WHEN the PRIZE LIST OF THE PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION AT KENTVILLE comes hand we shall issue a *Supplementary Number* of the *Journal* with a reprint of it.

MANGEL WURZEL is a crop that is increasing in favour immensely in Europe, under high cultivation. As we improve and enrich our fields, it will also become better known and appreciated with us. It appears that it does not succeed in stiff soils. Such lands are, in fact, unsuited to all kinds of root cultivation, strictly speaking. The preparation of the land is critical and expensive, the results dubious, and the after-effects upon the succeeding crop unsatisfactory.

On lighter clays root cultivation may, to a limited extent, be carried on to a fit. But, in such soils the writer of article in the *Agricultural Gazette* which suggests these present remarks of points out the superiority of "HORSE BEANS" to Mangels. The bean (he says) is in clay, and does not mind a sour

It yields, in straw and corn, dry or equal in value to that contained in 10 tons of mangels, and it leaves the soil in better condition for a cereal grain

It is cheaper grown and more easily turned into money. Now what about HORSE BEANS? The grain here referred to is not the semi-tropical crop known in America as "bush beans" or "pole beans," or "white beans," or "wicots," and a hundred other names, but a totally different plant, with a stout, hairy stem, robust habit, easy cultivation, and of the highest nutritious qualities. It approaches in appearance and

style, the "broad Windsor beans," the "long pod beans" of gardeners, but belongs to a species quite different even from these. It is the *Faba vulgaris*, or, more strictly, the *Faba equina*, of botanists,—the Horse Bean of Scotch Farmers, originally believed to be a native of Egypt, but known and grown and fed upon by the Britons, before they were visited by the Romans. It is a crop that is entirely unknown on the American Continent, except in the Province of Nova Scotia, where it has been grown by only a few persons. The solitary sample of Horse Beans at the Centennial Exhibition at Philadelphia, was from Annapolis, Nova Scotia. The reason of this is easily discovered. The plant will grow, but will not produce its grain, either in the United States or Ontario. It is essentially a maritime plant; it requires the comparatively cool moist air from the sea to keep it in health and vigour. Our readers will perceive that this is a crop peculiarly deserving of attention in this Province. That it grows quite as well here as in Scotland we can testify from having raised it year after year, and it has likewise been grown with success by Mr. McKinlay, at Sunnyside, Dutch Village, by Mr. C. B. Whitman, Bridgetown, Annapolis, who gained first prize at the Provincial Exhibition of 1872, and by Mr. T. B. Smith, who took the prize at Truro last year. Who the other three entries of Horse Beans were made by last year we do not know.

Horse Beans are valued in Scotland above every other kind of feed for working horses, and they merely require to be

known in America, to attain an unlimited demand.

The gray HORSE PEA is usually grown with the Bean in Scotland. We do not know whether any one is growing it this year, although a prize is offered for it at the Kentville Provincial Exhibition. We fear the Prize List has not been issued in time to induce competition.

The Competition is thrown open to the whole Province. We hear that some of the leading breeders of thorough-bred stock in other Counties intend to accept the liberal invitation of the Colchester farmers to compete for their County prizes.

**GENERAL REGULATIONS.**

1. The Exhibition grounds and buildings will be opened on Tuesday, September 25th at 9 o'clock, a.m., and continue open during the day till sunset, for the reception and arrangement of Exhibition articles and animals. Exhibitors on arrival will immediately report themselves at the office of the Secretary who, with assistance of Committee of Management, will allot appropriate pens or space for their exhibits. This day none but members of the General Committee, officials, exhibitors and necessary attendants will be admitted.

2. Live animals, flowers, and perishable articles, will be received on Wednesday morning from sunrise up to 9 o'clock, unavoidable delays to be dealt with at the discretion of the Committee.

3. The exhibition will be open to the public on Wednesday, the 26th, at 10 o'clock, a.m., when an opening address will be given. The Grounds and Buildings will be open each succeeding day to visitors from 9 a.m. Admission 25 cents. Children 10 cents. Bands of music will be in attendance daily.

4. The Judges will meet at the Secretary's office on, Wednesday, the 26th at 9 a.m., obtain entry books and proceed to award premiums. On completing their work which must be finished by Wednesday, at 6 o'clock, p.m., they will personally show their books to the Secretary, and will be furnished with the requisite Prize Tickets, which it will be their duty to place carefully, and as soon as possible, upon the various articles, before giving up their books and report.

5. Exhibits may be removed from the Grounds on Thursday afternoon, at 4 o'clock, immediately after the closing ceremonies. The Treasurer will commence to pay premiums on the Grounds at 9 a.m. on Thursday.

6. Every intending competitor must transmit to the Secretary not later than the dates mentioned below, an entry paper containing a correct list of the animals or articles which he intends to exhibit together with certificate of pedigree in the case of thorough-bred stock, or else a reference to the registry numbers of the Nova Scotian Stock Register. Any competitor failing to transmit his entry certificate at the proper time will be excluded from competition. No fee is charged for the entry of animals or articles.

7. Horses, cattle, sheep, swine and poultry, must be entered on or before Monday, 10th September, two weeks preceding the show, and the age of each animal should be stated in years and months, at date of exhibition; the precise date of birth to be given when necessary.

8. Plants and Flowers, Grain, Roots, Vegetables, and other Field and Garden products. Agricultural Implements, and manufactures of all kinds, articles not elsewhere enumerated, may be entered up to Saturday, 15th September, one clear week preceding the show.

9. Exhibitors of bulky articles, requiring extensive or unusual accommodation, should communicate with the Secretary on or before Monday, 17th September, in order that there may be time for the Committee to make the requisite arrangements.

10. All articles for exhibition must be on the grounds on Tuesday, 25th September, after which day none will be received, except live stock, flowers, and

other perishable articles which will be received up to 9 a.m. on Wednesday, 26th. All necessary erections, and bulky articles requiring to be put together on the grounds or in the buildings, must be finished, and all waste material and rubbish removed, not later than 12 o'clock, on Monday, 24th September, as no such work can be permitted during the show days.

11. Exhibitors will in every case give the necessary personal attention to whatever they exhibit. Necessary attendants upon stock will be furnished with admission tickets with their names written upon them, for 25 cents, good for the whole time of the Exhibition, which tickets must be presented at the *Exhibition Gate only*, during the Show; such tickets to be obtained from the Secretary, by personal application.

12. All articles for competition shall be the production or manufacture of the exhibitor, except when otherwise mentioned, field produce must be the growth of 1877; and live stock must have been owned by the exhibitor, except that imported for breeding purposes not less than three months prior to the Exhibition.

13. Articles from other countries, and especially from other Provinces of the Dominion, are solicited, but not for competition. The Judges will have the power of granting a limited number of honorary prizes for such articles.

14. All expenses incurred in the conveyance of articles or animals to and from Truro, placing them in the exhibition, and maintaining them while there shall be borne by the exhibitors, who must likewise undertake all risk of loss or damage. Articles must in every case be delivered free of expense to the committee.

15. Each exhibitor will receive from the Secretary an entry ticket for every article to be exhibited by him, and he is required to affix such ticket upon the article or animal which he exhibits, or on the stalls.

In the Woollen Factory and Fine Art Department "Delivery Cards" will be furnished the exhibitors when such articles are entered in the Secretary's book, and no such exhibit can be removed from the building, unless these "Delivery Cards" are presented to those in charge of the Department.

16. When fewer than three competitors appear for any prize, and where the articles exhibited are of inferior merit, the judges shall have the discretionary power of awarding or withholding prizes or reducing their values. No article can take two prizes or be exhibited in two collections, unless the contrary is distinctly expressed in the prize list. In estimating the merits of live stock the judges are requested to take age into consideration where animals of different ages are competing against each other.

17. In case of ties, the judges will award the highest prize to animals from largest herds on the ground and to roots and grains from largest areas, upon proof furnished Secretary by exhibitors upon entering animals, &c., for exhibition. The committee are required to reject articles which they shall consider unworthy or unfit for exhibition.

18. No person shall be allowed to enter for Exhibition more than one specimen (or required quantity) in any one section or class. This rule is not to apply to animals, but to apply to all kinds of grain, vegetable products, plants and flowers, fruits, implements, home manufactures, &c.

19. During the exhibition, all vegetable products and manufactured articles shall be under the control of the Exhibition Superintendents, and all live stock shall be taken charge of by their owners, —the Superintendents giving all practicable assistance in providing the necessary accommodation and food. Hay, straw, oats and roots, will be supplied on the grounds at reasonable prices, and there will be a free supply of water.

20. All articles exposed for sale shall have the prices affixed, and be sold by the owners, or by parties appointed by them for that purpose. No Auctioneer will be allowed to sell animals or articles on the grounds or in the building without the written permission of the President or Secretary of the Committee, and the time and place of sale specified in such permission must be strictly adhered to.

21. Articles sent for competition or exhibition shall not be removed from the exhibition rooms or grounds, till the time appointed, under forfeiture of any prizes or awards that may have been made to the respective exhibitors.

22. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with the judges while in the discharge of their duties, or who shall attempt to influence their decisions by his presence or remarks, or who shall afterwards, within the limits of the show grounds, use any contemptuous or abusive language, in consequence of any award made, shall forfeit his right to any premiums to which he might otherwise be entitled, and be otherwise dealt with as the Committee may determine.

23. An Exhibitor who may feel aggrieved in consequence of any accidental irregularity, is requested simply to draw the attention of the Superintendent of the Department, or of some member of the Committee, to such, without entering into any discussion apt to cause hindrance or distraction. Should he not receive what he may consider sufficient redress on the spot, he must nevertheless abide by the decision given, but he may at the close of the Exhibition, bring the matter

before the Committee by written statement, with a view to full enquiry.

24. No animal can be admitted within the enclosure that has not been previously entered in accordance with Regulations 6 and 7, and animals of an inferior character, unworthy of a place in the exhibition, will not be admitted under any circumstances.

25. Space will be provided for any article that may be forwarded for exhibition, subject to approval of Committee, apart from such as are mentioned in the Prize List. Award of merit will be offered for such, all of which exhibits must be entered on the Secretary's Book in the manner prescribed for those that come within the Prize List.

**COLCHESTER COUNTY EXHIBITION PRIZE LIST.**

The Colchester County Exhibition which opens on Tuesday September 25th, and closes on the 27th, will likely be attended by many visitors from different parts of the Province. The Prize list has, as far as possible, been arranged to bring out the many varied industries of the County. In class 1, Horses, \$199 are offered; in class 2, Cattle, \$560; in class 3, Sheep, \$96; in class 4, Swine, \$81; in class 5, Poultry, \$31.50; in class 6, Roots and Vegetables, \$78.50; in class 7, Grain and Field Seeds, Grain Manufactures, &c., \$40.50; in class 8, Dairy Produce, \$25; in class 9, Woollen Manufactures, Flax, and Straw Goods, \$91; in class 10, Fruits, \$47;

in Ornamental Plants and Flowers, \$46.5 in class 12, Manufactures, \$434; besides number of extra prizes have been offered. The total amounts to \$1735, the largest sum ever offered at a County Exhibition in Nova Scotia. We hope our farmers and mechanics will come out in full force. The Regulations are almost the same as at the Provincial Exhibition in October last. We notice a change in Rule 11, wherein we find the necessary attendants upon stock will not be admitted free but will receive tickets with their names upon them for 25 cents while will be good for the whole exhibition. This is a good arrangement and will prevent any one from entering an animal, whether fit for competition or not, merely for the sake of the tree pass as an attendant upon such stock. We hope that the Committee will also carry out the last part of Rule 24. In Rule 15 a slight change is introduced; to prevent confusion and obviate the loss of articles, we find that no exhibit can be removed from the Woollen Manufactures and Fine Arts Department without presenting to the heads of that department a "Delivery Card," furnished each exhibitor therein, at the time of entering his or her articles. We hope this experiment, for such we understand it to be, may prove successful, and that after the exhibition no complaint whatever may be made of articles lost, &c. The change in Rule 12 may keep out certain flocks of geese that were prize winners last October.—*Sun*.

We have received from W. D. Dimock, Esq., Secretary of the Provincial Exhibition of 1876, the following memorandum of an omission in the published Prize List of that Exhibition. We join in the Secretary's expression of regret that the admirable work done in the *Sun* office should have been overlooked in the printed Report, for we believe the Exhibition Committee, in carrying out their labors to a successful issue, had no more faithful or useful ally than the Editor of the *Sun*:

"We regret that inadvertently "Specimens of Book and Job Printing" from the *Sun* office, Truro, that received a Certificate of Merit at the Provincial Exhibition last October, were omitted from the list of articles receiving such honor certificates published in the Annual Report of the Central Board of Agriculture. The Specimens exhibited by Mr. Alley were admitted by all to be exceedingly creditable to his office and in the mechanical execution were almost faultless."

The arrangements for Stud Horses, for the season, so far as we have been able to ascertain, are as follows:

**MARQUIS OF LORNE**, will make the season of 1877 in the County of Hants, commencing about the middle of May, and will travel between Falmouth and Shubenacadie. The owner is Alexander Ross, Middle River, Pictou. This is an English Draught Horse. He was selected at the Hamilton, Ontario, Exhibition,

in 1872, by Messrs. Northup, Brown and Lawson, for the Board of Agriculture. He is of a beautiful brown color, stands 16 hands, with strong muscle and well set limbs, has good action and moves in a fine graceful style. He gained seven different prizes at shows in Ontario.

**BRUTUS** selected by Messrs. Matheson and Archibald, and imported by them for the Board in 1873, is advertised by Murdoch McKenzie, Upper North River, to stand at the following places, viz.:—Truro, Stewiacke, Upper Stewiacke, Brookfield, East Mountain, Earltown; Four Mile Brook, Pictou County, Salt Springs, Kemptown. **GENERAL GRANT**, John Ferguson, Acadian Mines, Proprietor and Groom, will travel, at least during the greater part of the season, between Acadian Mines, Truro, and Wallace. The Horse is jet black, 8 years old, nearly 18 hands high, and weighs 1660 lbs. He is a handsome horse for agricultural and draft purpose.
