The I cent is the craziest stamp we have ever seen, containing a portrait of the Queen in widow's apparel with the dutes 1497-1897 beneath. The 3 cent is not so bad, having a view of Cape Bonavista The inscription, "American Bank Note Co., N. Y.," appears on every stamp, for which advertisement. no doubt, the Newfoundland Government got a little reduction.
