You collect quantity not quality; because if an inferior specimen of a stamp is offered you, you will accept it rather than wait for a better copy.-Walter A. Withrow.

Philately being a somewhat complicated and many sided study, it follows that the learner must make a mistake or two some time during the period in which he is in the primary grade; but he can minimize the effect of any errors so that their ill in. Huence will be scarcely felt.-C. E. Severn.

While admitting that individuals have a perfect right to collect whatever they like, or even to imagine varieties if such is their humor, it becomes positively pernicious for priests of the order to iusist on, as essentials, what have not even the prominence of indifferent truths, are in fact, the merest fads, calculated first to mislead and then disgust.-W. H. Wilson.

Revenue stamps were not so quick to adopt the perforating machine and hence we find imperforated revenue stamps being issued a few years after the perforating machine had been introduced into the postal countries of the globe.-E. Paget.

# How Some Collectors Collect. 

By Observer.
He who thinks he can find within himself the means of doing without others is much mistaken, but he who thinks others cannot do without him is still more mistaken. I have in mind a number of collectors whose collections range from 600 to 1500 and who are diligent collectors in their way. They go through the alleys rumaging in waste paper boxes and can also be found at the dumps awaiting big barrels and boxes of store papers. 'T hey hear of some firm about to move and away they rush basket in hand and then spend their evenings looking over the "find," They separate them and store most of them in books or large envelopes and parade around among collectors and finally return them to the side of the less valuable ones of the same "find." You ask them if they are for sale they answer "well I don't know, they are valuable stampis, if I sold them they ougnt to be worth catalogue price." On inquiring if he took a stamp paper, he replied, "No, I have not as yet but told the boy we ought to take one of the cheaper ones for we get tired looking at the same old catalogue for a year," This same party is worth five hundred times more than the "observer" the one who did not make the find. He does not understand why he cannot sell his stamps at catalogue prices. His collection numbers 1650 and he has sufficient old revenues and $U$. S. adhesives which if exchanged judiciously would increase his collection to 5000 . He is a stamp miser and not a philatelist.
There is unother "Stamp Find" as he
calls himself but who could rightly be called "Stamp Fiend" as the saying goes. He recently mutilated Court House records in his own county to an alarming extent for the parpose of malking a find of revenues He did not attempt to remove the stamps carefully by aid of dampened bloting paper but deliberately cut out with his knife, paper and all regardless of how valuable the document was to its owner. This same collector through a relative in the East received some weeks :gro. five Newfoundland surcharges. A block of four and a single. His relative is not a collector but wrote that the stamps were worth more than face value. This enterprising collector had never desised philatelic reading. He had taken a paper one year but gave it up becuuse it cost half a dollar and had too many advertisements. With these four stamps, he reasoned that if he was sharp enough to drive a bargain at a little over double face value he was really doing the other fellow, for very soon other stamps like these would be floating around almost as thick as the two cent Onahas. He had in mind the thought that when you get the best of a bargain its cunnning. He will soon forget this when he awakens and reads a yellow surcharge across his field of vision something like this-When the other fellow gets the best of a bargain it.s cheating. He sold the block of tour at ten cents each and he carefully cement ed the other in his collection. This was type I; the block of four had two of type I and two of type II. These tive are the only ones in a city of fifty thousand inhabtants and have been pronounced genuine. He has not as yet decided to take a paper. It costs too much and then he always gres by the catalogue. That collector and there are thousinds like him is "penny wise and pound foolish."
Every collector, if only the possessor of am outfit and a few dozen stamps, should take at least two or three stamp papers. Be awake and up with the times; it costs but a few cents to have two or threegood papers dropped down before you every month.

## U.S.Jottings.

The New York Philatelist is offered as a premium in the Scott Co's advertisements in some papers. This too would seem to prove the real ownership, for in these days of short-lived stamp papers, the Scott Co. would scarcely guarantee a year's publication of a paper in which they have no financial interest.

Three philatelic lights have gone out during the warm months-the Home Worker, Temnessee and Pennsy. In stampdom there has grown an adage that if a stamp paper can survive the summer the balance of the year will be rosy. To the credit of the Adrocate belongs the honor of surviving two warm seasons and notonly that, but growing better as time progresses.

The old and most respected "Eastern Philatelist" has again changed its home. The writer vell remembers the stormy days of journalistic life the E. P. encountered during the days when its home was in Fitchburg. Mr. Pinkham hats given us a good paper and it is to be hoped that its new owner, Mr. Drew, of Boston, will give us as good a journal as has his predecessor.

The principal topies of concern for collectors is, "What are we going to do about the Spanish Colonies?" The behef seems to prevail that we will keep them. This belief has made business good in Porto Rico Cuba and l'hillipine stamps. Collectors are filling up the blank spaces. in these colonies

## Anent Mounting.

By Leon V. Cass.
After a tince every collector finds his small album too small for his rapidly growing collection. Therefore he buys a new one, either a printed ulbum or one of the blank ones which are becoming so popular of late. And now comes the work of mounting your collection.

The method of mounting depends largely on the album. If you have a blank album a good plan is to mount your stamps in various shapes representing differentobjects peculiar to the country the stamps are from. Say for instince you form a flag or battleship, with the U. S. Revenues.

But should you select a printed album, your stamps will have to be mounted in sets to conform with the spaces in the album. When you are mounting your collection in a permanent book you should be careful to remove every particle of paper from the back of your stamps before mounting it. Even a hinge should be removed as if it remains it will make an unsightly lump and
will in a measure distigure your collection. A good way to remove the piper is $t$, fress the stamp between two damp blutting p.циегs.

Always press your stamps after wettmgr them as they are liable to curl up and crack if they are left to dry.
(Jollectors should not soak a mixerd lot of stamps together as some of the colors will run and tint the stamp.

The next thing to consider is the hinges and this is a more important question than many collectors seem to think. Never use tough thick hinges for they are sure to tear either the stamps or the album. I use a thin die cut hinge that will peel without tearing.

Don't tiy to save money by making your own hinges as you are sure to lose in the long run, but buy good hinges. The "Perfect" hinge is the best I have ever tried and I advise collectors to use no other hinge on the market.

Last, but by no means least, I think collectors should mark details under their stamps. For instance if you have a Br . Colonial watermarked C. C. or C. A. mark the watormark under the stamp, or suppose you have a grilled U. S. mark the size of grille underneath the stamp. You will find this plansaves you both time and trouble.
