CEDAR TO BE FREE.

The question whether the red cedar of British Columbia shall be admitted free into the United States, has, happily, on the decision of the United States Circuit Court, to which the Lumber Association of British Columbia appealed from the United States Board of Appraisers, been settled in favor of British Columbia lumber interests, and red cedar will in future rule under the free lumber schedule. This lumber is a strong favorite in United States markets, and a large development of trade may be anticipated from this out. We may hope that the decision touching dressed lumber, to which reference was made in our last issue, will meet a like outcome, or better still that the right of dressed lumber to rule free under the Wilson tariff, will be settled without the trouble of an appeal.

CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

ONTARIO.

BUSINESS to a large extent has gone holidaying. Lumbermen themselves are following the popular vogue and many of them are to be found enjoying themselves elsewhere than within the walls of their offices. It is expected that this spell of quietness will continue for probably another month, when, as something more definite will be known regarding the crops, business will commence to shape itself for the next season. A little stuff is moving, but only a little, home trade being slow, and enquiries from the States have fallen off very markedly. In the districts where sawing is going on everything is busy. The mills in most cases are cutting up to their full capacity, a circumstance that indicates confidence in the final outgo of lumber. Where the temptation is to shade prices, because of the present quietness, there is little of this actually done, and if general business takes on the expected strength in the fall there is no reason why prices for lumber should not advance some.

QUEBEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

The shipping of lumber by the regular line of steamers plying between Quebec and British ports is in the main a change in lumber methods in the Quebec market. It has its advantages, as well as drawbacks, and British importers are watching the development of this method of shipment, querying just what the altimate effect will be on the lumber trade of the United Kingdom. Lumber in good sized quantities keeps going forward to Great Britain and a slight improvement in trade in the United Kingdom is welcome news to lumbermen on this side of the Atlantic. There is not the same activity in New Brunswick as earlier in the season. Mills are closing down in Maine, because of a lessening demand, and the fact that prices are not satisfactory. A Boston journal says that large arrivals of cargo lumber from the Maritime Provinces, stimulated by the absence of duty, have filled up the market, and this to some ex tent operates against Maine lumbermen. On the whole, however, the season in New Brunswick is proving satisfactory.

, BRITISH COLUMBIA.

There has been a reduction in demand for lumber on the Coast within the past fortnight, though generally a fair volume of trade is the record, and there are good charters ahead that will keep the mills running steadily for some time. It is said that the collecting stumpage dues in arrears by the provincial government is bearing rather severely on some mills. The best news from the Coast for some

time is the stand taken by British Columbia lumbermen at a meeting held a week ago, when the price of lumber was advanced \$3.00 a thousand. The demand from Australia is brightening up, and this is also good news for Coast lumbermen. The Commercial, of Winnipeg, says that there is a fair amount of lumber business doing in Manitoba. "The cutting of prices at Brandon, which was in a fair way to terminate ten days ago has broken out again worse than ever. Wholesale dealers have lost heavily in Brandon in years past, owing to the unsatisfactory nature of the trade there, and it looks as though someone will be liable to lose again, as a war of cutting prices cannot go on long without causing someone to suffer. And it is not always the dealers themselves who are engaged in the war who have to meet the losses. Lumber is said to be offering in Brandon now at the lowest prices ever heard of in Manitoba, and farmers are coming from sixty and seventy, miles around Brandon to buy their lumber."

UNITED STATES.

A representative of the Canada Lum-BERMAN, who recently visited the Eastern States, reports the lumber trade exceedingly quiet. In New York there was no activity whatever, and to a large extent the same experience was met with in Albany, Buffalo and Tonawanda. This falling off in business has been most noticeable since the first of July. Things then seemed to go down with a jump, and the whole trade has taken on a holiday atmosphere. The outlook, however, for fall trade is by no means discouraging. True, lumber lags behind other departments of trade, but it is believed that it will catch up in the revival during the last half of the year on which trade is now entered.

FOREIGN.

The fact that deals re no lower in price in Great Britain, is accepted by the Timber Trades Journal as a point gained. At the chief centres, the lumber trade is showing some improvement. In Liverpool, trade generally is in more active condition, while the arrival of several steamers with large cargoes of Quebec goods gives the docks and quays a busy appearance. The demand for these new goods has been fairly good and the deliveries ex quay, particularly in deals and boards, have been on a large scale. In Glasgow, a steady business is maintained, and arrivals are being largely taken up by consumers ex quay. Prices remain steady, even where the demand does not take large size as hoped for. Reports from Australia indicate an improvement in business there, whilst trade with South Africa and the West Indies is none too

HARDWOODS

HARDWOODS.

Falling in line with the softer woods the trade in hardwoods for July is partaking of quietness, and the outgo will show a falling off from the two or three preceding months in which a very reasonable trade has been done. Prices hold firm, and it looks as though when fall trade opens that there will be strength assumed in this direction. direction.

STOCKS AND PRICES.

CANADA.

As a result of cutting pine lumber is being sold at Brandon, Man., at \$8 a thousand, the lowest quotation ever known in that district in that district.

Large shipments of shingles from the Gibson mill, are being received by J. Willard Smith, of St. John, N. B. Mr. Smith has sold over 3,000,000 shingles

The contract to supply the lumber required in the erection of the Northern Elevator Co's. new elevator, to be built at Winnipeg, Man., has been awarded to D. E. Sprague. The amount is over 500,000 feet.

The barkentine Wrestler, which has completed loading at the Brunette Saw Mills, will carry 560,000 feet of lumber to Shanghai. Her cargo is chiefly made up of heavy sticks, some of which are of unusual dimension.

The Royal City Mills, Vancouver, B. C., have just filled an order for fir dredge timbers for a dredge on the St. Lawrence over. The timbers are the largest ever chinnel formula for the largest ever the largest shipped from there, the size being 33x36 inch, 50 feet long.

The Timber News, of Liverpool, Eng., says: "We are told that Henry Ward Powis has cleared the balance of the Hawkesbury cutting of 12/12 3.11 4ths pine of 1895, sawing some 1,000:10 1,200 ptg standards. We regret that the prices paid have been denied us. This stock, with the Gilmour stock, have for many years been favorites in the London market."

The import of Quebec pine and spruce deals to Great Britain up to the present time is reported to be considerably less than that during the corresponding period last year and a firmer tone is asserting itself in this class of wood. The stock of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia spruce deals still slightly exceeds that of the corresponding period during the past two years, but the import only shows one half of that during June 1894, and the consumption 1,000 standards more.

A scarcity of logs on the Puget Sound has resulted in an advance of cedar siding and finishing.

An advance from \$8.50 to \$9 in the Chicago market has taken place in Manistee piece stuff, and the report is that a strong market is ruling.

THE SITUATION.

REPLECTED THROUGH CORRESPONDENCE OF "WEEKLY LUNDERHAM."

Marlatt & Housser, Portage la Prairie, Man.: "There is a fair movement of stocks in this district comparing favorab. with last year. Pine and spruce are in largest demand here, though no recent sales of great importance can be mentioned. Stocks are about the same as last year, though prices are not very firm."

Rhodes, Curry & Co., Amherst, N. S.: "Stocks are moving quite actively. Deals for the English market are in good demand and spruce frames and stuff for local and United States markets make up into good sized shipments. Spruce deals have been sold at about \$9 at Halifax and West Bay, and \$8 at Pugwash. The bulk of stocks in this section are sold. Prices

of stocks in this section are sold. Prices are stationary."

F. Deutschman, Teeswater, Ont.: "There is a very fair movement of stocks in this district. Shipped 20 cars in Jane. Basswood, soft elm, with certain size fof maple and hemlock, are in most demand. Several cars of maple, soft elm, and basswood have been sold at \$11.50, \$10 and \$12 from shipping points. Basswood and soft elm are running light in stocks. Maple first and seconds, still in stock; other sizes well cleared. Prices firm for good stock. Expect no advance except for stock. Expect no advance except for sizes that are scarce."

Pacific Coast Lumber Co., Ltd., New Westminster, B. C.: "Trade in B. C. shingles for the first half year has been considerably in excess of the same period last year. Unfortunately prices have been low, so that no one has been the better of the trade. An advance of ten cents per thousand has been made, but several more advances will have to be made before the business is on a proper basis. Bolis and shingle timber are basis. Bolts and shingle timber are scarce, the prices paid by mills being so low that many loggers and farmers have ceased cutting."

FREIGHTS AND SHIPPING.

The past week has been a fairly busy one at Montreal, several large steamers one at Montreal, several large steamers having got away with good quantities of lumber aboard, the leading being the Monterzuma, with 1049 stds, to London, the Mariposa, with 900 stds., to Liverpool, and the Alara, with 800 stds., to Fleetwood, and the quantities by the various liners have been quite up to the mark. The steamer Merrimac, to London, which got aground last week, has also sailed a second time with a large portion of lumber on board.

The freight market generally has weakened considerably during the past week or ten days. A decline of about 2s 6d per std. all round in the various Liners, od per std. all round in the various Liners, rates being the general thing. To London 37s od s. c. dock, or 35s any dock, August loading can be done; Liverpool has declined to 35s for prompt loading, and about 33s od for August loading, being a heavy decline from recent transactions, but the liners having now booked considerable quantities during the past week and feeling easier they will not likely be anxious for freight at same prices. To Glasgow a weaker tone prevails, and no coubt 35s. would be accepted by liners for August and September loading, althoughthey will not quote the rate. THE DRIVES.

In Nova Scotia the dry weather is impeding lumber operations. A considerable quantity of logs is hung up on the river and streams with no chance of geting out until Autumn. In consequence several mills are reported to have shut down, having no logs in their dam.

Graham, Horne & Co.'s big tow composed of 2,000,000 feet of saw logs, has reached Port Arthur from the south shore, in tow of the tugs Howard and Sally Jack. They were six days crossing the lake.

The ship Liverpool has cleared from St.
John, N. B., with remarkably large
cargo, consisting of 1,770 standards of
deals, which is 56½ standards to the 100
pounds. The Liverpool has been loading
eight weeks, during which time she has
paid about \$20 a day for wharfage. The
disbursements have aggregated over \$6,
000. The cargo was supplied by Alex.
Gibson, and is one of the largest ever sent
from this port. from this port.

AUSTRALIAN LUMBER CONDITIONS.

Fraser & Co., Ltd., of Melbourne, Aus., in their monthly timber report of June, say: As we anticipated in our last report, only a limited demand for timber has been experienced since that date; nor did we look for any improvement to be shown during the first months of the winter season winter season.

Business in Baltic flooring, etc., has been booked, ex Aberfoyle, previous to her arrival on the 31st ult., at about on a par with late quotations, though higher rates have ruled for some stocks on the spot of 6x%, which are likely to be maintained. In most other classes of timber imports, transactions have been carried through without any material change in values being evidenced, though stocks generally are not large, and as soon as the demand is on the increase, better rates are likely to ensue, and additional supplies come upon the market from some of the customary centres of exportation, the bulk of which should meet with satisfactory realization.

RED DEALS.—Imports: nil. Stocks of Swedish and Norwegian have been in little better inquiry at slightly improved

rates, but some fourth quality deals from Drammen have been disposed of at a low figure. Holdings of good quality are now figure. Holdings of good quality are well reduced. SPRUCE DEALS.—Imports: nil.

small enquiry exists, but stocks in first hands are nil. There is an improved de mand for this class of timber and supplies in the next season are expected to meet with satisfactory realization.

OREGON PINE.—Imports: nil. The demand has not been so brisk, owing to the trade having bought freely in the previous four weeks out of the shipment per Cadzow Forest. There is no change to report in values of good conditioned lumber.

REDWOOD.—Imports: nil. Business still remains dull in this line, but stocks are not important, and values last mentioned are well maintained.

SUGAR PINE AID DOOR STOCK.—Imports: nil, There is but little doing. Stocks are extremely small, but other lumber is being utilized for the manufacturing of cheap doors, etc.

LUMBER. — Imports: Shelving, 66, 388 feet super. Arrival: Paramita, from New York. A few transactions have been completed in shelving, but there is no hing of importance to report in other lines. of importance to report in other lines usually placed under this heading.

NEW BRUNSWICK SPRUCE AND BIRCH.

Several unusually large sailers and steamers, says Timber, of London. Eng., have been taken up on shippers account have been taken up on shippers account at low rates, and are either loading at St. John, N. B., or are on passage thence to Liverpool. Prices are steady at about £5 15s c. i. f., at which low figure, it is reported, the big 1,800 std vessel, now affoat, has been secured by Messrs. Holme, Wainright & Co., to go direct into consumption. Cargoes already to hand have been rapidly distributed, 7x3 particularly being in excellent demand, not of course, at the same figures as 9 and 11x3. The case making trade is well employed, and Parrsboro, Shediac and Hulifax deals are enquired for. There is every probability enquired for. There is every probability of all the earlier arrivals moving off freely, owing to the generally active and improving state of the building trade.

Some large parcels of St. John birch logs have arrived all together at Liverpool, two having been sold by auction at low and declining prices. Timber says: "It is difficult to understand why St. John shippers who have the reputation of being shrewd business men, should all within the same month determine to forward their stock for sale, to the serious extent of 100,000 feet, thus bringing the market tumbling down upon themselves and destroying the confidence of buyers for the rest of the season." A small line of Burstall's fresh Quebec wood has changed hands by private treaty at a low figure.

LUMBER FREIGHT PATES.

LUMBER freight rates for pine on the Grand Trunk Railway have been made a fixture, as below. Of any ntended change due notice will be given lumbermen.

General instructions in shipping by Grand Trunk are imbodied in these words in the tariff schedule: On lumembodied in these words in the tariff schedule: On lumber in carloads, minimum weight, 30,000 lbs. per car, unless the marked capacity of the car be less, in which case the marked capacity (but not less than 24,000 lbs.) will be charged, and must not be exceeded. Should it be impracticable to load certain descriptions of light umber up to 30,000 lbs. to the car, then the actual weight only will be charged for, but not less than 24,000 lbs. The rates on lumber in the tariff will not be higher from an intermediate point on the straight run than from the first named point beyond, to the same destination. For instance, the rates from Tarn or Hepworth to Guelph, Brampton. Weston or Toronto, would not be higher than the specific rates named from Wiarton to the same points. The rates from Cargill and Southampton to points east of Listowel and south and west of Stratford will be the same as from Kincardine, but in no case are higher rates to be charged than as per mileage table published on page 9 of tariff.

Rates from leading lumber points on pine and other oftwood lumber, shingles, etc., are as follows: From Glencaim, Creemore, Aurora, Barrie and other points in group B to Toronto, 6½c.; Collingwood, Penetang, Coldwater, Waubaushene, Sturgeon Pay, Victoria Harrbor, Midland, Fenelon Falls, Longford, Gravenhurst and other points in group C, to Toronto, 6½c.; Braks, bridge to Toronto 7c.; Utterson, Huntsville, Navor-Emsdale, Katrine to Toronto, 7½c.; Burk's Falls, Berriedale and Sundridge, to Toronto, 8c.; South River, Powassen and Callender to Toronto, 9‰c. These rates are per 100 lbs. Rates from Toronto east to Belleville are 7½c. per 100 lbs.; to Deseronto, 9c.; to Brockville and Prescott, 10c.; to Montreal and Ottawa, 11c. The

rates on hardwoods average about from 10. to 20. per 100 lbs. higher than on softwoods. For rates on railway ites, mahogany, rosewood, walnut, cherry, and other railuable woods, application must be made to the district

ties, mahogany, rosewood, walnut, cherry, and other valuable woods, application must be made to the district freight agent.

On the Canadian Pacific the rates on pine and softwoods may be illustrated as follows: Cache Hay, North Bay, Sturgeon Falls and Warren, to Toronto, to: Algoma, Cook's Mills, Massey, Spanish River and White-this to Toronto, 20: From Ottawa, Hull, Aylmer and Duchesne Mills to station on the Lake Erie and Detroit River, Erie and Huron, Toronto, Hamilton and Huffalo, and Michigan Central Railways, the rate is 14 Me. per 100 lbs. Regulations apply as to minimum size of carload of 30,000 lbs., and an advanced rate is charged for hardwoods.

Lumber freight rates on the Canada Allantic Rail way are as follows: Ottawa to Toronto, 10 cents per 100 lbs.; Ottawa to Oswego, \$1,00 per M ft., (3,000 lbs. and under per M ft.,) Amprior to

Montreal, \$1.50 per M fl., (3,000 lbs and under per M fl.); Ottawa to Quebec, \$2.50 per M fl.; Arnprior to Quebec, \$2.50 per M fl.; Citawa to Buffalo, 12 cents per 100 lbs.; Ottawa to Port Huron and Detroit, 14 cents per 100 lbs. Ottawa to New York, five carloads or over \$3.00 per M fl., Amprior to New York, \$3.50 per M fl., Ottawa to Boston, Portland and common points, local 15 cents; exports 15c. per 100 lbs. Arnprior to Boston, Portland and common points, local 17 cents, export 15 cents per 100 lbs. Ottawa to Burlington, 6 cents per 100 lbs.; Ottawa to Albany, 10 cents per 100 lbs.; Ottawa to St. John, N. B. and common points, 20 cents per 100 lbs.; Ottawa to Halifax, N. S. and common points, 22½ cents per 100 lbs. 3 finimum carload weight for shipment of lumber, lath, shingles, etc., is 30,000 lbs., and rates quoted per M fl. the minimum carload charged is 10 M fl., lumber not exceeding 300 lbs. to the M feet. Ottawa tates apply on shipments from Rockland and Hawkesbury.

MODIFICATION OF HARDWOOD RAYES.

THE Grand Trunk Railway and Canadian Pacific have made the rates on harlwoods from certain points to Toronto and Hamilton as follows. The regulations are over the signature of Mr John Earls, W D F A. of the G. T. R., and given in reply to a letter from Toronto hardwood men

"After careful consideration we have come to the conclusion that, on and after Jan. 1st, 1895, a modification will be made in the present arrangements for hardwood lumber, to the effect that the rate will be 7½c, per 100 lbs, from our Northern and Northwestern branches to Toronto and Hamilton. This rate, however, will not app', from main live points and the straight run between Toronto, Sarnia and Windsor; also that so far as rates on common lumber to points like Guelph, Galt, London, Woodstock, Ingersoll, etc., from all lumiker shipping stations the rate will be the same on hardwood as on pin-." On the old principle, we suppose, that half the last is better than none, hardwood men have something, possibly, to be thankful for, though there

is no good reason why the rates generally on bard-wood should not be as low as on pine. It is understood that the C. P. R. rate will be made uniform at 75c. from same points.
