We hope that the new monopoly will take advantage of their position, and squeeze the consumers hard. We should like nothing better than to see this mammoth combine followed by a dozen others, tightening the grasp of capitalism upon the peoples' means of subsistence...

CANADIAN TITLES.

Lord Stanley's scheme for making his term of office memorable. He is adopting a policy which may cause him to be the first of the Mohawks, or tenants of the government's estate's berth. Within two months he has advised the conferring of peerages upon citizens of Canada.

But the more personal aspect of this deplorable peerage business is of much less importance than its probable influence on public life. The examples of Lord Mountstephen and Lady Macdonald being given titles will put all the other Knights and their wives into a fever of jealousy.

If the Governor-General and his advisers desire the stability of British connection they must stop this nonsense promptly, or the democracy of Canada will spoil their scheme by its demanding union with the Republic to the south.

But after all, the creation of official titles is a small matter in comparison to the accumulation of wealth in the hands of the few under the competitive system. The real rulers of this, as of every other country, are the people who control the capital; and monarchs, lords, statesmen and legislators are merely the puppets who go through the show of governing, while the real power is centred in the money-bags.

THE ASHBRIDGES BAY JOB.

The defeat of the attempt to hand over the work for the reclamation of Ashbridges Bay to the clique of speculators, represented by Bovas & Redway, has fortunately met with a crushing defeat in the Council, owing to the impudent audacity of the promoters in making what practically amounted to an option of three months in which to peddle the contract among capitalists.

The reclamation of the marsh is not a work of immediate urgency. When it can be profitably undertaken it ought to be done as a city enterprise under the direction of the engineer in-charge any set of monopolists and sharpers. As for Aldermen Leslie, Hewitt and the rest of the East End representatives who have used their position in the Council to advance their personal interests, it is to be hoped that next January the electors will retire them permanently from the public service.

PROTECT THE TELEPHONE EMPLOYEES.

The Bell Telephone Company have refused to accept the clause in the agreement, fixing the pay and hours of their employees. Ald. Bell has therefore given notice of motion to the effect, that the offer of the Toronto Telephone Company be accepted.

In declining to accept the clause, the President of the Bell Telephone Company, assured the Council that "no just cause of complaint exists on the part of its employees, either with respect to wages or hours of work."

LOCAL NEWS

The Eight Hour League has changed its date of meeting to the second Friday of every month. It meets in Room No. 3, Richmond Hall.

The annual picnic of the Toronto Typographical Union will be held at Dundas Park, Hamilton, on Saturday, the 23rd inst. The local union will take part and a very pleasant occasion is anticipated.

This tenth annual picnic and excursion of Messrs. Wm. & G. Greig's employes takes place to-day (Friday) at Lewiston by steamers Chicora and Cibola. An excellent programme of games and dances has been provided.

The Single Tax Association held its annual weekly meeting on Friday last. A paper was read giving statistics which showed that every family of five setting in Toronto adds \$5,000 to the value of Toronto land. It was pointed out that by the adoption of the single tax these land values would be devoted to public purposes and so returned to the citizens.

The principal business done at the regular weekly meeting of the National Association on Thursday night, the 2nd inst., was the adoption of the following resolution which was carried unanimously: "That the association regrets that, at the last meeting of its Council, a proposition to extend the fifteen cent minimum rule to the reclamation of Ashbridge's Bay was defeated, and in view of the facts that the attendance was by no means large, and that it was afterwards ascertained that the contemplated agreement and advertisement, would question the Council to reconsider the question."

STREET RAILWAY TENDERS... At the meeting of the Street Railway Council of the City Council on the 20th inst., the amended tenders for the Street Railway were read. The tender of Miller Brothers offered \$500 per mile for maintenance of track, 10 per cent of gross receipts up to \$1,000,000, 8 per cent on the amount over \$1,000,000 up to \$2,500,000, 10 per cent to \$1,000,000 and an increase of 1 per cent for every quarter million following on all sums over the first \$1,000,000.

The Kerr-Brock offer offered to pay \$800 per mile for track maintenance, 10 per cent of gross receipts up to \$1,000,000, 8 per cent on the excess over \$1,000,000 up to \$1,000,000, 9 per cent up to \$1,000,000, 10 per cent to \$2,500,000 with graded percentage up to 16 at \$6,000,000. In addition to this, when the operating expenses of the road are 20 per cent of the gross earnings, the company will pay the city one-third of the net 21 per cent below that amount and one-third of all further reduction to \$2 per cent.

The Kiely tender offered 8 per cent up to the first \$1,000,000, 10 per cent on the excess up to \$1,000,000, 10 per cent up to \$2,000,000, 15 per cent to \$3,000,000, and 20 per cent over \$3,000,000. The tenders were referred to experts for report and their comparative advantages.

There were a lot of the men up in my room last night, discussing our futures, and, except a few rich men's sons, we agreed that the outlook for the average college graduate in the present crowded state of the profession, was darker than it had ever been before.
