## A HISTORY AND CATALOGUE OF CANADIAN POSTAGE AND REVENUES.

By "JEP."

1$T$ is the humble opinion of the writer that no greater value for stamps exists than their historical connection, and that in the race for new specimens and minor varieties, many collectors overlook the study of the uses of the stamps they collect, being perfectly satisfied to know the catalogue name of the stamp or set of stamps, and peruse the matter no further. It is therefore with the hope that a greater interest in the uses and connections of the various stamps of British North America will be created that this historical catalogue has been compiled.

British North America is the cognomen for what is now the Dominion of Canada and the island of Newfoundland. The name Canada was originally given by the French to all the present Canadian territory, and also to a portion of the United States, embraced by the Ohio river on the south and the Mississippi on the west. Latterly this name was the title of the St. Lawrence and Great Lake country, and as this applied to Upper and Lower Canada, which were formed as these Provinces in 1791 . In 1840 they were again united politically, and at the time of Confederation, the name passed into that of the Dominion, and what was Upper and Lower Canada, became the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec.

On March 29th, 1867, an Act for the Confederation of the British Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick was passed, and on July ist of same year became law. In 1869 the Hudson Bay territories entered Confederation, British Columbia in 1871 , and Prince Edward Island in 1873 , and at no distant date Newfoundland will be admitted.

The government of the Dominion consists of the Queen's representative in the person of the Governor-General ; an Upper House called the Senate, the members of which are appointed by the Governor-General, and hold their positions for life ; a Lower House term ed the House of Commons, the members being elected by popular vote. The area of the Dominion is estimated at about $2,00,000$ square miles, and the population nearly 5,000,000.

With this brief sketch of the general history of Canada we can the more intelligently, but as briefly, outline the postal history.

The early Provincial postal systems were under the control of the PostmasterGeneral of Great Britain. Later the Provinces had charge themselves, and on Confederation occuring, postal affairs in their entirety passed into the hands of the Dominion government. It will, therefore, be seen that the stamps of British North America are to be classified under three Govermental heads-Colonial, Provincial, and Dominion issues. It may be of interest to here note the matters that come under Dominion control. They
are property, public debt, taxation (for federal purposes), postal services, military and naval defences, salaries of civil officers, the census, navigation, weights and measures, various inspections, copyrights, marriage and divorce, criminal law and supreme legal publicity. The items in this list of interest to philatelists are the postal service, weights and measures, inspections, taxation and the Supreme Court, as these branches control the issue and denomination of stamps to be classified under the head of Dominion issues. Under the head of Provincial issues that were issued by the Provincial postal systems before Confederation, and also various legal and monetary tax stanns. Colonial issues were of postage stamps only.

One more matter comes under the general history, and that is the various coinages of British North America. The colonial issues were, of course, of values according to English sterling coinage - 12 pence, one shilling; 20 shillings, one pound. This, however, was not the same as the different Provincial coinages and on some stamps under the second heading are found two values-sterling value and currency value. During the issuance of stamps by Provinces-1860the decimal system of currency was introduced, and thus we find the last stamps issued before Confederation were valued in cents. All the Dominion issues were of thiscurrency, which is now the standard currency of Canada.

## THE "CONNELL."

THE currency of the Province of New Brunswick was changed in 1860 , and the three stamps then in use, viz.: 3d, 6d and $1 /$, were to be replaced on May ist by the new stamps. The LieutenantGovernor of New Brunswick at that time was Hon. J. H. T. Manners-Sutton, and Hon. Charles Connell held the position
in the Cabinet of "ostmaster-General. By a minute in Council passed sometime before, "the Postmaster-General was authorized to obtain new postage stamps in $1,5,10$ and $12 \frac{2}{2}$ cents, " and now witness an act on the part of Mr. Connell which certainly has the privilege of being styled novel and unique if nothing more, for while all the other British Colonies were eulogizing Her Majesty by placing on their stamps all conceivable types of her portrait ${ }_{2}$ what happens in New Brunswick ? A set of stamps were issued which still hold their own as handsome specimens, but on only one denomination (10 cent) appeared the likeness of the Queen, on 1 cent a locomotive, on $121 / 2$ cent a steamship-recording the rapid strides the Province was making in railroading and ship building-and on the 5 cent stamp, to keep Her Majesty company, the people of the Province were favored with portrait of the Postmaster-General.

Mr. Connell kept the Goverment in total ignorance of the designs of the stamps until they " were actually issued and in circulation," and then, when brought to book by his colleagues for his act of presumption, and requested by them to reissue the 5 cent stamp "a new one with the Queen's head" in place of his own, he refused to have his acts questioned and resigned. The Connell was recalled, and his successor in office -Hon. James Steadman-issued the new 5 cent stamp bearing the Queen's likeness. Question of the prior issue of the Connell can be settled at once, as the Government in their communication to the LieutenantGovernor in the matter, dated May 8th, 1860, say:-" And we further advise Your Excellency to order a 5 cent postage stamp to be struck, bearing the likeness of the Queen instead of the 5 cent stamp. already procured by the PostmasterGeneral."

The error made by Lockyet in "Colonial Stamps" is a dual one-he gives the date as 1861, and presents Mr. Connell with the unnecessary Milesian prefix of a
capital $O^{\prime}$ to his name. These little things are all necessary to correct if we wish to arrive at the truth, and in the question of such a rare stamp all erroneous information should be weeded out. The principal object of this article is to prove the Connell as no essay, but as being actually in circulation. That is my firm opinion after a most careful gleaning of all information that I could possibly obtain from three gentlemen still living, who were either Mr. Connell's col?eagues in the Government of New Brunswick, or who were so prominent in the postal service under Mr. Connell that their opinions are invaluable. But before I quote these opinions, let me refer to the "Royal Gazette" of May 23rd, 1860, and we will see what Mr. Connell and the other members of the Government have to say in the matter, and surely here is where we should go for accurate information if anywhere. Here we have the record of this whole stamp affair in the official organ of the Government published at the very time, and is it not reasonable to suppose that no error would creep into such a publication? Mr. Connell on April 28th, 1860, says :"Any delay now will cause trouble all over the country, as instructions have gone out and all old stamps called in." And a little later in his resignation letter he says :-" I made arrangements for the sale and delivery of the decimal postage stamps at every post and way office throughout the Province on the first day of May."

Now please bear in mind that dateMay ist-and then also remember that the first intimation Mr. Connell had of the dissatisfaction his act had given to the other members of the Government was when he received a telegram from the Provincial Secretary-now Sir Leon. ard Tilley-on April 27th, 1860, asking for the delay of the issue of the stamp and then reason out in your mind whether telegraph and railroad communication was in a far enough advanced state to
allow of information reaching "every post and way office in the Province" in three days. I say that this one thing would be evidence enough that there was every possibility of several of the stamps having got out. But let us go further and see what the Government say in their letter to the Lieutenant-Governor in answer to Mr. Connell's charges :-"We admit the Postmaster-General had the consent of his colleagues to obtain decimal stamps, but they were procured and 'being distributed' before they were submitted to Your Excellency in Council for approval, or before the impress they bore was known to the Council, and when submitted it was the opinion of the Council that the 5 cent stamp should bear the likeness of Her Majesty." Further on : -"And we again assert that the Council were kept in total ignorance of design upon the 5 cent stamp until after they were struck off 'and put in circulation.'" If this means anything at all it means that the stamps were actually issued, for we are not going to suppose for an instant that the eight members of the Government were going to state in the Royal Gazette what was not true.
I have in my possession at the present time a Connell, which, I regret to say, was foolishly cut from the envelope in the possession of Dr. Cogswell, of Halifax, N.S., in the year 1874. I have also a beautiful unused specimen and two fine proofs. I have been at a good deal of trouble in obtaining informatiom from gentlemen who were in a position in the year 1860 to know all the facts of the case. I received a letter from the Hon. Peter Mitchell in answer to my enquiry, in which he says :-"I feel satisfied that several of them did get out and were used on letters going through the Post-office, and that was the way the Council of that day first discovered it. When Mr. Connell was brought to task about his unvarrantable act by his colleagues, it was several days after they had been used.." It is hardly necessary for me to state that
the Hon. Peter Mitchell is to-day one of Canada's public men, and having been one of Mr. Connell's colleagues in the New Brunswick Gove.nment in 1860, it would be hard to find a better authority.

Let us look to another authority-Mr. John Howe, who was postmaster at St. John in 1860, and he must have had an early supply of these stamps and been in ful! knowledge of the affair, as St. John has always been the most important place in the Province. Under date of Sept. 5, 188S, he writes:-" Your letter received, and in reply II a $e$ to inform you that the Connell stamps were issued and were in circulation some time."

And lastly I will quote Mr. W. H. Smithson, who was chiet clerk under Mr. Connell in the Fredericton Post-office, where the stamp was issued. He says:"They were certainly postage stamps, and a few might have got into circulation;" and in a later letter he says:-"It is probable they were sold to the public from St. John Post office."

The foregoing article is reprinted from the P. J. of A., and to use Mr. A. A. Bartlett's own words in closing:-"No stamp ever appeared under the same peculiar circumstances as the Connell. We may be forgiven in voluminosity in describing it-it is a rare stamp."

## Stamp Men.

## LIEUT. THOS. MITCHELL.

With pleasure we present to readers of this paper the pleasant features of Lieut. Thos. Mitchell, of the 12th Batt. He is a native of Dundee, Scotland, and came out to Canada in 1872. He has been an ardent volunteer ever since he could shoulder a rifle, and has been in service for 26 years. In the Northwest rebellion of 1885 he went through the campaign with the Royal Grenadiers, and wei.s as a memento the medal and clasp. It is in shooting, however, that Mr. Mitchell leads, and for 14 consecutive years he has been a member of what is now known as the Bisley Team-n:ade up of 20 crack shots selected from the whole Dominion of Canada, and annually goes over to England to compete against shooters of the Empire. Mr. Mitchell's collection of shooting trophies would dazzle the eyes wald they be seen. This year he is again a member of the leam. It was only a year ayo he became interested in stamps, and is an eager collector as well as dealer.

## PUBLICATIONS.

Messrs. Bright \& Son, Bournemouth, England, favored us with a copy of their "A B C Catalogue." The cuts are in half-ione and printed on good paper, and well bound. It is a pleasing volume, and at the price- $1 / 9$ posiffce-every collector snould have a copy.

Ketcheson's 1896 edition of Canadian Revenues is to band, and while some may condemn the pricing in a few instances, Air. Ketcheson is to be commended for issuing a book at all. The work of a catalogue compiler is no easy task, but pricing them is the most difficult work, as it must be done according to one's own stock. Collecting of Canada revenues is on the increase, and were they in as great
demand as United States revenues, some fancy figures would be paid to own them. Catalogue costs 25 c, and can be had at this office.
H. L'Estrange Ewen, Swanage, Dorset, England, sends us his "Catalogue of Postage and Telegraph Stamps, Postmarks and Obliterations of the United Kingdom",-copies of both the English and German editions. It is very neatly goten up, and will appeal to all collectors of these stamps for the information contained. Price $1 / 6$ postpaid.

Walter Morley's Catalogue and the Addenda (see adr.) are to hand, in which he prices all the stamps he has on hand. Containing the revenues of the British Colonies, we naturally turned to Canada, and note that he catalogues unperforaied Bill Stamps of the 2nd issue. At home these are looked upon as proofs and of no value. while Mr. Morley has them listed at stiff prices. We would like to learn more abnut these stamps. However, the book is sure to please many collectors of revenues, and it costs only $2 / 6$.
