A. Parr; Second Lieut. David Collins: Sailing Master, George Robertson,-and a crew of eleven men. It also contained instructions for them to proceed to New York, and "on arrival there engage passage on board the steamer and use your own discretion as to the proper time and place of capture. As soon as the capture was made known to the Federal authorities. several war vessels were sent from New York and Boston in pursuit of the Chesapeake. AMERICAN INTELLIGENCE.

The President's Message was delivered to Federal Congress on the 9th inst. In reference to the naval branch of the service, President Lincoln remarks:

"The extensive blockade has been constantly increasing in efficiency. the Navy has expanded, yet on so long a line it has so far been impossible to entirely suppress illicit trade. From the returns received at the Navy Department it appears that more than one thousand vessels have been captured since the blockade was instituted, and that the value of prizes already sent in for adjudication amounts to over thirteen millions of dollars.
