NOVA SCOTIA LAW

This Province has a stamp about the same size as an ordinary postage stamp, having a crude half-length representation of Justice thereon, holding aloft balances, one end of same being a small weight, and all inside of an oval. "Law Library" is in curved line at the top, and immediately beneath, in gothic letters, is the word "Halifax." In curved line at the bottom appears "25 cents." Stamp is printed in green. It was issued for the purpose of adding new book to the law library of the Province.

ONTARIO LAW STAMPS,

The stamps exclusively used for this province are devoted to law usages. The first issue are green in color, and the design is a figure of Justice, holding aloft the balances, while the other hand holds a sword pointed downwards. The value appears at both top and bottom of each stamp, and on the right and left sides is the wording "Canada Law Stamp." One can readily see to what use these stamps were put by the various surcharges.

A few years later, the values were issued in a smaller size, and the color changed to red. At the present time this issue is still in use. The unperforated ones are frequently found, and in this state are priced.

The Pan-American Issue.

The stamps will be of the same general shape as the Omaha set, though considerably smaller—about .30 millimeters long by .22 millimeters wide—uniform throughout. In each stamp the central figure or vignette, will be printed in black. Of course the colors for the remaining portion of each stamp will be the same as employed in the current series, being fixed by law.

The one cent value represents in the central figure a steamship with the inscription "Fast Lake Navigation."

In the centre of the two cent value is a fine picture of a railway train—Buffalo being a great railway centre.

An up-to-date automobile occupies the centre of the four cent denomination.

Niagara Falls in all the beauty and grandeur of life, will be found occupying the grand stand on the five cent value, the illustration being so realistic that one may almost see the spray drifting upwards from the rapids below.

In the centre of the eight cent stamp is a magnificent picture of the great canal locks at Sault St. Marie, with vessels passing through.

A mammoth steamship, different from that of the one cent, occupies the centre of the ten cent value, representing fast ocean navigation.

The King of Sedang and his Stamp Issue.

The *Australian Philatelist* makes an extract from "The Far East," a most interesting book by Henry Norman, who gives the full history of the kingdom of Sedang.

One of the most remarkable romances of modern Eastern history has been connected with these French colonies. In the spring of 1889, there appeared at Hong Kong a tall, well built Frenchman with a bushy brown beard and very long legs, who called himself Marie David de Mayrena, and distributed visiting cards with words "S. M. le Roi des Sedangs" printed upon them. He had had an adventurous career in the Far East, in the course of which he had more than once displayed great personal courage in guerilla warfare. At last his wanderings brought him to the region of Sedangs a tribe inhabiting part of the Hinterland of Annam, a region not so well known then as it has since become. By these people he was elected king, and of the genuineness of the election there can be no doubt whatever. He was at first recognized by the French missionaries and the French authorities, and I myself have seen correspondence and treaties which place his claim beyond question. Of these treaties there were a score signed between Mayrena and the chiefs of the different tribes (here follow extracts from some of the more important). * * * I should add that I give these details not only for their romantic interest, but also when Mayrena was thrown over by the French authorities he was pooh-poohed as a common liar, and now that he is dead and the whole strange adventure at an end, I take pleasure in showing that he was not wholly an imposter, in spite of his vanity and his follies. It should be added in explanation of certain phrases that his French was not always above reproach. To continue, the relations, that had subsisted between Mayrena and the priests are clearly shown by the following passage in the treaty, which, like most of this strange history, is now published for the

first time, so far as my knowledge goes: "Considerant que se nous detonons la couronne du Royaume Sedang, nous la devons aux R. R. Peres Missionaries de la Societe des Missions Etrangeres de Paris; que c'est grace a leurs concours que nous avons pu expliquer notre volonte et parcourir le Royaume avant d'etre élu; que ce sont eux qui ont servi d'intermediaires entre nous et ces chefs pour traduire nos pensees"— * * * "Le drapeau national sera bleu uni avec une croix blanche a l'etoile rouge au centre," * * *

When Mayrena first turned up at Hong Kong, he was vouched for by the French Consul, and introduced by him to everybody, including the Governor, in consequence of which his social position was sealed by an invitation to dinner at Government House. At this time he was an astounding figure, when in his royal attire. He wore a short yellow jacket with enormous galons on the cuffs, a broad blue ribbon, a magenta sash in which was stuck a long curved sword worn across the front of the body, white trousers with a broad gold stripe, and a white helmet with a gold crown and three stars. He distributed broadcast the "Order of Marie I.", beginning with the captain of the little Danish steamer Freyr, in return for the hoisting of his royal standard in Haipong harbour and continuing with the Governor of Hong Kong, who was caused no small embarrassment in getting rid of the impossible ribbon and cross. He used note paper with a huge gold crown and coat-of arms upon it, gave large orders for jewellery, and conducted himself generally like a crowned head. * *

Mayrena succeeded in getting a few Hong Kong merchants to enter into an arrangement with him by which he conceded to them the right of developing the country of the Sedangs, in return for certain duties upon trade and exports. But the collapse came, of course, when the French authorities changed their policy and took a line of direct opposition to him. Even the missionaries, who had enabled him to secure the treaties, of which they themselves were the official witnesses denounced him as an imposter. He then

offered himself and his country to the British, who naturally would have nothing to do with him; so he next tried the Germans, and was actually indiscreet enough to send a telegram to Berlin in open German, offering his allegiance, forgetting that this must pass through a French office in Saigon. Of course it was read and reported from there, and orders were issued for his arrest. He believed that he was condemned to be shot for high treason, so he went to Europe by the German mail steamer, a few of his acquaintances in Hong Kong passing the hat around to pay his passage. After he had left the police succeeded in recovering most of the jewelry he had purchased and failed to pay for. A man of his stamp, however, is never very long without money, and after spending some time in prison in Ostend for debt, he next turned up in Paris and lived there in luxury for awhile, the French press not being quite sure what to make of him. Finally he returned to the Far East, settled down with one male companion and two or three female ones on an uninhabited island off the coast of the Malay Peninsula, where a cobra brought his strange career to an end by biting him on the foot. All that remains of "Marie I, King of the Sedangs" is the set of postage stamps he issued, which are among the most prized (?) curiosities of the philatelists.

Such is the true story of "a man who would be a king", and it is perhaps worth telling as an illustration of the fact that even in these late days there may be as much romance in reality as in fiction, at least in the wonderland of the Far East."

Asked the other day what was the value of a Krueger penny, I made enquiries and find that it has not as yet been sold in a public auction separately, so up to the present time there is no data to get at a reasonably correct value of the coin. I have heard that they are fetching as much as 17 sh. each in the Transvaal. The following prices were recently realized at a public sale: eleven Krueger coins, viz., £1, 10sh., 2sh. 6p., 2sh., two 1sh., three 6p. and two 1p. in all sold for

£4; again another set, consisting of £1, 10sh., 5sh., 2sh. 6p., 2sh., 1sh., 6p., 3p., 1p., realized £3 5sh. These, however, are not the prices some of the above coin are realizing at the Cape. I know from direct information that the following prices have been asked and paid: the 5sh. piece £30; and the 1p., 17sh.; 50sh., and in one case £5. The rare pieces are the 5sh.; the 3p. and the 1p. I do not, however, think it possible to obtain such prices in this country, and we must at present be guided by public sales.

"Mafeking Stamps."

A great deal has been written and said recently on the subject of the "Mafeking Besieged" stamps, and the patience of the philatelic world has been greatly exercised by the many divergent opinions, theories and convictions that have been expressed. Seeing, however, that large prices are asked and given for specimens of this issue, and that the publishers of Gibbon's Catalogue have decided to class them as provisionals, it behoves us to assure ourselves that such action is consistent with proper appreciation of their status. The reason adduced for the view that these twenty varieties are genuine Provisionals is, briefly, this. That the occupants of the besieged town were desirous of communicating with their friends in England and elsewhere, and in order to get letters through the lines runners had to be engaged who demanded as much as £25 for the undoubted risk of the enterprise, and it was therefore necessary to practically double the ordinary rates of postage, hence the surcharge.

Now after following very carefully the whole case for and against the supposition that these stamps are genuinely authorized to fill a provisional necessity we find ourselves quite unable to support such a theory, and are firmly persuaded they are nothing better than locals. That the post office at Salisbury or Beira accepted and transmitted letters stamped with the surcharged stamps is no proof that they accepted the surcharge, since they were obliged to recognize the stamps of the Cape or the British Bechuanaland

and would ignore the overprint in the absence of special instructions. The representatives of the British post office employed runners to convey the ordinary mails is not suggested as it would be absurd. No civil department of any government would pay a man, either native or otherwise, £25 to risk his life in such a manner for ordinary postal requirements. It is therefore abundantly clear that such runners as these were were paid by private persons, newspaper correspondents, or were on military service only, in either of which cases the stamps so used had no significance at the making post office for regular service from Mafeking. When we couple the statement that these runners were not permitted to carry bags of any kind, had the letters secreted in the soles of their boots, to the naive announcement that follows, to the effect that of no single specimen of the twenty varieties are there more than 1,000 copies, it is really too funny for a sober philatelic's understanding. The "head of B.P." and the Cyclist stamps are admitted to be locals, and since permission could be obtained of the general commander for these labels it is not difficult to believe that a proposition to brand the stamps, that would eventually leave the country, in such a manner as to form a memento of the gallant defense they were making, would also meet with the same good-humored approval. We therefore would most strongly urge our friends to indulge in no excitement about these stamps, nor to pay fancy prices for them, at least until some more definite reason is produced for accepting them as anything better than a local issue, which is at the same time a memento of one of the events of this present war, which will most surely be handed down into history.—STAMPS.
