A collector who goes in for nitput varieties to any beyond the most limit cit extent can only rollect in a blank al ours has ratalogue will show him what there is to be cullerted, and he can surely arrange his stamps in acordance with the ratalogue without equippe numbered spaces to show him where to nut each specimen. What is really wanted by the beginner is a tassified catelogue, including, or s' cust indicating, every possible variety but at the same time separating the more important from those that are less se giving, first, lists, as one might say of stamps in their various designs colours and values, as recognized by the Post Offices, followed by lists of the varieties recognized in philatelists as it these varieties further classified as far as run be done, occording to their relative importance from a scientific point of view Thus the beginner be taught how to begin and at the same time would have before his eyes the road that he might pursue if he des nes to become a philaselist

The Prince of Stamp Collectors

The prince of stamp collectors is unmonbledly M. Ferratt, of Parls. Vittually procless are the stamp collections of this gentleman, and his devotion to the hobby may be ensured from the met that he keeps there accretative cano. fally to look after the precious bits of coloured paper, which are arranged and catalogued in luxurious libraries. M. Ferrari possesses no less than eight specimens of the famous "Post Office Maurithus," the rarest stamp in the world, of which only fourteen copies are known to exist. The actual value of this stamp-which has been known to fetch privately the large sum of \$1930, more than 90,000 times its face value-arises from the fact that it bears the words 'Post Other' instead of the regulation "Post Paid." It was found in 1847, and is so very highly prized that not long agos wildly enthutiastic collector advertised that he was willing overcapond, with a view to matrimony, with a larly possessing a copy of "Post Office Me entius," 1847 The 2 penny blue "pert paid" Mauntine fe annther very valuable stamp, an I at an auction a copy of it has actually realized \$700the highest price ever puld for a stamp anid in this way. The particular specmen was unit-of, but even a cancelled copy has been sold for \$460.

There was recently a large sale of carners's tamps from the F. W. Hunter collection in New York. The largest buyer was H. L. Caiman, of the Sout-Stamp Company who represented over a hundred collectors. J. C. Bidwell was a heavy puyer also on behilf of a lar e number of philateries.

The Lits offered at sale were of cutriers to waterper united letter; telegrapa and local stimps, wrappers, envelopes and plate numbers, which, while fare are not as much desired by collectors and do not bring such good prices as postage stamps. The carriers' stampe brought the highest prices. Mr. Bidwell buying a New York carmer's stamp-two cent on three cent. on one and cover -the only copy known, f a 3261, the inghess price daid at the sale, H. L.
