The Grand Scribe's report was read, as follows :—

THE GRAND DIVISION OF THE SONS OF TEMPERANCE OF THE PROVINCE OF NOVA-SCOTIA, ASSEMBLED IN QUARTERLY SESSION AT BARRINGTON :

Worthy Brothers :

Up to the present moment I fully expected to meet with you at Barrington ; but circumstances over which I had no control have just occurred, and will deprive me of the pleasure of assisting you in conducting the business of the session. This I do much regret as the Grand Worthy Patriarch will also be deprived of the pleasure of presiding over your deliberations in consequence of his removal from the Province. This is the first time, since my appointment to office, in May, 1856, that I have been denied the privilege of attending a Quarterly Session.

Since our last meeting two new Divisions have been organized viz. :—

HOPE, No. 154, at Grand Joggin, Digby County, on 28th April, by D. G. W. P. Henry Stewart.

COBEQUID, No. 155, at Folly Village, Colchester County, on 2nd May, by P. G. W. P. Rev. John McMurray.

So far as I can ascertain from the information in my possession the Order in this Province is still in a very healthy state, although some of the divisions cannot make much progress during the summer season, as their members are mostly all engaged either in the fisheries or with their farms, and cannot, therefore, prosecute their temperance work with that degree of activity they would wish. The prospects, however, of good increase during the coming fall and winter are very encouraging.

By the accompanying returns you will perceive that some of the divisions have had good accessions to their membership, while others have expelled large numbers—principally for non-payment of dues.

Their services will be missed by the temperance community, and we shall be deprived of their counsels in the deliberations of the Grand Division. Let us hope that, if they may be permitted to meet with us again, and assist us in prosecuting our glorious work, they may be equally as successful in promoting "the objects for which we are associated" in their respective spheres of duty. Let us also hope that their places may soon be filled by brothers who will prove equally as talented, energetic and sincere; and whose labors may result in as much benefit to our cause.

Trusting that the circumstances which prevent me from attending the session—as set forth in the accompanying letter—may be accepted by you as a reasonable excuse for my absence; hoping that your deliberations may prove advantageous to the interest

The accounts of the Grand Scribe and Grand Treasurer were read and ordered on file.

The following report was presented from the Standing Finance Committee :—

The Standing Finance Committee report that they have examined the accounts, books and returns of the Grand Scribe, and the Grand Treasurer's account, and find them correct.

The committee recommend the following bill for payment :

The following report was presented from the Standing Committee on Constitutions and Bye-laws :—

The Standing Committee on Constitutions and Bye-laws have read before them copies of the bye-laws of several divisions, and report as follows :—

*See appendix.

NEW CALEDONIA, No. 14.—The alterations in the bye-laws of this division do not conflict with the Constitution, except the term “benefits abolished.” Benefits cannot be constitutionally abolished; but, in order that New Caledonia and other divisions may know how to act in reference to amending their bye-laws relating to benefits, your committee would direct their attention to the following extract from a report adopted at the quarterly session held at Yarmouth in July, 1856 :

“Your committee would recommend the division to adopt a bye-law giving the lowest amount of benefits allowed by the Constitution (see article 6), and then avail itself of the privilege to suspend benefits under section 2 of article 6 of the Constitution, which says: ‘Nevertheless this division may suspend benefits by a two-third vote of the members present at a regular meeting, after two weeks’ notice of such action.’”

“Your committee would also recommend the division not to suspend benefits for a longer period than twelve months, at the end of which time, if it is thought necessary, the suspension may be continued, in accordance with the sixth article of the Constitution.”

HOWARD, No. 26.—The bye-laws of this division do not conflict with the Constitution.

RISING SUN, No. 52.—Your committee recommend as follows :

That the words, “eligible to office,” in sec. 2 of article 1, be struck out.

That the word “two-third” be inserted before the word “vote,” in sec. 6 of art. 3; and that the words, “after one week’s notice has been given,” be added to the same section.

That the words, “Minority reports shall also be receivable,” be added to sec. 6 of art. 4.

That the word “eleven” be inserted instead of the word “nine” before “months,” in sec. 2 of art. 5; and that the words, “in accordance with art. 7 of the Constitution, and art. 2 of the revised rules,” be added to same section.

SACKVILLE, No. 137.—No part of the bye-laws of this division conflicts with the Constitution.

CONHEATH, No. 148.—Your committee recommend :

That the words “and art. 2 of the revised rules,” be added to sec. 2 of art. 5.

That the words, “a balloting shall take place, and if a majority vote to give it to him,” in sec. 9 of art. 5, be struck out, and the following inserted instead thereof, “if there be no charge

against him." Also, that the words, "for which the sum of seven-pence half-penny shall be paid," be added to the same section.

GENERAL INGLIS, No. 152.—Your committee would recommend :

That the words "Constitution and" in sec. 3 of art. 4 be struck out.

That the word "two-third" be inserted before the word "vote" in sec. 7 of art. 4 ; and that the words, "after one week's notice has been given," be added to the same section.

That the words, "in accordance with article 7 of the Constitution, and article 2 of the revised rules," be added to section 2 of article 5.

That the words "withdrawal card" be inserted instead of "card of clearance," in sec. 8 of art. 5 ; also, that the words, "a balloting shall take place, and if a majority shall vote to give it to him," in the same section, be struck out, and the following inserted instead thereof, "if there be no charge against him."

July 27, 1859.

The Committee on the State of the Order beg leave to report, and have to regret, that they have not the necessary information before them to enable them to furnish such a report as can be satisfactory to ourselves or to this Grand Division.

In the first place we have to regret the absence of the Grand Worthy Patriarch, which fact is fully and satisfactorily explained by his removal to another sphere of usefulness out of the Province, but we have also to regret the absence of his report, from which, judging from his previous reports and his well known zeal and ability we would expect to gather all that was necessary concerning the state of the Order throughout the Province.

In the second place we have to regret the absence of the Grand Scribe, whose general knowledge of the business of the Grand Division and whose efficiency as an officer make it very desirable that he should always be present at the Quarterly Sessions. Although in the present instance we feel bound to report that we consider the reasons assigned for his absence perfectly satisfactory. We have before us the Grand Scribe's report, and although the state of the Order generally is reported in a flourishing condition yet there is one ominous fact apparent, namely, a very large number expelled for non-payment of dues. Indifference is as bad as opposition ; it is a gangrene that preys upon the vitals, and we would recommend subordinate Divisions to use the healing ointment rather than the pruning knife as far as practicable.

We have further to regret the absence of any report from the delegates to the National Division: we fear that such neglect will

in future be a serious obstacle in the way of raising the necessary pecuniary aid to another such mission.
