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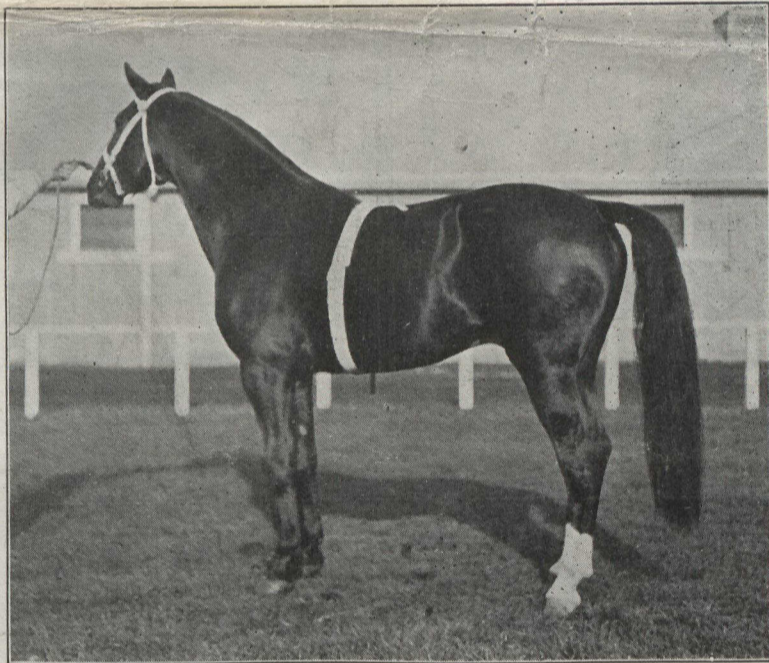

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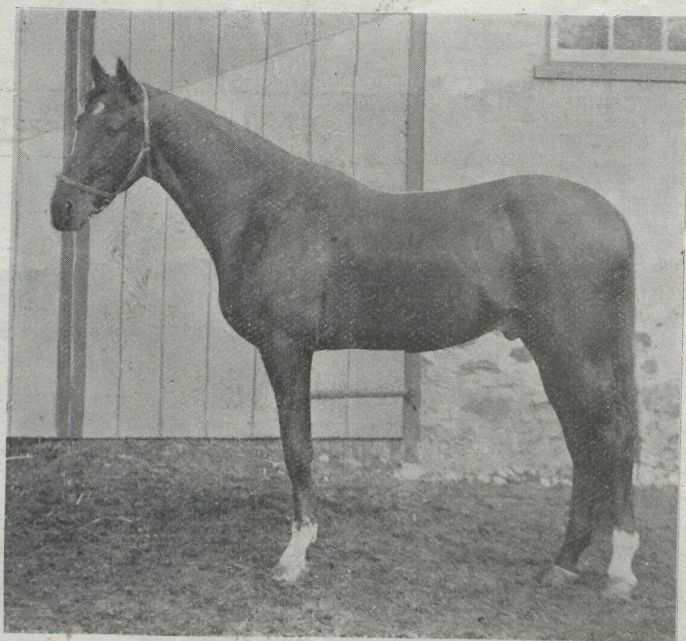

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## WITH THE HARNESS HORSE

The former Canadian trainer, Percy Burnham, has located at Detroit.

A. W. Churchill of Jones Falls, Ont., has a very promising trotting gelding sired by Guinette 2:16 $\frac{1}{4}$ .

Don Chenault, 3, 2:05 $\frac{1}{4}$  finished second in his first start in Austria. He was defeated by the Austrian bred trotter, Pierrot.

There is a very promising three-year-old trotter by Kentucky Todd, 2, 2:08 $\frac{1}{4}$  and out of a dam by Judge Parker 2:09 $\frac{1}{2}$  in training at Baltimore, Md.

Russ McGirr, "The Little Giant" of the sulky is training a string at Moose Jaw, Sask., including the pacers, Alcyfras 2:03 $\frac{1}{4}$  and Hal D. 2:13 $\frac{1}{4}$  and the trotter Copius 2:19 $\frac{1}{4}$ .

There will be a good program of races decided at Wallaceburg on May 25. The meat amount of \$700 in purses will be divided for the following classes: 2:16 class, 2:25 class and 2:50 class.

The Ghost 2:16 $\frac{1}{4}$ , a full brother to the grey pacer, Harry The Ghost 2:04 $\frac{1}{2}$ , was second in 2:04 $\frac{1}{4}$  over a half mile track last season and is said to be headed for a tab of 2:05 or better this year.

The American-bred trotting mare, Alfreda Todd 2:16 $\frac{1}{4}$ , recently exported to Austria, won her first start in that country, trotting in 2:15. Alfreda Todd was raced a few times on the Canadian Circuit in 1912.

C. K. G. Billings has sold the trotting stallion, Burning Star 2:14 $\frac{1}{4}$ , brother to The Harvester 2:01 to the Wisconsin horseman, Paul C. Wilson. Mr. Billings had several good offers for Burning Star from foreign buyers, but wishes to keep the stallion in this country.

G. E. Everett of Simcoe, Ont., owner of Hal H., p, 2:13 $\frac{1}{4}$ , recently purchased from Cruickston Farm, Galt, the trotting stallion, The Baronet 2:28 $\frac{3}{4}$ , trial 2:12, by Kentucky Todd 2:08 $\frac{3}{4}$ , dam Baroness Helena, dam of Jim Todd 2:08 $\frac{3}{4}$ , by Baron Wilkes 2:18; second dam Sultana, dam of 5, by The Moor.

Ray Snedeker will be the trainer and driver of the fleet pacer Directum I. 2:02 $\frac{1}{4}$  this year if the recent report that Owner Jas. Butler has turned the stallion over to Dr. J. C. McCoy of Kirkwood, Del., is true. Dr. McCoy is the owner of the trotting stallion Lord Dewey 2:03 $\frac{3}{4}$ , which is to be prepared for an attempt against stallion record, and it is said that Directum I. will be his stable mate.

Chas. Dean of Palatine, Ill., has shipped the four-year-old trotting filly Loree, Toddington, by Toddington 2:20 to Portage la Prairie, Man. where she will join the stable of Barney Barnes, who has charge of the Carson and Rochon horses. Loree Toddington is a very fast young mare and was well engaged in the futurities, but took sick early last season and had to be declared out. She is owned by Chas. Donnelly of Winnipeg.

That good trotter, Earnest Axtell 2:08 $\frac{1}{4}$ , exported the past winter, is winning on the other side of the ocean.

Mack Thistle 2:04 $\frac{3}{4}$ , the full brother to Independence Boy 2:04 $\frac{3}{4}$ , will be raced over the eastern half mile tracks this year.

J. S. Hodges of Attercliffe Station, is the proud owner of a fine large filly by Jack McKerron 2:07 $\frac{1}{4}$  and out of a four-year-old mare by Kentucky Todd, 3, 2:08 $\frac{3}{4}$ .

Jos. Carson of Winnipeg, Man., while on a trip through the western States the past week, dropped off at Des Moines, Ia., and purchased the pacing stallion, Strathell 2:14 $\frac{1}{4}$ .

Symbolier 2:09 $\frac{1}{4}$ , for a number of years the premier stallion at Chicas Kia Stock Farm, Blackwell, Okla., will in future stand in Niles, Mich. Symbolier has proven a splendid sire and there are a good number of his get owned in Canada.

The trotting stallion, Captain George 2:09 $\frac{1}{4}$ , by Admiral Dewey 2:04 $\frac{3}{4}$  has been purchased by Russian buyers through the Fasig-Tipton Sales Co. of New York and will soon be on his way across the water. Captain George was a 2:10 trotter as a 3-year-old.

Grace D., 3, 2:10 $\frac{1}{4}$ , the fast young pacing mare that failed to make good in the Rodney stable last season, has been returned to the stable of Curt Gosnell, who gave her her record as a three-year-old over a half mile track.

The fast young pacer, Herman Wenger 2:08 $\frac{1}{4}$  that is staked through the Canadian Circuit in 2:10 paces, is working at Cleveland and has been a mile in 2:23 $\frac{1}{4}$ , last quarter in 33 seconds. He will be campaigned by Bob Beaver, who raced the trotter Gillett and the pacer, Pat Logan 2:16 $\frac{1}{4}$ , through the Canadian ice circuit the past winter.

The Montana trainer, Frank Ragsdale, will again race through Western Canada and will have in his string the trotting mare Idealo 2:16 $\frac{1}{4}$ , and the pacer, J. M. Johnson, 3, 2:14 $\frac{1}{4}$ , formerly owned by M. D. Shutt of Penisa Maid 2:04 $\frac{3}{4}$  fame. The pair are the property of Mike Tynen of Prince Albert, Sask.

The big western pacer, College Gent 2:09 $\frac{1}{4}$ , owned by Jos. Carlson of Winnipeg, Man., tips the scales at 1225 pounds. He worked a half mile track in 2:06 $\frac{1}{4}$  last year and being in rare form, is expected to again sweep the board in his class in the Western Canada Fair and Racing Circuit and on the Pacific Coast.

The \$30,000 stable commenced by the late J. Howard Ford at Goshen, N. Y., has been completed and the former Canadian trainer, William Hodson, will have charge of the racing string, which includes the sensational young trotter, Lord Allen, 2, 2:11. Mr. Ford's brother and chief heir has taken over Stoney Ford Farm and will maintain the famous breeding establishment.

S. A. Proctor of Toronto, has sold the fast pacing gelding, Billy Sims 2:13 $\frac{1}{4}$  to Jas. Cmith of the same city.

W. B. Thompson of Woodburn, Ont., has in Mildred Maid, a 4-year-old mare by Arbutuskan 2:09 $\frac{1}{4}$ , dam Mildred Wilkes, that gives promise of becoming a very capable sidewheeler. She is a double gaited mare, but when at speed, prefers the pace and will be worked at that gait.

The track at Chesley, Ont., has been put in splendid condition and the local horsemen will give a good program of races on May 25. W. Lustig is one of Chesley's most prominent horsemen and owns the promising young stallion, Eel W., by The Eel 2:02 $\frac{1}{4}$ . Eel W., with the exception of being a little larger, is the exact counterpart of his famous sire, and being a good prospect, will be worked after a short season in the stud.

The first foal, a black filly, by High Private, 3, 2:23 $\frac{3}{4}$ , arrived on April 29, the property of E. H. Webbling, Brantford, Ont. and as a sample she will "do," being a typical Bingen every way. Her dam is by Axworthy, second dam Lucy Wilton, by Wilton and is a full sister to the noted Colorado sire, Ask Me Not. She will be bred back. The first mare bred to High Private this season was Lou Lo, 2, 2:30 $\frac{1}{2}$ , by Clay; dam Empress Josephine, by Empire Wilkes.

In reporting arrival of foals by Alto Dewey 2:24 $\frac{1}{4}$ , at College Farm, Chatham, Ont., Mr. D. McLachlan writes as follows: "We have now five—three colts and two fillies, all doing exceedingly well and I doubt very much if five of the get of any stallion in America of the same age will beat them. They are all strong, husky fellows, straight on their legs from the start, full of ambition, wild as hares, and handsome. Three of them are blacks, taking after the sire, Alto Dewey, and the other two are bays. Every one of them is marked with a star in the forehead, and two of them with left hind ankle white. With this exception, they are solid color."

E. Martin was working Yankee Bingen by Fritz Bingen 2:16 $\frac{3}{4}$ , dam Dolley O., by Belmont Star.

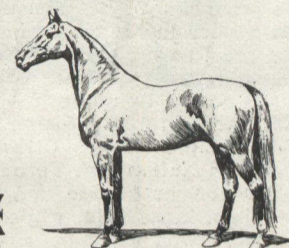
Jimmie McDowell was working Billie G. which has improved very much this spring.

## Bad Sportsmanship at Horse Show

It is regrettable that the Toronto Horse Show, although successful in every other way, should have been, to a certain extent, marred by the unsportsmanlike conduct of some of the exhibitors in refusing to accept the awards of the judges.

Judging of show horses is necessarily a matter of individual opinion, and it follows that some disagreements must arise over the awards. It is, therefore, an essential part of the horse show game that an exhibitor, although he may honestly believe his entry has been unfairly treated, should not make an issue of it. Any man who owns show horses realises that he must occasionally be a victim of a decision which is perhaps unfair, but it is the tradition of the sport that such an occurrence must be accepted in a sportsmanlike and gentlemanly way. If this tradition is not to

be observed, it means the end of all horse shows. It would be impossible to conduct these highly necessary and entertaining exhibitions if any exhibitor who thinks he has been unfairly dealt with has the privilege of refusing the judge's award and making a fuss over the matter.

The man who cannot take a licking in the horse show ring, whether deserved or otherwise, should go out of the horse show business. Ninety-nine times out of a hundred, at big horse shows, the judges are honorable men who do their best to be fair. No one can blame the management of our horse show in refusing further entries from individuals who have shown themselves to be bad sportsmen. Every game must be played according to the rules and smiling acceptance of defeat is the primary rule of the equine arena.—Toronto World.

# With The Show Horses, Thoroughbreds and Trotters at Montreal

Activity is everywhere evident in the various equine enterprises in Montreal and suburbs just now, and a season of considerable prosperity is confidently looked forward to by owners, as the track managers are certainly vying with one another in their efforts to provide attractive programs and conditions.

All interest is, of course, centred this week at the big arena on St. Catharine St., where Montreal's fifteenth annual horse show is being held and judging by the first couple of days' performances, the association seems bound to score a best on record.

Much interest was shown in the entries of Miss Lulu Long of Kansas City, who again met her fair rival of the tan bark, Miss E. Viau of Montreal, on the opening day, Miss Long securing the verdict in the mares and geldings, 15.3 shown to vehicle, with the b. g. Revelation; Miss Viau scored second with Eye Opener.

In the pairs to four wheeled vehicle, 15.2, Miss Long took first with Revelation and Realization, just beating out Miss Viau, who showed with the Duke of Connaught and Earl Grey. The tables were turned in the tandem class, when Miss Viau was awarded the blue ribbon with the geldings, Eye Opener and I Wonder, defeating the American entries from the Wild Rose Farm of St. Charles, Ill., very attractively shown by Mr. Val Crane. Miss Viau also took first in the two saddle horse classes carrying up to 180 lbs with Love Maker, the Illinois entry Red Rose, being second.

The attendance on the opening day was large and graced with the cream of Montreal society, while the best of exhibitors included many of the patrons of former shows, such as the Hon. Clifford Sifton and his two sons, Lieut. W. B. and Captain John Sifton; Sir D. C. Cameron, Sir H. Montague Allen, Capt. W. T. Rodden, Dr. R. E. Webster, A. Hamilton Gault, Dr. J. C. Reid, Dr. D. McEachran, Major Sims, J. E. Arnold, W. H. Collier, Colin Campbell, Major Van Straubenzie, W. C. Leitch and a score of the Montreal contingent of owners and riders.

Mr. Geo. Pepper of Toronto was again on hand giving timely assistance and while not an exhibitor this year, his presence was a great pleasure to his many friends here.

The racing season proper will open here on Friday, May 22, when the Montreal Driving Club will start their spring race meeting of seven days at DeLormier Park. Already many horses are now in training over the half-mile course and it is fully expected by the management that when the bugle sounds for the opening race there will not be a vacant stall in the four hundred now on the grounds. Judge Cole, who gave such good satisfaction with his decisions last year, will again preside in the stand at the opening meeting and will be assisted by Mr. Charles Campeau as associate and Mr. Wm. Murray will officiate at the barrier. The

track is a busy place these days and the railbirds are out every morning.

The announcement is made that the King Edward Park track just east of the city will again be operated this year and two running meetings will be held, the management being controlled locally, the owner of the property just now being Mr. J. T. R. Laumendeau, president of the Dorval Park Jockey Club, and whose manager, Mr. S. N. Holman, directed so successfully the King Edward Park races in the past. The dates claimed are July 11 to 18, and August 12 to 19.

Secretary Brown, of the Montreal Driving Club, states that it is about settled the annual summer harness meeting at Delormier Park will take place from Thursday, July 23, to Wednesday, July 29. The official announcement with the programme will appear in THE SPORTSMAN in a week or two.

Granby, P. Q. will probably have the opening harness meeting for the season in this neighborhood, having announced races for May 23 and 25. This town is located on the Central Vermont Ry. about fifty miles from Montreal and a number of the local campaigners were shipped there the other day for their spring training.

Mr. Pat Dunn, the Ayiwin Street merchant in Hochelaga Ward, has just shipped to Granby in charge of Trainer E. Lefebvre, the grey pacing gelding Hal Online, by Direct Hal, 2:04 1/4, out of Online's Ddaughter 2:24 1/4. This horse has no mark but has shown many fast trials and will be given every opportunity this season to earn some money. Hal Online was purchased by Mr. Dunn recently from LePailleur Bros., of Lachine, who imported him from New York.

A matinee or speedway club is promised among the new features for this season, the DeLormier Park management having consented to give the use of the north end track for that purpose at the conclusion of the running races this month. Mr. R. C. Clarke, the well-known local contractor, will undertake the organization of the new club.

Word comes from Richmond, P.Q., that Mr. J. H. Lane, a long-time friend of THE SPORTSMAN, has just completed his new four storey Brunswick Hotel, and will now be able to entertain tourists and sport lovers as never before. Excellent boating, fishing, good roads and pleasant drives abound in that section and Mr. Lane always has a few good drivers in his stables that can lead the pace for any of the boys.

Horsemen, friends and many others will regret to hear of the serious illness of Mr. Wm. Boag, Chief Clerk of the Grand Union Hotel, here and formerly occupying a similar position at the Walker House, Toronto. Always fond of a good horse, having owned several with speed, Mr. Boag, never missed a harness meeting when health and business would permit.

### THE FOREST CITY Fair RACE MEETING

At Cleveland, Ohio, on August 20, in connection with the Forest City Fair, will begin the most important half mile track meeting of the 1914 season. The complete program is announced in this issue of the SPORTSMAN and the particular attention of our readers is called to same.

There will be seven days' racing. Three \$1,000 stakes have already closed and four new stakes, each worth \$1,000 are announced to close May 19. There is a 2:14 and 2:23 trot and a 2:12 and 2:25 pace.

All purse races will be worth \$500 each and these will close on August 10.

This meeting will give horsemen the only opportunity they will have to race rain or shine, over a waterproof half mile track. Cleveland is a member of the Lake Erie Circuit and follows the Cranwood meeting in that circuit. No ship will be necessary in this case as Cranwood is but three miles from North Randall and horses can be led over.

A three per cent entry is to govern in the new stakes announced in this issue and program is to be so arranged that horses can start twice at this meeting if owners so desire.

The race meeting in Summerside on Dominion Day promises to be more than usually interesting. The card has not yet been settled upon but it will be a good one. The track is rapidly drying up and will be put in first class condition for racing.

There will be races on the Charlottetown Driving Park on June 3. The card consists of a 2:18 trot and pace, and a 2:24 trot. The purse in the first class will be \$200, and in the second and third \$100 each. It is expected the entry list will be large.

## Western Canada Notes

J. A. MacCullough of Calgary, Alta. who last spring purchased of Col. W. Pike, of Montana, nine head of harness horses, is preparing five of them for an active racing campaign in Western Canada this spring and summer. Wm. McPherson is assisting Mr. MacCullough in the training of this good bunch of pacers, on MacCullough's private track near Calgary. During the winter months on ice track was used to good advantage and each animal is ready now to race in good form. Last year soon after Mr. MacCullough bought these animals they became afflicted with boils and much trouble was had in getting them in condition.

Hal Mercury, p, 2:15¼, by Brown Hal 2:2¼, is the head of this stable. He is now ten years old and his owner trainer says that he is now ready to race the head off any 2:10 pacer over the Canada half-mile tracks. MacCullough also says that Miss Mercury, p, by Hal Mercury is ready and fit to step five times in one afternoon in 2:10 over a half-mile track. This mare is now six years old and has a record of 2:15½, as a three-year-old on a mile track, and 2:16½ on a half-mile course. She was not raced as a four-year-old but started a few times last season and did not equal her 3-year-old record in a winning race. Hal Stewart, p, 2:29¼, by Liai Mercury, is a five-year-old and shows now that he can race in 2:13 or better. Judith Hal, a six-year-old and Montana Bell, a five-year-old, are going around 2:20, and in a few weeks, if they keep good, will be able to race around 2:15. These last two are also by Hal Mercury but have never raced.

There are probably more harness horses now at the Calgary track than at any other training point in the country. So far the spring weather has been pretty good for training and the making of speed. All are anxious for the 22nd of May to come when the season is to open at Edmonton. Among others at Calgary are F. E. Smith with a stable headed by the great pacer, Merry Direct 2:11½, by Walter Direct 2:05¼; John Wall, among others, has Grattan Boy, by Montana Grattan, the Montana bred and raised gelding, that is said to be the best trotter without a bar in Canada. He was the largest money winner on the ice last winter. His ice record is 2:21¼. Then there is George Haag with Alberta, p, 2:03¼, by Searchlight 2:03¼, and fifteen or sixteen others; and G. C. Pendleton from Oregon with his stable headed by Hal Gray, p, 2:08, by Hal B. 2:04½.

There is hardly a day passes now but what one or more stables cross from U. S. through Montana or Washington, to Canada to get ready for the start at Edmonton. The Montana stables will begin to cross over the line about the first of May, to go direct to Edmonton. Frank H. Ragsdale, who has campaigned in Canada for a number of years, will ship from Kalispell, Montana, about the 6th of May, and go direct to Edmonton. He has nine or ten in his string. Idealo 2:16¼, by The Beau Ideal 2:15¼, a son of Dare Devil 2:09, dam Miss Expresso, is one of his best and in fact the best in the far north-west. She started out green last year and in 16 starts was never out of the money. She is in good condition this spring and "Rags" has much confidence in her. Then he has J. M. Johnson, a pacer with a three-year-old mark of 2:14¼, that is doing well. This one is also well bred. He is by a son of Cochato 2:11¼, dam Pearl Poindexter, by Sam Estes 2:20¼. Margaret Powers, a 3-year-old trotting filly by Vice Commodore 2:11, by Bingen 2:06¼, dam Arionette, by Arion 2:07¼, is a grandly bred one and is one of the sweetest trotters one ever looked at. She certainly will make good. Then "Rags" has Grattan Bond, a four-year-old trotting colt by The Bondsman, dam Grattane, by Grattan 2:13, that looks

and acts like a coming grand trotter, and to be able to sustain the reputation of his breeding. "Rags" also has Red Wood Wilkes, a green pacer, by Domineer 2:20, dam Nora May, by Redwood Redman and Helen Argot, a four-year-old pacer by Inferno 2:15½, by Diablo 2:09¼, dam Mildred C., by Argot Wilkes 2:14¼, owned by F. 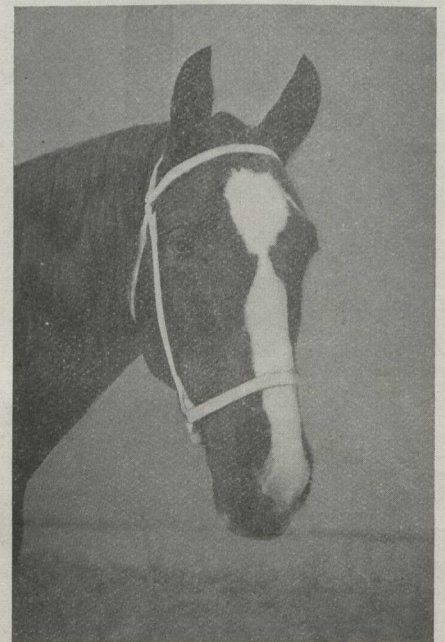
### SOUTH EDMONTON NOTES

## Latonia Derby Entries

The historic Latonia Derby will be run off this season on Saturday, June 13. This is the sixth day of the coming meeting at Latonia, which begins on June 8 and continues for 24 racing days. This great race was first run off as the Hindoo Stakes in 1833, the season the Latonia track was first opened to the public. It was first run as the Latonia Derby in 1837, and it holds an unbroken record since 1884 to the present time, having annually been the feature of the late Spring and early Summer meetings of the beautiful course among the Kenton county hills of Kentucky.

It is the one early Derby race which is always run at a mile and a half, the distance of its English namesake. The subscription this season is \$25 each, with \$100 additional to start, which, with the \$6,000 added by the Latonia Jockey Club, makes it one of the richest three-year-old events of the season. ## EDITORIAL

### The King's Plate

The date for the running of the King's Plate, Canada's feature racing event, is but a little over two weeks away and interest is now running high. The King's Plate is an annual fixture and is the oldest race decided on the American continent, having been run continually the past fifty-four years. It is one of Canada's richest races and is to this country what the Derby is to England and the Kentucky Derby to the United States. The race is exclusively for Province-bred horses, owned by British subjects residents of Ontario, and derives a national reputation through the donation of fifty guineas to the winner by His Majesty The King. There is much fame attendant with the winning of such a race and it is more for the notoriety than the monetary gain that many horsemen are so anxious to saddle the winner.

Of the thirty-two original entries in the race only five have been declared out, and while there will no doubt be others fall by the way side before the 23rd, there is plenty left to assure a good field at the post. The Giddings' three-year-old, Bee Hive, is the public favorite on the strength of his performances in the two-year-old division last year and should he continue to work well and hold his present good form he will probably go to the post a strong favorite. Mr. Giddings has furnished the winner the past two years in the splendid pair, St. Bass, holder of the record for the race, and Hearts of Oak and there is a large following of the Oakville stable who believe that Bee Hive is equally as good as either of his stable mates.

The spring has been a backward one for training operations and only within the past few days have any of the candidates been let down anywhere near the pace they will be asked to set over the Plate course. The Simcoe four-year-old, Mausolus, owned by Mr. H. H. Roberts and in charge of Trainer John Nixon, has outworked any of the candidates and at this date of writing looks real good. He is a much improved horse and has many admirers who believe he will play a prominent part in this year's renewal of the big race. He has been an easy mile in 1:45 2-5 and finished the Plate distance in 2:15 2-5 eased up on the end.

Gold Bud, one of the Davies entries, has started twice in the Plate race and last year was third, being beaten off about twelve lengths in 2:09 1-5, the time made by Hearts of

Oak, Vio Vode, entered by Mr. P. Gorman of Ottawa, was also a starter in the race last year and finishing very resolutely was beaten a head by Gold Bud. He is a much improved horse and possessing a rare turn of speed, is pretty certain to prove a factor in the race on the twenty-third.

Dark Rosaleen, owned by President Seagram, and Slipper Day, entered by Col. J. S. Hendrie of Hamilton, are another pair that are highly regarded. They were both good two-year-olds and are thought to be the kind that will go the route. While all the talk is in favor of Bee Hive, it appears to us at this date to be an open race, and we would not attempt to predict the winner. ## The Syracuse Entries

With 177 entries received, the New York State Fair has established a new record for early closing races on the Grand Circuit. Each of the ten classes for which entries were invited have been filled and the full \$36,000 offered for this branch of sport at the big exposition will be paid as scheduled.

Although a large patronage was expected, even those best informed of the horse situation hardly thought such a large number would come in for the races. The response, however is looked upon as a justification of the liberal offer made by the authorities in this city.

The prize event on the program, the Empire State stake of \$10,000 for 2:14 trotters, attracted the entry of twenty-four horses. Last year this same stake brought forty-eight entries, but the return this season is considered satisfactory because of the change in the conditions.

Last year the stables could enter one horse for a payment of 3 per cent and any number of others for 1 per cent. This season on each horse entered the full three per cent must be paid unless the owners declare out after the first and second payments have been made.

Twenty-four entries have been placed for the Syracuse \$5,000 stake for 2:11 pacers. This is considered one of the richest races ever offered and will be watched with unusual interest.

What promises to be the greatest race at the fair is the free-for-all pace, for which a stake of \$5,000 has been offered. Twelve horses each of which is known throughout the country, have been entered. In the past it has been the custom to make the free-for-all pace a sweepstake event with a certain sum added money. The change is thought a good one by the horsemen.

Four Syracuse horses have been entered in the various events. The Syndicate stable has entered Baron Alcyone in the 2:08 pace and the 2:11 pace. Colusa, the big black pacer, owned by Wm. Cahill, has also been named for these two events. Both horses are now being trained by Havis James.

George D. Sherman has entered two horses, Sherman Audubon and Edward Audubon, in the Geddes 2:19 trot.

The largest single entry is that made by Thos. W. Murphy of Poughkeepsie. He has named twenty-four horses. Walter R. Cox is in the list

with sixteen and Edward Geers with fourteen. All the other large stables are also represented.

Of the entry lists announced thus far this year the Syracuse list is the largest. Kalamazoo has 124, Grand Rapids 128 and Pittsburgh 126. Two of the classes failed to fill heavily and it was feared for a time that they would be canceled. Because of the support given the other classes, Commissioner Jones decided to carry the weaklings at a loss. The complete list of entries follows:

**OLD ROSEBUD WON KENTUCKY DERBY**

Louisville, May 9.—For the first time in 26 years, and the fourth time in the forty years' history of this turf classic, the Kentucky Derby was won by a gelding, when Old Rosebud, owned by H. C. Applegate and Co., of Louisville, and ridden by J. McCabe, raced under the wire in the event at Churchill Downs track this afternoon, a victor by about eight lengths. Hodge, owned by K. Spencer, of Missouri, was second, and Bronze Wing, owned by A. P. Humphrey, Jr., Louisville, was third. Old Rosebud was a 4 to 5 favorite.

Not only did Old Rosebud, the son of Uncle and Ivory Bells, win the Derby, but he also established a new track and Derby record for a mile and a quarter, making the distance in 2:03 2-5, over a track not considered fast. The former Derby and track record of 2:04 4-5 was made by Donerail, last year's Derby winner.

The running of the Derby, the feature of the opening day of the Churchill Downs spring meeting, was witnessed by one of the largest crowds that ever attended the event, including many society folk from neighboring cities, and leaders in turf circles from all over the country. Last night's rain was succeeded by a day of sunshine, which placed the track in better condition than expected.

Eleven crack three-year-olds were on the card as starters, but only seven went to the post.

Old Rosebud led from the barrier, with Hodge and Old Ben well up, and Bronze Wing trailing. On the back stretch Hodge tried to move up, but McCabe let out a wrap on the

favorite's reins, and he shot ahead, increasing his lead to the finish. John Gund moved into third place and made a bid to be considered, but in the stretch Bronze Wing caught him and took third easily. In addition to the horses mentioned Watermelon and Surprising also ran.

The Derby purse, with \$10,000 added money, aggregated \$13,350, the richest stake in the history of this race. Of this amount approximately \$10,000 went to the winner.
