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

The date of the earliest stamp collection is presumed to be unascertainable. The first I ever saw was in 1854. The stamps were arranged on a chart; the names of the countries were placed in a column on the left and the stamps followed horizontally; it contained about one hundred stamps.—Dr. Viner.

Philately, as I understand it, does not mean merely the accumulation of a number of pieces of paper of different colors and designs, and issued by various countries and towns, sticking them in an album and then boast of the large number you possess. It implies a careful and accurate study of the postage stamps of all nations, in all their phases and varieties.—T. Coke.

Postal Difficulties of Long Ago.

In England in 1784 the first mail-coach started from St. Martin's-le-Grand. A handsome sight it presented with its four splendid horses, and its coachman and guard in brilliant scarlet uniform. The guard, armed with a wide-mouthed blunderbuss of gigantic proportions, ought to have carried terror to the hearts of the highwaymen who infested every road around the principal towns throughout the country, but it didn't, and the robbery of the night mails was a matter of constant occurrence, the guard usually being incontinently despoiled of the aforesaid arm as a preliminary,

Nor was this the only danger to which the mails were exposed. For the coach to be overturned by some huge stage wagon crawling along the narrow road in the darkness was to be expected now and again and in winter it was not at all unreasonable—at least so thought our forefathers—that it should be snowed up occasionally and perhaps be abandoned altogether, the driver and guard placing themselves and the mail-bags on the horses and leaving the unfortunate passengers to follow as well as they were able.

The mail-carriers were often found not wanting in noble devotion to their duty, sacrificing even their own lives in the endeavor to get the mails to their destination. Take the instance of John Goodfellow, mail coachman, and James Mc George, mail guard—their names are worth preserving. Starting from Edinburgh to Dumfries they found before long that it was impossible for the wearied horses to drag the coach any farther; so, taking them out of the

traces and strapping the mail on the two spare horses, they mounted the others and, securing the services of a local postboy as guide, continued their journey. Soon the road became so heavy that the exhausted horses could be urged forward no longer. But the men did not give up. Sending the horses back in charge of the boy, they struggled on bravely with the bags, and five days afterwards their bodies were found stiff in death; but the bags were safe and sound, fixed to a stake some distance off—the last act of the dying men, good and loyal servants, "faithful unto death."

A Unique Postal Race.

Mr. Robert McClure, Glasgow, Scotland, engineered a unique scheme for the purpose of determining the shortest route around the earth. The method employed was both novel and simple—by mailing four postcards in as many different directions. The card which made the best time was mailed from Glasgow to Yokohama, Japan, and readressed there to Winnipeg, Manitoba, and thence home to Glasgow in 76 days. Had it been addressed to Winnipeg via Vancouver instead of San Francisco, it would have gained several days and have made the trip in almost ten weeks. The second card was started off in the opposite direction via New York, Auckland, N. Z. Madras, India, and arrived home in exactly three calendar months. It would have gained a whole week had it reached Madras one day earlier. The other two cards were returned by the postal authorities at San Francisco and London respectively endorsed as "Unmailable" and "Contrary to postoffice regulations."

TAHITI

Counterfeited Surcharges.

Counterfeits of the provisional stamps of Tahiti have been seen quite frequently of late and notwithstanding they are not well enough counterfeited to deceive any experienced philatelists, as very happily, like many other cases, the counterfeiters have overlooked some of the most important features, it may not be out of order to give a few points to enable collectors to detect these forgeries.

The 25c on 35 yellow of the 1880 imperforated issue had its first and second types closely imitated but in most of the cases the counterfeited surcharges were seen on the reprints of the 35c stamp of the 1887 imperforated issue of the French Colonies which are a deep violet brown on orange instead of being gray violet brown on yellow and this alone should be sufficient to detect the fraud, but in the counterfeits the top bar measures 17mm and the bottom bar 16mm instead of being an even length measuring 15 to 16mm. The figures 25 are only 6½mm high instead of 7. The space between the figures and the bottom bar is 3mm and should only be 2½mm.

Cancelled specimens of these are easier yet to be detected as the bogus postmark used, has its inner circle made of dots instead of a continuous lined circle.

All the above points apply to the 25 on 40 vermilion on straw but here only reprints of the 40c stamp of the 1877 imperforated issue were used and as they are of the second type with the N of INV placed under U of Republique instead of having it under B.

The 5c on 20 green perforated of the 1884 issue which comes in four different types of surcharge, has also tempted the imitators but in all cases known they have added a bar to the A of TAHITI. In the 10c on 20 green of the same issue which originally came in four types, they have overlooked the peculiar shape and wideness of the A and the characteristic narrowness of the H in the word TAHITI. Of the last two, the surcharges were cut with a penknife in some ordinary wood in two blocks of four, one for each value, but after

some use, one, two and later on three, of each stamp got broken, the wood used for the engraving not being as hard as such usually used for that purpose and of course were withdrawn from use thus explaining why some surcharges are more numerous than others. Notwithstanding the 25c on 1fr bronze green imperforated is listed as 1882 issue it was really issued in 1884 the same time as the 5c and 10c on 20 green. In the counterfeits the figures 25 are as high and in the genuines the 5 is about 1mm higher than the 2.

There are numerous types of the diagonal overprint TAHITI of the 1893 issue, among which three very distinct varieties are known, but the forgeries measure differently from the genuines. The counterfeits which are more commonly met with are about 3½mm high and fully 20mm width from the first stroke of the T to the end of the I while the genuines are from 3½ to 3¾mm high and from 18½ to 19mm wide according to surcharge. Of the two lines overprint 1893 TAHITI there are also a number of varieties in the figures 1893 or in the letters of the word TAHITI, sometimes the stamps were overprinted two by two with a double hand-stamp, in some other cases the stamps were single overprinted.

All the surcharges and over prints were handstamped and sometimes show great differences between one another. This could be accounted for in the way the hand stamp has been applied on the postage stamp, the more or less ink used or the wear of the handstamp. So we have surcharges with T or the final I broken at top or bottom, T with one or two strokes missing, 1 or 3 broken, but these are infinitesimal accidental varieties which are certainly not worthy to be collected even by the more fastidious and I merely mention them so that they would not look suspicious if they should sometimes be met with.

The information given above will certainly enable anybody to tell the counterfeits from the genuines in most cases but it may be well to say that these imitations come principally from Bordeaux, Marseilles, Brussels, London, Cleveland, St. Louis and New York.

U. S. Notes.

I note in the latest edition of the "Universal Dictionary" (Nov. 1897) two very fine plates illustrating the fac-simile of the postage stamps of the world in their original colors.

Apropos to the above, this dictionary gives a fine definition of the word "Philately," with an additional description of stamp collecting, etc.

Mr. E. Y. Nash, the well known lawyer of Manitowoc, Wis., was a recent visitor to our city. This gentleman is an enthusiastic collector, brimful of philatelic gossip and always ready to augment his collection if the conditions are right.

The big D. P. A. Convention number of the ADVOCATE has eclipsed all former numbers, and to use the remarks of a disinterested collector to whom I have shown it, Messrs Starnaman Bros, are to be congratulated on the push and enterprise they have shown in bringing it to its high state of efficiency.

Many readers of the ADVOCATE will recall the enterprise shown by Mr. Henry Ades Fowler, late of Toronto, Canada,, in the issuance of his "Canadian Journal of Philately," (two numbers only) containing plates of the U. S. Government Counterfeits of the 1847 and 1857 issue, illustrating these stamps on the original cover. These two numbers, now eagerly sought after by literature collectors, are in my opinion the two finest copies of philatelic journals ever issued by a Canadian publisher. In a conversation with Mr. Fowler at the time he informed me that it cost him in the

neighborhood of \$300.00 to issue the two numbers.

The Omaha Philatelist has been consolidated with the Philatelic West and the publisher of the latter informs me that he will fill all unexpired subscriptions of the latter. Mr. Shepard is, I believe, a member of one of the crack Nebraska regiments which has been called to the front; so he finds that he will be unable to continue the publication of the O. P.

The great naval victory achieved by Admiral Dewey in the destruction of the Spanish fleet and the capture of Manila is on the lips of the general public of the U. S. Especially so with patriotic collectors many of whom, it is reported, can be seen with a current 1c envelope on manilla paper pinned to their coat lapel. Methinks that the collecting of U. S. wrappers and envelopes on manilla paper will be the ruling passion.

Samples of the 1c., 4c. and \$2.00 values of the Omaha Exposition Stamps have been received at the Omaha Post office up to time of writing (May 10th.) All the stamps will be printed in two colors. The rules of the International Postal Union will be observed as to the colors of the stamps where they apply.
