## Letter from the Vice-President of Nova Scotia.

DEAR EDITOR,—As you do not appear to be troubled with many letters from Nova Scotia, I made up my mind to write you one on matters in general.

Our Canadian Association is now an accomplished fact, and I think we may justly congratulate ourselves upon the success of the movement which has thus banded the stamp collectors of Canada into one general association.

I am finding evidence almost every week of the interest that is being awakened in the minds of old time collectors who have long been slumbering, but are again coming to the front and taking up their old hobby with renewed vigor.

This new inspiration is mainly due to the increased importance which our common bond of brotherhood gives us.

I have talked to several old collectors within a few weeks, who for years have not added a stamp to their collections. In fact had almost forgotten the existence of that evidence of youthful folly. But are now coming rapidly into line, and intend to identify themselves with us and try to regain their lost ground.

The lasting benefits that this increased interest will confer on the Association are apparent.

While some of those ancient collectors

to be very active our membership will at least gain temporarily.

But the more important point is that many old collections thus resurrected will find their way into the hands of live collectors which would otherwise long "lie deeply hidden from human eye." Thus we will all be benefited more or less directly.

Now for another point I wish to touch upon: Our very efficient and painstaking Exchange Supetintendent evidently has his department in full swing. I have seen several of the books and covers on circuit and while some of them are very creditable I am compelled to say that they contain too large a proportion of the veriest trash imaginable.

This association is not composed of boys. Stamp collecting is no longer child's play. In these latter days stamp collectors to be successful require brains, industry, education or intelligence and some money.

Our association is largely composed of men who make Philately a study for the pleasure and profit they draw from it. Men who are will to spend sometime and some money in their pleasant pursuit. Then why afflict them by sending out such sheets as those of forty (40) stamps -total value \$1.25 to \$1.50 and so on up to \$2.00.

What can a collector, having over 3,000 will doubtless tire of the work and crease in his album, want of such sheets they get

to be regular old "chestnuts" long before that number is reached.

I hope that in course of time the quality of our sheets will improve for it certainly should not take long to convince those who make up cheap and trashy sheets that our members do not want

Another difficulty is pricing rare stamps. Members putting rare stamps on their sheets naturally want to secure the highest price possible, and thus when catalogue prices are once departed from there is no limit to the extravagent values that are placed on sheets of more or less rarity.

At this moment I am not prepared to suggest any plan for regulating this question of values.

I think this matter is one of the most important that the association will have deal with at its annual communication.

And now for a look at the Nova Scotia Branch Society for a moment: I had the pleasure of presiding at its last regular meeting in May and I assure you it afforded me great satisfaction. I find the memhers fully alive to their work. The average intelligence and standing of the members is high, and they follow their private study most perseveringly. I venture to say that there is in the N.S.P.A. the material for some eminent Philatelists.

I trust when the place and time of our annual meeting is decided upon that it will be a brilliant success, for there is nothing like personal intercourse of its members to benefit the association. The meeting together and interchange of thoughts and opinions are of more practical value than all the correspondence of a decade. shall attend if possible wherever the meeting is called.

Trusting, Mr. Editor, that I have not taken too much of your space.

To the Members of the C.P.A.:

GENTLEMEN.—Is it not time that the question when and where the first annual Convention of the C.P.A. should be held should come up for discussion? general understanding, I think, last winter was that It would be held in Montreal or Toronto in January, 1889. Now is not January, or in fact any of the winter months, a wrong time in which to hold this convention? It is well known that during the winter months, many at a distance would not be able at attend, and besides this, the modes of transit are not at all times to be relied upon; for instance, it might happen that a big snowstorm might come and block up the northern branch of the I. C. R., as it has frequently done in the past for a week or so, consequently the members of our Association from the Maritime Provinces would be unable to attend. This party I intend to prosecute, and have already made complaints to the head postal authorities at Washington, and also to the U.S. marshal in Lancaster county. The Hawkeye State Collector throws some light on the mystic Miss Greene, and in conjunction with the authorities I hope to place this swindler in the arms of the law. The reference this party has been giving is J. J. Winters, attorney-at law, of Denton. Further interesting developments anxiously expected.

## Canadian Postage Stamps.

BY CANADENSIS.

By the Dominion Auditor-General's Report considerable information of interest to philatelists is contained therein. largest number of any particular denomination of stamps issued was the 3c., while the 15c. is the least in demand. For every 5c. registered letter stamp used there are eight 2c. registered stamps. The ordinary stamps from 1c. to 15c. cost 25c. per 1000, and 50c. per 1,000 for registered stamps; 1c. postcards cost the Government \$1.25 per 1,000; the 2c. \$3.50 per 1,000; reply cards, \$3.25 per 1,000; wrappers, \$2 per 1,000: 1c. and 3c. envelopes (No. 1 size) \$3 per 1,000; 3c. envelopes (No. 2 size) \$3.50 per 1,000. For each new plate it costs \$150; the registered letter plates being valued at \$75 each. The following table will show the comparative number of stamps issued and hence their scarcity.

## Women in the English Post Office.

Mrs. Millicent Fawcett, widow of the blind Postmaster-General of England, talks of coming to this country to give a course of lectures. She is and has been for years profoundly interested in everything concerning the advancement of her sex, and it was owing to her influence that her husband, upon assuming the Postmaster-Generalship, threw open the appointments to unrestricted competition and strove long and earnestly to have the wages of women employed in the postoffice greatly increased. Mr. Fawcett was totally blind when he assumed the responsible position of controlling the British postal system, but his energetic and devoted wife supplied him with eyes and wasso helpful and skilful that he carried on the department to the entire satisfaction of the public and the authorities. Until Mr. Fawcett's appointment it was difficult for women to get positions in the post-offices, and three nominees competent for each appointment. He abolished the system of nomination altogether, and competitors were subject to only three conditionsthat their ages must be no less than 18 or more than 20, and only widows and single women were eligible, and that they must be duly qualified in respect to health and character. Arithmetic, English composition, geography, history and chirography are the subjects of their competitive examinations. When Mr. Fawcett entered upon his duties the initial salary of the second-class female clerk was £40. By his urgent appeal this was raised to £65 for London clerkships, with a yearly increase of £3 until they reach £80. Edinburgh and Dublin the salary begins at £55 and rises to £60. Promotion to a higher class of service obtains higher salaries. The highest salary earned by ment reports the work of the women ed with the gift of a dollar.

clerks is referred to as particularly good and quite equal to that of the men, their salaries, however, remaining but one-third of what is paid to the men. This injustice Mrs. Fawcett has devoted years of effort to abolish, and though only in very few instances has there been any movement towards equalisation, she is not discouraged but firmly believes that evantually clerks will be estimated and rewarded solely by the work they do and not by a mere question of sex. All told, there are 2,981 women employed by the postoffice of the United Kingdom, 750 being in the central establishments of London, Edinburgh and Dublin, and thirty-six in the Provinces. The rest are in the savings bank and telegraphic departments.
