THE PARASITE WILL THRIVE.

HIS OWN UNPAID EXPLOITATION.

In order to bring out the conditions by which some may get a little more good things brought to them, our little community will have to be differently organized.

We must first agree to have a common division, in the manner by which each devotes himself to some special form of production.

It will facilitate matters if the division of exchange which is continually varying in value.

Lastly we establish the competitive system. We have now the necessary conditions, in the manner by which the parasite is made possible.

In other words, we have established such relations by which the few may accumulate the products of the many, to the pockets of the few must follow as a logical sequence.

We need not here stop to inquire by which the various legitimate or illegitimate process this transference takes place; whether it be by the good old plan of direct exchange, or by the more modern methods interests, profit and rent grabbing.

PUBLIC ROBBERY.

Take hold of one corner of the paper raise a whole sheet section from the cotton mound down the centre and with a large wet sponge or wet cloth cover the surface of the cotton strokes radiating from the centre. It is a mistake to think that the cotton in the sun was wet and heavily dripping that in a moderate warm place under an even heat. Do not be alarmed if the wet surface looks full of blisters. They will probably all dry flat, but if any remain they can generally be reduced by an application of a hot solution of alum. If, however, the blisters will not go down the paper can be entirely covered by pouring boiling water over the back and quickly pulling the paper of the maulin beginning at top and pulling away from the corners. If left any time after setting it will stick flat again. Repeat and immediately remount, and as a rule the result will be good.

The "materials" for use are not expensive and readily procured at any store where "artistic materials" are sold. The following are the most useful out of the great variety offered:

One size crayon pencil - Nos. 0, 1, 2 and 3. Contic wax crayon - black powder pressed into shape.

The large chamois skin - One small chamois skin - A soft old linen cloth - 8-10 cent cotton batting - One good leather stamp. Two crayon holders.

(One piece each of "velvet" and "suede" rubber - One box burnt rubber. Some finely powdered pumice stone.

In selecting the chamois skin choose one that is rather thick and very soft with fine even pores. The paper stamps should be firm and extra hard, as the soft ones are quite useless in general work. The sand pad is used to sharpen the pencil and rubber points upon, and is simply a number of pieces of sandpaper fastened together.

To prepare these materials for use cut the strip of velvet rubber in half, cut the end of the strip against the sand perfectly smooth. Then cut off about one inch of the square end of the "level" rubber (which is closer and firmer than the "velvet") into four pieces and putting it into a crayon holder, sharpen to a fine point by means of a knife and the sand. Hold it flat against the sand and keep the holder constantly rolling between the fingers as you rub it. Cut the other end of the paper stamp, and fasten into a crayon holder and sharpen on the sand pad to a fine point. The crayon pencils can be trimmed to a fine point with the knife and then finished on the sand pad to a fine point as it is possible to go.

Hold the pencil in a strong light coming from the left side and out of the direct rays of the sun, and begin work on the front only until it is so dry that the pores of the paper are perfectly set.

With dark curly hair, a fair complexion, high dark eyes, black laccear and white rouche at throat. With a finely pointed nose. Crayon pencil go over entire face the face at the eyes, nose, mouth and ears, taking care to follow very exactly any shadow which will render the face thinness. It is very delicate to use the pencil. Double the larger chamois skin into a square one-quarter the whole size. Double again into a triangular shape. Bend this triangular folding twice and you will have a fine pointed roll which can be easily grasped in the hand and will prove a most useful and effective tool.

Hold this into the wax crayon until the pores are well filled with the mixture. Then, by holding against the sand on dress and then, when the surplus crayon is well rubbed off with a circular motion, rub evenly and lightly all over the back ground at sides, top of the head, out-lining in a broken clouded effect and having it broader and darker as it approaches the outlines. The outlines should be shaded part of the face should, however, be kept very light to give, what is called, the "finest" and most delicate finish. The whole back ground should now be, at least, two shades darker than when finished. Then, in the same way, go all over the dress until a flat, even tint is produced that blends gradually from the darkest at throat into the white paper about five inches from the neck. If the tint has been properly "vignetted," i.e., blended, this will be easy, but if a nasty, dark shade is at the top, only way is to carry the shade further down and make the outline of the shoulders straight and be content, in going over the face, to rub in the tint as closely as possible to the skin as it does. Then hold the linen cloth as you did the chamois skin and go over the back ground again until the dress in light circular strokes rubbing very gently. The result will be to remove some of the crayon from the surface of the pores of the paper, and thus produce an atmospheric effect which will add greatly to the "quality" of your work.

The face is now ready to be modelled. And next week I will try to tell you a simple, but very effective method of first job here let us arrange upon the practice constantly drawing from objects without any outlines to guide you.
