When a horse falls in the street and gets injured the shock generally numbs the senses so much that it does not either cry or groan, but under some conditions an injured horse will sollicit sympathy in the most distinct manner. I remember a favourite horse of my own which trod on a nail long enough to pierce his foot. The poor thing hobbled up to me on three legs and cried as nearly like a child in trouble as anything I can describe. The sight was a very touching one, as was also the crippled animal's gratitude when the nail was pulled out and the wound dressed."

OTTAWA UNIVERSITY.

The following is a University commencement address of Very Rev. H. C. Weston, M.A., D.D., Rector of Ottawa University, was delivered at the fifty-first annual commencement exercises in the presence of the Governor-General upon whom the Senate of the University has conferred the degree of LL.D., and a brilliant assemblage of guests.

Your Excellencies, Ladies and Gentlemen—It is my pleasing duty to appear before you in the name of the University of Ottawa. In order to extend to one and all here present, but in an especial manner to your Excellencies, the Governor-General and the Councils of the University, my sincerest thanks for the encouragement of your kind attendance at these, our annual commencement exercises.

An occasion like this is one of annual recurrence within this old familiar walls. About the same time every year we welcome to our Assembly Hall, a large number of our friends and well-wishers, who come to witness the result of our studies, as they are evidenced by the medals of honour that are awarded and by the graduation diplomas that are conferred upon the successful students.

The classical education which a young man receives is divided into two parts: the scientific and the artistic. The work of the first three years corresponds to that done in the high schools and colleges of the provinces. At the end of the third year, the successful student receives a certificate of graduation, and as a consequence frequently, alas! for their own good, some students, at this stage, enter the study of law, medicine, or engineering. All educators, however, recognize the fact that a complete education, a thorough course of mental training should be received by every young man.

A man, to be a complete man—not only should he be well versed in the sciences of religion, but he should also be a model of exemplary Christian conduct, not only should his heart be formed by the practice of religion, but his mind should have gone through that process of liberal culture, that training, which only a complete education can give.
