

The following words have been received from high quarters:

"I have not failed to promote interest in your 'Kamloops Wawa' upon every occasion that presented itself. I have succeeded in arousing considerable interest in our parochial high school, and I would not be surprised but that we should turn out this year yet a number of shorthand graduates. The sister in charge is an enthusiastic convert to your system, and is starting in with wonderful 'vim' into the 'Kamloops Wawa.' I think we will revolutionize this city (pop. 100,000) in a short time. So do not be surprised at anything.

"When are you going to publish your new shorthand method, in one volume complete, with all the parts bound together? This is what you want, I think. Then you should have a book of graduated exercises, containing not only the usual words, but also the most difficult ones, with all the abbreviations your system is capable of. This should be very complete, thorough and practical, with an accompanying key. A third volume with beautiful little histories, embodying the lessons as they progress, having a key which would be used for self practice. This, I consider, would tend to popularize your magnificent system. Pardon me these suggestions: but I feel a very keen interest in the 'Kamloops Wawa.'

Many thanks in return for the suggestions. In answer to which, the first part of the "Wawa Shorthand Instructor," in about 24 pages, can be got ready as soon as a sufficient demand is expected, that justifies the publishing of it. To be sold at the same price as a single number of the "Wawa." Ten cents. For the second desideratum, "the Graduated Exercises," our opinion is that nothing can be found more handy than a common school primer or first reader put in shorthand, following exactly the same text as that of the one used in schools. The primer or first reader mostly used in our schools should be chosen, and after it is decided, it will be only the work of a few days to have the "Graduated Exercises" ready for publication.

Concerning the difficult words, it might be a good idea at first to have the students in shorthand send in lists of words which offer some difficulty, for publication in the "Wawa."

The Indians throughout the districts of Kamloops and William's Lake are now anxious to have a neat little church in each of their camps. To begin with those of William's Lake, William's Band at Sugar Cane completed last year a very nice church, which was opened in July, an account of the ceremonies, etc., having been given in the "Wawa."

The Indians of Kenim Lake soon followed them, and taxed themselves to over one thousand dollars, in order to meet the expenses. A letter from Kenim Lake, lately received at Kamloops, states that 200 marten skins have been set apart by the band to pay up for the building of the church.

At Halowt, the Lower Shushwap camp, where a pretty spacious building was put up two years ago, which is not yet quite finished: the band at that place finds out that the surest way for them to secure funds for the achievement of their church is by selling firewood in the city of Kamloops, and they have come lately to the mutual agreement that every able man in the place will make up five cords of wood for the purpose; the wood is all ready by this time, and will soon be taken down to market. About 200 cords in all.

At Upper Shushwap camp, named Knowt, or rather Shwh'koikwah, to which place they are now moving their houses, the new church, 24 x 60, is just now being completed, and the blessing of it is expected to take place on June 7th, next. In order to meet the expense of that building, the young and energetic chief, François Shilpahan, has employed his men in cutting down timber and trading it to the saw mills for lumber.

At Bonaparte, they are also preparing to erect a new chapel.

News has come from Aleali Lake that the church there has been renewed, and looks now like a different building altogether.

The figure on page 107 is that of the late Cardinal Guibert, Archbishop of Paris, France. Cardinal Guibert belonged to the Congregation of the O.M.I. As nearly all the Missionaries in these Missions are of the same congregation, the question is often asked what is the meaning of the letters "O.M.I." which accompany their names. These letters stand for "Oblatus Marie Immaculatae" which means "Oblast of Mary Immaculate," and conveys the idea that the members of the said congregation have placed themselves under the special protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and have pledged themselves to spend their lives in working for her Divine Son, the Saviour of the World.

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#### THE WAWA SHORTHAND.

A few more syllabic tables appear in this number.

The table on page 100, "pupe," "pute," etc., requires but little attention. Angle is avoided in every case

between the first consonant and the vowel, and wherever possible, between the vowel and the following consonant.

The table on page 101 is more complicated, yet it may be observed that angles are more scarce in this table than in any other preceding one: that is owing to the double sound, figured by the combination of circle and hook, which affords a way to connect it without angle with almost any preceding and following consonants. But great care should be taken to examine and write out all the monograms of this table exactly as they are in the printed table.

NOTA.—The sign adopted for "i" as in "pipe," "pite," etc., may appear somewhat complicated: but another one could not be adopted without disfiguring the system of shorthand we have adopted: it would at once break its universal adaptability to all languages. Other adaptations of the Duployan Shorthand to English

have taken the same sign, circle and hook combined, to represent the long "i," and in fact it is as short, and in many cases shorter than a tick or reversed hook, which necessitates one or two angles. To become convinced of this, one needs only write down any of the monograms on page 101, one hundred times, watching the number of seconds required to do it; then write the same syllable according to another method that requires one or two angles, one hundred times also: by the time spent in writing each kind it will be easy to see which is the shortest.

The table on page 102, "pi-ep," "pi-et," etc., contains more angles than the preceding one; yet the angle with the preceding consonant is avoided in every case, and with the following one more than half the time.

All that has been said of the monograms on page 101, can apply as well to those on page 103.
