graduation from a literary and scientitle college or high sehool or a teachors' certifieate, or, lacking this, a thorough examination in the branches of a good English education.

For graduation: 1) good English education; 2) twenty-one years of age; 3) three years study; 4) two full courses of lectures. All students entering the college for the segsion of $\mathbf{1 8 8 8 - 8 9}$ must attend three years' course of lectures. 5) sutisfactory examination to the faculty and board of censors.

Requirements: For admission-"Applicants for admission to this sehool are required to give evidence of possessing a good English educntion, und a eertifleate of good moral character."
"An examining committee has been appointed in order to eomply with the requirements of the laws of the various States, and State boards of health, demanding a preliminary examination before atmission to medical lectures. Students possessing academical degrees, or who have graduated at high sehools, or who have reeeived a teacher's certiflcato, will do well to bring evidenee of that faet with them."

For graduation: 1) tweaty-one years of age; 2) three years' study;3) complete disseetions of the human body during two courses; 4) two full eourses of legtures; 5) satisfactory written examinitions on nill brunches taught. ## VERMONT MEDICAL COLLEGE.

## " Woónstock, Vt.

Organtzed in 182\%, under the name of the Clinical School of Medicine, by Dr. Joseph A. Gallup, and was mader his manngement until lxi.5. For several years the dextees were eonferred by the Waterville College, Maine. In 1830 an nrrangenent wins nade with the Middlebury College, Vernont, and the degrees were conferred by that instithtion up to 1836. In 1835 the State Legishature passed an act incorporating the Vermont Medieal College, By this act the supreme Court wis directed to appoint a Board of Examiners. The school was quite prosperous and well patronized; had a strong faculty and more than one hundred students in 1850-51-52-53.

Professor B. R. Palmer, Dean of the Faculty and Professor of Anatomy, removed to Louisville, Kentucky, in'1854. He was the leading sphrit in the is stitution and in 1856 the school became extinet.

## VIRGINIA.

An Act to Regulate the Practice of Medicine and Sumery, Approved Jan ary $31,1884$.

1. Be it encected by the General Assembly of Virginia. That there whall be for th State a Board of Medical Examiners, consisting of three members from each Comgre sional Distriet in the State, and two from the state at large, whose torm of offee she be for four years, or until their suecessors are appointed and dualifled. 'The tem oflee of the Boari] thrst appointed shall commence on the itrst day of Janaary, cighte hundred and elghty-live.
2. The said Boatd shall eonslst of men learned in medjeine and surgery, and sha be appointed by the Governor on the ilrst day of November, eighteen humbed an eighty-four, and every fourth year thoreafter, from a list of namos to be pecoma mile by the Madical society of Virginia. He shall also nyoint flve homeopathice physiciane who may be nominated to him by the Hahnemann Medical Soeioty of the Old boninion in the manner hereafter provided. Vacancies occurring in snoh Board for unexpire terms., shall be illed in the same manner. Sueh recommendations shall be by the vote of a majority present at some merting of the said societies, and the same shall be cer tiffed to the Governor by the president and seeretary of sueh mooting; providud, hor ever, that in case the Governor shall consider any of the persons so reeommended unsuitable. ho may deeline to appoint such person or persons, and comminiento the fact to the presiding offleors of the Soclety prosenting the nomination, and sueh Society shall, within ninety days thereafter, mako other rocommeniatlons, in the manor hereinafter preseribed, which shall stand on the same footing in all respects as those thrs made; ind proviled furthor, that if such Society fall to make such reeommendations prior to the time of appointment, or within ninety days, aforesail, then the Governor suall appoint sueh Boare ier in whole or part, without regurd to sueh recommundations. If any of said $F$.rs shall cease to reside in the distriet for which he was appointed, it shall vacau his offee.
3. The whe ors of said Board of Medical Examiners shall qualify and take the usual oath of ohace before the County or Corporation Court of the eoanty or corporation in which they shall respectively reside. The offeers of said Board shall be a president. Viec-President, and Secretary (who shall also net as Treasurer), said otfleors to be me nbers of and elected by sald Board. The thrst meeting of the same shatl be at lichmond, and at such time as the Governor shall notify the members by mail to assemble. Subsequcnt regudar meetings shall bo hed at such times and places as the Board may preseribe, and special mectings may bo held upon the call of the president and itre members, but there shall not be less than one regular meeting per annum. Eleven members of said board shall be a quonum. Said Board may organize at its ilrst meeting, and may, at its flrst or any subsequent meeting, preseribe rules. regulations and by-laws for its own proecedings and government, and for the examination of candidates for the practice of medicine and surgery by its individual members.
(1. Be it emacted by the General Assembly of Virginia. That seetion of an act, ontitied An Act to regulate the Practice of Medicine and Surgery, approved January 31, 1884, be amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:) (Approved March 1, 1888.)
4. It shall be the duty of said Board, at any of its meotings, to examine all persons making appliantion to them, who shall dosire to eommenee the practice of medieine or surgery in this State; and when an applicant shall have passed an oxamination satisfactory as to protleieney before the Board in session, the President theseof shall grant to such applicant a certificate to that effert. A fee of sis shall be paid to said Board, through such offleers or members ns it may designate, by each applicant before such examination is had. In ense any applicant shall fail to pass a satisfactory examination before the Board, he shall not be permitted to stand any future examination within the nest three months thereafter, nor shall he have again to pay the fee preseribed as aforesaid: proviled. however, no applicant shall be rejected upon his examination on account of his atherence to any particular sehool of medicine or system of practice, nor on aceount of his views as to the method of treatment and cure of discases; and provided further, that when, in the opinion of the President of the Board, any applicant the been prevented by good eause from appenting before the Board, he shall appoint a Committee of three members, who shall examine such upplicant, and may grant him a certifleate, which shall have the same foree and effeet as though granted by the full Board.
(2. This act shall be in foree from its passage.)
5. The fand realized from the fees aforesaid shall bo applied by the Board toward its expenses, inchuding a reasonable compensation to the President and Secretary.
6. Anyperson who shall obtain a certiticate as aforesaid from the President of said Board shall eanse his name to 'se registered in the elerk's oftlee of the County or Corporation Court for the countr or corporation in which he shall reside; and it shall be the duty of sald eleck to register the name of every such persoi, describing such certilleate, together with the date thereof, and the name of the president of the Board, signing the sime in a book kept for the purpose, ats a part of the records of his Court.

hich shall also qive the date of ach registration, and his fee for each registration. thall be one doling, to be paid by the person whese nome is registered.
7. No person who shall commence the practlee of medleine or surgery after the flrst sy of Janmary, eighteen hundred mad elghty-fle, shall ratiee as physician or surgeon or compensation withour flrst having ohfained a certifleate and caused his name to be fristered is aforenaid. Any person vilating the provisions of this section shall pay a the of not less than tifty nor more than ilve hundred dollars for ench offense, and whall e debured from receiving any compensation for service rendered as such physlelan or argeon.
8. Any person who shall have been assessed with a license tux as a physictan or urgeon by my Commissioner of the Revenue in this State at any time prior to the flrst lay of January, cighteen hundred und eighty-flve, shall be tuken as having ce 'moneed the practice of medicine or surgery pror to that date; but any person wh ball not bave been so nssessed, shall be taken as not having commenced such pract indor to bat date.
4. Any physician or surgeon who shall commence to practice sfter the flrst day of
 within ten miles of the boundary line of this State, shall be entitled co stand the examibations and receive the certifleate herembefore provided for, and such certilleate whall be reglstered as hereinbefore provided, in that eonnty in this state which is nearost bis place of resi' 'nce, nnd such certillente nai registration shall make it lawful for him to practice medicine or surgery.
10. Nothing in this act shall be taken as ineluding or affecting in any way the practlee of dentistry, nor shall it inelmile physicians or surgeons reslding in other states, and called in consultation in a spechal case with a physleian or surgeon reslding in this State, Nor shall it be construed as uffeeting or changing in any way the laws in reforence to the bicense tax to be pidd by physicinns, surgeons and dentists.
11. Provided the provisions of this net shall not apply to any midwle.

As a further law on the subject of attempting to practlee in Virginia without preriously having a proper lieense, we append:

An Act to * * * provide for tho Mose of Applying for Lleense to Transact any Business in this State-Approved Mureh 6. 1886. Aets of Assembly 1885-6. 11. 512.
\$80. No person shall, without a ticense nuthorized by law practice as attorney-atlaw, physicim, sargeon or dentist, and no porson who shall horeafter apply for license to practice as a physician or surgeon, shan have such license g"anted to him, umless he shall have complici with the urovisions of an act, entitled An Act to legulate the Praetice of Mediclne and Surgery, apmoved Jamury thirty-flrst, eighteen humpred and eighty-four; provided. that no person who was licensed to practice as physichun or surgeon, at any time urior to Jumury thr flrst, eighteen hundred mul eighty-flve, need comply with the provisions of said net in order to be again licensed as it physician or surgeon.

## MEDICAL EXAMINING BOARD OF VIlGINIA.

## Cearlottesiille, Va. Hugh T. Nelson. M. D., Seeretary.

Organized November 10, 188.t. The law flrst became operative January 1, 1885.
Composition of the Board: The Board consists of three physicians from each Congressional distrint in the State, and two from the state nt large, making thirty-two nembers, and in addition, nhso sue homeopathie physicinns, Members of tho bonrd, except homeophths are nominated by the state Mediend Society and apponted by the Governor every four years.

Persons Required to be Examined: Every mplicant for the practice of medicine in Virginia, who has not been assessed with a license tax ns a physician or surgeon in this Stato at some time prior to Janury. 1, 18ss, is reanired to mas a sutlafictory examinntion before he ean commence practice. Graduates and mon-gradnates are subjected to the snme examination.

Application for lixamination: Any person vishing to be cxamined with the view of prattejng medicine in Virginia, jo required to :ill out and flle whth the Secretary of the Board in form $o_{\text {: }}$ application stating: 1) age; 2) residence; 3) college where graluated (if a graduate), and date of graduation. The aplication must be aceompanied by recommendations from two citizens of the county in whieh applleant resides, an'! a fee of flve tollars.

Mode of Conducting Examination: Examinations are held by the Board in session regularly twice each year. During the recess of the Board, if any person lus been prevented by sickness, or other pood cmuse, the President may order three members of the Bonrd to examine him. The eause is discr tlonnry with the President. The Plan of Examination is fis follows:

1. Examination questions and answers are to be in writing or printing.
2. The applleant is required to nnswer at leust three-fourthe $75 \%$ of the questions satisfactorily, and show a falr genernl knowledge of all the branches upon which he is examined.
3. Applicants can neither give nor receive information relating to the subjects under consideration during the eximination.

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4. No examiner is permitted to tell the appleant the result of his examination until after the examinations are all over and have been passed upon by the Board.

The examinations are $\ln : 1$ ehemistry; 2 anatomy; 3) physlology ; 4) hygiene; 51 medical jurlsprudence; 6) materia medlea and therapeaties; i) obstetries; 8) gynecology; 9) practlee of medieine; 10 surgery.

The oxaminers report the result to the President of the Board, who issues the license or notifles the eandldate of his rojection, as the case may be.

The Virginia laws require that no person shall be rejected on accome of his adherence to any particular school of medicine or system of practice.

Number of applicants examined from January 1, 1885-when the law went into effectto December 31, 1888 . 243 . Of this number 52 were rejected and $;$ withdrew withont completing the examination; 186 hold certilleates from the Board, all but 5 being gratuates of colleges in grod standing. Of the 52 rejected all but 4 were graduates. 11 non-graduates were applicants, 5 passing.

The fellowing table shows the number of applicants from varions medieal colleces which have appeared before the Board, the number passing, the number rejected, etc.

Course of Instruction: One anmual gradunting session of nine months' duration. The session of $1888-89$ began October 1. 1888, and will close June 30, 1889. Daily examinations on the subjects of preceding lectures. Course is praded, extending over two fears. Lectures embraco matomy, physiolofy, ehemistry, materia medica, theory , and practice of medicine, obstetrics, medical jurisprudence, shrgery and pharmacy "The arrangement of the lectures is such that the student acduhes a eompetent knowledere of anatomy, physiology and chemistry before he enters upon the study of the prineiples and practice of medicine and surgery."

Requirements: For admission, the faculty are required by law to be satislled by netual examimation or by certillente that applicants are suffleiently proflelent to awail themselves of the advantages afforded by the miversity.

For graduntion: "Graduation in medicine, as in the other departments and schools of the University of Virginin, does not depend upon the time which has been suent in the study of medicine, but non the preparation of the student, as indicated by rigid examinutions. which he is ealled upon to stand. Hence it is possible for a diligent student to graduate in one sission. But the severe and protrated labor neeessary for this purpose is atteuded with. 3 of which the medical faculty is fully conscions: and it is considered far better for a student to attend lectures ior two sessions. whing his attention during the Irst session to the subjects of ehemistry unntome and physiology especially, and endeavoring to obtain only suel a general khowledge of the other brnnches, as will better enable him to complete the course and to prollt by the instruetion of the second year."

Fees: Matriculation and use of library, sis; tuition, s110; graduation, s15; inllmary fee, s .

## WINCHESTER MEDICAL COLLEGE.

## Winchester, Via.

Chartered by the Legishature of Virginia in 1826 . The school was organized by Dr. Cook a celebrated physicinn of Virginia at that time. It continued in oneration but a few yeurs when it becane extinct. In 1850 it was revived by Dr. Hugli MeGuire and was operated with moderato suceess until the buildings were burned during the war. During its latter career it had min attendance of from 25 to 30 students ammally, and up to 1857 had graduated 47.

## MEDICAL DEPARTMENT OF RANDOLPH MACON COLLEGE.

Prince Edeard Court Howse, Ia.

Organized as a private medical sehool by Dr. John P. Metaner, presumably about 1840-45. In $1 \times 19$ it became the Medieal Department of Randolyh Macon College, located then at Clarksville, afterward ut lichmond, Va. Extinet, $18 \%$.

## MEDICAL COLLEGE OF VIRGINIA.

Richmond, Vi. J. S. Dohsey Cullen, M. D., Dean.

Organized in 1838 as the Merlical Department of Hampden Sidney College, unde which name it continued until 1854, when a new charter was obtained and the presen name assumed. The ilrst chass whs graduated in 1840 . Classes have been grainated each subsequent year. The faculty embraces nine professors, nine adjunct professors and twe demonstrators.

Course of Isstruction: One nnnial course of slx months' duration. The fifty flrst annual session began Octobor 1, 1888, and wili contimue six months. Daily examina tlons by ench professor of ussistant. Cliusies nt hospital. "The instruction consists o didactic lectures with demonstrations, clinical teacilng, recitations, examinations ano practical teuching in subjects involving manipnation."

S.) is eonferred unon those gradintes in medicine of the University, or of other recognized schools. Who attend two full courses of lectures in the Auxiliary Department, pass a satisfactory examination before the fuculty, and present an original thesis on some one of the subjects tanght.

Leetures eomprise medical jurisprudence and toxicology mineralogy and peology; (including a practieal course on mineraloglcal and geological ehemistry); botany; hygiene; comparative anatomy and zoology. The session begins the flrst Monday in Uetober and ends in May. The professor of compurative anatomy eonducts, dining the summer months, at a place on the Atlantic coast, a practical laboratory for specinl work in the subjects of his elair.

Fees: The lectuses are free to students and graduates of the Department of Medicine of the University of Pennsylvinia; to other matriculates, \$15 for each professor's ticket, or $\$ 3 ;$ for the course; graduation, $\$ 10$.
