It is supprosed loy these that the recent decision of the Supreme Court of Canada in reference to the Scott Temperance Act will render void all the laws for the suppression of the liquor traffic which haveloeen passed by the Local House during the past few years.

In either case this is requisite, as in the former, if the Local License Law is invalid, then the sooner the art is passed in this county the leetter for the people. act is an improvement over the present license laws and action taken accordingly: We are convinced that if Hants Combty were allowed to vote on this question, it would pass with an overwhelming majority.
