But notwithstanding the great plainness of speech used many of us are slow to comprehend the meaning of such an expression as, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to the whole creation." "Go ye therefore and make disciples of all the nations," or " teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

How few, comparatively speaking, realize that it is the duty of disciples without being "scattered abroad," to tell to those about them of the Love of God. For never before were there so many faithfully declaring the Gospel as the power of God unto salvation. And never before so many teaching and being taught to observe all things commanded by Jesus our Lord.

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
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
