CROP PROSPECTS.

A N extended tour through Western Canada enables the writer to report most satisfactorily upon the condition of the growing crop of wheat. Inquiries in various sections of the country result in the conviction that very much more than the usual quantity of winter wheat has been sold. Notwithstanding the fact that very large deliveries of grain have been made throughout the season, farmers have been busily engaged in preparing an unusual quantity of land for the reception of seed, and we believe we are not exagperating the fact, when we state that the area now under winter wheat is at least one half greater than at this time last year. The weather has been exceedingly favourable, and the plant never looked more promising than at the present moment. The success of the midge-proof wheat last harvest was so completely demonstrated, that seed of this description has been almost universally adopted. This grain is certainly somewhat inferior to the fine white wheat which Canada has hitherto produced, but what is lacked in quality is more than made up by the certainty of a full crop Besides, as we once before observed, it is not at all improbable that the coarseness of the grain will be improved by the influences of the climate and soil of Canada. It is safe to say that never before, at this season of the year, was there a greater certainty of a good crop of winter wheat than at the present moment, and the country may be congratulated on the prospect. The extreme mildness of the season has enabled farmers to get forward very rapidly their preparation for the spring crops. Very much more than L | the usual extent of ploughing has been accomplished. and if we should happen to have an early spring, we should not be surprised if spring grains were sown to an extent at least lifty per cent greater than last year. BANK CAPITAL.

MHE paid up Bank Capital employed in Canada has been rapidly increasing of late. According to the Auditor's statements, it was \$26,325,116 in October 1862; \$26,861,489 in October 1863; \$29,732,252 in 1864. and \$30,647,412 in October 1865.

We doubt, however, whether this increase has kept pace with the requirements of the Province. Since the introduction of the railway system and the com. pletion of main lines of road leading to the various stations, every part of the country has been brought into business relations with the cities Branches of the various banks, too, have been established in the country towns, so that the people have become accustomed to deal with them, rather than with the local capitalists, who used to flourish on their neighbours needs. We therefore hail with pleasure the starting of new monetary institutions. The Merchants' Bank is now fairly established; the Royal Canadian is in successful operation; the stock of the Union Bank has been subscribed with unexampled rapidity, and we hear of a new institution, on a somewhat similar footing to the International, which will no doubt succeed. Banks can realize eight per cent. in Canada without doubt, in some seasons even more. And it seems that plenty of capital can be found here, as well as in England, for investment at that figure.

In this connection it is somewhat interesting to look at the market value of our Bank stocks We deduce the following table from our last week's quotations, applied to the paid up stock of the Banks as per the Auditor's October statement.

Thus we see that the majority of the Banks have their shares at a considerable premium-a great encouragement to the projectors of new enterprizes of a similar kind.

A NEW POLICY NEEDED.

WE understand that Mr. Brydges, the Managing Director of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, has been to Washington, accompanied by Mr. Watkin, M.P., the President of he Company. While there they had an interview with the President, members of the Government, and other influential centlemen. It is said that Mr Brydges has returned with two important conclusions thoroughly impressed upon his mind. The first is, that there will be no war between England and America arising out of the Alabama claims; the second is, that there is no doubt that the present Reciprocity Treaty will not only be abrogated in March next, but that some time must clapso before a new one can be procured. That he is right in both impressions there can be hardly any doubt; and it is not improbable that the authorities at Washington, finding it inexpedient and dangerous to go to war, may become more than ever opposed to the Treaty, with the behef that they can thus spito England by attempting to injure Canada. It is an obvious conclusion that the question of Reciprocity would be much more certain of a fair discussion and an impartial decision if there were no such difference existing between the mother country and the United States, as those involved in the Alabima claims

We are glad to hear that Mr. Brydges is convinced of the hopelessness of Reciprocity. It is essentially im portant that he should thoroughly appreciate the fact' for on him, more than on any other man in the Province, will depend the ability with which the people will bear the loss of that Treaty. In a week or two more, navigation will be closed, and the great volume of produce seeking a market will find outlet only by railways. For three and a half months the American markets will be open and free to Caradian products. In that time, with proper management on the part of the railway authorities, a great deal ought to be effected. There is yet a vast quantity of wheat peas, oats, and other produce in the country; in many of the remoter localities only a very small portion of the last crop has yet found a market, and beyond question there yet remains in the country fully one-half of the great yield of last wonderful harvest with which we were blessed. If every facility is afforded for the rapid movement of this grain, the great bulk of it can be emptied into the United States before March next, and before it is chargeable with a duty of twenty per cent, by the abrogation of the treaty. Mr Brydges, with the immense Grand Trunk system under his control, holds therefore an important place in the next few months. If he is desirous of seeing the country prosper, if he is anxious that the failure of Reciprocity should be as lightly felt as possible; if he cares to secure the good will of the people; and if he is willing the great work over which he presides should deserve well of the community, he will endeavour to afford every facility for the local traffic on the road. If he is thus inclined, he will reverse the policy which has been pursued until very lately in the present and previous scasons. He will cease to carry "through" Western States produce over his road for less than paying rates, while every storehouse and station on the line is crammed full of Canadian grain waiting shipment. If he is really in earnest in his desire to corve the coun. try, he will not permit two-thirds of his rolling stock to be employed in carrying foreign freight almost at a loss, while he can employ it in getting our own produce to a free market, and receive double rates therefor. In the past few months, in the past and previous years, there has been the greatest dissatisfaction among produce dealers in all sections of the country, on account of the impossibility of getting their property forwarded for want of cars, while two-thirds of the entire stock was being employed in carrying through foreign produce. Local rates of freight have been high, flour has been carried cheaper from Chicago to Boston than from Stratford to the same city, yet even these rates would be paid, if only the ordinary facilities were afforded. Canadian farmers, though taxed on every pound of tea and sugar, and on every yard of cutton they used, to help build the Grand Trunk Railway, have had to hold their grain throughout the winter, while Western States produce has been carried forward at rates less than half these which farmers were willing and were compelled to pay. So grievous has this abuse become. that grain buyers have absolutely in some localities been compelled to build their own cars; and the condinon of all local markets has been seriously depress-

ed by the poor facilities for shipment. Embarrass ment, auxiety and annoyance have been the universal experience along the line.

Whatevor may have been the policy of the Grand Trunk in the past, we carnestly hope a change will take place this winter. There is a great abundance of produce seeking a market; it can realize a high price, and will readily sell, if it can be carried forward. If the railways are but equal to the occasion, they will earn the grafitude of the people, and benefit im, mensely, indirectly, by benefit to the country. But if the policy is pursued of neglecting local or Canadian produce, and employing the road, in carrying foreign property, we are certain the greatest injustice will be done to the country, and the managers of the railways deserve nothing but the condemnation and repreach of the people.

We believe Mr. Brydges is actuated by the strongest desire to meet the requirements of the trade; he has many difficulties to encounter, and a great many interests to consider. But he never occupied a position of greater responsibility than now; to a large extent he holds the prosperity of the country in his hands. The policy which he will pursue in the next few months will influence more than anything else the price which every farmer will realize for his grain. It he acts but wisely and well for the country's interest, the goods which have been so largely purchased this fall will be readily and easily paid for in the spring. The commerce of 1866-its health and extent-will be largely influenced by him, and we trust he will cease making contracts for Chicago and other Western cities, and bend all his powerful energies to aid Canada and Canadians

OUR FOREIGN COMMERCE.

I' would be difficult to choose three better men to place in the Commission for the extending of Canadian Trade than the Hon. Win. Macdougail, the Hon. Thos. Ryan, and Mr. Duuscombe. Were we disposed to carp, we might object that none of its members hall from any of the Lower Provinces, but under the circumstances, this being an Imperial Commission, and the Lower Provinces not yet having given in their adhesion to the policy of the Empire, concerning Federation, the maritime colonies have no claim to be represented, and certainly we need not complain.

As far as locality then is concerned we have Mr. Macdougall, who is identified with the interests of Toronto and the Western Peninsula, Mr. Ryan, a Montrealer, and Mr. Dunscombe, who is in every sense a thorough Quebecer.

As far as experience goes we have Mr Dunscombe, who, as Collector of Customs at Quebec, has had the best of opportunities for learning the condition of our present foreign trade, and who, we know, has always taken a deep and intelligent interest in the matters that have come before him. We have Mr Ryan, one of the working Directors of the Bank of Montreal, well versed in all things appertaining to the financial state of the Province, himself a merchant not long retired from an extensive business, well posted in what concerns the resources of this country and the Lower Provinces, as his conduct as chairman of the provincial delegates to the Detroit Convention showed. And we have Mr Macdougall, who has been quietly but earnestly devoting special attention to fiscal and commercial matters ever since his accession to office as a minister of the Crown, and on the score of acquaintance with trade, is probably the best qualified to not in the commission of any of the ministry-with the excention of Mr. Galt, and perhaps of Mr. Howland.

The Commission, we are informed, will proceed to England in about a week, where they will receive their creden ials, and be placed in complete possession of the views of Her Majesty's Imperial Government. They will then visit the principal islands in the West Indies, and proceed to Mexico, if not even to the Brazils. They expect to be absent about three months, but we think that even this time may be too short for the most important task they have on hand

This task—that of opening up new trade relations between these northern countries, so rich in cereals, in fish and animal food—and those equatorial regions, with their abundant supplies of sugar, coffee, and all other kinds of tropical produce, is a difficult and delicate task, but it successfully performed it may lead to the most glorious results.

SMUGGLING ON THE FRONTIER.

If It Tariffs are the most fruitful source of smugging. There is nearly the same connection between the two things as between cause and effect. You might as well expect to plant thistles and reap figs, as that very high duties will not be followed by attempts to evade their payment. This has been the experience in Great Britain, and in fact throughout the whole world. And just as the tariff of a country is high, very high, or exorbitantly high, in the same degree will smugglers abound, and their efforts become daring and determined.

The Government of the United States is just now realizi. no truth of these remarks. The immense expendative caused by the internecine war, through which they have passed, has rendered necessary the imposition of an exceedingly high tariff. On some articles the duty almost amounts to prohibition. Smuggling has followed as a natural result. Before the war began, the office of Revenue Inspector along our frontier lines had almost become a sinecure. But as the American tariff increased, smuggling began to make itself felt, and there can be no doubt that it is now carried on to an extent which few have any idea of. Many Canadian dealers living within a stone's throw of the American shore, are evidently selling largely to American customers, and doubtless a large part of such purchases reach the other side of the lines, despite all the vigilance of the Customs officials. Whiskey, Tobaccos, Cigars, Teas, Silks, &c., are said to be the principal "contraband" articles, and as the highest duties are levied upon them, this is extremely probable. The American journals announce that several seizures have recently been made at points both east and west; and even ladies of good standing in society-who ought to know better-are reported to have been found among the delinquents.

The increase of smuggling is attracting the rerious attention of the Washingtor binet, and also of the American people. A large meeting was recently held in Detroit to take the subject into consideration, and to devise the best means of checking the evil. The Government is also taking every means within its power to prevent illicit trading. A considerable increase to the staff of Customs officers has been made and to meet the case of females who may be suspected, female detectives have been appointed.

It is much to be feared, however, that smuggling cannot be wholly put down, so long as the American tariffremains as at present. During the cras of high duties in Great Britain, although almost encircled with Custom-house officials, dutiable goods were frequently lauded under cover of the night. How much more this is likely to be the case with the United States, any person may foretell who understands the relative positions of that country and Canada. Should smuggling not increase beyond its present proportions, strict vigilance will no doubt decrease the evil. But should the American Congress persist in abolishing the Reciprocity Treaty, the inducements to smuggle will be so great that hardly any amount of surveillance will suffice to put it down. At the pressent time the great bulk of the articles we exchange with the Americans pass duty free. Should these judicious trado regulations be disturbed, and a heavy tariffenacted on such articles, it requires no prophetic vision to foresee the danger of the banks of the St. Lawrence, Ningara, Detroit, and St. Clair rivers, as well as other parts of our frontier lines, becoming alive with contraband traders. We trust, however, that the efforts being put forth to secure a renewal of the Reciprocity Treaty will yet succeed; and that smuggling will receive no impetus from this source.

In speaking on this subject, we are gratified to believe that few, if any Canadians, are engaged in these vasions of the American Revenue laws. It is said that as many as sixty indictments for smuggling have been found by the Grand Jury at Detroit, and we believe that in all these cases American citizens were to blame. We hope that our people will continue to shun connection with so dishonourable and hazardous a trade. It is a singular fact that many regard smuggling as not so heinous as many other breaches of law. Not a few respectable people think it "no harm" to bring in a few purchases without paying duty. Whatever popular opinion may be, such conduct is dishonest, and should be avoided by all classes of the community. Those who evade the Revenue laws of a country are as justly li bie to the penalty as those who break any of the other statutes of the land:

OUR FISHERIES.

ROM the report just issued by the officer in charge of the fisheries in the Lower St. Lawrence and the Gulf, it appears that the expedition had been for over six months cruising about the different settlements along the coast. The purpose, as evidenced by the report before us, is to see that order and public peace are maintained at the various establishments, and to take up a position in the ports and roadsteads, for the better protection of the fisheries. It has had a beneficial effect upon the crews of foreign vessels who, from the presence of the Government ship, "La Canadienne." were more than usually quiet. Very often the inhabitants along the shore have had their property considerably damaged, and sometimes their houses broken into and pillaged by these foreigners, who, from the isolated and unprotected condition of the settlements, find in them an easy prey. Unless the necessary protection were provided by the Government, for these important posts, the fishing interests would inevitably suffer. They would soon become so unprofitable and even dangerous to the men engaged in them, that the business would ultimately be ruined. and large tracts, which now add so materially to the wealth of the country, would be rendered utterly useless.

The season in which the greatest activity in seal capture is apparent in the settlements of the Gulf, is the early spring. About the middle or end of March, when the ice has been broken up, and large sheets of it are floating on the surface of the water, great quantities of seals perch themselves upon these layers, and use them as a sort of temporary habitation. this position they are sought after by the hunters, and, as is very often the case, the ice is so very closely packed together that the seals can find no convenient mode of escape. Several hundreds of them are frequently killed in the course of a day. When a storm or very high wind arises and blows these moving masses of ice on to the shore, there is a general uprising of the inhabitants along the coast, each of whom provides himself with a good large knife, a rope, and a stout club, and, springing on to the fields of ice, captures enormous quantities of these valuable animals. According to Mr. Fortin's report, the quantity of seals caught during the past fishing season is little short of twenty thousand, and the total amount of money realized is \$84,283. This is an enormous amount certainly for one class of fish, and yet it has been exceeded by the proceeds of the cod fishery. The herring, too, has produced for the fisherman a handsome sum of money. The quantity caught during the season was about twenty-six thousand barrels, representing the sum of \$55.022.

The mackerel season lasts only for ten or fifteen days, and yet the yield has been in round numbers as many as three thousand five hundred barrels, which, at an average of eight dollars per barrel, gives the respectable sum of \$28,000. The mackerel fishery however is not as highly appreciated as it should be, and this department appears to be rather neglected than encouraged, by Canadians. While only \$28,400 have been realized by our fishermen on mackerel, for the past season, the Americans have taken, in the waters adjoining our coast, not less than twenty-five thousand barrels, representing some two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and this must be taken as the lowest estimate, and only in this one branch, the mackerel fishery.

The great source of wealth of the fisheries, however, lies in the cod, which is to be found in immense quantities at a short distance from shore, between the months of May and October. In the capture of this fish, the men very often run serious risks of their lives. The best time for catching is in the early morning, say from three to five o'clock. The fishermen often go out thus early, with the highest expectations of success, the day promising well, and the weather clear; but in a few hours the steady quiet breeze gives way to a terrific gale from seaward, which increases rapidly in violence; and frequently it is by the merest chance that they reach shore with their lives. The success of this fishery has not been so great during the past season as in former years. The high winds which frequently visit the neighbourhood of the Gulf settlements having been of longer duration this year than formerly; many even of the best and bravest of the fishermen not daring to venture out.

The result, however, as reported by the commander of the expedition, sums up to more than six hundred and twenty thousand dollars. Of this large sum, the shores of the county of Gaspé alone have yielded as

much as three hundred and thirty-three thousand dollars, not including some sixty thousand gallons of cod liver oil, worth thirty thousand dollars.

Whale fishing is carried on to a limited extent along the Labrador coast. There have been engaged in this business, during the past season, eight schooners, employing in all one hundred and twenty men. The remarkably calm weather and clear atmosphere, which are at all times necessary to the safe practice of whale fishing, have not been had this season, and the amount realized is not therefore so large as we should have anticipated. The quantity of oil produced is about twenty-five thousand gallons, the greater part of which has been exported to England.

Summing up all the products of our fisheries, both those which we have already spoken of, and a few other unimportant species, we arrive at the following:

In the capture and preparation of all this fish there have been employed 170 vessels, with a total tonnage of 12,236 tons, and manned by 1243 seamen. The number of fishing boats engaged were 2,937, manned by 5,946 men, and the number of graviers, or men employed in its preparation, 3178. This shows an aggregate of 10 367 men, many of them with families, to which the fisheries of British America afford the means of subsistence; and beside these there are large numbers of men engaged in the business on account of the Americans, who have been reaping rich harvests from this source. Although the aggregate, this season, has not been so large as in previous years, yet the yield has, on the whole, been a good one, and we trust that every effort will be made next year to increase the production, and every encouragement afforded to the trade, so that it may be still further developed.

BANK STATEMENTS.

 O^{UR} last review of the position of the Canada Banks was to date of 31st August.

The returns for September have not been condensed by the Audit Department in the Gazette of November 18th, just received, which contains the position only of the Banks to 81st October, so that our comparison will be for the last named date, as compared with that of 31st August.

We recapitulate the figures, showing how the Banks stood in the aggregate at our last review.

The difference in these last summations is of course connected with profits.

It will be observed as an indication of the conservative character of Bank management in this country, that the increased means placed at the disposal of the Banks by the increase in the deposits and circulation has only been availed of to about one fourth, or \$2,686,-438, against \$9,682,760.

We now refer to the items somewhat more in detail1. CAPITAL PAID UP.—Of this \$33,000 is in the
Royal Canadian Bank. A somewhat small amount it
appears to us to have gained in two months, when
money is comparatively abundant in Western Canada.
Ontario Bank \$40,000. Jacques Cartier Bank \$43,000,
and the Merchants Bank \$50,000.

2. CURRENT LOANS.—Bank of Montreal increased \$1,100,000; Quebec Bank decreased \$250,000; Commercial Bank increased \$260,000; Gore Bank \$200,000. This looks like a revival of vitality in this small but respectable institution. Bank of Toronto \$500,000. We know this last named Bank to be under conservative management, and therefore this is an indication of a valuable accession of business, which the popular cashier will know how to turn to account. The Merchants Bank has also added heavily to its investments. Instead of calling in its capital, and paying 8 per cent. for it, it should wait for deposits to counterbalance the want of circulation. The Royal has increased its loan \$200,000.

3. CIRCULATION.—Bank of Montreal increased \$1,500,000; Quebec Bank decreased \$60,000; Bank of Upper Canada increased \$300,000; Commercial Bank increased \$800,000; City Bank increased \$180,000; Gore Bank \$350,000; Bank of B. N. America \$500,000,—an unexpected indication from this quarter. Niagara District Bank \$90,000; Molsons' Bank \$100,000; Bank of Toronto \$500,000; Ontario Bank \$800,000; Royal Canadian Bank \$180,000; others scattering, and but one Bank as above decreased.

The Gazette having only reached us to-day, we cannot further dissect the positions of the different Banks, but the figures given will indicate that the tide has turned in favour of the business of Banking, like that of most others in Canada. But let bankers be cautious; all is not gold that glitters; another harvest equal to the late one, and moderately good prices would give firmer footing; but without it, and, it might be without peace, and border security—where would be the retreat from an expanded position for our smaller institutions.

Prudence in the day of adversity is a common virtue. The like quality with importer and banker, in the day of our returning prosperity, is a consummation only to be hoped for from the well balanced judgment that ever fears to tempt Providence by forgetting his laws—laws as much those of business as of any other department of his secret surveillance.

Pork-packing Contract.

We are gratified to notice that the British Navy Department has given a large contract to the Ontario pork packing factory at Hamilton. We doubt not the contract will prove beneficial to all concerned. We hope to see the packing of pork and beef more extensively carried on in Canada, than it has ever yet been. This business has done much to build up such cities as Cincinnati and Chicago, and, where it is gone into in the style of the Ontario factory, must be greatly advantageous to the interests of this Province. Providing, as such factories do, a home market for our pork, they deserve every encouragement which the public can give them.

THE business of the week is somewhat similar in character to that reported in our last issue. Dullness and inactivity are the prevailing characteristics. It may, however, be considered a shade better than the previous week, but even then it must be regarded as a remarkable period of stagnation for so extensive a business. The only cause that can reasonably be assigned is that given in our last issue, the remarkably large trade sales of teas and general groceries, which have supplied the necessities of a very large number of country traders, and until their present stocks are well nigh worked out, the trade will not be likely to regain its usual activity.

TEAS.-Sales to the extent of 2,000 half chests are reported, chiefly in Coloured Japans, within the range of our quotations. The stock of Teas in England on 31st ultimo was 82,000,000 lbs., being a decrease of three and a half millions, as compared with that of same date last year.

SUGARS .- Quiet: moderate business done in small parcels to the retail trade.

SPICES.—No change to note; business is at present restricted to the immediate necessities of the trade.

FRUIT.-Raisins have a pretty fair demand, and are firm in price.

Molasses .- Dull; sales of Muscovado have been made, ranging from 40 to 521 cents per gallon, and Clayed from 35 to 40 cents.

RICE.-Still scarce, and firm at quotations.

SALT-Has been dull for some time, and is somewhat lower in price. The stock at present is moderate, and at this late season we do not expect that any additions will be made to it.

FISH.-The business in this article may be considered pretty well over for this season, the closing sales having already taken place.

THE LEATHER TRADE.

GOOD average business has been done during the week, and there is every prospect of the demand continuing until the close of navigation, and even after. The continual orders being received by consumers are indicative of great activity in trade in Western Canada.

SPANISH SOLE .- The principal demand felt at the present time is for ordinary, and No. 2. The stock in first hands is not large.

SLAUGHTER Sole .- Stock is very light, having been pretty well cleared out of desirable lots. Prices therefore are firm, and must be expected to continue so until some considerable arrivals.

ROUGH.-Is in light stock, but as there is nothing beyond a poor average demand, the present prices leave little or no profit to the currier.

WAKED UPPER.-Principal enquiry is for light, and several lots have been disposed of lately, at a small increase on previous quotations.

GRAINED UPPER .- There has been a very active request for this article during the past week, but now that the demand is to a large extent met, the market closes dull and inactive.

SPLITS.-Improved demand for both weights, and good ordinary lots find ready disposal.

CALFSKINS .- Good demand; supply short. A fair article would be easily disposed of at quotations.

PATENT AND ENAMELLED .- Few sales being effected, the demand is of a limited character.

BUFF AND PEBBLED. - Continue to be in active request, and receipts are still very light. Prices are therefore increasing.

SHEEPSKINS .- Are very scarce in this market. The large drain to the United States, where more favorable prices are to be had, has left this market quite bare. HIDES.—The stock in market is almost entirely of city slaughter, which is inadequate to the demand. Very little doing in imports, and stock is therefore limited.

THE business transacted during the week has not been so good as that of the week previous; the orders from Western Canada still come pouring in, and a good active demand prevails. Many houses who held large lots of staple goods a few weeks ago, and who were not very sanguine of disposing of them early, have been almost entirely cleared out; and the arrivals reported in our last issue, per the Belgian and Thames, have also been caught up with avidity, and are in a fair way of being soon exhausted. Importers therefore find some little difficulty at the moment in executing orders as fast as received.

Advices from England continue to represent the trade in a prosperous condition, although the orders received were not so large or numerous. The earlier buyers had disposed of what they had, and some of them have not felt further inclined to operate for the present. Arrivals here, therefore, are limited.

COTTONS -The activity which characterized the business of last week in this department has continued with increased vigour. Although several large lots had been got in-more than were expected to be disposed of for some little time-yet cottons are now very difficult to be obtained, and so far as we can learn it does not appear that there are any extensive lots to arrive.

PRINTS.—These have been in so good demand all along, that the stock is now exceedingly limited; and the business in this branch has almost ceased for this season.

-Baggings are much asked for, and luckily the wholesale market is pretty well stocked with them, as very considerable quantities have been lately received. From the quantity of orders daily coming in from the West, it is evident that trade generally in that section must be in a most flourishing condition.

WOOLLENS .- Continue in active demand, and the orders received from the West are executed at the moment with some difficulty, as the stocks in the hands of importers are light. Sealskins are in very good demand. Orders are pouring in, day after day, from the West, while the stocks are comparatively light. In flannels and blankets the usual activity prevails. and stocks are well assorted.

DRESS GOODS .- The demand for Winseys during the week just closed has been very heavy. A strong and continuous trade has been done in these during the season, and the stock is now very perceptibly decreased. In Cobourgs, the stocks of coloured are exceedingly light, while black are in very good stock and well assorted. The goods on hand just now can be bought to decided advantage here, as they are composed of part of those lots imported previous to the advance which has taken place in England. They are not therefore affected by the new prices which prevail in the home markets. Future importations cannot be obtained on such reasonable terms.

Boot and Shoe Trade.

The old stocks held for some time past have been entirely exhausted, and the trade are depending almost exclusively upon the immediate production of the factories. Everything that can be turned out is rapidly going off, and the activity which has of late characterized this department of business is yet maintained as strongly as ever. The principal demand is from Western Canada, and from the numerous and extensive orders being received, there is every prospect of a first rate business being done, not only this season, but during the winter. From the large advances lately made on all the different articles entering into the manufacture of leather, and boots and shoes, it is believed that a further advance in prices must soon take place.

At the sale of buffalo robes on 23rd instant, about, 5,000 skins were sold, the principal portion of which were bought for the American and Lower Canada markets. Although the prices were somewhat lower than last sale, the assortment of qualities was not considered equal to the first.

THE business done this week consisted mainly in filling orders previously received. These, with the addition of a few orders which arrived this week, have kept the Hardware houses very busy during the last four or five days.

PIG IRON.—The market is very short of Gartsherrie. the active demand of the season just closing having almost exhausted the supply. Summerlie and Glengarnock are also well cleared out; indeed, all stocks are pretty well exhausted, and prices are firm at our quotations.

CANADA PLATE-In good demand; they are now becoming quite scarce, and we are not aware of any lots to arrive. Any thing arriving is picked up at once. and disposed of readily at our quotations.

BOILER PLATES .- Stock is rapidly diminishing; some few lots lately received have been taken up immediately, for the oil regions.

TIN PLATES-Are now quite scarce, and prices firm. In England they have been advancing considerably, and are in very active demand. Makers there refuse orders for early delivery, except at higher rates. Notwithstanding the pressure of the money market in Britain, trade is in a most active and flourishing condition, and an advance in the leading articles of Hardware is expected shortly to take place.

Money and Stock Markets.

Sterling exchange, since date of our last issue, has been operated in to a limited extent only. On las-Friday, the Bank rate was 1094 for cash, and yestert day it was the same, but closed higher in consequence of an advance in the rates in New York. To-day the rates are anticipated to be 1091 for cash,

The discount in Silver has gone up to 4 per cent. Montreal brokers are selling Greenbacks at 32, and buying at 321. Drafts on New York, however, are about | less.

There have been but few transactions in Stocks this week, partly owing to the transfer books of several of the Banks being closed for the payment of the half yearly dividend on 1st proximo, and a limited demand for Stocks and Securities; our quotations of Stocks x d. are nominal.

Sales have been made in Commercial Bank Stock at 76. Bank of Upper Canada at 301, and Bank of Toronto at 105.

Nothing doing in Mining or Railway Stocks this week.

Wheat to the extent of 14,000,000 cwts. and the value of £5,128,000 has been imported into England this year. A further instance of the short supply in the United States is seen in the fact that the value of all the wheat exported by them to Great Britain during the year 1865 to 80th September, is not equal even to one-ninth of that of the previous year. In 1864, the United States sent to England £2,918,000 worth of wheat: in 1865 it amounts only to £305,000. In flour also there is noticeable a marked reduction in the supply. In 1864, as much as £800,000 worth of this article was shipped to Britain, while in 1865 it is only £117.000.

THE PRODUCE MARKET.

THE state of the weather during the latter portion of the week has been such as to seriously impede business of every kind. A heavy and driving storm of snow fell on Tuesday night, succeeded by rain, and with mild weather and showers at intervals since, the streets and country roads have been almost impassable. Bread-stuffs and grain have engaged little attention, either for export or local use. Provisions have been also in diminished request. Ashes have ruled dull, at a material decline from rates during the recent excite-

Ponk.-The stock is so small that the approach of the packing season exercises but little influence upon the market, retail sales continue to be made at previous rates; were any quantity, however, pressed upon the market, a concession would be needed to place it.

DRESSED HOUS-Are arriving very sparingly, but with the unsettled weather we have had, receipts are quite sufficient for the demand, which is as yet very trifling. Prices are declining, and now range from 88 to 89. Any increase in the arrivals before steady cold has set in, will infallibly reduce prices to a point at which packers will be willing to operate.

BUTTER-Has been dull and unsettled since our last. In the American markets the stocks of all descriptions are reported to be heavy and augmenting, as the export demand has almost ceased, leaving them dependent upon their home trade, which will not absorb all their surplus stock.

The stock in this market is supposed to be unusually small for the season, and rather than submit to a decline, holders in many cases will prefer to ship all their better qualities to Britain, while prices there remain high. It seems, however, probable that the present very high range of prices can hardly be maintained, as a large proportion of the medium and inferior grades, unfit for table use, can only be brought into actual consumption at low figures, to compete with the various substitutes that can be used in baking, cooking, &c.

LARD AND TALLOW-Remain without change to note.

Asnes-Have now settled down to a point at which purchasers are willing to operate; the demand is, however, far from active, present rates being paid reluctantly, but the firm attitude of holders prevents any further decline; receipts are limited, and with the small stocks in the principal British markets, it seems probable that present rates will be maintained.

FLOUR.-The receipts have been small, but fully equal to the demand. Less enquiry for Quebec and Lower Ports has existed than was generally anticipated, while the almost impassable condition of the roads, cutting off the retail demand, has materially hindered the purchases for local use. The attention of exporters, which the gradually improving tone of British advices had begun to direct to Flour, has resulted in little, owing to the latest mails noting a quieter market, and the upward movement arrested. American advices still reporting Flour as difficult to quit, except at a decline, causes the higher grades to be neglected here, and the protracted depression has led to some concession on the part of holders, with a view to reducing accumulations. Superior Extras are only taken in small parcels. Extras have been placed mostly by single hundreds at \$7 to \$7 15, and Fancy, but only to a very limited extent. within range of quotations. In Supers the bulk of the transactions have been at somewhat lower rates than last quoted; Welland Canal and other brands from Western Wheat have latterly been placed at \$6.15, while even \$6.05 has been accepted in one or more instances for ordipary Canada No. 1; the ruling rate, however, for good brands from Canada Wheat have been \$6.15 to \$6.25, any transactions above or below being somewhat exceptional. The supply of the lower grades continuing within the wants of the trade, we have no material change to report. There was more show of inquiry at the close, there being a few buyers in from the country, with a view to replenishing, prior to the final close of navigation; as, however, they contented themselves for the day with obtaining a run of prices, little actual increase in the average amount of business can be noted.

BAO FLOUR-Has been freely supplied, and although liberal concessions in price have been made, little has changed hands, owing mainly to the condi-tion of the country roads. Jobbers are comparatively idle, and are unwilling to lay in stock, even at relatively low prices, until prospects of speedier returns improve. The bulk of late arrivals have, therefore, of necessity, been stored, and are likely to do better, barring a further decline in the flour market generally.

OATMEAL .- The offerings are small, and the demandlimited; prices range from \$4.90 to \$5.10, only strictly good however commands extreme quotations.

WHEAT.—There are no new features to note. U. C. Spring arrives sparingly, and being mostly direct to millers, very little is offered for sale. Nominal prices are \$1.25 to \$1.30. Western is held at about same figures, but buyers are unwilling to operate, except at a considerable decline.

PEAS.-There being no sea-going vessels in port, except the last steamer for the season, now about clear ing, there is little or no demand for peas, and prices have materially declined, lates, transactions being at 80 to 85c per 66lbs.

OATS .- Continue about as at date of our last. American advices are again improved, and a better demand may be looked for.

BARLEY .- Little doing on the spot, and prices mostly nominal.

RECEIPTS OF PRODUCE.
