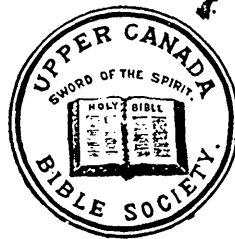

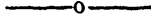

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LAWS AND REGULATIONS  
OF THE  
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

*As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the third day of August, 1855; and amended at a General Meeting held on the 13th day of April, 1880.*

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, and a representative from each Branch as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The five clerical and five lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election, except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the country, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be *ex-officio* such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depository, Colporteurs, Bookkeeper,

and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances ; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President, or of any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society ; when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen ; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depository's accounts, duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration in these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alteration has been given to the Board.

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#### RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday-schools, the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the School ; the number of Scholars and Teachers ; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers ; who are its officers ; and why it is necessary to make such application : all which should in every case be certified by a Minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements ; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

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## RULES

### RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES

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I. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment: the English copies, being of the authorized version *only*.

II. That the Society be denominated "THE \_\_\_\_\_ BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually, or five dollars at one time, shall be members of this Society.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than \_\_\_\_\_ other members; five to constitute a quorum.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who join the Society shall be reckoned members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into districts, and appoint visitors for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted yearly to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the Indian languages, and for supplying other nations, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God: or for the purchase of Bibles and Testaments to supply the neighbourhood *at cost price*, or gratuitously to those who cannot purchase.

IX. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, in each year, at \_\_\_\_\_, when the accounts shall be presented; the proceedings of the past year stated; a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required.

X. That on the formation of a new committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.



# FORTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

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In this semi-centennial year of the City of Toronto the minds of most of its inhabitants are naturally carried back to the year of its incorporation, and they desire to recall and realize the state of things existing in the then newly inaugurated city. Especially is this the case with those who were themselves living in it at that time. Although this professes to be only the forty-fourth annual report of the Upper Canada Bible Society, as strictly it is, yet this Society can rightly claim its place among the institutions of the city at the time of its incorporation, for the change of name and the extension of its field in 1840 did not destroy its individuality. It is fitting, therefore, at this time to take a brief glance back at its past history.

As early as in the year 1818 a Society was formed under the title of "The Bible Society of Upper Canada." Among the speakers at the meeting at which it was organized were two men whose names can never be forgotten in the history of this city; the Rev. Dr. Strachan, afterwards the first Bishop of Toronto, and Jesse Ketchum, Esq., the munificent benefactor of this Society. The Rev. Dr. Strachan, was in fact the founder of that Society, and the moving spirit of the meeting, and we cannot refrain from quoting one passage from his speech. He said "in this country where all denominations of Christians meet together, there is generally a disposition to unite and be kindly affectionate one towards another. This spirit should be cherished, and no Society can promote it more than one for disseminating the Sacred Scriptures." However, the Society then started only continued three or four years, and the real existence of this Society properly dates from the 3rd of November 1828, when the "York Auxiliary Bible Society" was organized under the Presidency of the Hon. John Henry Dunn. The first anniversary meeting was held in the Steamboat Hotel on the 9th of February 1830, when the total income for the first year was reported as £180.10.0, or as we would say in these days \$722.00. The total distribution had been 542 copies. The young Society took up very vigorously the important matter of getting the Scriptures translated into the Chippewa, or more properly Ojibway, language, and at this first anniversary was able to report that the first seven chapters of St. Matthew had, at its request and expense, been translated by the Rev. Peter Jones.

When the city was incorporated in 1834 the name was changed to "The City of Toronto Auxiliary Bible Society," and the report of that year states that during the year 1833 the receipts had been \$680 for sales, and \$678 from donations and subscriptions, making a total of \$1358. The issues had been

1777 and the number of Branches was 30. The report also states that the Rev. Peter Jones had completed the translation of the Book of Genesis into the Ojibway language; and that the Society had during the year circulated the Gospels of St. Matthew and St. John among the Indians at the different mission stations in the Province. In the year 1840 the present style and title of the Society was adopted, and in a circular which was issued to announce this we find the following words, which give us the object aimed at by the change: "With a view to unite into one body all the different Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate all the Bible operations in the same, in order to give more efficiency to the whole, the Society has assumed a Provincial character under the name of 'The Upper Canada Bible Society.'" The circular then goes on to enumerate several advantages to be gained by this step, among which is the appointment of the Rev. James Richardson, afterwards Bishop Richardson, as Agent to visit and stimulate the Branches, and to form new ones. The total income of the Society that year was \$2055, and the issues were 2,819 copies. The income in the year now just closed has been \$30,633 and the issues 31,271. In the course of its history the Society has received \$851,569 with which it has circulated 1,240,141 copies of the Holy Scriptures in its own field, and has sent over \$250,000 to spread the word of God in Romish, Mohammedan, and Heathen lands.

The total income of the year just closed has been \$912 less than that of the previous year, but a larger decrease might have been expected as money has been less abundant; moreover, the Directors feel encouraged by the fact that the free contributions from the Branches are in advance, although several of the larger ones have fallen far short of their usual standard, and they hope that this may be taken as an indication that the field is being more fully occupied and better canvassed. The whole decrease is more than accounted for by the unusually large amount received from bequests in the previous year; and although the proceeds of sales are less, it is gratifying to mark that the number of issues is greater by 1506 copies.

The only bequest received during the year was the very handsome one of \$1,000 from the late James Michie, Esq., of Toronto. The larger donations received have been \$100 from Donald Fraser, Esq., of Nairn, \$100 "In memory of a beloved brother," \$100 from Miss Helen Lesslie, of Dundas, \$100 from John W. Ball, Esq., of Niagara, \$50 from Robert Black, Esq., of Brussels, and \$50 from Ferguson Whiteside, Esq., of Little Britain.

During the year the Society has lost one of its oldest Vice-Presidents by the death of W. A. Baldwin, Esq. He was a member of the Society from its beginning, and was for several years one of its Secretaries; but for some time back has been unable to attend the meetings of the Board. Several losses have been sustained by the removal of efficient Officers of Branches in different parts of the field, some have gone to their rest above, and some have emigrated to the North-West, where we trust they will yet render good service to the Bible Cause. Prominent among the former was the late F. C. Lesbirel, Esq., the zealous President of the Tiverton Branch. On the last day of February one of the Society's most zealous and liberal supporters, Donald Fraser, Esq., of East Williams, entered his rest after a long and faithful Christian course. His former pastor, now in Scotland, who had known him for 50 years, says he was "ever unwearied in well doing." Although not an office bearer at the time of his death, he had been on the committee of the model Branch of East Williams from the beginning, and Mr. Menzies, the Secretary, says he thinks he never missed a meeting for twenty-two years. Not only in the year just closed, as seen in the preceding paragraph, but several times within the last few years, he has sent very handsome donations, and during his last illness he gave directions that another hundred dollars should be sent to our Society.

Just before the close of its year the Society lost one of its most valuable and valued friends by the death of the Rev. W. W. Ross, who had been its Permanent Agent from 1875 to 1879. The success of his special mission to to Manitoba on behalf of the Society was one of the most encouraging features in the last Annual Report. The great value of his services have more than once been publicly acknowledged not only by the Board of Directors, but also by the Branches in Manitoba. As he continued to the end ever ready to do anything in his power for the Society, the Directors looked upon him as one whose zeal, tact, experience, and readiness might be called upon, as occasion required, for many years to come. They cannot, therefore, but feel a sense of great loss by his removal from this scene of action.

In the last Annual Report attention was called to the very dilapidated state of the building jointly owned and occupied by this Society and the Tract Society, and the necessity of providing a new building at an early date; and the Directors were able to report that already several handsome sums had been subscribed for that purpose. They regret to say that very little progress has been made in this matter during the past year; but the Joint Committee has lately appointed Mr. William Hewitt to solicit subscriptions for the Building Fund, and as he is well known to the business community, they hope he will be heartily received and encouraged in this good work. The Directors trust that when this need is really brought before the minds of the Christian public of Toronto, they will in this semi-centennial year of the City readily subscribe the very moderate amount required to provide a suitable habitation for two of its oldest institutions.

#### BRANCHES.

In the past year, as in every third year, the Board wished to have all the Branches visited by the Agents, which for several reasons is desirable, and therefore did not request any to dispense with such help. A few, however, intimated a wish to do so, and the Directors, of course, acquiesced. Nevertheless the visitation and inspection of the Branches and Depositories throughout the field may honestly be reported as fairly complete, and on the whole very satisfactory.

With very few exceptions, the Depositories are reported as being in good condition; but a few cases of negligence have been brought under the notice of the Board. One Agent reports that in a certain place he found on visiting the Depository that "the Bibles were not at all exposed to the view of persons coming in; but were in a box covered up with goods in a room over the store." Another Agent reports that in another place "the Bibles fell into the hands of some man who bought the insolvent estate of the former Depository, and refused to give them up, thus entailing quite a loss on the Branch." Such negligence is very annoying, and these cases shew the importance of officers and committees of Branches remembering their responsibility in reference to their Depositories. But when it is considered how few such cases are among nearly 400 Depositories, the Directors think they may fairly report that the Society's affairs in this department are in a very satisfactory condition.

Only two new Branches have been formed during the year viz:— Fort Erie, and Midway, and one new Depository opened at Fort Simpson, on the Mackenzie River in the far North-West; on the other hand one Branch has been struck off the list, and three reduced to the rank of mere Depositories. This makes our present list to contain 403 Branches and 29 Depositories. At first sight this may appear to some as slightly retrogressive; but in fact real progress is being made in occupying the field. Some of the Branches are forming sub-branches, and others though not forming any subordinate organizations,

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are giving increased attention to their outlying districts, which is much better than multiplying weak Branches, and so increasing the expense of Agency.

### AGENCY.

The visitation was done by the Permanent Agent, nineteen Provisional Agents, and two Local or Provincial Agents: the Rev. O. Fortin, for Manitoba, and the Rev. R. Jamieson, for British Columbia. Their Reports have been almost all of an encouraging tone, some of them very much so. One writes: "From the office-bearers of all the Branches I received a cordial welcome, and if I may judge from the intercourse I had with them, your work has a firm hold on their confidence and affection. The collectors appointed to canvass the various sections were for the most part present at the meetings and seemed ready for their work. Too much praise cannot be given to these self-denying Christian ladies, and I am looking forward for a great advance in the subscriptions all along the line." This the Board regards as a very encouraging report, for if all the Branches would follow the example of those in this Agent's Section, and have their Collectors ready to go to work immediately after their public meeting, it would make an immense improvement in the total results at the end of the year. Another Agent reports: "The visitation of the several Branches entrusted to me by your Society this year afforded satisfactory evidence of an intelligent and hearty attachment to the Bible, and a practical sympathy with your efforts to secure its world-wide distribution."

These are fair samples of the general tone of almost all the reports; but of course neither the Agents nor the Directors wish to represent the affairs of the Society as having arrived at a state of perfection; and as perfection is the goal at which we must always aim, it may be profitable as well as candid, though perhaps not so pleasant, to report and call attention to some of the imperfect features which present themselves here and there. A few of the Agents have still to complain, although there has been great improvement in this respect, that their communications had received very tardy replies or had been entirely neglected, and that sometimes when they arrived at a place they found that no effort had been made to get the people to come to the meeting, in which cases it is very hard for an Agent to get them interested in the work of the Society. One Agent writes: "Could we only get crowded audiences to address, that the Christian public as a whole should have an intelligent idea of the workings and wants of the Society, our income would double in a single year. But how can the public be reached? That is the problem to be solved. The pulpits must take the matter up and take advantage of sabbath day congregations for enlightenment on this whole subject." Another Agent, among several suggestions at the end of his report, says: "Put into operation the recommendation of last year in respect to the boundaries of our Branches." If the Board of Directors could issue decrees which must be obeyed, this would be a comparatively easy matter; but the Board can only, through its Agents, endeavour to induce the Officers of the Branches to carry out its recommendations; and the Directors are glad to be able to report that many of them are giving increased attention to their outlying districts. There can be no doubt however that these two questions: how best to get the country lying between the Branches canvassed, and how our Agents can best reach the ear of the Christian public, are the problems most needing solution.

The Directors regret that they have not been successful in getting special meetings of children during the past year; but several Sunday Schools have been addressed on behalf of the Society, and some have sent contributions. The gentlemen who distribute the Ketchum prizes in the city schools, moreover, have in doing so from year to year, not only told the scholars something about

the good man who provided these gifts for them ; but have used the opportunity to say a few words to enlist their sympathies in the work of the Society. Several Agents also endeavoured, whenever possible, to visit the day schools in the country and ask the children to announce the Bible Society meeting to their parents, and at the same time to say a few words to interest the children themselves in the Bible cause. This commendable practice is very important, and the Directors trust that the Agents in future years will more and more endeavour to seize such opportunities. It not only helps to increase the attendance at the public meetings of the Branches, but it is undoubtedly the most practicable method of reaching the ears of the rising generation with a view to getting their hearts enlisted in this great work of giving the Holy Scriptures to all nations of the earth. In order to reach their eyes for the same purpose, the Directors wish very much that the Society's friends throughout the country would do what they can to promote the circulation of the "Gleanings for the Young." This beautifully illustrated little periodical, published by the Parent Society is, for its actual value, one of the cheapest things issued for the good of children.

The Rev. Mr. Jamieson, the Society's Agent in British Columbia, regrets very much having to report very little accomplished for the Bible cause in his field during the past year ; but in the present state of affairs in that Province the Board does not think that Mr. Jamieson can with justice blame himself for not seizing opportunities which have never presented themselves. Moreover we have received since the closing of the accounts, a free contribution of \$114 from the New Westminster Branch, and \$54 from other friends in the Province through Mr. Jamieson. Perhaps these contributions might be larger ; but they put to shame many places in Ontario, whose populations are both larger and in more prosperous circumstances.

The Rev. Mr. Fortin's report shews that in Manitoba, where the Society's affairs were in a very unsatisfactory state eighteen months ago, they are now, chiefly through the enthusiasm and wisdom of our lamented friend the Rev. W. W. Ross, in a most hopeful condition. The published report of the Winnipeg Branch says : "New life and zeal were infused into the Society by the visit of the Rev. W. W. Ross, who came last year as the official representative of the Society in Toronto." Mr. Fortin, reports that "the public meetings of the Branches were not as well attended as he could have wished ; but that he was quite cheered by the manifestation of so much zeal and enthusiasm." In another part of his report he says : "Everywhere there is a feeling of gratitude towards your noble Society for the many kindnesses which it has shewn to this Province in the past, and as we become more able there will, I am sure, be some substantial return made."

#### COLPORTAGE.

The Colportage of the Society has been much hindered, even more than in the previous year, by the heavy snow of last winter, and in some degree again by sickness. There have been six colporteurs employed for longer or shorter periods, Messrs Taylor, Jackson, Currie, Pyke, Aston, and Patterson. The aggregate time spent in the service has been thirty-five months, and they have circulated 5318 copies of the scriptures. The Tract Society's Colporteurs have sold 1765 of this Society's Bibles and Testaments, making the total distribution by colportage, of 7073.

Mr. Taylor was again remarkably successful in Algoma last summer. He was sent up in the beginning of May, and by the end of the month had circulated 252 copies in the district of Thunder Bay. In June, partly in the same neighbourhood, partly near Lake Nepigon, and partly near Sault Ste

Marie, he sold 319 copies. In July he was much hindered by swamps, heavy rain, and the scattered state of the settlers, and yet he succeeded in selling 117 copies and giving six; but he closes his report for this month by saying "I am very much crippled in my legs and feet, so much so that I shall not be able to travel for some time; but I trust I shall be all right again after a little rest." In September and October he was sent to a number of the Agricultural Shows and met with his usual success. He attended those of Toronto, Guelph, Tilsonburg, Drumbo, Brantford, Stratford, and Park Hill. At all these places he received the hearty sympathy and valuable co-operation of the officers of the Branches. In reference to Park Hill he reports: "I never saw the people take so much interest in the different languages as at this Fair. I am very sure it would have done the Committee good to have seen the deep interest which the people took in our work at the Bible stand. I gave away a good number of our handbills with a short history of our Society and its work. Many thanks to the President for his kindness." At the end of November Mr. Taylor was again obliged to desist from work for some weeks, and he is at the present time also resting; but the Directors trust that he will in the coming summer be able again to do valuable work for the Society in Algoma.

Mr. Jackson has been doing good and faithful work; but there is nothing striking in his reports, though he has in several places met with sad examples of how the Church of Rome does all she can to withhold the Holy Scriptures from her people. He has been labouring in the townships of Greenock, Bruce, and Saugeen in the county of Bruce; and in Dummer, Asphodel, Belmont, Percy, Seymour and Cramahe in the counties of Peterborough and Northumberland. He received very cordial sympathy and help from the Officers and Committee of the Peterborough Branch. He reports that the month of January was the most severe and least successful he has ever experienced. At the close of February he requested the Board to allow him to cease work for some months, partly on account of ill-health and partly to attend to some private affairs.

Mr. Currie was first employed in the month of May and was sent to the back townships of the county of Hastings, where he laboured for several months. He was afterwards removed to the county of Bruce, where it was thought his familiarity with Gaelic would be particularly useful. He is a good and earnest man, and the Directors had hopes that he would make an excellent colporteur, especially suited for some districts. But he did not like being kept so much away from home as the service of the Society requires; and as he also wished to be able to sell other good books as well as Bibles, he asked to be allowed to give up the work at the end of November.

Messrs. Pyke and Aston only began work in February, and in that month experienced such severe weather and some other difficulties that they felt somewhat disheartened. But having since done better, they feel encouraged, and the Directors hope that both will prove good colporteurs.

Mr. Patterson was appointed on the recommendation of the Committee at Winnipeg, and began work on the 21st of May. He laboured steadily until the end of August in different parts of Manitoba and went as far west as Medicine Hat. He was again employed for a few days in October to attend the Exhibition at Portage la Prairie. In his report of this he says. "This exhibition was not a very successful undertaking either for the Bible Society or for others interested in it, but the exhibit by the Society of scriptures in six languages and in raised letters for the blind appeared to awaken considerable interest and was well noticed by the press." His regular work was very successful, and he sold nearly a thousand copies in three months. The published report of the Winnipeg Branch speaks of him in very appreciative terms, and expresses the earnest hope that his services may be secured for future years.

In addition to the above contributions from the Branches, the Board of Directors has sent a grant of \$500 to the Quebec Bible Society, for its work among the French Canadians, and has placed \$1000 at the disposal of the Agency and Colportage Committee for work in Manitoba and the North-West.

## DISTRIBUTION.

The number of Bibles, Testaments, and portions issued from the Depository in Toronto during the year is 31,271 being 1,506 copies more than during the previous year. This increase is partly in Colportage and partly in issues to Branch Depositories.

Of these issues, 3,296 were sold, and 1,078 issued gratuitously from the Toronto Depository; 21,579 supplied to Branch Depositories, or sold to the trade; and 5,318 were issued by Colporteurs. Included in the above are 1,308 copies in foreign languages, and 28 in raised characters for the blind.

The total issues of the Society since its commencement is 1,241,141.

## SISTER SOCIETIES.

The Directors regret that they are unable to give any account of the work of several of the sister Societies in the Dominion, not having received their reports; but they hope that they are prospering.

The cordial relations existing between the Montreal Bible Society, and the Quebec Bible Society, and our own are a source of great pleasure to our Board, and it is always a very great encouragement to read of their success, whether in their reports, or in the letters occasionally received from them. There is nothing very marked in the last report of the Montreal Bible Society, and we regret to notice there had been a little falling off in their free contributions, and in their issues. But their opportunities are increasing, and their faith and courage are strong. In writing recently to thank our Society for its contributions, the Rev. Dr. Cornish, the Secretary, says: “I am glad to be able to say that the arrangements for our French work during the summer are now completed. We have engaged ten French colporteurs. We are informed that the prospects of the French work in this Province are brighter than they have been for a long time past.”

The report of the Quebec Bible Society shows that its work has been carried on amid discouragements and difficulties, which those alone who are engaged in it can fully understand; and yet with a fair amount of success. The labour has been almost exclusively among the French Canadian rural population. We are glad to find that the Committee have been enabled by

a grant from the Parent Society to employ a second colporteur, who gives gratifying evidence of fitness for the work. In one part of their report they say, "We are still indebted to the Upper Canada Bible Society and its Branches, for the means of carrying on our work among the French Canadian people. We thankfully acknowledge the receipt during the year from that source of the very handsome sum of \$776.05."

Our great neighbour, the American Bible Society, has been doing a remarkable amount of work in the past twelve months. In a letter received a few days ago from the Rev. Dr. Gilman, one of the Secretaries, he says: "Our report when published will show some very noteworthy results of work, both in the United States and in foreign lands. In prosecuting the fourth general re-supply of our own country there were visited 1,217,215 families, and one eighth of the whole number were found to be without the Bible. Two thirds of the destitute families were supplied by sale or gift; fifty thousand refused to receive it. The aggregate circulation surpasses that of every previous year with a single exception. The foreign circulation exceeded half a million of copies, and is more than double that of ten years ago." We are sorry that Dr. Gilman has to report that their receipts have fallen far short of their expenditure; and that they have sustained a great loss in the death of their President Dr. S. Wells Williams, a man whose long labours in translating the Holy Scriptures, together with his moral energy and spiritual self-consecration, brought honour both to the cause of Christian Missions and to the land that gave him birth.

#### PARENT SOCIETY.

In a letter just received from the Parent Society, we are called upon to rejoice with them over the financial statement for the recently closed year, which shews the largest amount ever received in twelve months, by way of income, and also records an expenditure which has only once been exceeded. The increase of the total income, as compared with the previous year is £22,708 1s 4d, and although this is due chiefly to the great increase in the amount received as legacies, it is gratifying to observe that both the more permanent sources of income, namely Free Contributions and Proceeds of Sales, are considerably in advance. But they ask us to take due notice of the fact that, were it not for the extraordinary sum reached by legacies their receipts would have been several thousands behind their expenditure. The statistics of their circulation had not yet been completed; but they anticipated that the number of copies disseminated would be somewhere about three millions. The forthcoming report of the work done during the year will be of a very encouraging character. Among the most interesting features will be the very great increase of the work in China and India, and the greater opportunities than ever in Egypt and Morocco. Particularly for the benefit of our friends in the Province of Quebec, the Society is bringing out a new and special edition of DeSacy's version of the French Bible. Of course it takes some time to prepare and print the report of such world-wide operations as those of our Parent Society, and we shall probably not receive the report above referred to until the month of August. But the last report begins thus:

"In one of the first reports of missionary work contained in the New Testament, it is said that the apostles Barnabas and Paul 'rehearsed all things that God had done with them.' At an anniversary like the present, when the danger of exalting human agency is great, there can be no more needful reminder than this—that whatever good has been achieved is the deed of God, and not of man. It is not the liberality of the Churches, nor the administration of the Committee, nor the voice of the colporteur, nor even the Book itself that has done the work, but the Divine Spirit acting through and with all these.



“Yet the honour which is due to God alone did not prevent St. Paul from enjoining upon the Thessalonians to know and esteem those who laboured among them; and your Committee desire to express their gratitude on the one hand to their constituents at home, in the colonies and in foreign lands, for the continuance of generous support, and on the other to their agents and colporteurs, who have gone up and down the field of the world, wounded by its stones and thorns, yet bravely and in patience sowing the good seed.

“The general results of the year, so far as they can be gauged by statistics, are in advance of those reported twelve months ago. The FREE INCOME of the Society has been £112,428 3s. 4d. showing an increase of £7,590 6s. 3d., which falls chiefly under the head of donations, the legacies and contributions of auxiliaries remaining practically the same. The RECEIPTS FROM THE SALE OF SCRIPTURES at home and abroad have been £98,068 6s. 2d., giving an increase of £3,225 19s. 2d., so that, adding a small item of £104 3s. 7d., for Indian colportage, a total income from all sources is reached of £210,600 13s. 1d., or £10,816 5s. 5d. in excess of the corresponding total for 1883,—but, it should be added, only £1,098 1s. 2d. above the more normal year that preceded it.

“Meanwhile the EXPENDITURE has more than kept pace with this growth of receipts, amounting to £207,996 5s. 2d., or £17,079 5s. 10d. above the expenditure of the previous year.

“The ISSUES from the Bible House in London have amounted to 1,542,413 copies, and from depôts abroad to 1,422,223, making a total of 2,964,636 copies, or 26,091 more than in the previous year. It is satisfactory to observe that the returns both of home and foreign sales show a decided increase in the number of complete Bibles and New Testaments as compared with Portions.

“The issues of the Society from its commencement now reach a total of 96,917,629 copies.”

Of course we cannot here attempt to review even in outline all the scenes of the operations of our great Parent, the British and Foreign Bible Society; but the following extracts and summaries will give some idea of its world-wide work.

The customary Annual Conference of the District Secretaries had been held in May and the general results of the year's labour which are here given seem to indicate that the Society is rooted as firmly as ever in the confidence of those who value the Word of God.

#### I. LOCAL SOCIETIES.

The number of Societies in England and Wales twelve months before was 4,962.

Of these 91 were reported as extinct. Against these losses 155 had been formed during the year. The total number was therefore 5,026 showing an increase of 64 Societies for the year.

## V. COLPORTAGE.

In addition to this, the Committee has given assistance to colportage on the Thames, Mersey, Tyne, Wear, &c.

The Committee had made grants towards the support of the London Bible Women amounting to £444 12s. and to the various Sailor's Societies—in money and Scriptures—to the extent of £700. They are indebted to the Thames Church Mission for assistance in supplying Testaments to the troops that embarked last summer for Egypt. A place has been claimed for the Bible at several Exhibitions which have been held during the year, and a kiosk for the sale of Scriptures had been erected at the International Fisheries Exhibition.

The Society had lost no fewer than five of its Vice-Presidents—the late Archbishop of Canterbury, the Earl of Harrowby, the Bishop of Grahamstown, Bishop Steere, and Dean Close. Archbishop Tait was a warm friend of your work. He described it as “the best practical step which is being taken throughout the world to make Christendom one;” and in his charges he urged the clergy “not to stand aside from co-operation in such an acknowledged good work as this great attempt to circulate the Holy Scriptures.” The Committee were deeply thankful to be assured of the hearty sympathy of his successor the new Primate.

The labours of Bishop Steere on the Swahili translation will enure as a monument not only of Christian scholarship, but of patience and self-sacrifice. He took five years to complete the first gospel, and nearly twenty to finish the New Testament; and then, rather than insist that his own hand should be seen in the whole work, he included the translation of one gospel by a fellow missionary, the veteran Rebmann, whose labour he felt ought not to pass unacknowledged.

## EUROPE.

In reference to the foreign work of the Society the Committee say :

"Some months ago one of your colporteurs on entering a café, was met with the exclamation—'Take your books to the children. We are men, and do not want them.' This is, in effect, the cry raised in all parts of the Continent by men of labour, who are too busy to listen to the Word of God, and by men of letters, who are too proud to own that it has any message for them.

"To a certain extent your Committee take these objectors at their word. They do carry their Bible to the children, and, what is more, they carry it to the child-nations of the world—like those of Africa and the Southern Seas. But, because they turn to the children, why turn away from the men? and, while caring for heathen lands, why relax effort for countries nearer home, whose need is as great as their resistance is strong?

"Looking first at Europe, a distinction must be drawn between Protestant countries like Norway and Sweden, and the lands, unhappily larger and more numerous, over which the Church of Rome holds sway. In the former your Committee feel that they are best fulfilling their charge by stirring up the native Bible Societies to undertake the whole supply of the Scriptures; and gradually, as this object comes to be attained, a policy of withdrawal will be pursued.

"But as regards the latter, your Committee have been engaged in devising stronger measures, some of which are already being put in force. Thus in France your colporteurs have for the first time, carried their labours into every one of the eighty-six departments; and in Austria, in the teeth of opposition which has never been more bitter, your work has been pursued with so much vigour that the circulation shows an increase of nearly 10,000 copies.

"Germany, it should always be remembered, is to a considerable extent Roman Catholic; yet in Germany 324,614 copies have been sold during the year, and more recently 8,000 copies have been distributed among the homes wasted by the Rhine floods of last autumn."

Mr. James Watt, the Society's Agent for Germany says of the colporteurs :

"These faithful and hard working men are the rank and file of our army. They are also our outposts and skirmishers. It is they who keep touch with the main body of the enemy, and are most roughly used in the fight. Deprived of the sympathies of home, obliged to be content with humble quarters and often with wretched food, exposed to the inclemencies of every season and to the still more trying storms of ridicule and abuse, the colporteur must not only possess a stout heart and iron frame, but be a man of faith, and one who walks with God. All honour to such men! let us support them with our sympathy and prayers."

In reference to Mr Watt himself, who had only about a year before been transferred from Southern Russia to take charge of the work in this field, the Committee say: "Your Agent possesses the advantage of combining loyalty to the traditions of the Society with a quick sense of the requirements of changing circumstances"

The favourable attitude of the Russo-Greek Church towards the circulation of the Scriptures is shown by the sale in Russia of 314,422 copies, and these at prices very little below the cost of production. Hitherto the Society has been restricted, within the Empire itself, to the New Testament; but the past year has witnessed the completion of an edition of the entire Bible in Russ, specially printed by the Holy Synod for the use of your Agencies. The sales in Asiatic Russia have increased sixfold, partly in consequence of the establishment of a depot at Tashkent, where the colporteurs in charge hope some day to join hands with comrades from India, and partly through a further journey made by the Rev. Dr. Lansdell in Central Asia. Your Committee

contributed towards the cost of this journey, and would express their appreciation of Dr. Lansdell's services in exploring parts little known, and depositing with local governors stores of Scriptures for use in hospitals and prisons.

#### MOHAMMEDAN AND HEATHEN LANDS.

Your work in Egypt was for a short time interrupted by the war. On the return of your depository to Alexandria, it was found that the depot had been burned and damage done to the extent of nearly £900 and a claim was filed for this amount. As soon, however, as the Committee understood that this sum would have ultimately to be recovered from the taxpayers of Egypt, they felt that it would be contrary to the whole spirit of the Society to add to the burdens of those whom it was their sole object to benefit; they therefore notified to the British Embassy at Constantinople the withdrawal of their claim. A letter has just been received from Lord Dufferin expressing his warm appreciation of this step.

In looking to the future of their work in Egypt, the Committee have felt that increased responsibility was laid upon them; and they have resolved to make Egypt the centre of a new Agency embracing Syria and Palestine, the line of the Suez Canal, and the regions bordering on the Red Sea, and no longer to regard these countries as a part of their Turkish field. This Agency will be placed under the care of the Rev. R. H. Weakly, who long laboured in the East on behalf of the Church Missionary Society, and was highly distinguished as a reviser of the Turkish Bible. They would acknowledge the generous spirit in which the American Missionaries in Egypt have expressed their readiness to welcome him on his arrival.

North Africa is now being supplied by the recently-established Agency at Algiers, which owed much to the hearty sympathy of the late Miss Beamish. Her many benevolent enterprises were crowned by the organizing of a work of Scripture distribution to the Easter pilgrims at Jerusalem. One of her last wishes was that this should be kept up; and the Committee have cordially undertaken to carry out the desire of their friend. Some 15,000 Portions are circulated annually in this way. A journey of exploration in Morocco is being taken on behalf of the Society by Mr. W. Mackintosh, a gentleman who has had long experience of mission work in Syria. It is hoped that his enquiries may open the way for Bible work in a country which lies at the very gate of Europe, and yet is less known and more neglected than many lands far more remote.

To a few of these more distant lands the Committee would now turn. Their great Indian Auxiliaries employ a staff of about 150 colporteurs, and have effected an aggregate circulation of about 240,000 copies. In response to invitations from the Committee, they have submitted plans for the development of their work, and undertaken to prepare editions of the Bible to be in readiness for the advance in elementary education which is expected to result from the Viceregal Commission. Special grants, amounting to over £3,000, have been made for this purpose.

The Rev. J. A. D. Macdonald, who superintends the Colportage of the Calcutta Society, gives an interesting and intelligent view of the situation. He says:—

“Our colportage work is mainly undertaken to carry the Bible to those whom ordinary Mission agencies fail to reach. Every Christian preacher doubtless does what he can to induce men to read the sacred volume; but Mission stations are few and scattered in this wide country. In the streets of Calcutta, and in remote towns and villages, there are thousands willing to buy and read the Holy Scriptures. Our problem is to reach these unprejudiced inquirers, and to place the Word of God in their hands.

“This problem is by no means satisfactorily solved. Colportage is pioneer work, demanding great courage, perseverance, and faith on the part of the agents, and considerable aid and attention from those under whose direction they labour. Colporteurs of the right stamp are not easily found, and most missionaries are too busy with their own duties to spare time for an effective supervision. So that there are vast stretches of country where the Bible never goes, though, for aught we know, there may be hundreds of inquirers who are wistfully seeking the Word of God.

“A few weeks ago a schoolmaster was baptized in Calcutta, whose religious history shows the necessity of sowing beside all waters. As a boy he was dissatisfied with idolatry, and longed for a purer faith. This dissatisfaction increased as years went on, and became so strong that he put off marriage in order to seek the way of peace. In a distant part of the country he heard Christian preachers, and obtained from them portions of Holy Scripture. These he studied in private, until he became convinced of the truth of the Divine message. Under the influence of this conviction he came to Calcutta, sought out Christian teachers, and in spite of the entreaties and opposition of his relatives, joined himself by baptism to the people of God.

“Those colporteurs who have made special tours into distant parts of the country have discovered that the Word of God is being studied diligently, although no human teacher is at hand to speak of Christ.”

The journals of Missionary Bible tours, which are appended to the Calcutta Report, are full of interest. The testimony given by missionaries as to the value of the circulation of the Scriptures in their respective districts is strong and hopeful. Thus the Rev. J. Paul writes to the Committee of the Bangalore Bible Society:—

“Year by year the influence of the Bible increases among the people. In illustration of this, I may mention that one day when conversing with a young Hindu, who is a constant reader of the Bible, he said:—‘I feel fully convinced that the Christian religion is the true one, although I do not profess it. You should regard me as a Christian at heart.’ On another occasion, when recommending the Bible to some educated natives as the true veda, they said:—‘We are not strangers to its teaching. We frequently read it. It is only the ignorant who argue against it. To the thoughtful it contains invaluable truth. We feel that we are not able to act up to its moral standard. If we try to do so, we cannot get on in the world.’ The temporal sacrifices involved prevent many from making a public profession of Christianity. Although caste prejudices have strong hold on the people, it is encouraging to know that they are being gradually undermined by the teaching of the Word of God and the advance of education.”

The Telugu revision is now going on with the great advantage that the Rev. Dr. Hay has returned to India to give his whole time to the work, for which he is pre-eminently fitted, his connexion with the London Missionary Society having ceased. An arrangement has been made whereby he will be supported during the progression of this work by our Parent Society. It was in connexion with the Telugu that the Committee had taken the important resolution referred to at the close of the report.

There have of late been such unmistakable indications in China of desire to hear and read the Gospel, that the Committee have felt that they would be faithless and negligent if, having the means liberally placed at their disposal, they did not boldly go forward. At present their staff consists of an agent at Shanghai, eight missionaries giving the whole or half of their time to Bible work, four European colporteurs, and fifty-three native assistants. The circulation by colportage, so far as can be ascertained, has been 162,709 books. Some of the colporteurs have had extraordinary success. Thus Mr. Paton made a journey of two months through a part of the Island of For-

in 1858, in the course of which he sold 19,400 books. It will be understood that very few of these were complete Bibles or Testaments; a large proportion were single gospels sold at four cash, or a little over a farthing, a copy. Still it is found better to sell even at the lowest price than to give away, though there are exceptional cases, such as the gathering of university students at Peking and Nanking, where some thousands of books have been given freely to young men of a class inaccessible to the ordinary colporteur.

It has for some time been the conviction of your Committee that their arrangements in China ought to be recast upon a larger scale, and they have resolved to create three distinct Agencies for North China, Mid China, and South China respectively, and to engage for each of the eighteen provinces a European head colporteur to travel with, and to superintend, native helpers. In the latter capacity three missionary students have already been engaged, and the Committee are hoping ere long to fill up the number of the appointments with men qualified for the important duties required. They believe that in the action thus taken they have only been carrying out the strong wish of their friends, one of whom indeed has signified his pleasure at this forward movement by adding to large gifts previously made a thank-offering of £2,000 for colportage in China.

There are many other points of interest in their foreign work on which your Committee would fain dwell did time permit. They would, for example, not pass unmentioned the pleasant interviews they have had with the Malagasy Ambassadors, to whom they expressed the hearty prayer of the Society that God in His mercy would be pleased to dispel the cloud hanging over the liberties and Christian life of their people. But one further fact must suffice to show the range of the work—namely, that during the past year the editorial sub-committee has considered or taken action in respect of versions of the Scriptures in eighty-seven languages.

In bringing the Report to a close, the Committee briefly advert to a step they had taken, which they trust may tend to the good of nations that are being brought out of heathenism, and to the closer fellowship of all concerned in mission work, whether abroad or at home.

Letters received from India have shown that there was grave danger in the Telugu field of conflicting versions of the Scriptures being put forth, as has already been the case elsewhere, in consequence of a difference of opinion on the part of translators as to the right words to be employed in that language for expressing *baptize* and *baptism* in the New Testament.

An earnest desire to avoid this calamity to the native Church, and to secure to it the blessing of a single version accepted by all parties, has led your Committee to review the whole subject.

They have long felt anxious that nothing on their part should remain undone which might, without disturbing the conscientious views of others, enable their Baptist brethren to unite with them in the circulation of the same versions; and it has now appeared to them that a solution of the difficulty might be found in the adoption, where needed, of an alternative marginal rendering, stating that the Greek word which expresses this rite is by some translated *immerse*, the neutral or transferred term being itself retained in the text. The Society would thus be carrying out a plan which is of frequent occurrence in the English Bible, and would simply be stating an undoubted fact.

A resolution to the above effect has been passed and communicated to Translating Committees in India, in the hope that it may enable missionaries of various denominations to join in the use of one and the same version.

Whatever may be the immediate result, of this your Committee are assured, that it was right for them to consider how far they could go towards securing united action, and that the question is now being approached on both sides

in a candid and brotherly spirit, which must issue in a deeper sympathy between those whose common aim is to make known among men the living oracles of God.

To a share in this work you are again invited to-day. The great Missionary Societies report growth and success; and it is for you to rejoice with them. But not only to rejoice. Every advance they make, every new mission they plant, must mean fresh demands upon that Society whose happy province it is to accompany and keep step with them all, and to furnish the chief weapon of their warfare. It means that the best Christian scholarship must be engaged to produce new versions of the Bible, and to improve existing versions, and that greater efforts every year must be made to sow through all lands the imperishable seed of the Kingdom.

## EXTRACTS FROM AGENTS' REPORTS.

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Rev. E. M. C. BOTTERILL—*Campbell's Cross*.—Here, in the whole-souled officers with which this Branch is blessed, you may expect year by year an increasing liberality.

*Erin*.—With Brethren Fowlie and Tyler, a wilderness would bloom into a garden, and a garden become an Eden. Words cannot tell our joy to find instead of a once drooping Branch meeting, one of fire, energy and growing importance.

*Streetsville*.—Of this Branch your Society may be grateful and proud.

*Meadowdale*.—This sub-branch of Streetsville gave \$25 last year, and was represented to your agent as desiring some special encouragement, and knowing the willingness of the Agency Committee to increase the number of sub-branches, I consented to visit the field. I found a large number of warm hearted friends, all eager to hear of our progress during the year, and fully in sympathy with all our difficulties and victories.

*Brampton*.—The President of this Branch is my ideal of a presiding officer. He has made our Society the one thing of his life, and into all the possibilities of Bible Society work, as well as all its present attainments, he enters heartily and fully. The good friends in this town were eager to exalt our annual meetings into the position of honour they ought to occupy, and all the pulpits in the town were available. Your Agent preached in the morning in the Presbyterian Church—addressed the children and friends in the Primitive Methodist Church in the afternoon, and in the evening preached in the Methodist Church of Canada; while our annual meeting was held on Monday evening in the Baptist Church. Kindness, superabounding kindness was shown me from everybody, and the whole town on Monday and Tuesday seemed to talk of nothing besides the success of our meeting.

Rev. JAMES CARMICHAEL—*Meaford*.—Your Agent visited the Branch on Monday the 15th October. The day was exquisitely beautiful. The hills on one side were crowned in all the glory of their autumn foliage; on the other side the beautiful, treacherous waters of the Georgian Bay kept up their never ceasing lay, lapping upon the shore. Called upon several friends of the Society. Had a splendid meeting in the evening, with stirring speeches from Rev. Mr. Patterson, Mr. Perry, and Mr. Vickery. The collection was larger than last year, and the contributions far in advance of former years, and the office-bearers are full of hope that they can do better still in the year to come.

Rev. A. A. DRUMMOND.—*Mount Pleasant (Cavan)*.—This Branch is in a healthy condition, and will give a good report of itself when the contributions are forwarded to you. Mr. McLean, an old tried friend of the Society, has enlisted the lady collectors, who soon will be engaged in their laudable work.

*Keene*.—This is one of the best country Branches I have ever visited, and the agent who will not be fired by the enthusiasm of the meeting must be void of sympathy. A good chairman, a good report, and a good meeting make a good agent.



*Hastings.*—In the morning a union thanksgiving service was held in the Methodist Church, and by request I preached the thanksgiving sermon. In the evening we had the largest Bible Society meeting that was ever held in the village. All the Protestant ministers were present and spoke. If we may judge from the collection and the interest otherwise displayed the contributions will be ahead of last year. One man had come seven miles to attend the meeting. One family waited to the very close, who had five miles to go home and over a rough road, but they seemed to think nothing of it. I need hardly say they were Scotch, and true friends of the Bible.

*Lakefield.*—It was a pleasure to your agent to present the claims of your Society on both occasions and to be so well backed by the resident ministers. The people responded nobly to the appeal made to them. The collections taken up at the Hall amounted to the large sum of \$23. This Branch has done nobly for the Bible in former years, and will doubtless maintain its character for a large-hearted liberality this year again.

*Peterboro'.*—Various circumstances conspired to make the Annual Meeting a small one, but what was wanting in numbers was made up in interest. Mr. Munro, of the Baptist Church, in a capital speech gave the key-note, and it was easy for your agent to follow up with an account of the doings of your Society. The audience was deeply interested. The indefatigable secretary, Mr. Stratton, read a very good report. Though old in the service his zeal has not abated, and you may always depend upon him as the staunch supporter of the Bible Society.

*Whitby.*—This Branch is in good working order. The old and staunch Secretary is unflagging in his labours. Allow me in closing to assure the Society that it has many warm friends throughout the country who are always pleased to see your agents and extend to them a cordial welcome, and are ever ready to co-operate with them in the noble endeavour of giving a copy of the Word of God to every family on the face of the earth.

*Rev. O. FORTIN (the Society's Agent in Manitoba).*—The annual meeting of the Society in Emerson was held last week. I found that nothing had been done during the year . . . But there is better hope for this season. All the clergymen of the town were present and promised to preach special sermons on the following Sunday, commending the Society to the liberality of their people, after which two ladies have promised to take up subscriptions. At the meeting a gentleman gave a check for \$10, an act which seemed to stimulate the hope and courage of the collectors. I have just returned from Brandon and Portage la Prairie, having gone there last week in the interests of the Bible Society. On Monday evening, the 7th, we had a meeting at Brandon which was fairly attended. Unfortunately the President of that Branch is at present in the South. I was not aware of the fact otherwise I would have written to some one else to arrange for a meeting; as it was, the notice was rather short; but in spite of this contretemps we had a pleasant, enthusiastic and, I hope, profitable meeting. At the close a collection of \$46 30 was taken up, which will be considerably increased when the lady collectors go on their rounds.

At the Portage our meeting was not as well attended as I could have wished. However, I am glad to be able to say that I was quite cheered by the manifestation of much zeal and enthusiasm. We collected \$29 at the meeting, and several ladies are ready to enter upon the work which they did so well last winter. The Depository here is very well kept and has a fine stock on hand; a good many sales are effected. As soon as their winter collections are made they will send you an account of them, remitting you at the same time whatever moneys have been received from

the sale of books. Everywhere there is a feeling of gratitude towards your noble Society for the many kindnesses which it has shown to this Province in the past, and as we become more able there will, I am sure, be some substantial return made. Perhaps it is well that I should mention the fact that we are suffering considerably through the commercial depression which is so general. We suffer all the more in this Province because a considerable portion of the wheat was injured. This may perhaps affect our returns to some extent, but I hope not materially. I mention it only that you may not think that the falling off, if there be any, is owing to indifference.

After conferring with the clergy of Rapid City and Minnedosa, I have thought it better to put off establishing Branches in these two places until there is a revival of prosperity in the country and a consequent growth in their population.

I think I may say that the Society has taken root in this country and that it has a good future before it. God grant that this young Province may be founded upon the Bible; that its people may be a Bible-reading and a Bible-loving people.

Rev. R. D. FRASER. — I have to report that I took advantage of the October moonlight to visit the district assigned me. The weather was most favourable with the exception of two evenings, the arrangements by officers of the Branches were in every case satisfactory, and the attendance at most of the meetings was encouraging; there was not a single failure; while the hearty assistance of brother ministers and friends of various denominations made my work comparatively light. In no case had the subscriptions been collected in advance of my visit; but arrangements were made at the various meetings for a complete canvass of the whole field, and it is hoped that notwithstanding the very serious shortage in the harvest throughout this district, the contributions will show an advance on previous years.

*Pine River.* — The meeting was small; but larger than in preceding years, and full of interest. This Branch, while working a very limited territory, has done well in the past. A larger staff of Collectors was appointed, that the whole unoccupied space may be traversed. The Depository, which has been closed for three years is to be reopened.

*Underwood.* — Always to be depended on for a good subscription list did not come up to its usual standard as to attendance, but the business was transacted in good style and a reliable staff of collectors appointed. Addresses of the President, Rev. G. McLennan, both at the beginning and at the close of the meeting, were most effective.

Rev. J. GEMLEY. — The Branches visited were the same as those appor- tioned to me last year with the addition of a few to which the agent had not gone on the former and some previous years. I find in nearly every case unabated interest and improvement in the Branches.

*Fonthill* — A wonderful improvement here. A bright and cheery meeting in the Baptist Church. Collection though not large was given cheerfully; and collectors were appointed. All the ministers of the village aided at the meeting. There was one very interesting incident. The aged and venerable Rev. W. Hancock, Presbyterian minister of North Pelham, who gave us a very nice address, made the statement that he had been personally acquainted with the late Rev. Thos. Hughes, one of the founders of the Parent Society. Thus the present is linked with the past.

*North Pelham* — This Branch is always active. It has an admirable Secretary and will remit in due time.

*Drummondville.*—Meeting in Town Hall. This Branch is well officered and well sustained. The subscriptions have been remitted ere this, and are in advance. Felt I never was more cordially received at any visitation on any occasion.

*Dunnville.*—This is a good Branch and very methodically managed.

*South Cayuga.*—This Branch I repeat is a model Branch.

*Nanticoke.*—This Branch is well managed, and when remittances, in addition to those I have forwarded, are received by you, the contributions will be more than last year. The annual meeting was held in the English church, and was the largest for many years. I may add in conclusion, that in all my visits I met with nothing but kindness, although most of my journeying had to be done by rail, and in every case where other modes of travelling were required, prompt and cheerful help was offered me.

Rev. D. GORDON.—*Princeton.*—This Branch is in good working order. We had a very good meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. Little and Mr. Beattie gave valuable help by practical addresses.

*Washington.*—The meeting here, was one of the best I had. All the office-bearers were present, and all whole-souled in the work. There was hearty enthusiasm in the meeting. The President volunteered to double his subscription, and another, and another followed his example.

*Plattsville.*—The meeting was held in the German Church. Besides the Pastor of the Church the Baptist and Methodist ministers took part. The meeting was very good. The people seemed heartily interested. On the whole, I may say the pleasure I had in the last six places visited, compensated me for the disappointments in the first four, and I do acknowledge that the more careful research and deeper thought on the subject of Bible circulation necessitated in preparing for this work has been to myself a benefit and a blessing.

Rev. JOHN GRAY.—*West Lorne.*—This Society is in a good condition. The President, the Rev. Dr. Schulte, is worthy of all praise for his earnestness and ability in the cause. The attendance was good, although the intense rain of the previous day had made the roads very bad. Along with the President, Dr. Schulte, Rev. C. C. Cousins of the C. M. Church gave aid and encouragement by his presence. The Depository is carefully and well kept, and is doing good work.

*Orford.*—Notwithstanding that Monday evening proved most unfavourable the attendance was unusually good. This Branch continues to attend to all matters of interest with the utmost care, and is in a good healthy condition.

*Fingal.*—There is nothing new in the condition of this excellent Branch. The officers and ministers continue alive to its interests. The attendance in the Presbyterian Church was good. All matters pertaining to the prosperity of the Branch are carefully looked after.

*Lambeth.*—This little Branch showed to unusual advantage in the M. E. Church this evening. The attendance was very good. The officers had favourable reports to give of the past year's work. The pastors of the C. M., and Bible Christian Churches were present and showed the liveliest interest in the work of the Branch.

*Westminster.*—This Branch continues on in its old way. It may well do so for I know no better way. The Annual Meeting was highly creditable to them.

In submitting this report your Agent has great pleasure in testifying to the kindly manner in which he has been everywhere received, and the general interest which obtains throughout this section in the work in which your Society is engaged. Upon the whole the meetings were better attended than during the previous year and I fondly predict that the result will be considerably increased subscriptions.

Rev. Dr. HODGKIN.—*Tweed*.— . . . Rev. Mr. Kelso, as on my former visit, very kindly conveyed me to Tweed where I found, what I fully expected, a hearty welcome at the house of that earnest living brother, Rev. J. Savage C. M. minister where I had a pleasant home during my short stay. A capital meeting. That staunch friend of the Society Mr. Newton was present and told me to inform the Secretary at Toronto that they might look to him for fifty dollars towards the Bible Society House. Dr. Tuttle was absent but everything at the Depository was found to be highly satisfactory. Books to the front. Sales good. Accounts straight. Cash in hand.

*Melrose*.—As my last year's report states, I had great difficulty with this formerly interesting Branch. I was not overjoyed to find that the Secretary of the U. C. B. S., set me at it again. I had this year a great deal of trouble and disappointment which I need not detail, but through the kind offices of Rev. Mr. Kelso, I was encouraged to proceed. So I started in faith and reached Shannonville Station where I saw one person on the platform, and he I felt confident had come to meet me. I was not mistaken, he kindly took me to his house. I found that the good people of Melrose were glad to hear of Bible Society work again, and that it was not their fault that there had been a break in their efforts. Had a very good meeting considering the shortness of the notice. Reorganized, and expect a good account of them. A very pleasant time was spent in the neighbourhood, and the next day, Mr. Anderson to whom I was indebted for conveyance and hospitality took me to Deseronto. I left Melrose not without a desire that business or pleasure might take me there again, and felt that the Permanent Secretary was quite right in being unwilling to give it up.

*Trenton*.—One minister who professed warm friendship for the Society thought that travelling agents were useless, and proposed to work up out posts in order that the whole ground might be occupied. The President, W. H. Austin, Esq., who is really a staunch, judicious and hard working friend, while doubting the doing without agency, expressed his readiness to co-operate in any work of extension. Whether these proposed plans will be carried into effect or not I expect well from Trenton. . . . I cannot adequately express my deep sense of the kindness of Mr. Austin, the President, not merely for personal attentions and the hospitality of his home, enhanced by the hearty welcome of Mrs. Austin and the family, but for the very deep interest that he takes in the work of the Society and the constant readiness to afford judicious counsel and personal effort.

*Belleville*.—The following day, I was at Belleville. At Trenton a kind telegram had been received from Mr. Sheriff Hope, the President of the Society, inviting me to his house during my stay. It would have afforded me much pleasure to have accepted his kindness, the more so as nearly forty years before I had been on the Bible Society platform at Belleville with him, but my young brother, the Rev. E. W. Sibbald, of Christ Church, had previously put in a loving claim for my companionship which I had acknowledged. This however did not prevent my spending a pleasant time at the Sheriff's tea-table before the meeting. I can truly say that whether the meeting was a success or no everything had been done by the friends of

the Society to make it successful. It was held in the City Hall, and the ministers of the city certainly did their part on the platform, as they had done by their previous announcements to have an effort worthy of the object and of the city. This was the only meeting in my tour at which I had the help of a Church of England minister, and I certainly did have it here. I cannot but hope that Belleville will appear better in the list than it has of late. In justice to it it should be stated that the returns made to the U. C. B. S. by this Branch do not fully represent its work, as there are local institutions such as the Deaf and Dumb Asylum, the Marchmont Home and others which receive needed supplies.

—The undenominational character of the work while in one sense its glory is in another its hindrance. No one cares for it as he would for something belonging to "My Church." Ministers let very trivial things prevent attendance as I have sadly seen, and the annual meeting of the Branch Bible Society of a place, instead of being, as in one sense it should be, the religious event of the year, is often the very reverse. True catholicity might be shewn in a general rally, in the real oneness exhibited in the high estimate that is cherished of the written word; but alas "it is not my Zion" and therefore I need not attend.

Rev. S. KAPPELE.—*Mildmay*.—Saturday morning, October the 20th., I made my way partly on foot the seven miles to Walkerton in order to take the train to Mildmay, but owing to wrong information arrived too late and had to wait seven hours for the next train. I arrived at Mildmay in the evening, found a welcome home at the house of the Rev. Mr. Herlon, the Evangelical minister. Found everything arranged for the Sabbath. Preached in the morning at the Methodist, in the afternoon at the Presbyterian Church and in the evening at the Evangelical (German) Church. Monday was occupied in making arrangements for the evening meeting, choosing officers, collectors &c., in which I was assisted by the ministers who resided in the place and by some of the friends whom we asked for advice. With this forethought and pre-arrangement we found no difficulty, after an address by your agent, to form a Branch, and in a most satisfactory way completed all arrangements. This seems to promise a very good and solid Branch.

*Winterbourne*.—Had a well attended spirited meeting. This Branch has a backbone. It is a pleasure to meet with the people. Mr. Durrant, the faithful untiring secretary, along with the other officers are true and earnest friends of the cause.

*Bloomingdale*.—Friday found us once more with our friends here, where we had the most interesting and cheering gathering since the Branch was formed. I have seldom seen such interest taken in the arrangements for the work. Several of the men present spoke after the agent's address. All spoke highly of the Society. It did my heart good to listen to these laymen. In the absence of ministers, I found them a great help to me.

Rev. J. LEAROYD.—*Warkworth*.—I made arrangements to hold the annual meeting at this place on Saturday night the 19th inst. Most of the ministers of the place were present. On Sabbath I preached three times at Warkworth and neighborhood, and took up a collection each time on behalf of the Society. On Monday I drove through mountains of snow twenty miles to Harwood where the meeting was appointed. I saw Mr. Ross, the President, in the afternoon, who lives about two miles away, and he said that with the state of the roads there would be no meeting and thought it no use my going. I went and found a fair audience with a number of ministers, some who came ten miles through a blinding storm.

—I have visited each of the appointments given to me and, with the exception of my last visit, enjoyed the work. I found a greater interest in the Society's work than I did some years ago.

Rev. R. McCosh.—*Blyth*.—Preached in the Episcopal Church on Sunday Nov. 11th. Meeting held in the same church on following evening. The night was terribly cold and stormy; notwithstanding, there were 115 present. Rev. Messrs. McLean, Fisher and Parke addressed the meeting. The collection amounted to \$7.10. Blyth Branch is ably managed.

*Bayfield*.—Splendid meeting and yet the rain was coming down freely. It was the largest ever had in this Branch. Over 130 present.

*Brucefield*.—Meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The night was very dark and stormy and the roads bad, consequently there were not over sixty present. Rev. Messrs. Ross, Thompson and Taylor made brief addresses. Our old friend and able Secretary, George Walker, Esq., presented his ably prepared report. He is a model officer, and I heartily wish there were more like him. Collection \$5.32.

*Seaforth*.—Grand meeting—over 300 present. Rev. Mr. McDonald, the President, said it reminded him of the good old time when Bible Society meetings were packed. After assembling, we heard that the Hon Edward Blake had missed his train, and would have to remain in Seaforth until the morning. The Rev. Mr. McDonald and the Rev. Mr. Edmund went and invited the Hon. gentleman to the meeting. He came and spoke briefly. All the resident clergymen were present. The collection amounted to \$15.32.

*Clinton*.—Meeting should have been held on November 15th, but the night was terribly wild and stormy. The officers assembled, and thought it advisable to postpone until December 3rd. On that night the meeting was held in the Baptist Church, which was packed to the doors. It was the largest Bible Society meeting ever held in Clinton. This Branch has a splendid staff of officers, and their hearts are in the work. Collection \$13.29.

REV. J. G. MANLY.—My work for the Bible Society has never afforded me so much satisfaction and pleasure, since its beginning in 1870, as in the past year. Just one week's indisposition, at the outset of eight months' continuous labour, seemed to admonish me of dependence on Him in whose hands are my times and ways; and thenceforward to the end, my strength has been as my day. The winter seemed the severest I have known in the thirty-three years of my Canadian life, and must often have lessened our gatherings; but, on the whole, there have been increased attendance, deeper interest, heartier cooperation, and more liberal response in a year of diminished harvest. With exceptions so few as to prove the rule, the ministry of the Churches has come to the recognition and help of the Society, and the people have been like their leaders. The more the Divine book has been slighted and assailed in some quarters, by false friends or open foes, the more determinedly have believers evinced their love of the Word and their desire to circulate it. Substantially, the Bible is already translated for the world, and has so touched every region as to gather its universal first fruits. It so widely and signally spreads and prevails, in salvation and consequent civilization, as to abase man's boasted strength and wisdom. Nowhere more truly than here, in this new world and this new dominion, is the revelation and record of God's love to man accepted in thankful faith, and disseminated with unselfish zeal. To our motley population, it speaks in many tongues; and throughout our extended spaces, it wins its widening way by the multiplied Branches, depositories and agencies of the time-honoured Upper Canada Bible Society.

The meetings at *Parry Sound* and *Bracebridge*, last August, were largely in advance of any previous year. Both Branches are important centres for Bible distribution. The Union Sunday-school at *Auham's Harbour* was gratuitously supplied by the former with the Scriptures, and the latter included a donation of twenty dollars for *Muskoka*. There were three Sunday sermons and collections in September, in the *Winona* region. *Grimsby* Branch well occupies its limited field. The meeting at *Mono Mills* in October was the best ever held there, and was attended by all the ministers. *Scarborough* is a model country Branch, that thoroughly canvasses its field, according to the school sections, and gave the year before nearly two hundred dollars. *Markham* arranged for canvassing the surrounding country, as well as the village—a very important matter, too often neglected. *Sandford*, *Mount Albert* and *Sutton* are on the advance; and *Uxbridge* is no less efficient than before. A good meeting at *Beaverton* was sadly followed by the sudden sickness and speedy death of one of its best members. *Stouffville* has advanced from thirty dollars to nearly eighty. *Bradford* evinces vigour. At *Ivy* the President and Secretary undertook to collect, and at *Thornton* the President spoke warm and weighty words for the good cause. *Cookstown* is now doing well. *West Essa* requests Sunday services next year. Collections at *Lloydtown* doubled, and to be still further increased by extended canvass. *Lynedoch* does well. At the *Port Dover* meeting, friends from the country requested Branch meetings to afford information and secure extended help. *Laskay* is good and satisfactory as usual; three Sunday services were held for the South *Etobicoke* Branch. *Norwich* meant work. Sunday services were held at *Newark* and *Otterville*. The previous income of *Simcoe* is nearly doubled. *Rockwood* and *Everton* was expected to reach a hundred dollars. *Georgetown* attendance was doubled in the town-hall. *Acton* excellent. The *Milton* income has somewhat suffered by the failure of two collectors. Revisited *Temperanceville* (to give Sunday services) and *Sunderland*. *Beverly* and *Oneida* deserve to be classed with *Scarborough* as very efficient rural Branches. *Binbrook* is in advance. Good meetings in inclement weather were held at *Caledonia* and *York*. Mr. James Kippen of the latter place has lately bequeathed five hundred dollars to the U. C. Bible Society, and the same to the British and Foreign. Good and well-attended meeting at *Port Elgin*. *Burgoyne* asks for Sunday services next year. *Warton* is doing well. Excellent meeting at *Durham* with several ministers. Large meetings at *Drayton*, and good at *Glenallan* and *Hollin*. Sunday services at *Rothsay*. Capital meeting at *Palmerton* in the town hall aided by five choirs and four ministers. *Thornhill* does well. Sunday services and collections at *Cupetown* and *Zion*, followed by the anniversary of *West Flamboro'*.

The many other Branches in my visitations must this year be omitted for want of space; they will all appear, if daily reported, in the financial lists. I feel thankful for the completion of last year's work, for so much pleasant service, for so many good meetings, for the sympathy and help of so many kind Christian friends of the various churches, and for the country's deepening interest in the Society's noble work. The seed of the Kingdom cannot perish, and its fruit is life everlasting.

Rev. J. H. MOORHOUSE.—*Harriston*.—Leaving home on the morning of Tuesday, January 7th, I reached here in time for the meeting. Doubtless partly owing to the stormy weather the attendance was not large, but a lively interest was manifested in the work of the Bible Society, your agent's address being received kindly and with marked attention. Three of the resident ministers were present. At the close a resolution was passed by which

the Branch pledged itself to renewed and earnest efforts on behalf of the Bible Society. Next day your agent, after inspecting the Depository, called on three of the collectors, all within reach.

*Clifford.*—Thursday afternoon I arrived here on time to visit the school and give notice of the meeting in addition to the notices already given. The Depository is well supplied with books, and is kept in a prominent position. Our meeting, which was pretty well attended, was regarded as one of the most successful. This Branch is in a healthy condition, the officers are efficient, and the people are interested in the work of the Bible Society. On Friday I called on four of the collectors, who expressed a willingness to give their help.

*Lakelet and McIntosh.*— . . . After the meeting was over, I had an opportunity of speaking to two or three of the collectors. Too much cannot be said in praise of the zeal of the President here, Mr. William Harkness, who for some thirty years has steadily assisted in the work of the Society. Without efficient officers the agent can accomplish but little.

Next day, Saturday, I made my way to Lakelet and spent some time in examining the stock of the Depository.

*Teeswater.*—This was the last meeting of my trip. I arrived here in the afternoon of Friday, January 18th, and spent a portion of the time in calling on the collectors within reach. After the encomium passed upon this Branch by your agent last year, it would be superfluous to say more in this respect, than that the praise was fully deserved. May the people of Teeswater and surrounding country ever retain their interest in Bible Society work, and long continue to set an example that some other places would do well to imitate. The Secretary, Mr. J. K. McLean, spoke of resigning, but was prevailed upon not to do so. It is to be hoped that he will be able to act as Secretary for many years, for he fills the position most efficiently.

Thus closed a trip, which though at times arduous was on the whole very pleasant. I was received with great kindness, and were it not that my report is perhaps already too long, it would be a pleasure to mention the names of those who showed me so much hospitality. Where practicable, I called upon the collectors and spoke an encouraging word. With few exceptions I found the price of the books at the Depositories correctly marked.

Rev. J. L. MURRAY.—The fact that the Permanent agent had visited these Branches only six months ago was inimical to my success, as many would not be easily convinced that two meetings were not thus held in one Society year.

*Innerkip.*—The President, Mr. McBeath, is a veteran Bible Society worker, and the efficiency of the Branch is due largely to his untiring efforts. When the collectors were appointed he agreed to call on each of them personally and secure promptness of action. The Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. James Hill, is an exact business man, and attends to the duties of his office in an admirable manner. Collection \$4.93—Innerkip is sure to do well this year.

*Embros.*—Came next in order. This Branch generally conducts its business without the help of an agent; but, when the officers discovered that one born and brought up among themselves was the agent appointed to visit them, they considered it unhandsome to decline his services. I was warmly invited to appear on the scene and warmly welcomed on appearing. The meeting was held in the Congregational Church and was one of the largest and most enthusiastic I have ever attended; no meeting can be dull under the management of such men as Squire Matheon and Captain Gordon. This meeting was a decided success, all the clergymen of the place were present.



A speech was delivered by the Rev. Mr. Scratch, who made his mark as usual. The absence of your gentlemanly Secretary, Reeve Murray, on account of severe sickness, was regretted by us all. The Depository is always well managed in the hands of Mr. Mann. Collection \$7.62. Unless good intentions vanish 'like the morning cloud and the early dew', the contributions of this Branch will be double or treble those of last year. Embro is decidedly the banner Branch in my district.

In my short tour I found much to please and much to deplore; a few in every Branch are interested in the circulation of the word of God. The uniform courtesy and hospitality extended to myself as agent was also very gratifying, but I was more anxious to have generosity expended on Bible circulation than on myself. The percentage of the professedly Christian public deeply interested in Bible society operations is very small indeed. When a professing Christian in good circumstances will deliberately break a dollar bill into small change that he may give a part of it, and not the whole, as his yearly contribution to put the Bible into the hands of perishing millions, it is evident that something must be wrong. The head or heart must be astray. The most powerful agency employed at the present time in evangelizing the world is the Bible Society. Not only are its operations on a larger scale, and its catholicity more marked than those of any other society, but its machinery has less waste and more efficiency and directness than that of any other. Apart from the five hundred Colporteurs employed directly by the British and Foreign Bible Society alone in the various countries of the world, preaching the gospel through the eye (while the ordinary missionary preaches through the ear); all missionaries of all churches have to depend on Bible Societies for furnishing the sword of the Spirit—the word of God translated into the languages of the various heathen countries in which they operate. How any Christian can fail to feel the force of these facts, and can contribute meanly to such a society, is beyond my comprehension. Could we only get crowded audiences to address, that the Christian public as a whole should have an intelligent idea of the workings and wants of the society, our income would double in a single year. But how can the public be reached? That is the problem to be solved. The pulpits must take the matter up and take advantage of Sabbath-day congregations for enlightenment on this whole subject. May the God of the Bible touch Christian hearts and open Christian purses, that every man of every tongue and clime may soon be in possession of the Bible.

Rev. Dr. O'MEARA.—*Bowmanville*.—Arrived by the afternoon train, went to the house of the Rev. Mr. Little, of the Presbyterian Church. The public meeting was held in the body of the church where a good, though not very large number had assembled to hear from the speakers on the occasion details of the society's operations and successes during the past year. Preliminary addresses were delivered by the Rev. Mr. Young, of the Canada Methodist Church, who gave some interesting details of what the Bible had done for the Cree Indians, among whom he had laboured for a considerable portion of his ministerial life, and by the Rev. Mr. Harris, of the Bible Christian Church. I endeavoured to draw the attention of the audience, which was said to be better than on former occasions, to the different departments of the work done by the Bible Society throughout the world, illustrating each point that I endeavoured to make by facts and anecdotes taken chiefly from the Society's report for the past year.

*Garden Hill*.—The meeting at this place was held in the Episcopal Methodist Church and the night being fine and moonlit, the congregation was pretty good. The wonderful success of this Branch which when I visited is

three years ago, I found in an almost moribund state, though then only in its infancy, as in a great measure due to the faithful and energetic labours of the President, Mr. Jas. Gray. I am quite safe in saying that if all the officials of the several Branches of the Society throughout the country were to work as faithfully and as energetically as Mr. Gray, the increase in the funds of the Society would amount to many thousands of dollars. I am happy to say that though he wished to decline reappointment, he was again made President this year by a unanimous vote of the meeting. I was here entertained by the Rev. Mr. Chaffee, of the Church of England, who accompanied me to the meeting. The Rev. Mr. Taylor, of the Episcopal Methodist Church, moved one of the resolutions in a neat and forcible speech, endorsing the work of the Society, which I followed up by entering into details and giving facts connected with that work for the past year.

*Tyrene.*—I found this Branch in rather a disorganized state, there being neither President nor Secretary. Notwithstanding, preparations had been made for a large and enthusiastic meeting, chiefly I believe through the exertions of Mr. Hancock, the Vice President, and I am bound to say that though the largeness of the meeting was much curtailed by the unpropitious character of the weather, the enthusiasm of those who did attend in spite of the storm was in no wise damped by the wetness of the night, which was shewn by the largeness of the collection taken up after my address, amounting to \$6.84.

*Cartwright.*—It proved in every sense a very encouraging meeting, the largest it was said that has been for some years. Addresses pertinent to the object of the meeting were ably given by Rev. Messrs Creighton and Clewer, the latter of the Canada Methodist Church. I addressed the meeting at considerable length, giving facts and figures illustrative of the noble work that is being done throughout the world by the British and Foreign Bible Society, of which the Upper Canada Bible Society is but the hand-maid. I would in conclusion state for the information of your Committee, that I have found very much pleasure and I trust profit to my own soul from the intercourse that I have had with brethren in the Lord of all denominations during my attendance on those meetings, and by that intercourse my conviction is strengthened and intensified that not among the least of the many benefits conferred by the Bible Society on the Church of Christ, is the evidence thus afforded that the prayer of the Saviour is answered, and that His people are everywhere joined together in the unity of the Spirit, in the bond of peace and in righteousness of life.

Rev. W. R. PARKER.—The visit of the several Branches entrusted to me by your Society this year afforded satisfactory evidence of an intelligent and hearty attachment to the Bible, and a practical sympathy with your efforts to secure its world wide distribution. The attendance generally was more than average. The ministers of the several sections visited lent their valuable aid in advertising the anniversaries and contributed to their success by their presence, in most cases, and by short addresses. The project to erect a new and imposing structure as your Bible House in Toronto is generally endorsed, though the failure of the crops last year may prevent many heavy subscriptions from the western section of Ontario.

Rev. J. V. SMITH.—*East Williams.*—Too much cannot easily be said in commendation concerning the way this noble Branch takes hold of Bible Society work. It is most perfectly organized and consequently a most successful Branch. Its officers are all thoroughly in sympathy with the cause they represent, making all their arrangements for the material welfare of the So-

ciety with the utmost deliberation and care. We are happy to report the continued prosperity of this encouraging field, and expect the returns this year will still be in advance of previous years.

The Rev. J. Turner, of Ailsa Craig was present at the meeting, and did the Society good service by giving an excellent address.

*Thedford.*—This Branch still continues in excellent working order. It has a vigorous staff of officers, business men, and men who mean business. We had a fine meeting addressed by the Rev. Mr. Curry, Presbyterian, and the agent.

*Corunna.*—Had an excellent meeting here, . . . . Mr. Henry J. Miller, the venerable Treasurer and Depository, has held these offices for thirty-one years, ever since this Branch has been established, and he is today as enthusiastic in the work as when its operations first began. Such men are worthy of honourable mention in the annals of this glorious cause.

*Sombra.*—This Branch seems fully resolved to redeem the time by giving a good account of itself during the present year. There is the material for making a first class Branch in this locality.

*Sarnia.*—I remained in this town over the Sabbath, preached in the Presbyterian church in the morning and the Methodist Church in the evening to large congregations in both churches. On Monday evening we had a spirited meeting in the Baptist Church. The church was packed full with a thoroughly representative gathering of all the denominations. On the platform were the Rev. Messrs. Davis, Episcopalian; Thompson, Presbyterian; McDonagh, Methodist; Johnston, Baptist; Claris, Congregationalist; and in the audience, Rev. A. Bowers, Point Edward, Methodist. It was a grand sight to see churches and pastors uniting together to help on this glorious cause. The meeting was very enthusiastic, the Rev. Messrs. Thompson and Davis both giving excellent addresses. Sarnia will no doubt pull up considerably in advance of last year.

*Cantlachie.*—This is a small village but it has a fine healthy Branch of the Bible Society. We had a large meeting in the Presbyterian Church—the Reverend Jasper Wilson, President, in the chair. This Branch worked up a large section of the country all around, as may be gathered from the fact that no less than twenty-two young ladies were appointed to canvass the several concessions and side lines for miles around, and like the seventy of old went; when sent out, "two and two."

. . . . At all the meetings this year I have confined myself to the presentation of solid facts bearing upon the operations of the Society, and at every meeting held, I have reason to believe that the facts have told and will tell for the good of the cause. With but one or two exceptions, the meetings have been both larger and better than the year before.

Rev. S. L. UMBACH.—*Zurich*—I attended a spirited prayer meeting in the evening. On the 16th, I made calls inviting the people to the meeting and the result was that we had a good meeting in the Evangelical Church. The President, Rev. H. Dierlam, has his heart in the work. The meeting was conducted in the German language by Rev. R. S. Knetche of the Evangelical Association. The pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church was also present. The Depository is well kept by Mr. Faust, and the books are in first-class order.

*Elimville.*—The Rev. Mr. Smith took me to the place where the meeting was to be held on the Thames road. Here I was the guest of the Rev. C. Fletcher. The meeting was appointed in the Presbyterian Church. The

rain poured down in torrents, so that I expected no one out, but to my surprise there were between thirty-five and forty persons present, some of whom came two miles and over. We had a nice little meeting. In the absence of the President an aged gentleman, the Rev. Mr. Fletcher, pastor of the church, occupied the chair, and I think good was done. The Secretary, who lives two and a half miles from the place of the meeting was present and deserves credit for his energy and the good work which he does for the Master's cause in the neighbourhood. A cause is safe in the hands of such men. The next day I visited the President, Mr. T. Werry, in company of Rev. Mr. Fletcher, and found him to be an active Christian gentleman deeply interested in the Bible work. Elmville Branch will live. The Depository is in a good condition. The stock is rather small but well selected.

## EXTRACTS FROM COLPORTEURS' REPORTS.

J. E. TAYLOR.—May.—I have again entered upon a summer's work in Algoma. My first visit was to Prince Arthur's Landing in Thunder Bay, inhabited by about 200 families—going from house to house I found the people in need of God's word. There is quite a number of Roman Catholics, to whom I sold some Testaments. I then wended my way to Fort William and visited some families on the road. The Fort is about seven miles distant from the Landing; about twenty families are settled here. I sold a good number of Testaments, and found the people very well to do and able to pay for a Bible. My next place was in the township of Oliver; this is the only settled township in this part of Thunder Bay district; it contains about thirty-five families, pretty well scattered, so that I had to travel a long way to reach them; the people are very poor. They had no church and very few religious services. I held two services on the Lord's Day, and we had some prayer meetings from house to house, so that I had a pleasant time and plenty of hard work this month. Total distribution for the month of May 256 copies of God's Word up here among the rocks. I am going down the North Shore of the Lake, to try and find some of the families which are scattered along, but a very long way from each other.

June.—Having completed my work in Oliver township, I left the Thunder Bay district, and went along the north shore of Lake Superior, but did not find many people, only some half-breeds, who are under the control of the priest. I met a priest on Lake Nepigon, who said that he had charge of the people in that reserve, and that if I went among his people with my Bibles he would burn them. I must say this was the most daring priest I have ever met with. I believe that this very priest could have burned me as well as the Bible. The priests are very bold up this way and have great power over the people, but notwithstanding the priest I persevered until I found others who gladly received the Word of God and were very thankful for it in such cheap form. I next went to the North Shore of Algoma, where I found a number of people in want of God's Word, and after leaving the priest I got among black flies, which gave me no rest day or night. The flies are very

bad this summer. I next crossed over to St. Joseph's Island, and went on the top of the mountain and found some people there whom I did not reach last summer. I have sold during the month 319 copies of God's Word.

July.—Having finished round Thunder Bay, my next move was down below Sault Ste. Marie in Tarbutt and Macdonald townships, but I accomplished very little in this field owing to the excessive rain during the spring and early summer, flooding the paths and swelling the swamps. There are not many people in this settlement and they are very much scattered. I afterward proceeded to Rock Lake, where there is a number of people scattered throughout, but not short of God's Word. I then crossed over to St. Joseph's Island to take up the work I left off last summer; I had to climb the mountain, which was a very long one. I found a number of people on the top of this mountain who were very thankful for my visit to them. My next stopping place was on the north side of Manitoulin Island. There are some families settled along this part of the island who were very short of money; they managed, however, to get enough together to buy Bibles and Testaments for their children. I have spent a very pleasant time this summer, and I am thankful to kind Providence that I should have been the means of putting the Word of Life into the hands of so many people. During that time I have sold 700 copies of the Scriptures—the heaviest sales I have made. I did but little this month owing to indisposition through exposure to the continued wet weather and to the roughness of the roads. My legs pained me very much; I hope, however, to be all right again after some rest.

September.— My next fair was at Guelph, where I called on Mr. McCrae, Secretary of the Branch, who gave me a letter to the secretary of the fair ground, asking for room in the building, which he very kindly gave me to the full extent of my requirements. What made this fair so interesting was the great sale of God's Word. My sales were very large, and numbers expressed their pleasure at seeing our noble Bible Society represented at our large fairs. When I gave them the pamphlet containing the 215 different languages they were quite surprised, it seemed to give them renewed interest in our work. I trust that they went home impressed with the necessity and desire of helping the cause.

October.—My first fair this month was at Tilsonburg, where I called on the Secretary, Mr. Garnett, and stated our object in visiting fairs. He was very kind and obtained for me all the space required for my Bible stand. I found the people very much interested in the languages in which the Bible was printed opened out for their inspection. This is a new way of drawing public attention. *Drumbo*.—Being next in order, I called on the Secretary preferring my usual request, and was referred by him to the President, Mr. Passmore, who had undertaken to make all the necessary arrangements. Many thanks to this good brother for his kindness. He not only got me room but brought the people to see my display of Bibles after they were laid out. I was also visited by the Hon. O. Mowat, who seemed to take a deep interest in my work. I gave him one of your pamphlets containing the 215 languages. I trust that this will bear our Society good fruit during the year. This has been a very interesting fair. Many said that they never saw so many languages, and when I told them that the Bible is printed in 250 languages, they were amazed at the work the Bible Society is doing, never having heard of it before. I hope that this will also bear fruit in years to come. *Brantford*.—Here I called on good brother Shenston, who at once gave me a line to the owners of the fair-ground, believing, as he did, that it would be a good opportunity to bring our Society to the notice of the people. I accordingly took the note to the secretary on the fair grounds, who gave me all the space

I wanted for my Bible stand. A great many people made their way in my direction, and were glad to see the Bible Society represented at our fairs. We have a great many friends in this part of Canada. Many thanks to the good brother Shenston for his kindness to me, and who, in addition, gave me a home all the time I was in Brantford. *Parkhill*.—I called on the President of this Branch as the Secretary has left the place. Dr. Caw had not received Mr. Baldwin's letter about my coming, so that I had to explain to him my object in going there. He at once admitted that it was a good plan, and went with me to the fair ground, and gave me all the space I wanted for my Bible stand, and the timber necessary to erect it. I never saw the people take so much interest in the different languages as at this fair. I am sure it would have done the committee good to have seen the deep interest which the people took in our work at the Bible-stand. I gave away a good number of our hand-bills which give a short history of our Society. Many thanks to the President for his kindness.

JOHN JACKSON.—April.—*Township of Greenock*.—My work this month has been to a great extent amongst a Roman Catholic population, and I could not find any of them who read the Word of God. I am more and more convinced that Popery can only live where ignorance prevails. The priests know this and keep from them even their own version of the Scriptures. How wicked is that system that grows only in darkness. I have given a Bible to a woman whose husband is a Papist, tho' she is Protestant. I hope it will prove a light in a dark place.

August.—*Township of Dummer*.—I left Toronto the last day in July and made my way to Peterboro', found the Secretary of the Branch, Mr. James Stratton, a warm friend of the Society, who gave me a kindly welcome. Made my way to Stony Lake settlement about two miles from Peterboro'. Having occasion to return to Peterboro', I met with another gentleman in the person of Mr. Brunnette, a kind and warm hearted Christian. In the course of a conversation with a young woman, a Roman Catholic, she told me the priest would not allow them to buy our book, neither did he wish them to read their own Bibles, and that many of their people had not a Bible or Testament in the house. I gave two Testaments to two children where I thought they would do good. I have been able to distribute 230 copies this month. May the blessing of our Heavenly Father go with them.

October.—I have been very much among Roman Catholics this month. I have sold a Bible to a Roman Catholic woman, and also to a French Protestant and to a French Roman Catholic. It is very difficult to get them to buy.

March.—You will see that I have given a 60c Bible to a poor old man who had lost everything he had in a fire, and who is supported by the township. When I told him I would give him one from the Bible Society, he thanked me with tears running down his cheeks, and said, I am sure the Lord has done it.

H. D. CURRIE.—May.—I went to L'Amable and found no demand for either Bibles or Testaments so I returned down to Wollaston Mines, and found some demand for Bibles, &c., from the miners and railroad men in the vicinity. I have a notion to stop this month in Wollaston to finish the supply there, as there is quite a population moving and stationary, though the settlers are far apart, making it severe labour to carry books so many miles per day. I do not grudge my labour among so many different religions and classes of people; but I feel an earnest desire to see them all supplied with these valuable books, and I hope that God will encourage and bless to their use.

June.—I have found the weather very stormy and not favourable to travelling on foot. However, with scarcely an exception, I tried humbly and perseveringly to do some work every day, as the report shows *seriatim*.

I found the mining camps most unpleasant and unprofitable to remain in or near, the open blasphemy and reckless disregard of the sacred names of God and Jesus were horrifying and astounding to me. I could not believe such language could be uttered by the lips of men, perhaps it may have partly been done to annoy or intimidate me, knowing my business to be disseminating the Holy Word of God, but my opinion is that it is the natural outflow of the evil life they lead as miners; may God have mercy on them who have no mercy on themselves in leading a life of reckless infidelity. Apart from the mining camp, my experience of the people in their humble homes has been civil and pleasing on the whole.

JAMES PATTERSON.—Province of Manitoba.—May the 23rd, in part a rainy day, we spent in preliminary arrangements with the Secretary consulting with friends of the Bible Society from the country, who happened to be in town attending church meetings on that day. My Colportage work in Winnipeg has been, besides visiting immigrants, in visiting the numerous tents, shanties, and smaller houses, where the poorer classes most likely to need the Scriptures are supposed to live, and the columns on the other side of the report show each day's work. Those found without Bibles were mostly bachelors living in tents or shanties. One family could not read. Those without Bibles who could read, except two, were supplied either by sale or grant.

July.—As trains were not running to Gladstone and few men were at work on the roads, I returned to Winnipeg from the Portage on the 5th and resumed Colportage there. At the meeting of the committee on the 11th, I was directed to go west on the C. P. R. line, if necessary, to Calgary. I proceeded first to Moose Jaw, making note on the way of places at which to call on the way back. Having visited Moose Jaw and Swift Current, I reached Medicine Hat on the 21st. This place is 660 miles west of Winnipeg, but about 125 miles east of where the bulk of the C. P. R. men are at work. After consulting with friends at Medicine Hat, I decided not to go further west. I had not been able to sell many copies to railway men at the places visited and the prospects were that I would not dispose of a great number at the end of the track. The friends at Medicine Hat considered it necessary, if I went further west, that I should have a tent and outfit, which I had not means to purchase, and convinced that expense of living west of Moose Jaw is in the meantime too great for Colportage, I decided to begin the journey homeward. My trunks, through no fault of mine, went astray on the railroad and thus part of the time at Regina was lost. I arrived here this morning and expect, after visiting in this place, to call at Broadview, Moosemin, Virden, &c., and then, unless otherwise ordered, I purpose getting tent and outfit I have at home, and spending some time among the railway men now at work west of Gladstone. I have this month travelled 1180 miles, made 738 visits, and sold 272 copies of the Scriptures.

RICHARD PYKE:—March '84, *Township of Woodhouse*.—The first month has been a peculiarly trying one for Colportage work—the continued rain and consequent deep mud making it almost impossible to carry on the work with success, which has in my case, at times, had a very depressing effect. But thank God it has not been all cloudy; the unfeigned pleasure manifested by some that they are thus supplied with copies of God's Word they can read is cheering amidst the gloom.

FRANK ASTON :—March '84, *Townships of Whitby and Pickering*.—I have kept regularly at work from day to day, as far as the weather and roads would allow. The former part of the month, however, was very bad in both respects in the townships in which I have been.

I am happy to say I am always gladly received, and many are pleased, because they have heard for the first time the *practical nature of the Bible Society*, and only yesterday a man told me that this was the first time he had had Bibles offered to him at such cheap prices.

## ANNIVERSARY MEETING.\*

The forty-fourth Anniversary Meeting of the Society was held in Knox Church, on the evening of Wednesday, May 14th, beginning at half-past seven o'clock.

(The Anniversary sermon had been preached the evening before by the Rev. Dr. Behrends of Brooklyn, N. Y., in the Elm St. Methodist Church, and will be published in the October number of the *Recorder*.)

The chair was occupied by the Hon. G. W. Allan, President.

After the singing of the hymn "All people that on earth do dwell" the Rev. H. M. Parsons, pastor of the church, read a portion of Scripture and led in prayer.

The President then delivered the following address :

MY CHRISTIAN FRIENDS :—

I esteem it both a great pleasure, and a great privilege, that I am able to be present and occupy the Chair at our annual meeting this evening. The Sessions of the Dominion Parliament being so frequently prolonged until late in the month of May, have prevented my attendance at our annual gatherings for the past two or three years, and I am the more rejoiced therefore that this year no such obstacle has interposed to prevent my joining with you all in testifying by our presence here, our faithful allegiance to the Upper Canada Bible Society, and our earnest and hearty interest in the Bible cause.

Our Society, my friends, is growing in years. My own connection with it, as your President, extends back now for five and twenty years, and although the Report, which will be presented to you this evening, is only the forty-fourth Report of the U. C. Bible Society, under that name—we have in fact long since passed our semi-centennial, for this is really the fifty-fifth year of the Society's operations. The York Auxiliary Bible Society, as you will find from the brief sketch contained in the Report, was organized in November, 1828, and its first anniversary meeting was held in February, 1830, and although in 1834, the same year in which this city was incorporated, its name was changed to the City of Toronto Auxiliary Bible Society, and subsequently to the Upper Canada Bible Society, you will see that we are in fact an older institution than the City of Toronto itself—as we date back to the days of Little York! We are, doubtless, all prepared as good citizens to assist in the approaching semi-centennial celebration. We are all proud of our city, of its wonderful growth and progress in the last fifty years, not only in material wealth and prosperity—but in intellectual advancement and culture—witness the many noble institutions in our midst, for the promotion of learning and science—witness the latest provision made, for ministering to the intellectual wants of all classes of our citizens, in the establishment of a Free Public library, whose opening was celebrated only a few months ago. Yet while we rejoice over the progress of our city both materially and intellectually, may we not most fittingly look back

to-night with thankfulness and satisfaction to the first efforts made in what was then the little Town of York, not for the promotion of mere human learning only, or for the circulation of books of man's writing, but to unite all Christians in the glorious work of circulating the Book of Books!

See how from that beginning the Upper Canada Bible Society grew and increased, and spread its branches throughout the Province, until now we are able to tell you to-night that our income for the year has been \$30,633, and our issues of the Scriptures 31,271 copies, and that in the words of the Report during the course of its history the Society has received \$851,569, with which it has circulated 1,240,141 copies of the Holy Scriptures, in its own field, and has sent over \$250,000 to spread the word of God in Romish, Mahomedan and Heathen lands.

While, however, we humbly thank God, for the growth and progress of the Society, and the success which has so far attended its work in assisting to spread abroad the glorious Gospel in all lands, we must remember that the field is ever widening, and the friends of the Bible must not slack their hands until that time shall arrive, so earnestly longed for and desired by all God's people—when "the knowledge of the Lord shall cover the earth as the waters cover the sea." I have said that the field is ever widening, and so it is, whether we look at home or abroad. In the various countries of Europe, the Great Parent Society is carrying on, with increasing vigour, the work of Bible distribution among those who have not hitherto been in possession of that blessed book, so that we learn from their Report, that in France their Colporteurs have for the first time, carried their labour into every one of the eighty-six Departments. And in Austria, in the teeth of opposition, which has never been more bitter, the work has been pursued with so much vigour, that the circulation shows an increase of nearly 10,000 copies. Each year too, sees further inroads made by the Society's Colporteurs into the dark places of the earth, whether among the benighted followers of Brahma or Confucius, Mahomedan fanatics, or fierce Pagan tribes.

In looking to their future work in Egypt, that country now so torn and distracted by intestine feuds and savage warfare, and to which men's minds have lately been directed with so much interest and anxiety, for the fate of one, whose noble Christian character and love of the Bible have made his name a household word, the Parent Society have resolved to make it the centre of a new and more effective agency, shall we not hope and pray, that He, who ruleth over all, may deliver our gallant countryman from his perilous position, and may yet, out of all these wars and fightings, bring it to pass, that a wide and effectual door shall be opened, for the admission of the Gospel of Peace.

Again in Central Africa, the explorations which Livingstone was the first to begin, with the earnest hope of opening out a way for the Bible and civilization, are now from year to year being vigorously pushed forward, though with different objects, by various agencies and associations, but the missionaries and the scriptures are following the paths thus opened into the heart of "the dark continent," and the field of Bible work there is ever increasing. In China and India too, the British and Foreign Bible Society are arranging for their work on a still larger scale. So that the call to us, my friends, if we would continue to share in the glorious privilege of being fellow-helpers with the Parent Society, is ever one for increasing zeal and liberality.

Then if we turn from abroad and look nearer home. I shall remember presiding at an anniversary meeting fourteen years ago in this very Church, and alluding on that occasion to the probable enlargement of our boundaries, and that ere long we might expect to see the whole of the great North-West included in the Dominion of Canada, and thousands of settlers

seeking new homes for themselves in the valleys and plains of the new territory, and that it was for us to look to it, that they not only took with them the spade and the plough, but the Bible also. The North-West has become an integral part of the Dominion of Canada, and thousands of settlers are pouring in there from year to year, surely my friends there is a call to us here. We, who sit at ease in old Canada with our churches and Sunday schools at our very doors, where the Bible is read and its holy teaching inculcated on old and young, rich and poor, on Sunday and often on week days too, shall we be content until we have done what we can to place God's Holy Word within the reach of the thousands scattered far and wide in that vast territory? How many are there who are never reached by the voice of a minister of God, or have their attention called away from the cares and struggles of their daily life, on the blessed day of rest, by the sweet ordinances of religion. Oh! let us at least, if we cannot send the living messengers to carry the glad tidings, send the book which contains the word of life to guide and comfort them.

I have now briefly glanced at our opportunities and our duties as members of the Bible Society, both abroad and at home, and I must not further detain you from the speeches of the evening, which I know you are all desirous of hearing and from which we are all anticipating a rich treat; but I desire, coming nearer home still to advert, for a moment, to one other point, and that is this: If we really love our Bibles, if we feel and believe that it is that book that we are indebted for the peace of our own consciences, for all that makes our homes bright and happy, in the sanctity of the marriage tie, the love and obedience of our children, for the honor shewn to God's Holy Day, for the respect and observance of our laws, for all that, in fact, can make the people truly great—shall we be content with anything less than this, that God's Book shall form part and parcel of the education of the children of this country? Thank God this is being done more or less in our schools now; but I fervently trust that every member of the U. C. Bible Society throughout the length and breadth of Ontario, will each in their several spheres earnestly endeavor by every legitimate means in their power to bring about the time, when in every common school and collegiate institute in Ontario, there shall be heard, once in the day, the sacred words of God's Holy Book read with careful reverence by teachers and children. So shall these young lives, on whose characters and training, so much of the future of this Dominion depends, not be shipwrecked for the lack of that knowledge which is above all the knowledge, but be matured and developed into all that is pure and upright, all that is "lovely and of good report," in Christian men and Christian women.

Mr. Robert Baldwin then moved the adoption of the Report, which was seconded by David Higgins, Esq., and carried.

Col. Moffatt moved, and Mr. John Earls seconded the following resolution.—  
 "That thanks be given to the Officers, Committees and Collectors of the various Branches throughout the country, to whose zeal and energy the Society is so much indebted; and that the following gentlemen be Officers and Directors for the ensuing year:—(See list on page 4.)

Rev. Dr. BÉHREND'S moved:—

"That inasmuch as the word of God is the sword of the Spirit, the churches of Christ are summoned to magnify this chosen agency of the Divine ministry, not only by making the Holy Scriptures accessible to all men, but also by so training them in the use of the Bible as to make it a means only of blessing."

After reading the resolution, he said :—Permit me, Mr. CHAIRMAN and Christian friends of the Upper Canada Bible Society to say that it gives me great pleasure to meet with you and to be greeted by you under the circumstances of our present gathering. I have been charmed with the beauty of your city, and have been refreshed by the courteous hospitality of its citizens. I think you have reason to be proud of the past and of the present, and to be hopeful for the future. I am very sure, from what I have seen and heard, that you are quite capable of taking care of yourselves; and I have come to the conclusion that if now and then you send across the border for some one who shall represent your brother church-workers there, it is only because you are thoroughly good-natured, and intend to show by action as well as by speech that you bear us no enmity, but regard us with fraternal and with Christian affection. I assure you that to such a one as myself, who belong to a class of men, whose profession, as it were, is to exalt the Bible, it is very refreshing to hear such words as those we have listened to this evening from the honorable Chairman, words simple and clear, and full of encouragement, and borne out by the daily testimony of his public life. I agree with him that in the system of education provided for the children by the people, a place should be given to the Holy Scriptures. I confess that I shall go away to-morrow morning somewhat chastened in spirit, perhaps, because with the traditional temper of a Yankee (laughter), though I am not native-born, I have been watching the tone of the speeches that have been made, and of the opinions expressed in the city, and have failed to discover any great anxiety to be annexed to the country on the other side. (applause). But I have one answer which I think I shall be able to give my friends when they ply me with questions on my return, and one in which I think you will agree with me, that though there is not evident any desire either on the part of the Province of Ontario or on the part of the Dominion of Canada, for annexation to the United States, yet there is on both sides of this great chain of inland lakes a determination that all the Provinces and all the States,—aye, even all the broad continent from Greenland and Alaska on the north, to Patagonia on the south, shall be annexed to the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ; and that the bonds by which these hundred millions of men, women, and children are to be bound to him in sweet captivity must be forged from the pure gold of Holy Scripture, and in the fires of the baptism of the Holy Ghost. To this we are pledged. And now, as to the resolution that I have read; there are two parts to it. There is, first of all, a recognition of the intrinsic and peculiar value of the word of God as the sword of the spirit, in view of which fact we are summoned to magnify this agency “not only by making the Holy Scriptures accessible to all men, but also by so training them in the use of the Bible, as to make it a means only of blessing.” If I refrain from speaking more particularly on the first part of the resolution it is because I feel sure that the words of wisdom to which you listened only a year ago from the lips of Dr. Hall must be still fresh in your memory, and I should be unable to say anything new. All that he has said, or all that any man could say as to the importance of a renewed and enlarged zeal for the circulation of Holy Scriptures throughout not only our own continent, but all the lands of the earth I would say “amen” to. I would take it, therefore, for granted that the friends and supporters of this society are convinced that the voices of the past and the present summon them to renewed and ever enlarging diligence in the circulation of the Holy Scriptures. To this we are summoned if we would preserve the life of the church. Such diligence is needed also for the preservation of purity of doctrine, and for the prompt expulsion of every kind and degree of error. It is demanded

also for the checking and remedying of what is one of the great evils of modern life, the presence and the increase of an impure literature, the evils of which can be met only by the Bible and by its broadcast circulation. It is demanded, moreover, in order that men may be protected against superstition and against every form of fanaticism ; and lastly it is demanded for the promotion of morality. But, when we have recognised this obligation, our work is only begun. It is not enough for us to put in the hands of every man, woman, and child a copy of the Bible. I venture to say that if this were the sum and substance of our moral obligation it would be discharged before the close of the current year ; and money would be poured into the treasuries of the Bible Societies if our obligations were to be discharged by giving every man, woman, and child on the face of the earth a copy of the Scriptures. But that would not convert the world ; we must never forget that generosity is both of the body and of the soul ; and falling back upon that figure of the Bible so often used in the Scriptures themselves—the Sword of the Spirit, I ask you what is the use of a sword in the hands of a dead man ; it cannot defend or protect any one ; for a sword to be of use, there must be a steady hand back at the hilt to wield it aright, and a brave and living heart to give strength and nerve to the hand. So that, we come back in considering this obligation of ours to what we are ever forced to come to—that our work must not be merely mechanical. Our work, whether we will it or not, carries with it our temper and disposition ; the whole personality of each one of us must be cast into the current of the work ; the whole forces of our natures must be bent towards it ; and then we may achieve success. The Bible is the Sword ; you can teach others how to use it only by learning to use it yourself ; and I think one of the things to which the Christian church is called, is to have a Christian apprehension of the value of the recognition of this fact, and then to be found fearlessly and constantly acting on that conviction in the systematic and every day use of the Bible. For once, sir, I confess that when I see how both in Jewish and in Christian lands these holy writings have been distorted, misrepresented, and perverted, I am amazed at the vitality of Holy Scriptures ; when I consider the principles of interpretation that have been adopted and advocated in pulpits and on platforms, I am amazed that it has maintained its place and power in the world. I presume that you have heard the story of the parishioner who said that his parson was a very faithful man of God, who never neglected to do two things when he got into the pulpit—first to get away from his text as soon as possible, and second, to take care never to get back to it. That may have been an extreme case, but it seems to me that it may be taken as a fair sample of the method of the use of the Bible in too many cases ; and I repeat, that when I think how this Word of God has been abused and perverted, I am amazed that it has preserved its peculiar and unique vitality. In spite of all that men have done to make the Bible a laughing stock to intelligent men, it rules the life of the world with an ever increasing power. And yet, it seems to me that as soon as possible we should spread a true knowledge of the Word of God in all those parts of the world where it is not known, or where it is imperfectly known. Let us do all that we can to have an enlarged and ever enlarging sphere in which to carry on the work for the accomplishment of which this society was founded. There are two or three things I have in my mind that it seems to me are appropriate at this moment to speak of, not because they are original, but because I think these same thoughts have been burning in many other hearts than my own, and because I am convinced that the time has come for their clear apprehension and persistent application in our use of the Holy Scriptures ; for sword, and anvil, and hammer, and fire as that

word is, we shall never be able to teach others how to use it, until we learn to use it ourselves. The first thing that I have to say is this—that it behoves us in the face of every form of opposition to emphasize the reality of the revelation from God as constituting the peculiar quality of this book. The question of the Supernatural is the question of the hour. This is the turning point of all controversy. Does the Christian religion come from God or is it the product of human thought and aspirations? Does Christianity represent simply the outline of the world's past thought, or is it a revelation from God? Now we have amongst us to-day a peculiar class of men very willing to recognize that there is something in the Bible not to be found in any other department of the world's literature; but that it is the product of the world's thought, and that there is nothing divine about it, and that it is only literature after all. Against this we must firmly maintain our stand, and constantly, boldly, and clearly proclaim that the revelation is a real one, that this Book is the Word of God. In saying this I do not enter upon the question of the inspiration of the Scriptures. It is as impossible to understand the philosophy of inspiration as it is to understand the philosophy of regeneration. It is only by the impartation of the Holy Ghost that man can be born again. How this regeneration is accomplished we cannot understand, and we know just as little of the philosophy of inspiration, just as little as to how God works in the mind of man. It is sufficient for all practical purposes that we can say, as we are bound to say, that for the purposes for which the Bible was given its authority is plenary and infallible. There is no reason to suppose that Christianity must pass away as the other religions of the world have passed away. Our reasons for this belief lie in the principle that we have a revelation, and of our religion being based upon that revelation, and that we have the records of God's coming down upon the earth in order that man might be admitted to fellowship with God. It is not necessary for us to deny that there is a human quality in the literature of the Bible. The Bible is something more than literature, but it is also literature. The thought of God burns and glows in the living words of man; but it was not given to these Holy men to write by dictation but by inspiration. The second thought I have I can hardly call less important: it is that the Bible shall be interpreted in the simplest way possible. One of the utterances in the passage of Holy Scripture that was read this evening was this: "The entrance of the Word giveth light and understanding to the simple." The substance of Scriptural teaching is exceedingly plain, so that the entrance of the Word into a simple mind giveth it understanding. We do love simple things, simple speech, if it be but true. There is no beauty like the beauty of simple speech. Let us preserve our idea of the beauty of Holy Scripture by its simplicity of speech. And then, just one word more. The Word of God having taught us what righteousness is, tells us how it may be obtained. These are the two great centres around which all other parts of the Scriptures revolve. Righteousness, we are told, in all the Scriptures is to be found in conformity to God, and all Scriptures emphasize the correlative truth that we can become like God only through faith and love. It seems to me that great harm has been done by not confining our estimation of Holy Scripture to just these themes. An infallibility has sometimes been asserted for the Bible that the Bible nowhere asserts for itself. It has been looked upon by many as if it were a text-book on astronomy, or physiology, or geography. We have heard much of the conflict between science and religion. It is time we cut this gordian knot at once and for ever. The Bible, from the beginning to the end, deals only with the double question of righteousness and how it may be obtained. Whole libraries have been written, and may be found in our Universities and

and Seminaries, to prove either that the first chapters of Genesis do not disprove the discoveries of modern science, or else that they anticipate these discoveries. I do not believe that any part of the Bible conflicts with the discoveries of modern science, but when you make the further statement that these chapters anticipate such discoveries, I beg leave to withhold my assent, because the language of the Bible is religious, not scientific. We should take a short cut in this controversy, by declaring that it does not exist, that it is a legacy of mediaevalism which we have as yet hardly dared to shake off. The Bible has no more to say about geology and Darwinism than a book on political economy has to do with the movements of the stars. In the early part of this century, Thomas Chalmers rose to his feet in a religious assembly when he saw that a conflict was about to be started on the question of geology against the Bible, and in his stentorian voice uttered the single phrase "the book of Genesis has not one word to say about the antiquity of the globe." I think the truth of that sentence ought to be generally recognised. The Bible is not a text-book of science but of life eternal. It deals with the righteousness of God and how it may be obtained. The two things—science and religion, can never clash, for they come from the same hand. In the 16th verse of the 3rd chapter of John we have the text upon which all Christ's teaching is based—"God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on Him, should not perish, but have everlasting life." What music like unto that for the broken heart, for the contrite spirit, for the soul standing on the edge of darkness and peering out into the land of shadows and silence. "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." No suggestion of that love of God has ever come from the iron lips of science. And yet more than this: we are told that man "liveth not by bread alone, but by the word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God;" and of those words this blessed book is the chosen and sacred treasure. Let us ask the Lord Jesus Christ to increase in all our hearts a divine zeal to make known the knowledge of His word to the uttermost ends of the earth, and to bring the bread of life to a famishing and perishing world.

Rev. Hugh JOHNSTON, B.D., moved:—

"That seeing the wonderful openings that are continually presenting themselves to the Parent Society and other great Bible societies for the extension of their grand work in all lands, and recognising it as the will of God that all people should have in their own tongues the divine and matchless word; it behoves the people of Canada to be foremost in zeal and liberality, not only in providing their own land with gospel truth, but also in giving to other nations that blessed book which is the foundation of their peace and happiness."

The report before them and the eloquent and instructive address to which they had listened must, said the speaker, exercise a great influence upon them. He alluded to the work the Society was doing, and said that the man who could not here find room in which to stand with his brethren had not the love of the Bible and of the Lord Jesus Christ regnant in his soul. "What would the various missionary societies do without the Bible Societies? The English and American Bible Societies had spent five millions of dollars in the distribution of the Bible through heathen lands. More than seven millions of copies were distributed annually, this being more than twice the number that were supposed to have been issued for the three centuries from the printing of the first Bible in 1460 to the organisation of the first Bible society. The total issue of copies of the Scriptures by all the Societies numbered 180 millions. Who could estimate the good done by this work, and imagine where all these copies of the word of God had gone? And yet, not-



withstanding that the work they had already accomplished, was told in such enormous numbers, they were still only in the threshold of their labours. The Bible, after all the attacks made upon it, still remained supreme, and immeasurably above the books of all other religious systems. They should spread the Bible because it was closely related to the progress of humanity. It was not a book of Science, it was true, as Dr. Behrends had remarked; but see what it had done for science. It was in Christian lands, and in those Christian lands where the Bible was most freely and unrestrictedly distributed that science made most progress; it was in those lands where the telegraph and telephone and electric lighting and other modern wonders has been brought to perfection. Where but in Bible lands had science found its widest sphere? Then look at what it had done for literature and art. The themes of the great universal masters were taken from the Bible: 'Look, again, at what it was doing for the nations. It had created seventy languages. See what it has done for the German nation and for the British nation. The secret of Britain's power lay in her precious, peerless, Anglo-Saxon Bible. The speaker went on to comment on the report and enlarge upon the work being done in different lands by the Bible Societies, and concluded with an urgent appeal to them to do all that lay in their power towards spreading the Bible until from the Orient to the Occident it should purify all literature, elevate all science, and cleanse and renew all hearts.

Mr. James BROWN seconded the resolution and it was adopted.

Dr. J. G. HODGINS moved:—

“That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the Rev. Dr. Behrends for the instructive sermon which he preached on behalf of the Society last evening; and to the pastor and trustees of the Elm Street Methodist church for kindly granting the Society the use of their church for the occasion.”

Rev. J. M. CAMERON, seconded the resolution and it was adopted.

The Hon. Wm. McMASTER moved:—

“That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the pastor and trustees of this church, for granting its use on the present occasion; and to the organist and precentor for their valuable services on the occasion of this annual gathering.

Rev. J. MANLY seconded the resolution, and it was adopted.

A hymn was then sung, and the proceedings were concluded with the benediction pronounced by the Rev. Dr. Reid.
