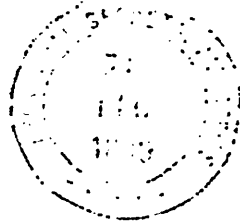


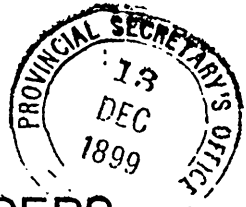

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Since the publication of our last "Register" an election for members of the new Council has taken place. The retiring Council has reason to be pleased with the result, the profession having endorsed their action by returning five out of seven members of the old Council. One hundred and fifteen ballots were cast and secrecy was maintained, as far as it is possible to maintain it, by a ballot conducted through the post. The Revs. A. Sheldrick, of New Westminster, and E. A. McLaren of Vancouver, acted as scrutineers. The presence of these gentlemen confirmed the general feeling of confidence in the authorities.

The Registrar handed over the ballots, sealed, to the new Council: they have been returned to him, unopened, with instructions to destroy them after thirty days. This was done on June 6th, in the presence of the Rev. A. Sheldrick.

The Auditor, Mr. John Anderson, when presenting his report, congratulated the Council on their financial standing and bore testimony to the accurate and careful keeping of the books under the new system. A financial statement for the year was ordered to be sent to each member.

The practice of the "unlicensed" has, as formerly, given great trouble. When possible, action has been taken, with the result that twelve "irregulars" have been driven to other fields.

The Council has heard of, with regret, the continued and constant "counter-prescribing" of druggists. The matter is a difficult one to deal with, even though the law is decided on the question. The Council hopes that druggists will, when their attention is called to the evil, weigh well their action. Such prescribing is simply a matter of routine or copying. The difficulty and science is in the proper appreciation of each individual case and this is impossible when a true understanding of causation and sequilæ is wanting.

The Registrar has received instructions to keep in force the

section of our Act dealing with unprofessional conduct, and has been asked to remind members that advertising in any form is unprofessional.

Twenty-nine candidates presented themselves for examination during the year. Twenty-four were ordered to be registered.

It is with deep regret we have to announce the death of three members during the past year, viz. : Drs. Duncan Eberts, of Wellington; Edward Furrer, of Kamloops, and Richard R. Sage, of South Vancouver.

The following resolution was passed at the last meeting of the Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons:

“That on and after January 1st, 1900, the British Pharmacopœia of 1898 be recognized as ‘official’ for British Columbia.”

This was done so as to afford to members of the Medical Profession and those engaged in the compounding of medicines one uniform standard and guide.

It is expected that Druggists will, after January 1st, 1900, regard all prescriptions, unless otherwise specified, as based on the strengths of medicines according to the British Pharmacopœia of 1898.

It is proposed to supply members with a copy of the 1898 Pharmacopœia free of charge.

SYNOPSIS OF REQUIREMENTS.

For the information of those who are not acquainted with the requirements necessary for registration as medical practitioners in this Province, the following synopsis is given :

1. Sub-sec. C, Sec. 24, Med. Act, 1898, provides : The Council shall admit upon the register any person who shall produce from any college or school of medicine and surgery, requiring at least four year's course of study, a diploma of qualification, provided that where the college or school of medicine did not require a course of study of at least four years, but a post graduate course has been taken which in point of time added, to the college or school of medicine course, completes a period of four years it shall be deemed sufficient ; provided also that the applicant shall furnish to the Council satisfactory evidence of identification, and pass before the members thereof, or such of them as may be appointed for the purpose, a satisfactory examination touching his fitness and capacity to practise as a physician and surgeon.

2. Sub-sec. [B], Sec. 24, provides that : The Council shall admit upon the register every person mentioned in chapter 48 of the Acts of Parliament of the United Kingdom, passed in the 49th and 50th years of Her Majesty's reign, duly registered under the " Medical Act " [Imperial], prior to and inclusive of the 30th day of June, 1887, upon complying with the orders, regulations or by-laws of the Council, and giving due proof of such registration, and that the person applying for registration has not lost the benefit of the same by reason of misconduct or otherwise.

3. Every person applying for registration under Sub-sec. C, Sec. 24, Medical Act, 1898, shall, on appearing in person before the Registrar of the Council and paying a fee to the Registrar of one hundred dollars, be entitled to be registered, on

producing to such Registrar a certificate duly authenticated under the hand and seal of the Registrar of Medical Practitioners in England, Ireland and Scotland, as the case may be (or other legal evidence), that such applicant is a duly registered Medical Practitioner, and that he was duly registered under the "Medical Act" [Imperial], on or before the 30th day of June, 1887. Such applicant will also be required to produce a certificate of good standing in the profession of Medicine from the Registrar or other officer of the Medical body having jurisdiction where such applicant last practised his profession, and evidence by statutory declaration that he has not lost the benefit of his said registration under the "Medical Act" (Imperial), by misconduct, or otherwise.

4. Sub-sec. (d), Sec. 24, provides that: Any homœopathic physician holding a diploma of qualification from any authorized school or college requiring at least a four years' course of study, which has been undergone by the applicant may be registered under this Act upon passing before the Council or such of them as may be appointed for that purpose, a satisfactory examination in the following subjects, viz. :—Anatomy, Physiology, Pathology, Chemistry, Obstetrics and Surgery.

5. The examination shall be orally and in writing, upon the following subjects :

1. Anatomy.
2. Chemistry.
3. Physiology.
4. Pathology.
5. Materia Medica.
6. Medical Jurisprudence.
7. Theory and Practice of Medicine.
8. Surgery.
9. Clinical Medicine.
10. Clinical Surgery.
11. Obstetrics and Diseases of Women and Children.

6. Before examination, the candidate shall pay to the Registrar of the College the fee of one hundred dollars for the

examination, fifty of which shall be returned if the candidate be rejected.

7. During the year there shall be two regular meetings, and two examinations held, beginning on the first Tuesday of May and the last Tuesday of October.

All examinations are held at the College rooms in the New Parliament Buildings, Victoria.

8. Permits are not granted by the Council.

An Act respecting the Profession of Medicine and Surgery.

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, enacts as follows:

SHORT TITLE.

1. This Act may be cited as the "Medical Act, 1898."

ORGANIZATION.

2. The members of the medical profession of British Columbia heretofore incorporated under the name of "The Medical Council of British Columbia," shall be deemed to be and to have been from its first establishment, a body corporate by the name aforesaid, and the said name is hereby changed to that of "The College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia," and under the changed name shall be deemed to be and to have been from its first establishment a body corporate, having perpetual succession and a common seal, with the power to acquire, hold and dispose of chattel property and real estate for the purposes of this Act, and to sue and be sued in the manner usual with such corporations.

3. Every person registered according to the provisions of the "Medical Act," and any other Act of the

Legislature of British Columbia relating to the medical profession shall be a member of the said "The College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia."

4. Every person hereafter registered under the provisions of this Act, shall also be a member of the said College.

COUNCIL.

5. There shall be a Council of the said "The College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia," to be elected in the manner hereinafter provided for in this Act; and referred to in this Act as the "Council."

6. The Council shall be composed of six licensed Medical Practitioners, and no person shall be eligible for election as a member of the Council except he be a practitioner duly registered under this Act, or the Acts mentioned in section 3 of this Act.

7. The manner of holding such election shall, with respect to the time and the taking the votes thereat, be determined by a by-law of the Council, and in default of such by-law the Lieutenant-Governor in Council shall prescribe the time and manner of holding such election or elections.

8. The members of the Council provided for by the sixth section of this Act shall be elected for the period of three years, but any member may resign his appointment at any time by letter addressed to the President or Registrar of the Council.

9. Upon the death or resignation of any member of

the Council it shall be the duty of the Registrar to forthwith cause a new election to be held in such manner as may be provided for by by-law of the Council; such election shall be conducted in accordance with the by-laws and regulations of the Council, but it shall be lawful for the Council during such vacancy to exercise the powers hereinafter mentioned.

10. The persons entitled to vote under this Act at any election shall all be duly registered practitioners, and no member of "The College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia" who is in arrear for his annual fees or any part thereof shall be entitled to vote at elections for members of the Council, or be eligible for election as a member thereof.

11. In the case of any doubt or dispute as to the legality of the election of any member of the Council, it shall be lawful for the Council to hold and decide who is the legally elected member of the Council; and the person whom they decide to have been elected shall be and be deemed to be the member legally elected; and if such election be found to have been illegal, the Council shall have power to order a new election.

OFFICERS.

12. The Council shall annually appoint from amongst themselves a President, Vice-President, a Registrar, a Treasurer and other officers as may from time to time be necessary for the working of this Act, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the Council; and the said Council shall have power to fix by by-law

or from time to time the salaries or fees to be paid to such officers.

13. The Council shall appoint annually from amongst its members an "Executive Committee," to take cognizance of and action upon all such matters as shall be delegated to it by the Council or such as may require immediate interference or attention between the adjournment of the Council and its next meeting, and all such acts shall be valid only until the next ensuing meeting of the Council, but such committee shall have no power to alter, repeal or suspend any by-law of the Council.

MEETINGS.

14. The said elected members of the Council shall make rules and regulations as to the time and place of meeting of the Council and the modes of summoning meetings of the Council, and it shall be lawful for the President thereof, or, in the event of his absence or death, for the Registrar to summon the same at such time and place as to him may seem fit, by circular or letter to be mailed to each member.

15. At least two weeks' notice of a meeting of such Council shall be given, and in the event of the absence of the President from any meeting the Vice-President, or in his absence some other member, to be chosen from among the members present, shall act as President.

16. Four members of the Council shall form a quorum, and all acts of the Council shall be decided by the majority of the members present.

17. The President or Vice-President, when in the chair, and the chairman of any meeting, shall have the right to give a casting vote in addition to the vote otherwise entitled to as a member of the Council.

18. There shall be paid to the members of the Council such fees for attendance (not exceeding twenty dollars per day) and travelling expenses (not exceeding ten cents a mile one way), as may from time to time be fixed by by-law passed by the said Council.

REGISTRAR, REGISTER FEES.

19. The Council shall cause to be kept by an officer appointed by them and to be called the Registrar, a book or register, to be known as "The British Columbia Medical Register," in which shall be entered the name of every person registered according to the provisions of this Act or the Acts mentioned in the third section of this Act, and from time to time the names of all persons who have complied with the enactments hereinafter contained, and with the rules and regulations made or to be made by the Council respecting the qualifications to be required from practitioners of medicine, surgery and midwifery in this Province.

20. Those only whose names are inscribed in the book or register above mentioned, shall be deemed to be qualified and licensed to practise medicine, surgery and midwifery in this Province.

21. Such book or register shall at all times be open and subject to inspection by any duly registered practitioner in British Columbia.

22. Any person duly registered in "The British Columbia Medical Register" under the "Medical Act" or any Acts relating to the medical profession when this Act shall take effect, shall be deemed to be registered under this Act.

23. The Registrar shall, immediately upon his appointment, without the payment of any fee whatever, enter in the register the name of every person mentioned in the third section of this Act, and not already entered therein or duly erased therefrom.

24. Every person who possesses one or more of the following qualifications, shall, upon complying with the requirements hereinafter stated and upon payment of the fees to be fixed for each particular class by by-law of the Council, be entitled to be registered on producing to the Registrar the documents proving such qualifications, and upon payment of the fees fixed by the Council, not to exceed one hundred dollars, that is to say:—

(a) Every person who, upon the coming into force of this Act, was entitled to be so registered.

(b) The Council shall admit upon the register every person mentioned in chapter 48 of the Acts of Parliament of the United Kingdom, passed in the 49th and 50th years of Her Majesty's reign, duly registered under the "Medical Act" [Imperial], prior to and inclusive of the 30th day of June, 1887, upon complying with the orders, regulations or by-laws of the

Council, and giving due proof of such registration, and that the person applying for registration has not lost the benefit of the same by reason of misconduct or otherwise.

[c] The Council shall admit upon the register any person who shall produce from any college or school of medicine and surgery, requiring at least four years course of study, a diploma of qualification, provided that where the college or school of medicine did not require a course of study of at least four years but a post graduate course has been taken which in point of time added to the college or school of medicine course completes a period of four years, it shall be deemed sufficient; provided also that the applicant shall furnish to the Council satisfactory evidence of identification, and pass before the members thereof, or such of them as may be appointed for the purpose, a satisfactory examination touching his fitness and capacity to practise as a physician and surgeon.

(d) Any homœopathic physician holding a diploma of qualification from any authorized school or college requiring at least a four years' course of study, which has been undergone by the applicant may be registered under this Act upon passing before the Council or such of them as may be appointed for that purpose, a satisfactory examination in the following subjects, viz. :—Anatomy, Physiology, Pathology, Chemistry, Obstetrics, and Surgery.

25. It shall be the duty of the Registrar to keep his register correct in accordance with the provisions of this Act, and the rules, orders and regulations of the Council, and he shall from time to time make the necessary alterations in the addresses or qualifications of the persons registered under this Act.

26. The said Registrar shall perform such other duties as may be imposed upon him by the Council.

27. Each member of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia shall pay to the Registrar, or to any person deputed by the Registrar to receive it, such annual fee as may be determined by by-law of the Council, not less than \$2.50 and not more than \$10 00 [ten dollars] toward the general expenses of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia, which annual fees shall be payable on the first day of January, in the year for which the same is imposed, and obtain annually a certificate under the seal of The College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia, stating his qualification to practise, and that the certificate is in force for one year from its date; and such annual fee shall be a debt deemed to be due by the member to the College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia and shall be recoverable with costs of suit in the name of The College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia, in the County Court, Small Debts Court, or other Court having jurisdiction at the place where the member resides.

28. The Council from time to time, as occasion may

require, make orders, regulations or by-laws for regulating the register to be kept under this Act, and the fee to be paid for registration.

29. Every person registered under this Act who obtains a higher degree, or any qualification other than the qualification in respect of which he has been registered, shall be entitled to have such higher degree or additional qualification inserted in the register, in substitution for, or in addition to the qualification previously registered, on the payment of such fees as the Council may appoint.

30. No qualification shall be entered on the register, either on the first registration or by way of addition to a registered name, unless the Registrar be satisfied, by proper evidence, that the person claiming it is entitled to it; and any appeal from the decision of the Registrar may be decided by the Council.

31. In the event of the Registrar being dissatisfied with the evidence adduced by the person claiming to be registered, he shall have the power, subject to an appeal to the Council, of refusing the said registration until the person claiming to be registered has furnished proper evidence, duly attested by oath or affirmation, before the Judge of any County Court.

32. If the Registrar make or cause to be made any wilful falsification in any matter relating to the register, he shall incur a penalty of fifty dollars and shall be disqualified from again holding that position.

FORFEITURE OF RIGHT OF REGISTRATION—ERASURE
OF NAMES.

33. Any entry in the register, proved to the satisfaction of the Council to have been fraudulently or incorrectly made, may be erased from the register by an order in writing of the Council.

34. If any person procure, or cause to be procured, his registration under this Act, by means of any false or fraudulent representations or declaration, either verbally or in writing, it shall be lawful for the Registrar, upon the receipt of sufficient evidence of the falsity or fraudulent character of said representations or declaration, to represent the matter to the Council, and upon the written order of the President, attested by the seal of The College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia, to erase the name of such person from the register, and to make known the fact and cause of such erasure by notice to be published in the British Columbia Gazette, and after such notice has appeared, the person whose name has been erased as aforesaid, shall cease to be a member of The College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia, and shall cease to enjoy any of the privileges enjoyed or conferred by registration under this Act at any future time without the express sanction of the Council.

35. Any registered medical practitioner who, either before or after the passing of this Act, and either before or after he is so registered, has been convicted in any Court of any felony or misdemeanor, shall thereby forfeit the right to registration, and by direction of the

Council his name shall be erased from the register ; and in case a person known to have been convicted of a felony or misdemeanor present himself for registration, the Registrar shall have the power to refuse such registration; and if any person registered under this Act shall, after due inquiry by the Council, be adjudged to have been guilty of infamous or unprofessional conduct in any respect, the Council may, if they see fit, direct the Registrar to erase the name of such person from the register.

36. The Council may, and upon the application of any three registered medical practitioners, shall cause inquiry to be made into the case of a person alleged to be liable to have his name erased under the last preceding section, and on proof of such conviction, or of such infamous or unprofessional conduct, shall cause the name of such person to be erased from the register.

Provided that the name of a person shall not be erased under this or the last preceding section on account of his adopting or refraining from adopting the practice of any particular theory of medicine or surgery, nor on account of a conviction for a political offence out of Her Majesty's dominion, nor on account of a conviction for an offence which, though within the provisions of the last preceding section, ought not, in the opinion of the Council or the committee hereinafter named, either from the trivial nature of the offence or from the circumstances under which it was committed, to disqualify a person from practicing medicine or surgery.

37. The Council may order to be paid out of any funds at their disposal such costs as to them may seem just to any person against whom any complaint has been made, which, when finally determined, is found to have been frivolous and vexatious.

38. Where the Council direct the erasure from the register of the name of any person or of any other entry, the name of that person or that entry shall not be again entered on the register, except by the direction of the Council, or by the order of a Judge of the Supreme Court.

39. If the Council think fit, in any case, they may direct the Registrar to restore to the register any name or entry erased therefrom, either without fee, or on payment of such fee, not exceeding the registration fee, as the Council may from time to time fix, and the Registrar shall restore the same accordingly.

40. The Council shall, for the purpose of exercising, in any case, the powers of erasing from and restoring to the register the name of any person or any entry, ascertain the facts of such case by a committee of their own body not exceeding five in number, of whom the quorum shall be not less than three; and a written report of the committee may be acted upon as to the facts therein stated for the purpose of the exercise of the said powers by the Council.

41. The Council shall from time to time appoint, and shall always maintain a committee for the purposes of the six last preceding sections, and, subject to the

provisions of this Act, may from time to time determine the constitution and the number and tenure of office of the members of the committee.

42. The committee shall meet from time to time for the dispatch of business, and, subject to the provisions of this Act and of any regulations from time to time made by the Council, may regulate the summoning, notice, place, management and adjournment of such meetings, the appointment of a chairman, the mode of deciding questions, and generally the transaction and management of business, including the quorum; and if there be a quorum the committee may act, notwithstanding any vacancy in their body. In case of any vacancy the committee may appoint a member of the Council to fill the vacancy until the next meeting of the Council.

43. The committee under the four last preceding sections may, for the purpose of the execution of their duties under this Act, employ at the expense of the Council such legal or other assessor or assistant as the committee may think necessary or proper, and the person whose conduct is the subject of inquiry shall also have the right to be represented by counsel.

44. At least one week before the first meeting of the committee to be held for taking the evidence or otherwise ascertaining the facts, a notice shall be served upon the person whose conduct is the subject of inquiry, and such notice shall embody a copy of the charges made against him, or a statement of the subject matter of the inquiry, and shall also specify the time and place

of such meeting. The testimony of witnesses shall be taken under oath, which the chairman, or acting chairman of the committee is hereby authorized to administer, and there shall be full right to cross-examine all witnesses called, and to call evidence in defence and reply. In the event of the non-attendance of the person whose conduct is the subject of such inquiry, the committee may, upon proof of personal service of the notice aforesaid in accordance with the provisions of this section, which proof of service may be by statutory declaration, proceed with the subject matter of the inquiry in his absence, and make their report of the facts without further notice to such person.

APPEAL.

45. No action shall be brought against the Council or the said committee for anything done *bonâ fide* under this Act, notwithstanding any want of form in the proceedings; but any person whose name has been ordered to be erased from the register may appeal from the decision of the Council to any Judge of the Supreme Court of British Columbia, at any time within six months from the date of the order for such erasure, and such Judge may, upon the hearing of such appeal, make such order as to the restoration of the name so erased, or confirming such erasure, or for further inquiries by the committee or Council into the facts of the case, and as to costs, as to such Judge shall seem right in the premises.

46. The appeal may be by summons served upon the Registrar to show cause, and shall be founded up-

on a copy of the proceedings, before the committee, the evidence taken, the committee's report, and the order of the Council in the matter, certified by the Registrar; and the Registrar shall, upon the request of any such person desiring to appeal, furnish to any such person a certified copy of all proceedings, reports, orders and papers upon which the committee have acted in making the order complained of.

EVIDENCE OF REGISTRATION.

47. In any trial under this act the burden of proof as to registration shall be upon the person charged.

48. In all cases where proof of registration under this Act is required to be made, the production of a certificate that the person or persons therein named is or are duly registered, certified under the hand of the Registrar of the Council and the seal of the College for the time being, shall be sufficient evidence of such registration in lieu of the production of the original register; and any such certificate purporting to be signed by any person in the capacity of the Registrar of the Council under this Act shall be prima facie evidence that such person is such Registrar without any proof of his signature or of his being in fact such Registrar.

49. The Registrar of the Council shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Council, cause to be printed and published a correct register in the form set forth in the first schedule of this Act, or to the like effect, of the names of all persons appearing on the register, as existing on the day of publication, in alpha-

betical order according to their surnames, with their respective residences, and together with the medical titles, diplomas and qualification conferred by any College or body, and the date thereof.

50. A copy of such register for the time being purporting to be so printed and published as aforesaid shall be prima facie evidence in all Courts, and before all Justices of the Peace and others, that the persons therein specified are registered according to the provisions of this Act.

51. In the case of any person whose name does not appear in such copy, a certified copy under the hand of the Registrar of the Council and the said seal of the said College, of the entry of the name of such person on the register shall be evidence that such person is registered under the provisions of this Act.

52. Except as in the last preceding section mentioned, the absence of the name of any person from such copy shall be prima facie evidence that such person is not registered according to the provisions of this Act.

EFFECT OF REGISTRATION OR NON-REGISTRATION.

53. Every person registered under the provisions of this Act shall be entitled, according to his qualification or qualifications, to practice medicine, surgery or midwifery, or any of them, as the case may be, in the Province of British Columbia, and to demand and recover in any Court of law, with full costs of suit, rea-

sonable charges for professional aid, advice and visits, and the cost of any medicine or other medical appliances rendered or supplied by him to his patients.

54. Any person entitled to be registered under this Act, but who neglects or omits to be so registered, shall not be entitled to any of the rights or privileges conferred by registration under the provisions of this Act, so long as such neglect or omission continues; and he shall be liable to all the penalties imposed by this Act, or by any other Act in force against such unqualified or unregistered practitioners.

55. It shall not be lawful for any person not registered to practise medicine, surgery or midwifery for hire, gain or hope of reward.

56. No person shall be entitled to recover any charge in any court of law for any medical or surgical advice, or for attendance, or for the performance of any operation, or for any medicine that he may have prescribed or supplied, unless he be registered under this Act; but this section shall not extend to the sale of any drug or medicine by any duly licensed chemist or druggist.

57. No person shall be appointed as a medical officer, physician or surgeon in any branch of the public service of this Province, or in any hospital or other charitable institution, unless he be registered under the provisions of this Act.

58. No certificate required by any Act now in force, or that may hereafter be passed, from any physician or

surgeon or medical practitioner shall be valid unless the person signing the same be registered under this Act.

59. The expression "legally qualified medical practitioner," or the expression "duly qualified medical practitioner," or any other words or expression importing legal recognition of any person as a medical practitioner or member of the medical profession, when used in any Act or law shall, in so far as such Act or law applies to this Province, be construed to mean a person registered under this Act.

60. Every person who shall be registered under the provisions of this Act shall be exempt, if he so desire, from serving on all juries and inquests whatsoever.

61. No duly registered member of The College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia shall be liable in any action for negligence or malpractice by reason of professional services requested or rendered, unless such action be commenced within one year from the date when, in the matter complained of, such professional services are terminated.

OFFENCES AND PENALTIES.

62. If any person wilfully procure, or attempt to procure, himself to be registered under this Act by making any false or fraudulent representation or declaration, either verbally or in writing, he shall, on conviction thereof before any Justice of the Peace, incur a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars; and every

person knowingly aiding or assisting him therein shall, on conviction thereof, incur a penalty of not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars for each offence.

63. If any person not registered pursuant to this Act, for hire, gain or hope of reward practise or profess to practise medicine, surgery or midwifery, or advertise to give advice in medicine, surgery or midwifery, he shall, upon a summary conviction thereof before any Justice of the Peace, for any and every such offence pay a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars.

64. Any person who wilfully or falsely pretends to be a physician, doctor of medicine, surgeon or general practitioner, or assumes any title, addition or description other than he actually possesses and is legally entitled to, shall be liable, on conviction thereof before a Justice of the Peace, to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars nor less than ten dollars.

65. Any person not registered pursuant to this Act, who takes or uses any name, title, addition or description implying or calculated to lead people to infer that he is registered under this Act, or that he is recognized by law as a physician, surgeon, accoucher, or a licentiate in medicine, surgery or midwifery, shall be liable, upon a summary conviction thereof before a Justice of the Peace, to pay a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars nor less than twenty-five dollars.

66. All penalties recoverable under this Act shall be paid to the convicting Justice, and by him be paid

to the Registrar of the Council, and shall form part of the funds thereof.

67. Any prosecution under this Act may be brought or heard before any one or more of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace having jurisdiction where any such offence has been committed; and such Justice or Justices may award a payment of costs in addition to the penalty; and in case the penalty and costs awarded by him or them be not, upon conviction, forthwith paid, he or they may commit the offender to the common gaol, there to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding one month, unless the penalty and costs be sooner paid.

68. All prosecutions against anyone acting in contravention of the provisions of this Act shall take place in accordance with the "Summary Convictions Act," and any Act or Acts amending the same.

69. Any person may be prosecutor or complainant under this Act, and the Council may allot such portion of the penalties recovered as may be expedient towards the payment of such prosecution.

70. Every prosecution under this Act shall be commenced within six months from the date of the alleged offence.

71. Any person convicted under this Act who gives notice of appeal against the decision of the convicting Justice shall be required, before being released from custody, to give the said Justice satisfactory security

for the amount of the penalty and the costs of conviction and appeal.

72. The Council, by an order signed by the President, having the seal of the Council appended thereto, may stay proceedings in any prosecution under this Act where it is deemed expedient.

MONEYS.

73. All moneys forming part of the Council funds shall be paid to the Treasurer, and may be applied to carry this Act into execution.

SUBJECTS FOR ANATOMY.

74. The body of any person found dead, publicly exposed, or who immediately before death had been supported in and by any public hospital receiving pecuniary aid from the Government of this Province, shall, unless the person so dying otherwise directs, be delivered to persons qualified as hereinafter mentioned for the purposes of dissection. But if such body be claimed within the usual period of interment by bona fide friends or relatives, the body shall be delivered to them, or if the person otherwise directed, as aforesaid, before death, the body shall be decently interred.

75. The persons qualified to receive such unclaimed bodies shall be such medical practitioners as are duly qualified to practise, and are actually practising under the provisions of this Act, who may require such bodies for dissection, either for their own improvement or the

instruction of any student or students under them, or to the teachers of surgery and anatomy in any public or private school, college, society, or faculty of medicine or surgery, that may hereafter be established in this Province.

76. The person in charge of any and every public hospital as aforesaid, the Coroner of each district, shall forward to the Registrar-General of Titles the name, age, sex, birth-place [if it can be ascertained], and date of death of all unclaimed bodies given up by them respectively, for dissection under this Act, within one week from the time of giving up such bodies as aforesaid.

77. It shall be the duty of the Registrar-General of Titles to enter in a book to be kept for that purpose by him, the name and residence of all medical practitioners qualified to receive and desirous of receiving bodies for dissection, and also to enter from the returns forwarded to him by the person or persons in charge of the public hospitals, and of the Coroners, in a register to be kept for that purpose, the name, age, sex, birth-place, and date of death of all persons mentioned in such returns, with the name and place of residence of the practitioner to whom the body was delivered as aforesaid.

78. Such returns, book and register, shall be open at all reasonable hours for the inspection of any medical practitioner who may desire to inspect the same, on payment of a fee of fifty cents.

79. The person or persons in charge of the public hospitals as aforesaid, and the Coroners, shall make an impartial distribution of the bodies in rotation, according to the actual wants of the claimants.

80. On delivery of every such unclaimed body as aforesaid, the person or persons in charge of the hospital, or the Coroner, as the case may be, shall take from the medical practitioner receiving the body a receipt in the Form A in the Second Schedule to this Act, and such practitioner shall pay the sum of ten dollars to the person from whom he receives the body, and takes a receipt therefor in the Form B in the said Second Schedule, and such sum shall, in every case be applied towards the support and maintenance of the public hospitals in the Province.

81. The Coroner who presides at the inquest on any body found publicly exposed, and unclaimed by bona fide friends or relatives, shall deliver up the body to any medical practitioner (on application by him), duly qualified by him to receive the same under this Act.

82. Every medical practitioner wishing to avail himself of the benefits of the nine last preceding sections of this Act, shall appear before the Registrar-General of Titles, and give security himself in the sum of one hundred dollars, and two sureties in the sum of fifty dollars each, for the decent interment of the bodies after they have served the purposes required.

83. The "Medical Act" is hereby repealed.

An Act to Amend the "Medical Act, 1898."

27th FEBRUARY, 1899.

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, enacts as follows:—

I. Section 57 of chapter 9 of the Statutes of 1898, is hereby amended by adding thereto—

"or hold an interim certificate of qualification, which certificate shall be granted by the Executive Committee of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia, if requested by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, in respect of a medical appointment to the Provincial Public service. In such case, such certificate shall hold good until the next regular examination of the said College of Physicians and Surgeons, and shall carry with it all the rights and privileges of a registration under the provisions of this Act for the time covered by the said interim certificate."

ANATOMY.

Examiner: J. M. LEFEVRE, M. D., C. M.

1. Describe the temporo-maxillary articulation.
2. Give the attachments, relations, actions, blood and nerve supply of the deltoid muscle.
3. The course, relations, branches of the axillary artery. How would you indicate its course on the surface of the body? In case of ligature of the vessel in the first part of its course how would the circulation in the limb be maintained?
4. Anatomy of the adult duodenum—including its course, relations, nerve and blood supply. Describe briefly its mucuous lining and the manner in which the bile and pancreatic ducts open into it.
5. Describe the dissection necessary to expose the contents of the orbit. Give the nerve supply of the muscles of the eyeball, and describe the ophthalmic ganglion.
6. Describe the anatomy of the tunica vaginalis. How is it developed and how is its descent into the scrotum effected in the foetus.

1. What are the chief constituents of air? Give a method for recognizing each constituent in pure and impure air.

4. What is meant by the terms "acid," "base," "salt," "acid salt." Name any four acids and give tests for each.
5. What is glycerine, and how is it obtained?

Examiner: DR. C. J. FAGAN.

1. How would you produce diaphoresis? Give doses of medicines used for the above. Write a prescription for a diaphoretic mixture.
2. Classify Cathartics, giving examples of each class, and state how they produce their effects.
3. Write a four ounce prescription with directions for dispensing, etc., containing arsenic and strychnine.
4. Discuss the value of: "Quinine," "Aconite," and "Pilocarpine," as antipyretics, and state how each produces its effect.
5. Transpose the following prescription into one according to the metric system.
