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DIOCESE OF QUEBEC.

VISITATION OF THE LORD BISHOP.

On Wednesday, 2nd inst., the Lord Bishop of Quebec held his triennial Visitation at the Cathedral. The proceedings of the day were opened with early prayers (as daily accustomed) at All Saints' Chapel, which were said by the Rev. Official Mackie, D. D., the lessons being read by the Rev. Armine Mountain. The service in the Cathedral commenced at ten o'clock, when the Litany was read by the Rev. E. W. Sewell, the Anté-Communion Service by the Rev. S. S. Wood, M. A., Rector of Three Rivers and Chaplain to the Lord Bishop, and the Epistle by the Rev. G. M. Ross, Rector of Drummondville. The Rev. J. H. Nicolls, M. A., Principal of Bishop's College, preached the sermon from Hebrews xiii, part of verse 10, at the conclusion of which the Lord Bishop, attended by his four Chaplains, entered within the Communion rails, and took his seat in the Episcopal Chair. The Clergy were then desired to come forward and answer to their names, being present to the number of thirty-six, four having been excused from attendance for urgent reasons. His Lordship then delivered his charge, which is shortly to be published at the request of the Clergy. After the delivery of the charge, the Holy Communion was administered to the Clergy and some of the laity by the Bishop, assisted by three Chaplains.

In the afternoon, the Clergy, for all of whom accommodation had been provided in private families in Quebec and Pointe Levi, assembled at the residence of the Bishop, and partook of a cold collation, after which some matters of general interest were discussed.

ANNIVERSARY MEETING OF THE CHURCH SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of the Church Society was held in the evening at the National School House, which was crowded in every part by a highly respectable and attentive audience, who manifested, throughout, the greatest interest in the proceedings. The Lord Bishop took the Chair, the Clergy, in their gowns, being seated on his right, and the Lay Delegates who had been chosen to represent the different parishes and missions, as well as the Anniversary Meeting, as in proceedings to be taken with reference to the Clergy Reserves, on his left. A large number of delegates were assembled, whose presence added much to the interest of the meeting.

His Lordship, having requested the Rev. Official Mackie, D. D., to read the usual prayers, gave some information, in the course of his opening address, with reference to the Clergy Reserves, which were to be made the subject of some of the proceedings, and then called upon the Secretary (the Rev. W. Wickes, A. M.) to read the Annual Report. The Report, which was of a very encouraging character, is now in the press.

His Lordship stated that letters, expressive of regret at being unavoidably prevented from attending the Meeting, had been received from two gentlemen who had taken charge of Resolutions to be brought forward, the Honorable W. Walker, and Edward Hale, of Portneuf.

After the reading of the Report, it was moved by the Rev. S. S. Wood, M. A., Rector of Three Rivers, seconded by T. Triggs, Esq., Delegate from Nicolet, (in the absence of the Hon. W. Walker,) and Resolved,

1. That the Report now read be received and adopted, and printed under the direction of the Central Board.

Moved by Rev. D. Falloon, D. D., of Melbourne, seconded by Rev. Official Mackie, D. D., and Resolved,

2. That this meeting desires to express its devout thankfulness to the Giver of all good, for the continuance of His blessing upon the labours of the Society, and would see in the renewed encouragement thus afforded, an incentive to renewed exertion.

Moved by the Rev. I. Hellmuth, of Sherbrooke, seconded by the Rev. C. P. Reid, of Compton, and Resolved,

3. That this Meeting desires to express its thankful sense of the benefits, which promise to accrue to the Church from the recent division of the Diocese of Quebec, and the manner in which that arrangement has been effected; and at the same time to signify its cordial interest in the success of the sister Association formed within that Diocese, as well as of the corresponding Institutions in the other Dioceses adjoining.

Moved by Rev. Principal Nicolls, seconded by H. S. Scott, Esq., and Resolved,

4. That we rejoice in the joy of the benevolent Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts upon occasion of its third Jubilee celebration, and respectfully request the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, to carry out the designs recommended by our Metropolitan, the President of the Society, and in particular, to cause that sermons be preached throughout the Diocese on Advent Sunday next, in aid of the various objects contemplated by the Society—the proceeds of such sermons to be forwarded to England, in dutiful acknowledgment of what we owe to the Society, and of the interest with which we regard its labors of love.

Moved by J. B. Forsyth, (in the absence of Hon. E. Hale, of Portneuf,) seconded by Hon. E. Hale, of Sherbrooke, and Resolved,

5. That this meeting, while it desires to express its deep and poignant sense of the injustice attempted against the Church in the Colony, in the proposed measure for the alienation of the Clergy Reserves, and of the disastrous consequences to Religion, which the execution of that measure would involve, would appeal to all the Members of the Church, to recognize the call which lies upon them for using their utmost exertions to resist the said measure.

Moved by Rev. A. Balfour, of Kingsey, seconded by Robt. Hamilton, Esq., (delegate from New Liverpool,) and Resolved,

6. That the thanks of this Society be given to its Officers, and those of the different District Associations, for their zealous and efficient discharge of their respective duties during the past year.

Moved by Rev. E. C. Parkin, of Valcartier, seconded by W. Jenkins, Esq. (delegate from Pointe Levi,) and Resolved,

7. That the following gentlemen be elected members of the Corporation:

The Revds. W. King, and S. H. Simpson; Lieut. Ashe, R. N.; Professor Chapman of Bishop's College; and E. Burstall, J. Young, W. G. Ross, W. Andrew, A. T. Galt, R. Roberts, H. N. Jones, and E. Jones, Esquires.

Moved by Rev. J. Carry, seconded by J. Maclaren, Esq., and Resolved,

8. That the following gentlemen be requested to accept office as Vice-Presidents of the Society for the ensuing year: The Honbles. Messrs. Chief Justice Bowen, and Justice Meredith, the Honbles. H. Black, J. M. Fraser, E. Hale, Senr., E. Hale, Junr., G. Pomberton, J. Stewart, and W. Walker; Lieut. Colonel Streatfeild, R. E.; and the Revds. Official Mackie, D. D., S. S. Wood, M. A., and J. H. Nicolls, M. A.; and that the Central Board consist of the Rev. A. W. Mountain, and Wm. Andrew, D. Burnet, A. Campbell, T. Cary, J. B. Forsyth, N. Freer, H. LeMesurier, J. Maclaren, C. N. Montizambert, W. Petry, H. S. Scott, J. A. Sewell, M. D., J. Sealy, J. Von Exter, J. W. Leaycraft, and R. Hamilton, Esquires, in addition to the ex-officio members.

Mr. Scott then gave notice that at the next meeting of the Society, he will move that the word "Thursday," be substituted for the word "Friday," in Article ix., and the words "10th January," inserted before "15th May," and also that Article viii., which fixes the qualification for Membership at 25s. Annual Subscription, be amended by substituting 10s. for 25s.

It was then moved by Rev. W. Wickes, seconded by Rev. C. P. Reid, and Resolved,

That a Committee be appointed to revise the By-Laws of the Society, and particularly to consider the expediency of reducing the qualification for Membership, and that this Committee consist of the Rev. E. Sewell, the Rev. W. King, J. B. Forsyth, (Chairman,) and H. S. Scott, Esquires, and the Treasurer and Secretary of the Society, and be directed to report to the next Meeting of the Society.

In the course of the proceedings, the Secretary read a letter from the Rev. W. Bond, Secretary of the Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal, expressing the interest felt by that body in the prosperity of the Church Society of the sister Diocese, and communicating a Resolution of the Society to that effect.

The Doxology having been sung, the Meeting was dismissed with the benediction by the Lord Bishop.

MEETING OF THE CLERGY AND LAY DELEGATES.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates who had been requested to accompany them for the special purpose of considering what further action might be taken with regard to the preservation of the Clergy Reserves, met at the National School House, Quebec, at half past six, P. M., on Wednesday, 2nd July. The Minutes are given below, as well as the Circular of the Lord Bishop, suggesting the appointment of Delegates.

The Lord Bishop having taken the chair, directed the Rev. A. W. Mountain, to call over the names of the Delegates, which having been done, it was moved by the Rev. Dr. Falloon, seconded by Rev. Charles Reid, and Resolved, That the Rev. Armine Mountain be appointed Clerical Secretary of the Meeting.

Moved by T. Triggs, Esq., Delegate from Nicolet, seconded by H. N. Patton, Esq., Delegate from Pointe Levi, and Resolved, That the Hon. Edward Hale, of Sherbrooke, be appointed Lay Secretary of the Meeting.

These gentlemen having accepted their respective appointments, it was further Resolved, That the Secretaries be appointed a Committee to act in concert with the Lord Bishop, in preparing Resolutions for an adjourned meeting, to be held to-morrow, at ten o'clock, A. M.

The meeting then adjourned.

Thursday, 3rd July, 1851.

Divine Service was held in All Saints' Chapel, at half past seven, A. M., when the Rev. Gilbert Percy, B. A., said prayers, and Rev. H. Burges, B. A., read the lessons.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates re-assembled, by adjournment from yesterday evening, at the National School House, Quebec, at ten o'clock, A. M.

The Lord Bishop of Quebec presided.

The Meeting having been opened with prayer, the minutes of the meeting of yesterday were read.

The names of the Clergy and Lay Delegates were called over.

It was then moved by the Rev. George M. Ross, Rector of Drummondville, seconded by John B. Paddon, Esq., Delegate from Lennoxville, supported by John U. Ritter, Esq., Delegate from Three Rivers, and unanimously Resolved,

1. That the Bishop, and Clergy of the Diocese of Quebec, and the Laity of the same, being represented by the Delegates attending, by desire of the Bishop, the Anniversary Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society, do solemnly protest against the alienation of the Clergy Reserves, for any other than their original purpose, and do hold the same to involve a violation of the principles of the British Constitution, a dangerous infringement of vested interests, a departure from the pledges virtually given by Act of Parliament to the Church, and a most injurious deprivation of means provided by the pious munificence of the Imperial Government, for the extension of Religion, and specially for fulfilling the great and solemn duty of preaching the gospel to the poor.

It was moved by the Rev. H. Burges, B. A., of Nicolet, seconded by James Armstrong, Esq., Delegate from Rivière du Loup en haut, supported by George Chapman, Esq., Delegate from Pointe Levi, and unanimously Resolved,

2. That no class or condition of persons in this Province can be endangered in estate or conscience, by the maintenance of this religious property for its original purpose.

It was moved by the Rev. John Kemp, of Bury, seconded by Mr. Simon Gavin, Delegate from Dudswell, supported by Mr. Joseph Rockingham, Delegate from Inverness, and unanimously Resolved,

3. That any measure framed with the view of diverting this property from its original purpose, is to be regarded as erroneous in its general principle, and fraught with alarming evils to this Diocese in particular, inasmuch as the settlements opened from year to year within the limits of Lower Canada, and especially within that portion of it which constitutes the Diocese of Quebec, afford no adequate resources whatever for the support of the Ministry of the Gospel among the inhabitants, who, if deprived of the benefit of such an endowment, will be left as sheep without a shepherd, and will present a spectacle of reproach to a Christian country.

It was moved by the Rev. John Dalziel, of Eaton, seconded by Eleazar Clark, Esq., Delegate from Sherbrooke, supported by Mr. Hugh Russell, Delegate from St. Margarets, and unanimously Resolved,

5. That a Petition embodying the views now expressed as the solemn opinion of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Quebec, in special meeting assembled, be presented to the Provincial Parliament during the present or ensuing session, and be also transmitted to the Queen, and to the other branches of the Imperial Legislature: 't' at the Revds. Official Mackie, D. D., E. W. Sewell, and A. W. Mountain; The Honorables William Walker, and Edward Hale, of Sherbrooke, and Horatio Nelson Patton, Esq., be a Committee to draft the same, in conformity with these views; and that the Lord Bishop of Quebec be authorized to sign and transmit it, as hereinbefore directed on behalf of this meeting.

The benediction having been pronounced, the meeting then adjourned.

(CIRCULAR.)

Quebec, 26th MAY, 1851.

REV. AND DEAR SIR,

Although the threatened measure for the spoliation of the Clergy-Reserves does not appear to be very closely impending,—since no intimation has been yet received of any such action taken by the Imperial Parliament, now in Session, as would enable the Provincial Legislature to deal with the subject,—yet it would be matter of regret to lose the opportunity of the meeting of the Clergy (of which you have been notified) in triennial Visitation, conspiring, as it does, with the Anniversary Meeting of the Church Society, to make a proper demonstration against a project so distinctly oppressive in its character, and so fraught with calamity to the interests of Religion.

I trust that the laity of the Diocese are alive to the magnitude of the mischief with which we are menaced, and the extent of spiritual privation which it would inflict upon our people in the scattered and backward settlements of this Diocese, where our Church has preached the Gospel to the poor. Even where the country congregations are able in some little measure to contribute to the moderate and frugal support of the holy Ministry, it is well known to all persons who have opportunities of information, that they cannot do so unaided. It is equally well known that the generous Society for the Propagation of the Gospel which has fostered the Church throughout the Colonies, has been compelled, under the pressure of still extending demands upon its resources, to commence a system of gradual reduction and final extinction of the charges upon its funds, for the North American Church.

Under such circumstances as these, the lay-members of our communion, will, it can be little doubted, feelingly recognize the call which lies upon them to do all which God shall enable them to do to save from confiscation the slender patrimony of the Church in the Diocese, and to avert the reproach which will be slung back upon them by their suffering posterity, if they fail manfully to stand forward in defence of that endowment which cannot—we may proclaim it before the world—which cannot be wrested from us without exposing the authors and abettors of the measure to the charge of making an open assault upon the cause of Religion, and involving themselves in a violation of public faith. Let us only hope and pray that they may themselves be brought to see the proceeding in this its true character, before it be too late.

In this crisis, then, of our affairs, I have to request that you will propose either to the Church-Wardens of the Church or the several Churches which you may individually serve, or else to such other fitting representatives of our ecclesiastical interests, (being communicants of the Church,) as may be chosen by yourself and your congregation or congregations, two representing each, to accompany you when you attend the Visitation, in order to take part in the quality of Delegates for the defence of the Church patrimony, in that portion of the proceedings of the Anniversary Meeting above-mentioned, which will specially relate to the subject of the Clergy-Reserves, and, if need be, to assist in prosecution of any ulterior movement relative to that subject, upon which the meeting may agree.

CENTRAL BOARD.

Quebec, July 14th, 1851.

At the stated Meeting of the Central Board held this day, Present, the Lord Bishop of Quebec (in the Chair), the Revs. Official Mackie, D. D., D. Falloon, D. D., W. King, S. S. Wood, R. Lewis, T. Pennefather, A. W. Mountain, J. H. Nicolls, C. P. Reid, H. G. Burrage, S. H. Simpson, and J. Torrance; Lieut. Col. Streetfield, R. E; and C. N. Montizambert, Esquire.

The Meeting was opened by the usual form of prayer.
The resolution of the Annual Meeting of the Society appointing the Central Board was read: and the minutes of the last two Meetings.

The Report of the Auditors appointed by the last Meeting to audit the accounts of the late Treasurer, (W. Bennett, Esq.) was laid on the table. The Report stated that the books had been examined, and were found to agree with the Vouchers, and that the Securities, Deeds, and cash, belonging to the Society had been duly transferred to the present Treasurer, (R. Symes, Esquire.)

A letter of thanks from the Rev. W. King, for the grant made to the stone Church at Fief Cumberland, was submitted to the Board.

The Report of the Finance Committee was then read, and it was moved by C. N. Montizambert, Esq., seconded by the Rev. R. G. Plees, and Resolved that this Report be received, and considered clause by clause.

Clause 1, recommended that £50 be granted to the Montreal Diocesan Female School, on the understanding that the Clergy of this Diocese have the same privileges as those of the Diocese of Montreal.

The Rev. A. W. Mountain moved, seconded by the Rev. R. G. Plees, that the Rev. J. Flanagan be requested to convey to Mrs. Roles, the sense entertained by the Board of the liberality of her offer, but at the same to express their regret that the present state of the funds of the Society, viewed in connection with the actual number of Clergy in the Diocese, who would be likely to avail themselves of the benefits offered by the Diocesan Female School at Montreal, does not justify the Board in making a grant to that Institution.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. Official Mackie, D. D., seconded by Rev. W. Wickes,

That the recommendation of the Finance Committee be adopted. Carried.

Clause 2, recommended that £25 be granted towards the purchase of a Parsonage and Glebe at Melbourne, to be paid as soon as the property is secured to the Church.

The Rev. Dr. Falloon stated that, unless a much larger grant were made by the Board, the idea of effecting the purchase would have to be abandoned by the congregation at Melbourne.

It was then moved by the Rev. W. Wickes, seconded by Rev. W. King,

That, in consideration of the valuable nature of the property which it is proposed to purchase, and the eligible offer made by the vendor thereof, £60 be granted, on the condition recommended by the Finance Committee, and in the hope that every exertion will be made by the Congregation at Melbourne, to make the amount of Annual Subscriptions to the Society as large as possible.

Moved in amendment by Rev. Principal Nicolls, seconded by C. N. Montizambert, Esquire,

That should the Congregation at Melbourne be unable to raise a sufficient sum to secure the said property, it be purchased by the Society, upon the terms on which it has been offered to the Congregation.

Amendment carried.

Clause 2, stated that an application from the Rev. A. Balfour, Kingsey, for aid towards repairing the steeple of the Church at Kingsey, and painting the Building, could not be favorably entertained by the Committee, in consequence of a grant having been made, so recently as 1849, towards needful repairs of the Church.

Clause 3, stated that a further application had been received from the same gentleman, for aid towards establishing a Church School in the same mission, but that the Committee could recommend nothing, from the absence of specific information on the subject.

Clause 4, recommended £25 towards the erection of a Parsonage at Sandy Beach, Gaspé District, one half to be paid as soon as it is ascertained that the site is properly secured to the Church, and the other when the building is roofed in.

Agreed to.

Clause 5, recommending that £20 be granted towards the erection of a Parsonage at Gaspé Basin, on the same conditions, having been read,

It was moved by Rev. J. Torrance, seconded by Rev. T. Pennefather, that the sum recommended be increased to £25.

Motion lost. Recommendation of the Committee agreed to.

Clause 6, to the effect that £35 be granted towards the completion of a new Stone Church, in Frampton East, (to replace the one that was burnt down last year,) was then read,

When it was moved by the Rev. W. Wickes, seconded by Rev. A. W. Mountain, that the amount recommended by the Committee be granted, but that £17 10 be paid immediately, and £17 10 when the building is roofed in.

Carried.

The Report of the Committee appointed to consider the application of the Rev. Principal Nicolls for aid towards establishing a Book and Tract Depository in Lennoxville, and to correspond with the Diocesan Committee of Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, with a view to the junction of the same with the Church Society was read, and

The Rev. R. G. Plees moved, seconded by Rev. Official Mackie, that this Report be received, and considered clause by clause.

The several clauses were agreed to, and it was moved by Rev. Official Mackie, seconded by C. N. Montizambert, Esq., that £25 be placed annually at the disposal of the Depository Committee.

The Rev. W. Wickes, seconded by Rev. J. Torrance, brought forward the motion (of which he had previously given notice,) that the Resolution forbidding loans be rescinded, as far as it affects the case of newly ordained Clergymen. Carried.

The Rev. Principal Nicolls moved, seconded by Rev. R. G. Plees, and it was Resolved,

That a sum not exceeding £25 be lent to any newly ordained Missionary, (who may apply for such a loan to the Central Board, through the Finance Committee,) repayable in two half-yearly instalments.

The Secretary then drew the attention of the Board to the balance of the Treasurer's account, as shewn by his books, viz: £248 17 2 on account of the General Purposes, and £18 3 10½ on account of Widows' and Orphans' Fund, (£12 10 of the first named amount having been specially appropriated by the donor, for the benefit of the Magdalene Islands.)

With reference to the manner in which this sum should be employed, it was proposed by Rev. W. Wickes, seconded by Rev. J. Torrance, and Resolved,

That the amount be equally divided between the two Churches, which are likely to be erected in the Magdalene Islands: and that the Treasurer be directed to pay the same to the Rev. F. Boyle.

The Secretary stated that he had no report to submit from the Lay Committee, in consequence of the Committee having so recently presented a lengthy report, and of the opinion expressed by the Honorary Counsel, to the effect that no lands can be sold by or secured to the Society, till the new Act of Incorporation is obtained.

The Secretary informed the Board that the Committee appointed to consider what measures may be adopted by the Church Society, for taking its part in the Jubilee of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, had fulfilled its task by drawing up a Resolution for the Annual Meeting, which was duly passed, (see Resolution 4, in minutes of proceedings reported above.)

The Rev. Principal Nicolls moved, in connection with this subject, seconded by Rev. Dr. Falloon, and it was Resolved

That, under the authority of Article xv, of the By-laws of the Church Society, a special Fund be opened for receiving the contributions of any persons who may be disposed to make offerings in commemoration of the Jubilee of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, irrespectively of the collections to be made in Churches and Chapels, and that the Incumbents and Wardens of the different Parishes and Missions in the Diocese, be requested to take measures for soliciting and collecting such donations, which shall be remitted before 10th January next.

A letter from the Secretary of the St. Francis District Association was read, forwarding copies of two Resolutions passed at the last meeting of the Association. The 1st of these Resolutions requested that the new code of By-laws adopted by the Association should be published in the forthcoming Report. This request was agreed to.

Resolution 2. was to the following effect,

“That the Central Board be requested to make such arrange-

"ments as shall ensure an Annual visit from the travelling agent of the Society, and to direct that officer to correspond previously with the Clergy of the several Missions, with the view of arranging for a meeting in each Mission, and of securing as large an attendance as possible of the neighbouring Clergy."

Moved by Rev. T. Pennefather, seconded by Rev. J. Torrance, and Resolved,

That the Central Board will undertake that, should circumstances permit, an annual visit shall be paid to the several missions of the District, in accordance with the expressed wish of the Association.

The Standing Committees for the ensuing year were then appointed:

Lay Committee.—Hon. H. Black, Q. C., Hon. W. Walker, W. Andrew, W. H. A. Davies, J. B. Forsyth, G. Irvine, J. Maclaren, C. N. Montizambert, H. J. Noad, H. S. Scott, J. Sealy, J. Von Exter, and J. Young, Esquires.

Finance Committee.—Rev. Official Mackie, (Chairman,) H. S. Scott, Esq., and the Treasurer and Secretary.

Depository Committee, in connection with the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge,—additional members, Rev. J. Torrance, Rev. E. W. Sewell.

Auditors.—Noah Freer, and H. S. Scott, Esqs.

The Rev. Official Mackie, the Treasurer and Secretary were appointed a Committee with full powers to take measures for the printing of the Annual Report, and the Treasurer was authorized to pay for the same.

Ordered that 17s. 3d. the expences of the Annual Meeting, and £2 19 5½ cost of certain articles required in the Mission House, Grosse Isle, be paid by the Treasurer.

The Secretary was authorized to bring up with him from Grosse Isle, for his own use during the ensuing winter, such articles belonging to the Society, as he may desire, on the understanding that he restore them in the spring, in as serviceable a condition.

The Journal of the Rev. J. Carry was laid on the table.

The Secretary stated that the Mission at New Ireland had paid one half of the Instalment due for the present year, upon the glebe lot in that place.

The Meeting was closed with the benediction.

REPORT of the Committee appointed to take measures for effecting a junction of the Society with the Diocesan Committee of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and for other objects.

The Committee to whom was referred the application of the Rev. Principal Nicolls, for aid in the establishment of a Book Depository, with instruction to put themselves in communication with the Diocesan Committee of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, with a view to the formation of a junction of that Committee with the Church Society, beg leave to report,

That there has been laid before them a proposal which has been agreed to by the Diocesan Committee for a junction of the two bodies. This proposal is subjoined to the present Report, and your Committee recommend its adoption by the Central Board.

The adoption of this proposal will confer upon the Depository Committee, if constituted according to the terms offered, full power to carry out the views of the Rev. Principal Nicoll's, whose application, on that account, has not been further considered by your Committee.

PROPOSAL.

That the books of the Diocesan Committee be offered to the Church Society on the following conditions:—

1. That the members of the present Select Committee, being members, and so long as they shall continue to be members, of the Church Society, be members of a Depository Committee to be nominated by the Central Board: that the other members of such committee, if any, be chosen annually

from among persons who may make a special annual contribution of 25s. or upwards for the objects of the committee, in addition to their ordinary subscription to the Church Society— (This last condition, requiring an extra payment of 25s., not to apply to the case of clergymen)—The privilege accorded to members of the Select Committee to be extended also to such members of the Church Society as may at any time be subscribers to the parent Society in England.

2. That the Church Society shall take measures for procuring an annual sermon to be preached, as heretofore, with the sanction of the Lord Bishop, in the Cathedral, and in such other churches or chapels as may be convenient, in behalf of the special objects of the Committee.

3. That the proceeds of such sermon or sermons, together with the special contributions referred to in No. 1, and the proceeds of sales of books, do form a special fund to be called the Depository Fund.

4. That such fund shall be at the disposal of the Depository Committee, and that in order to enable the committee to sell at reduced prices and to distribute gratuitously, the Church Society do make an annual grant from its general funds of such amount to admit of increase at any time by the Central Board, without affecting any of the conditions of this arrangement.

5. That the Depository Committee have power to make grants of books for gratuitous distribution, or for sale at reduced prices, and generally to control the affairs of the Depository in the same way as has heretofore been done by the Diocesan Committee.

6. That the Depository Committee have power to make arrangements, subject to the approval of the Central Board, for the establishment of Branch Depositories in other parts of the Diocese.

7. That the Committee shall report their proceedings to the Central Board.

8. That in order to preserve the existing connection with the Parent Society, the Committee be styled The Depository Committee in connection with the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and that the books and tracts to be placed in the Depository be selected, as heretofore, exclusively from the catalogue of the S. P. C. K.

DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

The Lord Bishop of Montreal left that city on a short visitation tour through some of the Missions in the Townships, on Monday, 9th June. After passing through a few other places, his Lordship arrived at Bedford, on Friday afternoon, 13th, having been driven over from Clarenceville, where he had been the guest of the Rev. M. Townsend, by the Rev. C. Morice.

Bedford.—On Saturday his Lordship was accompanied by the Rev. J. Jones to Stanbridge, Upper Mills, within this Mission, where he met several of the principal inhabitants, and consulted with them about the state of the Church in that place; and on condition that they would make some sincere and immediate efforts towards putting the building in repair, and assisting in raising funds for the support of a Clergyman, the Bishop promised to see what arrangements could forthwith be entered into for the purpose of providing them with a resident Minister. On Sunday morning, (being Trinity Sunday,) the Bishop attended Divine Service at Bedford Church, and in the afternoon at Stanbridge: on both occasions the prayers were read by the Rev. J. Jones, and the Bishop preached.

Dunham.—At Stanbridge the Bishop was met by William Baker, Esq., by whom he was driven over to Dunham, where an appointment for a third service on the Sunday evening awaited him, and he again preached to a numerous congregation. On Monday morning, the 16th, a large and most respectable congregation being assembled, his Lordship proceeded, according to notice given, to consecrate the new Church and the burial ground adjoining. The Rev. J. Scott, Rector of the Parish, Messrs. Thomas Selby, and W. S. Baker, Churchwardens, Dr. Butler, Messrs. J. Selby, Wm. Baker, &c., having united in a Petition that the Church and ground might now be set apart for religious purposes and Divine worship, it was read and presented to his Lordship, who immediately commenced the service for the consecration, and having signed the deed, the Rector said the prayers, being assisted by the Rev. Wm. Jones of Farnham, who read the lessons: and the Revds. J. Reid and R. Whitwell read the Epistle and Gospel. There were also present the Revds. R. Lindsay, F. E. Judd, I. Constantine, and also E. Sayles, from a neighbouring parish in the Diocese of Vermont. His Lordship preached an impressive and instructive sermon from St. Matt. xviii. 20. After the sermon the congregation made a liberal offering. The Church is built of stone, and one of the most substantial in the Diocese, but without any attempt at ornament. It is furnished with a neatly executed Desk and Pulpit, made after a plan originally designed for the Church at Vaudeuil by Mr. W. Kennedy, and kindly furnished by him to be used here. The liberality of a few individuals has also provided a white marble Font.

Sutton.—On Tuesday morning Mr. Baker, whose guest he had been, kindly conveyed his Lordship to Sutton, 14 miles; where he arrived about 11 o'clock, a. m., and found a very large assemblage of people awaiting his coming, in order to attend the consecration of the new Church, just completed in this Mission. The usual petition was read by E. Kemp, Esq., and the Bishop entered the Church accompanied by all the same Clergymen who were in attendance at Dunham, with the addition of the Rev. A. T. Whitten from Waterloo. After the necessary forms had been gone through for executing the deed of consecration, the Rev. R. Lindsay, the Incumbent, commenced the morning service, and

was assisted by the Revds. J. Constantine, J. Reid, and R. Whitwell; the Bishop preached an appropriate sermon, and the service concluded with the offertory. His Lordship then repaired to the house of E. Kemp, Esq., of whose hospitality he partook during his stay at Sutton. In the afternoon there was a very pleasing celebration of the Sunday School, at which upwards of one hundred children met together in a large building, tastefully decorated with green boughs; and a most abundant supply of cakes of all kinds and bread and butter was provided. After the eating and drinking was concluded, the children were addressed by the Bishop. The children having withdrawn, fresh supplies of all kinds were placed on the tables, and the friends of the children and all the visitors took their places, and had tea, coffee, cakes, &c.: they were addressed by the Revds. J. Scott, J. Reid, and the Bishop. The Evening Hymn was then sung, and the company dispersed, after a very gratifying day.

Brome.—On Wednesday the Bishop proceeded to Brome, accompanied by the Rev. R. Whitwell, and became the guest of the Honble. P. H. Knowlton: Divine Service was performed in the Church, on the borders of the beautiful Lake, the prayers being said by the Incumbent, the Rev. R. Lindsay, and the Bishop preached. In the evening his Lordship visited the Churchwardens, H. Foster and L. M. Knowlton, Esqrs., and on the following morning was driven by the former to Waterloo.

Waterloo.—On Thursday, 19th, the Bishop arrived at ½ past 10, and proceeded, in company with the Clergy, who were in waiting to receive him, to Mr. Ellis's house, which is close to the Church. From thence they all went in procession to the Church, the consecration of which had been arranged to take place on this day; and the same forms having been gone through as at Sutton and Dunham, the usual service was performed. The weather, which had been exceedingly propitious all the week, still continued most favorable, and a large congregation was in attendance. The Rev. A. T. Whitten, the Incumbent, read prayers, assisted by the Rev. Messrs. Robinson, Reid, and Whitwell. The Bishop preached a sermon from Acts vii. 26, which was most appropriate for the occasion and the place. A quarterly meeting of the District Association of the Church Society was held in the Church in the forenoon of the same day; which was attended by a great number of the members of the Church both from this and the adjoining Missions, who took great interest in the proceedings. His Lordship presided, and the Rev. J. Scott acted as Secretary; and the following Clergy were present both at the consecration of the Church and the meeting:—Rev. Messrs. Reid, Johnson, Whitwell, Scott, Slack, Robinson, R. Lindsay, D. Lindsay, Whitten, and Mr. Wilson, Theological Student at Bishop's College. The different resolutions were moved by Messrs. Drake, Baker, and Dampier, and seconded by Rev. Messrs. Whitwell, Scott, and Reid. The Bishop, while at Waterloo, was the guest of Mrs. Robinsen, whose husband, very recently deceased, had been one of the chief promoters of the erection of the Church. On Friday his Lordship visited the Station of West Shefford, and morning service was performed in the Church there, and his Lordship preached to a very respectable number of persons, who attended notwithstanding some heavy rain.

Froste Village.—In the afternoon of Friday the Bishop went to Froste Village, where the Rev. David Lindsay has been recently stationed. There was an evening service in the building now used for public worship; but the inhabitants are commencing the work for a new Church here, and have subscribed upwards of £200 amongst themselves for that purpose. Dr. Foster, Capt. Wood, Messrs. Williamson and others of the Building Committee, met the Bishop in the evening at Mr. Lindsay's, where he was staying; and they afterwards inspected the site, and the beginning of the excavations for the foundations of their new Church.

Granby.—On Saturday the Bishop was driven by W. Williams, Esq., to Granby, where he attended Divine Service on Sunday morning, prayers being read by the Rev. G. Slack, the Incumbent; a very full congregation was assembled in this neat and well finished Church; the Bishop preached, and after dining at Mr. Grey's, one of the Churchwardens, his Lordship

was driven across the country to Milton, by Mr. Slack.

Milton.—After afternoon service, the burial ground adjoining to the Church at Milton was consecrated. The Rev. T. Johnson was in attendance. His Lordship was the guest of Mr. Slack until Tuesday; and on Monday they went over together to Metcalfe falls in Roxton; where Mr. Slack had been for some time occasionally giving a week-day service. The roads were most wretched, indeed dangerous, from the immense rocks, stumps, and pits that every where abounded; and some of the bridges were very insecure. Sixty persons assembled for an afternoon service, in a grist-mill; after which the following address was presented to the Bishop by Captain Savage and others of the residents in the neighbourhood:

To the Right Reverend Francis Fulford, D.D. Lord Bishop of Montreal.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR LORDSHIP,

We the undersigned, Protestant inhabitants of the Township's of Roxton and Ely, members of the Church of England and others—desire to approach your Lordship, with expressions of unfeigned respect and hearty congratulation upon this occasion of the first visit of a Protestant Bishop to this newly formed settlement.

We cannot but express also our feelings of deep satisfaction at this proof of the interest and concern, which we are well assured is felt by Your Lordship, for the scattered sheep of the flock committed to your charge, removed by inevitable necessity from the enjoyments of those religious privileges and means of grace, to which they have been formerly accustomed.

We earnestly hope and trust that your Lordship's visit will be the means of leading to the establishment amongst us of some regular Ministrations of the Gospel, which we feel to be indispensably necessary for the check and prevention of irreligious habits and of Sabbath profanation, too generally found to prevail in new settlements.

It is our fervent prayer that the Divine blessing may rest upon your labors, and that when the duties on earth of that high office, to which you have been raised, are fulfilled, you may receive from the chief Shepherd a crown of glory that fadeth not away.

His Lordship having had some conversation with those present, promised to give them his best assistance.

Abbotsford.—On Tuesday the Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Slack accompanied the Bishop to Abbotsford, where they were met by the Rev. Messrs. T. Johnson, (the Incumbent,) F. Robinson, and T. Machin. An afternoon service was held in the Church, and the prayers having been read by the Mr. Johnson, the Bishop preached.

Rougemont.—On Wednesday Mr. Johnson drove his Lordship to Rougemont Church, where a congregation was assembled, and after service they took some refreshment at Mr. Bachelord's; and the Bishop was then driven on to Chambly, where he was received by the Rector, the Rev. J. Braithwaite.

Chambly.—A meeting of the Richelieu D. A. of the Church Society was held here on Thursday, the 26th, at which his Lordship presided. This was one of the stated meetings of that District, but the Bishop having consented to attend, a General meeting was called specially to take into consideration the subject of the endowment of the Church in this Parish. His Lordship opened the meeting with some appropriate remarks, mentioning chiefly the encouragement which he felt in regard to the permanent establishment of the Church in the Parishes and Missions through which his Lordship had recently passed. The Resolutions, which were ably moved and seconded, bore particularly on the call for gratitude on the part of Churchmen in this Province, in consequence of the liberal and fostering care, which the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel has so long extended to our infant Church,—the approaching Jubilee of this venerable Society,—and the best mode of securing an endowment so as to perpetuate the blessings of our holy religion to ages yet to come. The earnest wish of the Clergy was happily responded to, in a very hearty

manner, by some of the principal laymen present, who processed their entire concurrence in the praiseworthy efforts of the clergy to secure the blessings of religion to posterity. His Lordship closed a very interesting and harmonious meeting by some feeling and eloquent observations, and, the Doxology having been sung, pronounced the blessing, and the meeting separated. There were present also the Revs. M. Townsend, J. Braithwaite, C. Bancroft, G. M. Armstrong, R. Lonsdell, F. Robinson, F. Judd, C. Morice, J. P. White, and E. Grasett, from the Diocese of Toronto; Major Campbell, Col. Austin, John Yule, Esq., and F. D. Fulford, Esq., and a large and highly respectable audience. A very large party were most kindly entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Braithwaite, many of whom, having come from a distance, remained till the following morning, when they returned to their respective homes, as did the Bishop, being driven by his son, and reached Montreal on the afternoon of Friday, 27th June.

Maitland, E. Shelton, Esq., S. C. Bagg, Esq., W. McGinnis, Esq., W. C. Evans, Esq., R. S. Tylee, Esq., J. S. Roles, Esq.

After prayers, the Rev. C. Morice's motion was called, but upon consideration, withdrawn, and the following substituted.—
Moved by Rev. C. MORICE, seconded by Rev. C. BANCROFT,

and Resolved:

That a Committee be appointed for the purpose of considering what steps may be necessary to be taken, in order that the Bishop, Clergy, and Laity of this Diocese, assembled in Convocation, may be authorised to frame Regulations, for the discipline and government of the Church, within this Diocese,—the Committee, to consist of the Lord Bishop, (Chairman,) Reverends the Rector of Christ Church, Dr. Leach, J. P. White, and M. Townsend, Hon. Judge McCord, Dr. Holmes and mover and seconder.

Dr. Holmes withdrew the notice given at last meeting, for petitioning the Legislature for the cessation of Sunday labor in the Post Office, stating that finding a Petition from the Bishop, Ministers and Congregations of the city, had been prepared, he considered that mode of carrying out the object, was to be preferred.

The Report of the Book and Tract Committee was then read, when it was

Resolved,—That the Report now read be received and adopted.

No Report from Lay Committee. Hon. Judge McCord, on behalf of the Lay Committee, stated, that in consequence of the absence of several members, they had been unable to hold a meeting.

No Report from the Education Committee. The subject permitted to lie over until this meeting was reported by the Bishop to have been disposed of for the present.

The Finance Committee's Report was then read, when it was *Resolved*,—That the Report be received and considered clause by clause.

Resolved,—That 1st clause of Finance Committee's Report be adopted, viz.:—That a grant of £50 be made to the Rev. J. Flanagan, towards erecting a Parsonage at Lachine, for which a lot of land had been given, valued at £100; to be built of stone or brick, and to cost about £400;—the money to be paid when the building shall be covered in, being the conditions upon which the land is deeded.

Resolved,—That 2nd clause be adopted, viz.:—That £5 be

granted to the Missionary at the Savanne St. Luke's, for services performed during the year ending June 1, 1851.

Resolved.—That out of the funds of this Society there be placed annually at the disposal of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese a sum of £150, to be distributed by him for Missionary purposes at his discretion.

Resolved.—That the Rev. W. Brethour be paid for his services at Chateaugay in proportion to the amount of the rent of the farm given by Mr. Walton, for the remuneration of a Clergyman doing duty there.

Dr. Bethune reported verbally:—That cards had been given to ladies, members of the Cathedral, some of whom had reported collections to the amount of about £10, which had been handed to the Treasurer,—and that he had summoned a meeting of the Committee, none of whom attended but the Chairman and Secretary.

A letter was then read from the Secretary of the "Incorporated Church Society," concerning Church Architecture. Referred to the Lay Committee.

Act of "Incorporation" received from Hon. W. Badgley, was laid on the table by the Secretary.

Dr. Howard gave notice, that at the next meeting of the Central Board, he will move that the Board respectfully request the Lord Bishop of the Diocese to enter into immediate communication with the Bishops of Quebec and Toronto, seeking their co-operation with him in obtaining the right for the Church, of distributing Marriage Licences to the members of the Church in their respective Diocese.

The Lord Bishop requested the Clergy in their returns to the Central Board, to report the sums collected within their several Missions, and expended for local purposes, in order to give a true estimate of the efforts made by the Church in this Diocese towards its own support, and also to make an annual return of the number of Baptisms, Burials and Marriages and aggregate number of Communicants within their respective Missions.

His Lordship then informed the Board that the Books received from the Christian Knowledge Society, were now on sale at the National School under the charge of Mr. Roles.

Ordered—

That the Assistant Secretary's Account of £1 2s. 4d. for Postage, &c., and his Quarter's Salary of £12 10s. be paid.

The meeting was then closed with prayer.
