So many of the Regulations of the Council of Public Instruction have been changed under the late amendments of the Educational Statutes, that it was considered advisable to consolidate provisionally the old and new Regulations at once. It is hoped Trustees and Teachers may therefore find no difficulty in becoming thoroughly acquainted with them.

COMMENTS AND REGULATIONS OF THE COUNCIL OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

COMMISSIONERS OF SCHOOLS.

Comments.

[1.] The provisions of the Act touching the classification of pupils, the employing of assistant teachers, and the grading of schools, render it necessary to retain sections of good size. Except in densely peopled settlements, no section should be less than three miles in length, and in thinly peopled settlements not less than four miles. It is earnestly hoped that each Board of Commissioners will exert its influence and authority to preserve, wherever practicable, such a number of inhabitants in each section as will enable either graded schools or the closest possible approximation to them to be sustained in all the more densely settled portions of the country. No mere preference in favor of one section or another, on the part of parents, should be allowed to interfere with the preservation of the proper bounds of sections. Such bounds should always be determined upon as will enable the people of all the sections to educate their children in the most efficient and economical manner. This can be attained only by means of large school sections. In making any necessary change in the established boundary of any section, the utmost care must be exercised that such change does not take effect prior to the settlement of engagements entered into by the trustees, under the authority of the annual meeting. As the law provides that alterations in boundaries shall not take effect until the beginning of the next ensuing School Year, the Council strongly recommends that they be made only at the regular Annual Meeting of Commissioners. The sections affected should always be notified as early as possible of the decision of the Board.

[2.] The commissioner being authorized by law to name a committee of not less than three of their number to appoint trustees of schools as occasion may arise between the yearly meetings of the full board, the Council strongly recommends that such a committee he named by each board. A careful record of all appointments made by the committee must be kept and reported to the board, to be entered in the minutes. The inspector shall

be ex officio secretary to the committee.

[3.] The power committed to each board of commissioners of condemning school-houses is an important one, and should, with necessary prudence, be faithfully exercised. There cannot be any lasting educational progress unless suitable school accommodation is provided by each section, according to its ability, for all its children. The law provides means by which an ample portion of the resources at the command of the inhabitants of each section may be devoted to so necessary and so noble a use; and it is for each board of commissioners to insist that the plain and reasonable demands of the laws shall be complied with. The Council recommends that every case calling for the exercise of this power be dealt with at the annual meeting of the commissioners, and that the trustees of the section be immediately notified of the declaration made and its consequences.

REGULATION 1. Any person or persons intending to apply to the commissioners for a change in the boundaries of any school section must hereafter post a written notice of such intention in one or more public places within each section affected, at least five days previous to the meeting of the commissioners; and the notice must specify distinctly the

change or changes to be applied for.

Reg. 2. All applications for changes in the boundaries of sections, and for the creation of new sections, must be accompanied by full information touching all the interests affected by such changes. This information is particularly required when it is proposed to create new sections, and it should include plans showing the relation of the new section to the section or sections from which it is to be detached, with distances carefully marked; also the number of rate-payers and children of school-going age, and the amount of assessable property in both old and new sections.

Reg. 3. As the law provides that no action taken by boards of commissioners towards the establishment of new sections shall have force until ratified by the Council of Public

Instruction, it is hereby made the duty of the inspector of schools, in his capacity as clerk of commissioners, to forward to the Superintendent of Education, in company with report of action of board, either in original or copy, all documents detailing the information on which such action in establishing new sections was based.

REG. 4. When in any section the entire number of resident rate-payers is less than twelve, a requisition for the appointment of trustees or a trustee shall be deemed valid if

signed by a majority of such rate-payers.

TRUSTEES.

Comment.

A relation being established between the trustees and the teacher, it becomes the duty of the former, on behalf of the people, to see that the scholars are making sure progress; that there is life in the school, both intellectual and moral—in short, that the great ends sought by the education of the young are being realized in the section over which they preside. All may not be able to form a nice judgment upon its intellectual aspect, but none can fail to estimate correctly its social and moral tone. While the law does not sanction the teaching in our public schools of the peculiar views which characterize the different denominations of christians, it does instruct the teacher "to inculcate by precept and example a respect for religion and the principles of christian morality." To the trustees the people must look to see their desires in this respect, so far as is consonant with the spirit of the law, carried into effect by the teacher.

Reg. 1. Whereas it has been represented to the Council that trustees of public schools have, in certain cases, required pupils, on pain of forfeiting school privileges, to be present during devotional exercises not approved of by their parents; and whereas such proceeding is contrary to the principles of the school law, the following regulation is made for the direction of trustees, the better to ensure the carrying out of the spirit of the law in this

behalf :-

Ordered, That in case where the parents or guardians of children in actual attendance on any public school or department, signify in writing to the trustees their conscientious objection to any portion of such devotional exercises as may be conducted therein under the sanction of the trustees, such devotional exercises shall either be so modified as not to offend the religious feelings of those so objecting, or shall be held immediately before the time fixed for the opening or after the time fixed for the close of the daily work of the school; and no children, whose parents or guardians signify conscientious objections thereto, shall be required to be present during such devotional exercises.

Reg. 2. In cases where sections fail to determine, in annual meeting, which member of the board of trustees shall retire from office, and to fill the annual vacancy in the trusteeship, it shall be the duty of the inspector to determine which trustee shall retire; and the

commissioners shall fill such vacancy in the manner directed by law.

REG. 3. When the same secretary is continued in office from one year to another, it is not necessary that he should give a new bond, provided the existing one is drawn in a sufficient sum and the sureties are satisfactory to the trustees.

REG. 4. In every case where no provision is made for the secretary's commission by the school meeting, in its vote of any sum, it shall be allowable for the trustees to add the

commission in levying the assessment.

Reg. 5. In every school in which two or more teachers are employed, it shall be the duty of the trustees to determine which teacher shall be considered the principal of the school. While not holding him responsible for the control and management of the classes directly under the care of the teachers, the trustees are expected to assign to the principal a general supervisory authority over the whole school. The principal shall always have power to visit the class-rooms of his associates, to see that the general regulations of the trustees are carried out, and that satisfactory progress is being made.

REG. 6. The following shall be the proper form of bond for secretary of trustees:—

Now the condition of this obligation is such. That if the said (name of Secretary) do and shall, from time to time, and at times hereafter, during his continuance in the said office, well and faithfully perform all such acts and duties as do or may hereafter apperain to the said office by virtue of any law of this Province, and shall in all respects conform to and observe all such rules, orders and regulations as now are or may be from time to time established for or in respect of the said office; and if on ceasing to hold the said office, he shall forthwith, on demand hand over to the Trustees of the said School Section, or to his successor in office on the order of the Trustees, all books, papers, moneys, accounts and other property in his possession by virtue of his said office of Secretary—then said obligation to be void—otherwise to be and continue in full force and virtue.

REG. 7. It is the duty of the Secretary of Trustees, acting nuder the direction of the Board of Trustees, to keep the school house or houses in good repair, and supply the same with comfortable furniture, outhouses, fuel, maps, and apparatus.

MODE OF SUPPORT.

Comment.

The school meeting should be careful, in voting its estimates, to authorize a sum amply sufficient to enable the Trustees to meet the liabilities of the school year. Any balance remaining in the hands of the Trustees is, of course, to be carried to the credit of the next school year, while any deficit arising from an authorized expenditure may be carried forward and provided for in the estimate of the following year.

SCHOOL MEETINGS.

Comments.

1. The following outlines indicate the usual and most important business to be trans-

acted by the Annual School Meeting :-

[1.] To elect a chairman of the meeting. [2.] to elect a new Trustee or Trustees. (A majority of votes, i. e., more than half, is required for this election.) [3.] To receive and pass upon the report of the Auditors of Accounts. [4.] To receive the report of the Board of Trustees concerning Educational operations of the year and the requirements of the Section for the ensuing year. [5.] To determine by a vote of a majority of the rate-payers present, what amount shall be raised by the Section during the ensuing year for any or all of the objects authorized by law; and if any sum is included for the purchase or improvement of grounds or for the purchase or building of school-houses, to fix the period (not to exceed five years) within which the sum voted for these purposes shall be collected; and if necessary, to authorize the Trustees to borrow money for the procuring of houses or lands. [6.] To transact any other necessary business.

2. The board of Trustees should at its first meeting after the Annual School Meeting, fix the time and place for its regular meetings during the school year, if the requirements of the section render such meetings desirable. When this is done, no other notice of any regular meeting will be required to be given to the Trustees. Whenever a special meeting

is necessary, each member should be duly notified of the same.

A majority of the Board of Trustees is competent to transact business only when all the members have received notice of the meeting.

INSPECTORS.

1. Official Circular issued to Inspectors of Schools on accepting office:

[1.] The person appointed Inspector is required as the condition of accepting and holding office to devote his attention exclusively to its duties.

[2.] The general duties and obligations of the Inspector remain as specified in the Act

relating to Public Instruction.

[3.] Particular attention is directed to the importance attached by the Council of Public Instruction to the systematic and thorough inspection of school work. The notes of Inspection suggest the proper subjects of inquiry and examination. The following points

may be specially noted:

a. Time should be taken to enable an intelligent judgment to be formed regarding the classification of the school, the methods of instruction pursued, the order and discipline maintained, and the general ability and faithfulness of the Teacher. A class exercise or two conducted by the Teacher, either at his own discretion or by request of the Inspector, will prove ar from sufficient for the above purposes. The latter official should in all cases personally test the knowledge and progress of the pupils by appropriate questions and requirements, and he should himself illustrate, as opportunity may offer, the most approved methods of teaching the various branches. This work should be done in a kindly and sympathetic manner, yet thoroughly—Both the Teacher and his pupils should be led to regard the visit of the Inspector as an occasion of real importance. This object will be furthered if great care is taken by the Inspector to ascertain the average educational status of the school. It should be borne in mind that effective teaching approves itself by the results which it produces on the school as a whole. The Teacher who is able to secure the advancement of but a fraction of his pupils is a practical failure, and if satisfied with such a state of things, he has but a low conception of his duty.

b. It is believed that a satisfactory estimate of the character of the work done in the smallest school or department cannot be obtained in a less period than one hour and thirty minutes. For an ordinary school at least two hours will be required, and in many cases a full half-day will be found necessary. Many—perhaps a majority—of our Teachers are inexperienced. Some are lacking in skill; others in disciplinary powers; others, again, do not faithfully apply themselves to their duties. Now it is as clear as a demonstration, that a mere flying visit to schools in such hands is worse than useless. If no inspection is made, no opinion can be formed nor advice given; and the inexperienced, unskilled, feeble or idle teacher, receiving from the supervisory authority no suggestion or criticism,

is simply confirmed in the habits which impair his usefulness.

c. It might be shown that the dignity of the office of inspector of schools is as much at stake in this matter as is the welfare of the schools themselves. The reduction in the number of inspectorships, and the exclusive assignment to the work of inspection of gentlemen believed to be competent therefor, have had respect to both of these objects. Persons accepting the office should understand that, while a thorough semi-annual examination of all the schools, in accordance with these views, is within the reach of the inspector, its accomplishment will involve protracted, and for months almost continuous, absence from home.

[4.] Should the inspector find anything faulty or defective in the teacher's methods of instruction or government, or in the classification and general management of the school, he is advised, with a view to the preservation of the teacher's influence and authority, to reserve his suggestions and cautions for private conference with the teacher, so far as he conveniently can. It will also be his duty, should he find the law and regulations of the Council disregarded in the organization and management of the school, or in respect to school accommodation and surroundings, to call the attention of the trustees or teacher, or both, as the case may require, thereto, that what is amiss or defective may be remedied before it works a forfeiture of public aid to the school.

REGULATION 1. Each Inspector of schools shall on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, forward to the Superintendent of Education, according to forms furnished by that officer, an abstract of the inspectoral work of the preceding month.

REGULATION 2. The Inspector shall report to the Superintendent of Education, every case of engagement between a Teacher and Trustees for less than one year, to which he consents (under Subsection 1 of Section 31 of Chapter 29, Revised Statutes, 5th Series, as amended April 30th, 1892,) on the same day on which he gives consent, with the special cause for giving such consent. Under no circumstances shall public moneys be paid either Teachers or Trustees for any days taught prior to such date of consent.

TEACHERS.

Comment.

The attention of teachers and trustees is specially called to the necessity of complying with the provisions of the law in relation to the disposal of the County Fund. It appears from the school returns that in some cases teachers have, in their agreements with trustees in respect to salary, assumed all risk as to the amount to be received from the County Fund. Such proceeding is contrary to the provisions of the law, and directly subversive of a most important principle of the school system, since the pecuniary penalty imposed upon the inhabitants of the section by the absence and irregular attendance of pupils is thereby in-

flicted upon the teacher, while the pecuniary rewards consequent upon a large and regular attendance of pupils at school are diverted from the people to the teacher. These results clearly tend to prevent the growth and development of a sentiment of responsibility and interest among all the inhabitants of each section, and thus measurably defeat the object

of the whole system—the education of every child in the Province.

REGULATION 1. All contracts and agreements between trustees and teachers must be in writing. The rate of pay to be received by the teacher from the trustees must be a fixed and definite sum or stipeud, and must be distinctly named in the agreement. The amount which the trustees may become entitled to receive from the fund raised by county assessment being necessarily uncertain and unknown at the date of such agreement, it shall not be lawful for the teacher to agree to receive such unknown and uncertain sum as a portion, or the whole, of his or her remuneration from the trustees.

REC. 2. The grant payable to the teacher from the Provincial Treasury shall be independent of, and in addition to, the sum or rate specified in the agreement with the trustees.

REG. 3. FORM OF AGREEMENT:

And it is further mutually agreed that both parties to this agreement shall be in all respects subject to the provisions of the School Law and the Regulations made under its

authority by the Council of Public Instruction.

Reg. 4. Each inspector, at his inspection of every school, shall examine the agreement between the trustees and teacher, or a true copy thereof, and shall faithfully report all cases of illegal agreement.

Comment.

The law makes provision for the employment of assistant teachers. These, of course, will not expect so much remuneration as teachers upon whom is devolved the management of schools in departments. Trustees are empowered to employ any qualified person as an assistant, but those only who hold licenses received after due examination on the prescribed syllabus, and who teach at least four hours daily in a class-room separate from the teacher's school-room, can receive provincial aid from the Superintendent. It may frequently occur that some advanced pupil in the section would render valuable aid in the capacity of an assistant during a portion of the day, and trustees are empowered by law to employ such if they desire, even though he or she may not have a license. Such assistant, however, cannot receive provincial aid.

REG. 5. The grants payable to teachers from the Provincial Treasury shall be paid by the Superintendent of Education through the Inspectors of Schools semi-annually after the end of the first half of the school year and after the close of the school year respectively. The first payment, which will virtually be a payment on account, shall

be based on the scale of the previous year.

REG. 6. A full list of the payments so made shall be published each half year in the

JOURNAL OF EDUCATION.

Reg. 7. Every teacher or assistant or substitute (except a temporary substitute) when commencing to teach in any school must on the first day of his, or her, incumbency mail or otherwise directly send a notice in writing to the Inspector of the District, intimating the fact, the period of engagement, and name of school section where last engaged. This intimation shall be put on file in the Inspector's office; and any delay on the part of the teacher in giving such notice shall render him or her liable to the loss of Provincial grant up to the date of proper notification.

SCHOOL ACCOMMODATION.

Comments.

In reference to the site of a school house, care should be taken to see that it is in a situation of readiest accessibility to the majority of the population of the section; that it is located from 15 to 50 yards from the public highway; that it is removed from poisonous influences of stagnant pools and low-lying, swampy grounds; from the clatter of the mill or factory, and the noise of a railroad or tavern; that it has a dry, airy position (with a gentle slope and a southern exposure, if possible), and commands as attractive and extensive a prospect as natural facilities will permit.

The amount of land set apart for school purposes should not, in the country, be less than half an acre;* in thickly peopled localities, not less than a quarter; and in towns, not less than one-eighth of an acre. The form of school grounds should be rectangular, the leugth (extending north and south if possible), bearing the ratio to the breadth of 4 to 2. If an acre can be obtained, it should be about 8 rods wide by 20 rode long; but if moreland can be procured, the length should be increased, in order to furnish longer play-

grounds

Plans of school-houses have been issued by the Council, and the requirements of the law are so explicit as to be a sufficient guide to each Board of Trustees in deciding on the

character of the house or houses required for their section.

As to the size and commodiousness of school-houses, provision should be made for onequarter of the population of the section; and whatever that number may be, the schoolhouse should be of such capacity as to furnish to each scholar at least 150 cubic feet of pure atmospheric air, or seven square feet of floor, with the ceiling from 13 to 16 feet high.

11. "If there is any house in the district more pleasantly located, more comfortably situated, better warmed, more inviting in its general appearance and more elevating in its influence than another, that house should be the school-house."—Cousm. With these sentiments the Council of Public Instruction fully sympathizes. That every facility may be had by the people for the realization of those views, the law provides that the school meeting may vote any sum necessary for school lands and buildings, and that such sum shall be levied by an equal rate upon the rate-payers resident in the section. The sum required may be spread over several years, not exceeding twelve, and collected in equal yearly instalments, with any interest accruing.

The best arrangement for seating is that of single or double desks in parallel rows with sufficient width between. By this plan the teacher is enabled to have his eye upon every pupil, and every pupil, without changing his position, to give direct attention to the teacher. According to this method, and allowing for the length either 6 or 8 feet for entrance hall, 4 to 5 feet for teacher's platform, 4 to 5 feet ween the platform and the desks, and 2 feet 6 or 9 inches (according to the size of pupils) for each desk and seat together; and allowing 2 feet for the aisles, from 3 feet to 4 feet in graded schools for each desk, and at least 2 feet for divisions between rows of desks, the following dimensions.

will furnish accommodation for the number of scholars prefixed:

Plans 324 Pupils, 26x21 clear, 6 feet hall, 3 rows of desks.
No. 1. 36 " 29x21 " " "

No. 1. 36 " 32x21 " " " No. 2.-46 " 35x26 " 8 feet hall, with single desks at sides, and rows of graded desks in centre.

No. 3.-56 " 40x27 clear, with class room.

Add 2 feet 9 inches to the length for every additional row of desks. Where the number of scholars amounts to upwards of fifty, there must be a class-room attached.

The patent desk has the seats separate from each other and from the desk, while both seats and desk are supported by light iron castings screwed to the floor. This desk is now manufactured in the Province, at a price within the ability of a large number of our schools. It is hoped that every section possessing the means will ere long have its school supplied with these desks. Benches dc not afford the necessary support to the body, and are not adapted to efficient organization of the school.

The desks and seats in every school should be graded, and no desk should seat more than

two pupils.

The Council strongly recommends large areas, so that there may be ample room for play-grounds.

Sections furnishing their schools with patent desks (double) will find the following table of service in adapting the size of desks to the pupils, etc.:

Trustees are strongly recommended to keep the school property of the section adequately insured.

Reg. 1. The trustees of every section are required to provide their school or schools with such apparatus as is necessary for the efficient management thereof.

REG. 2. The Council deems the following articles, in addition to the prescribed text-books

furnished by the parents or guardians of the pupils, essential in all public schools:

(1.) Every school should have the prescribed register, black boards of good quality and adequate size, a clock, handbell, thermometer, ball-frame, wall cards, a large map of the Province, of the Dominion, and of the County, terrestrial globe, dictionary, gazetteer, blocks of geometric solids, the conventional standards of measure and weight, illustrations of colors with shades and tints, and a box of colored crayons for special black board use.

(2.) Besides the above, advanced schools should be provided with a large map of each country for the study of its geography; charts illustrative of natural philosophy, and some apparatus for the same; instruments for surveying; and (if it be taught) instruments for

navigation; and some chemical apparatus.

(3.) In graded schools, the elementary department should be furnished with an extensive assortment of objects and pictures for object lessons, a ball frame, the different linear measures, the current coinage of the country, the various weights with a pair of small scales and a box of models of the more common solids.

(4.) The preparatory department should be supplied with apparatus adapted to the best grade of common or superior schools, or such as may be required to preserve an unbroken

connection between the elementary and high school departments.

(5.) The high school, in addition to the principal things laid down for common schools, should have a full set of ancient maps, and another of physical maps; physiological diagrams, both vegetable and animal; a celestial globe, historical charts; adequate apparatus for natural philosophy, chemistry, surveying and navigation.

REG. 3. Trustees are required to see that separate and commodious outhouses are provided, screened as far as possible from public observation, and kept in a cleanly condition for

the use of pupils.

LICENSING OF TEACHERS.

RRG. 1. There shall be five classes of teachers, each of which may be designated as follows:

[1] Academic (Classical) or Class A (Cl.) and Academic (Scientific) or Class A (Sc.) [2] First Class (Common School), or Class B.

[2] First Class (Common School), or Class B.
[3] Second Class (Common School), or Class C.
[41] Third Class (Common School), or Class D.

[4] Third Class (Common School), or Class D.
[5] Third Class (Provisional) or Class D (Provisional), good for one year only.

REG. 2. Licenses of these Classes shall be under seal of the Council, signed by the Secretary, shall be valid for the whole Province during the good behaviour of the holders, and shall be granted on the fulfilment of three conditions more fully specified in succeeding Regulations. (1.) The presentation of the prescribed certificate of age and character. (2.) The presentation of the prescribed certificate of scholarship. (3.) The presentation of the prescribed certificate of professional qualification.

REG. 3. The prescribed certificate of professional qualification shall be: [a] First, Second, or Third rank classification by a Normal School recognized by the Council of Public

m.

Instruction, or [b] the minimum professional qualification, a First, Second or Third rank pass on the following examination papers, which will be given at the close of the High School Terminal examination for such candidates as choose to take them, viz.:—(1.) School Law and Management. (2.) Teaching. (3.) Temperance and School Hygiene. Maximum value of each paper, 100. First rank pass: An aggregate of 200 with no subject below 30. Second rank pass: 150 with no subject below 20. Third rank pass: An aggregate of 100 with no subject below 15.

The Provincial Normal School at Truto is recognized by the Council of Public Instruction as the appropriate source of Certificates of professional qualification for Public School Teachers; but the Certificates of other Normal or Teachers' Training Schools whose curricula may be satisfactorily shown to the Council to be at least the equivalent of those of the Provincial Normal School, may be accepted when qualified by the addition of the two following conditions: (a) A pass Certificate of the Provincial "minimum professional qualification examination" of the corresponding class, and (b) A Certificate of a Public School Inspector before whom or under whom the candidate has taught school, recommending the said candidate as qualified for the class of License applied for after the test of actual teaching for a specified period.]

REG. 4.4 For an Academic or Class A License the three conditions are:—(1.) A certificate signed by a Minister of Religion or two Justices of the Peace to the effect that the candidate is of the full age of 20 years, and capable of fulfilling the duties specially mentioned in Section 74, subsection 5, of the Manual of Educational Statutes, 1888. (2.) A pass Certificate of the Grade A High School examination. (3.) A Certificate of First Class

professional rank from a Normal School.

REG. 5. For a First Class or B License the three conditions are: (1) A certificate of age and moral character as in the foregoing Regulation, but substituting for "20 years," "18 years if a male and 17 years if a female." (2.) A pass certificate of the Grade B High School examination with an aggregate of 400 on the Grade B, or of 750 on the Grade A. (3.) · A certificate of First Class professional rank from a Normal School, or a pass certificate of the Grade A High School examination with the First rank minimum professional qualification as in Regulation 3 (b.)

REG. 6. For a Second Class or C License the three conditions are:-(1.) A certificate of age and moral character as in the foregoing Regulations, but substituting for the age, "17 years if a male and 16 years if a female." (2.) A pass certificate of the Grade C High School examination with an aggregate of 400 on the Grade C, or of 300 on the Grade B, or of 500 on the Grade A. (3.) A certificate of Second Class professional rank from a Normal School or a pass certificate of the Grade B High School examination with

the Second rank minimum professional qualification as in Regulation 3 (b).

Reg. 7. For a Third Class or D License the three conditions are:—(1.) A certificate of age and moral character as in the foregoing Regulation. (2.) A pass certificate of the Grade D High School with an aggregate of 400 on the Grade D, or of 300 on the Grade C. or of 200 on the Grade B. (3.) A certificate of Third Class professional rank from a Normal School or a pass certificate of the Grade C High School with the Third rank minimum professional qualification as in Regulation 3 (b).

REG. 8. For a Third Class (Provisional) the three conditions are:-(1.) A certificate of age and moral character as in the foregoing Regulation. (2) A pass certificate of the Grade D as in the foregoing Regulation. (3.) The Third rank minimum professional qualification as in Regulation 3 (b).

REG. 9. All applications for License shall be made through the Principal of the Nor-

mal School or the Inspector of the District, who shall after examination report upon the applications and forward them to the Superintendent of Education. Forms of application will be provided by the Education Department through the Inspectors or Principal of Normal School.

REG. 10. The questions set in the minimum professional qualification examination paper shall be within the limits indicated by the books recommended by the Council of l'ublic Instruction, and shall be as follows: School System and School Management. (a) To be familiar with the Acts relating to Pub-

School System and School Management. (a) To be familiar with the Acts relating to Public Schools in Nova Scotia and Regulations of the Council of Public Instruction,—particularly those portions bearing on the relations and duties of teachers and on the organization and operation of all grades of Public Schools.

(b) To understand thoroughly the principles of school organizatior, the principles and methods of classification, the proper co-relation and sequence of studies, the true aim and right modes of discipline, and the proper conditions for securing the moral and physical well-being of pupils.

(c) To be familiar with the history of leading Educational Reformers and their systems. Teaching. (a) To have an understanding of the faculties and fundamental laws of the human mind in their relation to the science and art of education generally.

(b) To practically apply the principles thus derived to the teaching of particular

subjects, especially those embraced in a High School course of study.

Hygiene and Temperance. (a) Temperance as in recommended or prescribed books with special reference to requirements of the school law. (b) Hygiene as in recommended or prescribed books with special reference to school room, school premises and the health of pupils.

PROVINCIAL EXAMINATION OF HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS.

Reg. 1. "High School Students" shall be held to mean all pupils who passed the regular County Academy Entrance Examination, or who are certified by a Public School teacher as having completed one or more years of the High School Course of Study.

Reg. 2. A terminal examination by the Provincial Board of Examiners shall be held at the end of each year on the subjects of the first, second, third and fourth years of the High School Curriculum, to be known also as Grades IX, X, XI and XII respectively of

the Public Schools or Grades D, C, B and A respectively, of the High Schools.

Reg. 3. The examination sessions shall commence each day at nine o'clock, a. m., for Grade A on the first Monday of July, for Grade B on the following Wednesday, for Grade-C and D on the following Thursday, and for the "minimum professional qualification" of Public School Teachers on Saturday following; and shall be conducted under a Deputy Examiner appointed by the Superintendent of Education according to instructions, at each of the following stations, viz.:—1, Amherst; 2, Annapolis; 3, Antigonish; 4, Arichat; 5, Baddeck; 6, Barrington; 7, Bridgetown; 8, Cheticamp; 9, Clare; 10, Digby; 11, Guysboro'; 12, Halifax; 13, Kentville; 14, Liverpool; 15, Lunenburg; 16, Margaree Forks; 17, New Glasgow; 18, Parrsboro; 19, Pictou; 20, Port Hawkesbury; 21, Port Hood; 22, Sherbrooke; 23, Shelburne; 24, Sydney; 25, Tatamagouche; 26, Truro; 27, Windsor; 28, Yarmouth.

Reg. 4. Applications for admission to the examination must be made to the Inspector of the District not later than the 24th of May, and must contain (1) The names of the candidate in full (not initials); (2) Age; (3) Last School attended; (4) Post Office address; (5) Name of Examination Station at which to be examined; (6) Grade of Examination applied for; and (7) Evidence of High School standing (as in Reg. 1 & 13); (8) and a fee of two dollars if a candidate also for the "minimum professional qualification" examination of Public School Teachers. Note.—No Certificate of Admission will be required as formerly. Candidates should becareful to make their application complete in every respect, and not later than the date prescribed, otherwise, they are not entitled to be admitted to the examination.

REG. 5. Each Inspector shall forward, not later than June 10th, to the Superintendent of Education, a list of the applications received for each Grade of examination at each station within his District, in a form to be supplied from the Education Office, transmitting therewith all moneys, having duly classified and checked the same in the form aforesaid.

REG. 6. The Deputy Examiner, when authorized by the Superintendent of Education, shall have power to employ an assistant or assistants, who shall receive two dollars per

day for the time so employed.

REG. 7. The Superintendent of Education shall have prepared and printed, suitable examination questions for each Grade at each examination in accordance with the prescribed course of study, and shall also forward to each Deputy Examiner a sufficient supply of the printed questions, together with copies of such rules and instructions as may

be necessary for the due conduct of the examination.

Reg. 8. The maximum value of each paper shall be 100; and the numbered questions composing it shall be constructed with the intention of making each equal in value though not necessarily of equal difficulty. Thus, when 5 questions constitute one paper, the value of each when answered accurately with reasonable fulness and in good form will be 20, no matter whether it should be easier or more difficult than its fellow questions.

REG. 9. Each examiner shall mark distinctly by colored pencil or ink at the left hand margin of each question on the candidate's paper its value on the foregoing assumption; and shall sum up the total, placing it on the back of the sheet; and underneath, the number of misspelled or obscurely written words, which number is to be deducted from the total for the true value of the paper. Thus, should the sum of the marks of a paper be 54, and the misspelled or obscurely written words be 6, the marks on the back would

stand as follows, e. g.: English Grammar [54-6]=48.

Reg. 10. To make a "pass" in the grade of examination applied for, the candidate must make at least the minimum aggregate of the grade and at least a minimum of 25 on each imperative subject or paper of the grade. A mark below 25 on any optional subject will

not be counted in the aggregate.

Reg. 11. Candidates failing to make a pass in the grade applied for may be ranked as making a pass on the next grade below, provided 75 per cent. of the minima be made; and as making a pass on the grade second below, provided 50 per cent. of the minima be made.

REG. 12. Each candidate shall receive from the Superintendent of Education a certificate containing the marks given in each subject by the examiners and the High School

Grade which the candidate has successfully passed.

Rug. 13. Candidates for High School Provincial Certificates will be expected to passthe various grades in order. After 1893, candidates will not be admitted to the examinations of the higher grades without evidence of their proficiency in the subjects of the preceding grades.

REG. 14. The subjects, number, and values of the papers for the different examinations. and the general scope of examination questions, are indicated by the prescribed High School curriculum which follows. Examination may demand description by drawing as well as

by writing in all Grades.

[See, "High School Curriculum" under heading "Courses of Study for the Public Schools of Nova Scotia."]

PROVINCIAL EXAMINATIONS.

We publish here the new rules to be observed in writing at the Provincial Examinations. so that teachers may have an opportunity of so training prospective candidates that they may neither suffer loss of mark nor of papers on account of neglecting formalities necessary for the prompt and accurate handling of many thousands of papers in a very limited time. No envelopes shall be used to enclose papers, which as a general rule will be shorter than

usual—one hour being the maximum time allowed for writing each. One sheet of foolscap will therefore hold all that will be necessary to be written on any paper, if it is properly put down. Candidates who are unable to understand these rules, or if understanding them prove to be incapable of carrying them out in reasonably good form, will show thereby a lack of qualification for a Provincial certificate which will be taken into account when the examiners are valuing the paper.

PROVINCIAL EXAMINATION RULES.

1. Candidates shall present themselves at the examination room punctually one half of an hour before the time set for the first paper of the Grade for which they are to write; during which time the deputy examiner shall assign each a seat, and a number which shall represent the candidate's name, and must therefore be neither forgotten nor changed. The candidates who present themselves shall be numbered from 1 onwards in consecutive order (without a histus for absent applicants who cannot be admitted after the numbering) beginning with the A's, then coming to the B's, C's and D's in order.

2. Candidates shall be seated before the instant at which the examination is fixed to be-

2. Candidates shall be scated before the instant at which the examination is fixed to begin. No candidate late by the fraction of a minute has a right to claim admission to the examination room, and any candidate leaving the room during the progress of any examination must first send in his or her paper to the deputy examiner, and not return until the

beginning of the next paper.

3. Candidates shall provide themselves with (for their own exclusive use) pens, pencils, compases, rulers, ink, blotting paper, and a supply of good heavy foolscap paper of the size

thirteen inches by eight.

4. Each candidate's paper must consist of one sheet of such foolscap, which may be written on both sides, and must contain no separate sheets or portions of sheets unless inseparably attached so to form one paper.

bly attached so to form one paper.


5. Each such paper must be exactly folded. 1st by doubling, top to bottom of page, pressing the fold, (paper now 6½ x 8 inches); 2nd by doubling again in the same direction,

pressing the fold flat so as to give the exact size of 3 x 8 inches.

6. Finally the paper must be exactly endorsed as follows:—A neat line should be drawn across the end of the folded paper one half an inch from its upper margin. Within this space, 3½ inches by ½ inch, there must be written in very distinct characters, 1st, the letter in licating the grade, 2nd, the candidate's number, and 3rd. a vacant parenthesis of at least one inch, within which the deputy examiner shall afterwards place the private symbol indicating the station. Immediately underneath this space and close to it should be neatly written the title or subject of the paper.

For example, Candidate No. 18 writing for B (Grade XI) on Algebra should endorse his

paper as shown below :--



7. The subject title, Grade and Candidate's No. may be written within over the commencement of the paper also; but any sign or writing meant to indicate the candidate's name, station or personality may cause the rejection of the paper before it is even sent to the examiners.

8. Any attempt to give or receive information, even should it be unsuccessful, the presence of books or notes on the person of the candidate or within his reach, during examination, will constitute a violation of the examination rules and will justify the deputy examiner in rejecting the candidate's papers, and dismissing him from further attendance. No dishonest person is entitled to a Provincial Certificate or Teacher's License. And where dishonesty at examination is proven, Provincial certificates already obtained and licenses based on them shall be cancelled.

9. It is not necessary for candidates to copy papers on account of erasures or corrections made upon them. Examiners understand that one hour gives no time for copying or rewriting. Neat corrections or cancellings of errors, no matter how numerous, will allow a paper to stand as high in the estimation of the examiner as if half the time were lost in copying it. Answers or results on a paper without the written work necessary to find them

will be assumed to be only guesses and shall be valued accordingly. The question papers may be retained by the candidates.

10. Candidates desiring to speak with the deputy examiner will hold up the hand. Communication between candidates at examination, even to the extent of passing a ruler or making signs, is a violation of the rules. Any such necessary communications can only be held through the deputy examiner.

11. Candidates should remember that the deputy examiner cannot overlook a suspected

11. Candidates should remember that the deputy examiner cannot overlook a suspected violation of the rules of examination without violation of his oath of office. No consideration of personal friendship or pity can therefore be expected to shield the guilty or negligent.

TEACHERS' ASSOCIATIONS.

Whenever ten or more duly licensed Teachers within an Inspectoral District shall in writing request the Inspector to this effect, a Teachers' Association for such Pistrict shall be formed, in accordance with the following principles and directions.

1. Objects. - The exclusive object of the Association shall be to promote the efficiency of the Teaching service within the limits of the District. The means to be employed for securing this object shall be conversation and discussion of Educational methods, the preparation and reading of papers on special subjects, and ill strative exercises. All questions and dis-

cussions foreign to the practical work of teaching are to be strictly avoided.

2. Membership.—The Association shall be composed of the Inspector and all duly licensed teachers of the District on enrolment and annual payment of such fee as the Association may

determine. The annual fee shall not exceed one dollar.

3. Management.—The Inspector shall be ex officio President of the Association. The Association shall elect annually from its members a Vice-President (who shall preside in the absence of the President), a Secretary-Treasurer, and four other persons to form with the

foregoing officers a Committee of Management.

4. Meetinys and Sessions.—The time and place of the first meeting of the Association shall be determined by the Inspector after consultation with such of the Teachers requesting its formation as he may consider expedient, and, if thought necessary, with the Superintendent of Education, and the Inspector shall notify all the Teachers of the district of the same at least one month in advance. Subsequent meetings shall be held annually at such place and time as the Association may from year to year decide. The meeting of the Association shall occupy two days of the week for which it is called, and those days shall, if the analysis of the Thursday and Friday. There shall be at least two sessions. if practicable and convenient, be Thursday and Friday. There shall be at least two sessions on each day, and each session shall not be less than two hours in length.

sions of the Association, and he shall allow to the Board of Trustees their proportion of the County Fund for the two days as if the School or Department had been open, and the Provincial grant to teachers shall suffer no abatement for same. An additional half-day's or day's allowance shall be made in both the foregoing respects, when the President shall certify that the Teacher was obliged to be absent from his school one half or the whole of Wednes-

day in order to reach the place of meeting in time for the opening session.

6. The programme of the first meeting shall be arranged by the Inspector after consultation with such of the Teachers requesting the formation of the Association as he shall deem

necessary.

7. The Superintendent of Education is recommended to deliver a public lecture on some educational subject germane to the object of the Association on the evening of the first day

of the meeting, when compatible with his other engagements.

Reg. 8. When teachers, having received permission from their trustees to attend "Summer Schools" approved by the Superintendent of Education, present to the Inspector of their district certificates of regular attendance, the section and teacher shall be entitled to the same privileges granted in the case of teachers' associations, provided the allowance to any teacher or section shall not in any one year exceed five days.

VACATIONS AND HOLIDAYS.

REG. 1. There shall be a summer vacation of six weeks (thirty week days other than Saturdays) in all the public schools, commencing on the second Monday in July.

Reg. 2. In the city of Halifax there shall be five days additional in the Summer vaca-

tion, with an Easter vacation of three days—the same being week days other than Saturdays. There shall be a Christmas vacation of ten week days, other than Saturdays, in all the public schools. This vacation shall be taken in accordance with the following

Good Friday and the anniversary of the Queen's Birthday shall be holidays in all the Public Schools; also any day proclaimed by the Lieutenant-Governor as a public holiday throughout the Province. In the city of Halifax the anniversary of the settlement of Halifax shall be a public holiday.

REG. 5. Every Saturday shall be a holiday, but trustees in cities and towns may, if pre-

ferred, allow a half holiday on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Reg. 6. All week days not allowed as holidays or included in vacations, are to be regarded

as authorized and prescribed teaching days.

REG. 7. In order that the due instruction of schools, as required by the law, may not be interfered with, each inspector shall have power, notwithstanding anything in the foregoing regulations, to give notice of the day or days on which he proposes to visit any school or schools in his district for the purpose of inspection, and to require that on the day or days so named, such school or schools shall be kept in session.

When for any cause the trustees of a school shall deem it desirable that any prescribed teaching day should be given as a holiday, the school or schools may be kept in session on the Saturday of the week in which such holiday has been given, and such

Saturday shall be held to be in all respects a legal teaching day.

When, owing to illness, or for any other just cause, a teacher losses any number of prescribed teaching days, such teacher shall have the privilege of making up for such lost days to the extent of five during the same quarter by teaching on Saturdays.

No school shall be kept in session more than five days per week for two consecutive weeks, nor on account of any reason for more than five Saturdays during any

REG. 11. Nor shall any teacher teach more than five days per week on the average quarter.

(vacations not being counted) during the period of his engagement.

REG. 12. The hours of teaching shall not exceed six each day, exclusive of the hour allowed at noon for recreation. Trustees, however, may determine upon a less number of hours. A short recess should be allowed about the middle of both morning and afternoon sessions. In elementary departments, especially, trustees should exercise special care that the children are not confined in the school room too long.

When an Academic or High School Department is closed on account of the Provincial Terminal Examination, the teacher will be entitled to the Provincial Grant for the week as if the Department was in regular session, and the Trustees to the

County Fund based on the average attendance for the year.

Reg. 14. Arbor Day.-To encourage the proper adornment of school grounds, and thereby the cultivation of a taste for the beautiful in nature on the part of the pupils, the Council of Public Instruction has ordered the publication of the following regulation:

"On such day of May as according to season, weather, or other circumstances may be deemed most suitable, trustees are authorized to have substituted for the regular school exercises of pupils, the planting by the latter of trees, shrubs and flowers on the grounds surrounding the school house. The day devoted to this purpose shall be known and entered in the register as 'Arbor Day,' and when duly observed full credit will be given for it in the apportionment of public funds, on the basis of the actual attendance of pupils as ascertained by roll call at the beginning of the exercises, or other convenient time during their progress. Additional value and interest should be imparted by mingling with the practical duties of the occasion short addresses from the teacher and other competent persons on the æsthetic and economic importance of arboriculture. During their summer visitation, Inspectors shall take note of all schools in connection with which 'Arbor Day' has been observed."

There will be found subjoined some practical suggestions which will be serviceable to

those who wish to make the occasion a really profitable one.

(1.) In selecting trees, it is well to avoid those that bear flowers or edible fruits, as such in the flowering and fruiting season are apt to meet with injury from ignorant or mischievous passers-by, and to offer temptation to the pupils. Butternuts and horse chestnuts are not to be commended as shade trees. The balsam fir is objectionable from the liability of its balsam to stain the hands and clothing. Deciduous or broad-leaved trees are easily grown, their fibrous roots rendering transplanting a comparatively simple operation. If care is taken, the young saplings of the elm, maple, and ash, as found in the under growth of the forest, can be transplanted without difficulty.

(2.) No school grounds should be without a suitable number and variety of the standard deciduous trees. However, during the winter season these are bare and unattractive, and afford little or no shelter. On the other hand, evergreens such as spruces, pines, hemlocks and cedars, retain their foliage and provide a shelter as useful in winter as it is grateful in summer. Trees should always be planted according to a definite plan, being arranged either in curves or straight lines, according to circumstances, and with an obvious relation to the building and fences. They should not be placed so near the school house as to interfere with the free play of light and air.

(3.) Our native trees grow so freely in the woods that we are apt to suppose that they are merely to be taken up by the roots and transplanted, to start at once into as vigorous growth as before. This is a mistake. Great care should be taken in digging up the trees to preserve the fibrous roots; long runners should be cut across with a sharp knife, and not torn. All trees thrive best in well-drained soil, varying from sandy loam to clay. A clay loam suits all descriptions. The holes for the trees should always be made before the trees are brought on to the grounds. They should be too large rather than too small. In filling in the better soil from near the confece should be returned first ones to be the same of t In filling in, the better soil from near the surface should be returned first, so as to be nearer the roots but where the soil is at all sterile, and generally, there should be put below and around the roots, some well-rotted compost, mixed with sand and sandy loam, in order to promote the growth of the rootlets. In setting the tree it should be placed a little deeper than it stood before, and the roots should be so spread out that none are doubled. When finally planted the tree should be tied to a stout stake in such a way as to prevent chafing of the bark. Some mulch or stable litter should then be thrown around the stem to protect the roots from drought. Stirring the ground is preferred by some cultivators to mulching. Intropolarities cultivators to mulching. In transplanting evergreens, the roots should not be exposed to air or light—especially to the heat of the sun—more than can be helped.

Several varieties of shrubs planted together in clumps produce a very pleasing effect, while the care of judiciously arranged flower beds will be to the children ar important means of education.

REG. 15. Sections having a County Academy or schools of four or more departments can take an additional week of vacation without prejudice to their participation in the Public Funds, provided their application for the same be endorsed by the Inspector and approved of by the Education Department.

EVENING SCHOOLS.

Reg. 1. Trustees of public schools may establish in their sections evening schools, for the instruction of persons upwards of thirteen years of age, who may be debarred from

REGULATIONS OF THE COUNCIL OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, RELATING TO COUNTY ACADEMIES AND GRADED SCHOOLS,

(Under authority of the "Act to Encourage Academic Education," passed 24th April, 1885.)

REG. 1. All teachers employed in County Academies under the above Act shall hold Provincial Licenses of the Academic Class A. The Council retains right to waive this requirement in the case of teachers possessing other approved qualifications, who at the date of the publication of this regulation may be employed in any of the institutions recognized

in the aforesaid Act as County Academies.)

Reg. 2. Pupils shall be admitted to County Academies only by regularly conducted by the county Academies on the county Aca written examinations, according to the mode or modes hereinafter provided, but holders

of Provincial Licenses and Normal School Diplomas can claim admission on such certi-REG. 3.

The examinations for admission chall begin on the first Monday of July; and as soon as possible thereafter the results of examination shall be reported in detail to

as soon as possible thereafter the results of examination shall be reported in detail to the Superintendent of Education. Each candidate "passing" shall be entitled to a certificate signed by the Principal of the Academy. Each certificate for purposes of reference shall be distinguished by the No., year, and county of the candidate.

REG. 4. The questions for pupils applying for admission shall be on the work of the common schools, specially that of Grade VIII, and shall be forwarded from the Department of Education in due season to the Principal of each Academy. There shall be five examination papers bearing the following titles:—1, English; 2, Arithmetic; 3, Drawing, Writing and Simple Accounts; 4, Geography and History; and 5, Useful Knowledge. Reg. 5. A supplementary entrance examination for such applicants as can show good

Reg. 5. A supplementary entrance examination for such applicants as can show good reason for not having presented themselves at the regular examination in July may be held at the opening of the Academy after the summer vacation. The questions for this examination (should one be found necessary) shall be prepared by the Principal (or Faculty, and must be transmitted with the regular detailed report to the Superintendent of Education immediately after the examination; and in every other respect shall be subject to the same conditions as the regular examinations.

No supplementary entrance examination shall be held later during the year except on the express permission of the Superintendent of Education after good cause has been shown, when the examination shall be subject to the conditions already stated, except that the questions shall be so advanced as to cover in addition to the common school work, that

portion of the High School course already taken up at the date of examination.

Reg. 6. The entrance examinations shall be conducted and the candidates' papers valued by the Principal of the Academy, and such other persons as the Board of Trustees may choose to associate with him. The questions furnished by the Pepartment of Education will be accompanied by directions for holding the examinations, and a statement of the standards consider to which papers are to be valued. The Examinate shall in all cases he reaccording to which papers are to be valued. The Examiners shall in all cases be re-

according to which papers are to be valued. The Examiners shall in all cases be required to certify that the examination has been conducted in accordance with the prescribed rules. When a change in the Principalship shall occur at the close of the term, the incoming Principal may always take part in the valuation of candidates' papers.

Reg. 7. Students may be admitted to the higher classes in any academy on standing shown by Provincial Certificates of scholarship, or by examination, at the discretion of the Principal (or Faculty) of each Academy. The grading of any institution should for economy and efficiency be adjusted to its local conditions—i.e., to the number of the students and of the staff of instructors, etc.

But in all Academies and High Schools, students who hold a Provincial Grade D shall be entitled to be enrolled in the Register as in Grade X with an asterisk or star thus, X*; those who hold Grade Cas in Grade X1*; and those who hold Grade B as in Grade XII*. The star will thus indicate Provincial classification, as its absence will denote merely local classification as permitted above. An error in the use of this star will be taken as prima facie evidence of falsification of the Register.

REG. 8. All papers written by candidates for admission must be carefully filed and preserved for at least two years, for inspection by officers of the Education Department. Each paper shall have legibly endorsed upon each question according to instructions the

Reg. 9. No person shall be recognized as a qualified pupil of a County Academy, who has not been regularly admitted under some one of the foregoing provisions.

REG. 10. Each County Academy shall be examined annually by the Superintendent of Education, in conjunction with the Inspector of Schools for the district. The examination shall be conducted orally or in writing, at the discretion of the Examiners, and in its scope shall have regard to the time of the school year at which it may be held. The annual report of the Superintendent of Education may contain a statement of the number of pupils (by departments or years) presented and passed in each Academy.

Reg. 11. To entitle itself to the grant claimed, each Academy must pass at each annual

examination, at least the minimum number of regular pupils required by law as the basis

REG. 12. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of each County Academy to supply for the teachers' use all text-books which by the appended Course of Study are made the basis of oral lessons and lectures. They must also provide the philosophical and chemical apparatus essential for the experiments and demonstrations required by the Course as a regular part of the teaching. A selection of physiological and zoological diagrams, models and specimens, is deemed desirable. The teacher should encourage the pupils to collect cabinets illustrating the geology and varied mineral resources, etc., of Nova Scotia.

Reg. 13. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of Education to report to the Coun-

cil of Public Instruction as to the equipment of each County Academy, in respect to school room accommodation and conveniences, apparatus, and provision for physical exercise. If,

in case the Council of Public Instruction notifies the Trustees of any Academy that its equipment in any or all of the above respects is deemed insufficient, the Trustees fail within a reasonable time to remedy such deficiency, the Academy shall forfeit its claims to public

grants, until such time as the required improvements are made.

Reg. 14. Regular pupils or students are those who have regularly entered the County Academy under the regulations, and are pursuing the full prescribed course of study. Other pupils or students, who may be known as special students, may be admitted, provided they can be accommodated without encroaching on the rights of the regular students. They are not, however, legally entitled to admission free or otherwise; nor are they counted as qualifying the Academy to any extent for the Academic Grant under the law. In other respects their names, attendance, etc., are recorded in the register and entered into the annual returns as are those of the regular students.

Rec. 15. The Trustees shall make satisfactory provision for the instruction of all Common School pupils within their section in lower schools or departments, provided that with the sanction of the Inspector a limited number of 8th grade (Common School Course) pupils may be admitted to the Academic Department, when its average attendance of qualified

pupils does not exceed twenty.

Reg. 16. The schools entitled to employ a Class A teacher under section 10 of the "Act to Encourage Academic Education," shall comprise at least two departments, each in charge of a separate teacher, shall be regularly graded according to prescribed Courses of Study, and shall maintain in the Principal's Department a certified average of at least ten pupils regularly pursuing the studies of the prescribed High School Course.

pupils regularly pursuing the studies of the prescribed High School Course.

A Class A teacher being a subordinate teacher, in order to draw the Provincial Grant under the Act of 1892 amending the Laws relating to Public Instruction, must be certified by the Inspector as being employed in doing regular high school work with a daily aver-

age attendance of at least twenty high school pupils.

It is also provided that in all cases the Inspector of Schools shall certify that the equipment and management of these Schools are such as to warrant the payment of the special grant.

Any Class A teacher proposing to claim the Provincial Grants under this regulation shall within three weeks of the opening of the school, notify the Inspector of the District in writ-

ing of his intention to qualify for such claim.

Reg. 17. For the present the Council deems it inexpedient to prescribe definite qualifications for Teachers of Graded Schools in French Sections. Trustees or teachers anxious to take advantage of the provision of section 10, should correspond with the Council through the Superintendent of Education. No teacher will be deemed eligible who cannot, in addition to other qualifications, speak and write with ease and correctness both the French and English languages. The condition requiring the average attendance of ten qualified High School pupils shall not apply to schools established in French Sections.

COURSES OF STUDY FOR THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NOVA SCOTIA.

PRELIMINARY.

1. The following Courses are designed fo furnish a basis for the classification of pupils by teachers, and the examination of schools by Inspectors. Their general aim is to give a definite and continuous character to the work attempted in the Public Schools, and thus secure the harmonious co-operation of all the forces of our Provincial system of education.

2. In their relation to each other the Courses are complementary. It has been fixed by law that admission to the Provincial High Schools or County Academies shall be dependent on ability to pass a satisfactory examination on the subjects of the Common School Course. It is therefore of great importance that the processes of elementary instruction should in all cases be conducted according to its provisions. No teacher has a moral right to prejudice a pupil's participation in the Provincial appropriations in support of Academic education, because his own views as to the relative value of studies may differ from those embodied in the Course placed before him for his guidance. The High School Course, while specially designed for the Advanced Departments of Graded Schools, is also intended to exercise a regulative influence on the studies of those pupils of ordinary Miscellaneous Schools, who have completed the Grades of the Common School Course.

3. It is believed that a careful inspection of the requirements of these Courses will show that they are not fairly open to the objection of embracing an undue multiplicity of studies, and thus encouraging either "over-pressure" on the one hand, or "superficiality" on the other. The detail with which the various assignments are specified, especially in the earlier grades, gives an impression of a larger number of separate subjects than actually prescribed. Besides, a judicious variety of subjects is necessary, not only for the proper development of the mental faculties, but for awakening and maintaining due interest on the part of children in the exercises of the class-room. In arranging the practical details of this outline of studies, every effort has been made to observe the fundamental law of "unity in variety."

COURSE OF STUDY FOR COMMON SCHOOLS.

[Prescribed, 1893.]

GENERAL DIRECTIONS.

67. Hygiene and Temperance.—Orally in all grades, and as incidents or occasions may suggest. Text book for pupils use as follows: Grades V. and VI., Health Reader No. I. Grades VII. and VII., Health Reader, No. 2.

Moral and Patriotic Duties. - As enjoined by the School Law and when found most convenient and effective.

69. Lessons on Nature.—The noting, examination and study of the common and more important natural objects and laws of nature as they are exemplified within the range of the school Section or of the pupils' observations. Under this head pupils should not be required to memorize notes or facts which they have not at least to some extent actually

70. Spelling and Dictation.—It should be strictly insisted upon that, from the very commencement in the first grade, the pupil should spell every word read in lessons, and common words of similar difficulty used in his conversation. Writing words in the lower and the strictly in the latter was a lower to be and the strictly and the strictly and the strictly in the latter was a lower to be a Transcription and dictation in the higher grades should be utilized more and more

as facility in writing increased.

71. Reading and Elocution.—1. Pupils must be enabled to clearly understand the 71. Reading and Elocution.—1. Pupils must be enabled to clearly understand the portion to be read, then to read it with proper expression. 2. Faults of enunciation, pronunciation, &c., of tone, of posture and manner, &c., must be carefully noted and corrected. 3. Choice passages should be memorized occasionally for recitation with the proper expression. Ten lines per year at least for Grade I, twenty lines at least for Grade II, and a similar increase for each succeeding grade, is prescribed. Reading should be taught at first, partly at least, by word building from the phonic elements, occasionally drills of this kind being continued in all the grades to obtain clear enunciation.

72. English.—In all grades practice should constantly be given in expressing the substance of stories, lessons, or observations, orally in correct language, and in the higher grades in writing also. Discussion of subject matter of lesson. Attention to the use of capitals, punctuation marks, paragraphing, &c., should be introduced gradually and regu-

grades in writing also. Discussion of subject matter of lesson. Attention to the use of capitals, punctuation marks, paragraphing, &c., should be introduced gradually and regularly, so that at the end of the common school course, language in correct form can be fluently used in description or business letters, orally and in writing. The practical rather than the theoretical knowledge of English is what is specially required in the common school, and a large portion of the school time should be given to it. Pupils should be continually exercised in finding synonyms or substituting "their own made meanings" for difficult words in their reading lessons, instead of merely memorizing definitions often given at head of lesson.

Writing .- Styles most easy to read should be cultivated. is generally preferable to the sloping styles. No exercise in writing should be accepted by the teacher from the pupil unless its form shows evidence of care. Should begin in the first grade with letters formed from the simple elements properly classified, and taught in the

Drawing.—Langdon S. Thompson's "Manual Training, No. I," is recommended to the teacher as covering to some extent the Drawing and Lessons on Nature as they may be taught to pupils of the first five or six grades. With Thompson's Primary Freehand Manual, in addition, the teacher will have a sufficient guide for the work in drawing up to Grade VII. for the present. The "American Drawing Cards," first and second series, may also be advantageously used to this stage. Drawing of objects studied under the head of Nature Lessons to be constantly precised, and carried or even in the High school. of Nature Lessons to be constantly practised, and carried on even in the High school.

78. Arithmetic.—It is of the highest importance to secure the habit of obtaining accurate answers at the first attempt. Every slip in mental or written arithmetical work is not only unnecessary, but is a positive education in a habit which will tend to render useless the most strenuous efforts afterwards to become accurate or even to make satisfactory progress in mathematics. Accuracy is of supreme importance from the first. Rapidity may then be neglected to look after itself. In the first four grades the teacher will have to prepare a great number of exercises of a nature not specially arranged for in the present prescribed text book, so that the pupils may be accurate and rapid in their operations up to the limit rescribed.

75 and 76. Geography and History.—The verbal memorizing of these lessons at home by he pupil is for the most part injurious to the character of the memory and useless as practical knowledge. For in spite of all cautions and instructions to the contrary, most pupils when left to themselves mentally associate the facts memorized with the wording, the paragraph and the page of a book, instead with of with the proper locus in the map, or with the proper system of related facts. These lessons should therefore be prepared under the careful and philosophic direction of the teacher in the school room, at least until the pupils are trained how to study aright. The home work would then be only the review and perfecting of the lessons by the pupils in the proper manner by reference to the several items in the text. Local or current events, historical, conomic or scientific, should be skilfully used to interpret the remote in time and place.

90. Manual Training.—(Optional). This may often be introduced as an alterative or recreation, and without therefore materially increasing the real labor of the pupil. Clay modeling, needle work, wood-work, &c., as most appropriate or expedient, may be introduced with the consent of the Trustees. Teachers should at all times encourage the pupils in the production of any specimens of home-made handiwork or apparatus, in scientific experiments at home, and in the formation of collections of plants, minerals, and other

natural productions of their own part of the country.

SPECIAL DIRECTIONS.

GRADE I.

Reading.—Primer with Wall Cards or Blackboard work.

Language.—Story-telling by pupil. Writing easy script letters, words and sentences. Writing and Drawing.—Writing on slate, paper or blackboard. Drawing of easy, interesting figures.

Arithmetic. -All fundamental arithmetical operations with numbers, the results of which

do not exceed 20, to be done with concrete and abstract numbers, accurately and rapidly.

Lessons on Nature.—Power of accurate observation develope by exercising each of the senses on simple or appropriate objects. Estimation of direction, distance, magnitude, weight, &c., begun. Common colors, simple regular solids, surfaces and lines. Simple observations on a few common minerals, stones, plants and animals.

GRADE II.

Reading.—Reader No. 1.

Language.—As in Grade I., but more advanced.

Writing and Drawing.—As in Grade I., but more advanced. Angles, triangles, squares, rectangles, plans of platform and of school room.

Arithmetic.—Numbers up to 100 on the same plan as in Grade I.

Lessons on Nature. - As in Grade I., but more extended.

GRADE III.

Reading. -Reader No. 2.

Language.—As in II., but more advanced. Subject and predicate. Nouns and verbs. Writing and Drawing.—Script letters on slate and in copy book. Freehand outlines on slate, blackboard, &c. Common geometrical lines and figures with their names. Map of school grounds and surroundings.

Arithmetic.—Number to 100 as in previous Grades, divisors not to exceed 12. Dollars

and cents. Long Measure and Avoirdupois Weight, with reduction exercises.

Lessons on Nature.—Geography of neighborhood, use of local or county maps. Estimation of distances, measures, weights, &c., continued. Color. Study of, say, three or four each of common metals -tones, earths, flowers, shrubs, trees, insects, birds and mammals,

GRADE IV.

Reading.—Reader No. 3.

Language.—Oral statements of matter of lessons, observations, &c. Written sentences: with punctuation, &c. Modifiers of subject and predicate, of noun and verb.

Writing and Drawing.—Copy Book. Primary F. schand Series No. I., and Cards, &c.

Geography.—Oral lessons on the seasons as in pages VII to X of Elementary Geography,

with the general geography of the Province begun on the School map.

Arithmetic.—Numeration and notation extended. More difficult exercises in fundamental rules and reduction. Common tables of weights, measures, &c., idea of fractions development.

Lessons on Nature. - As in Grade III., but extended so as to include as many more new objects of each kinds.

GRADE V.

Reading .- Reader No. 4, Part I.

Language.—As in Grade 4 and General Directions. All parts of speech and of sentence with inflections of noun, adjective and pronoun,—orally. Composition practice increasing.

Writing and Drawing.—Copy Book. Freehand Drawing Series No. II, and Cards, &c.

Writing and Drawing.—Copy Book. Freenand Drawing Series No. 11, and Cards, &c. Geography and History.—Ideas of latitude and longitude, &c., developed. GRADE VI.

Reading.-Reader No. 4 completed.

Language. —As in Gre le V. extended. Formal compositions (simple essays) twice each month. Paradigm of regular verb. Simple parsing and analysis begun. More important rules of Syntax applied. Short descriptive sketches and letters. All from oral instruction. Writing and Drawing.—Copy Book. Drawing No. 3, and Cards, &c. Increasing prac-

tice in representing common objects in outline.

Geography.—Elementary Geography text, to end of Canada. Thorough drill in outlines.

Aistory.—British American History; text, chapters 3, 5, 10, 11, 12, 13 (in part) and 14.

Arithmetic.—As in chapters 4 to 6, Kirkland and Scott, (omitting circulating decimals), with continual review and mental exercises.

Lessons on Nature.—As in Grade V., but extended, say to at least nine or ten objects of each class specified. Distribution and values of all natural products of the Province.

GRADE VII.

Reading. - Reader No. 5 begun. Character of metre and figures of speech begun to be

Grammar.—Leading principles of Etymology (large type generally), with paradigms as in prescribed text, and exercises, with related rules of Syntax, Parsing and analysis to complex

Composition. —Written abstracts of oral or reading lessons. Simple description, narrative and business forms. Punctuation and paragraphing

Writing and Drawing. -- Copy Book. Drawing, No. 4, and Cards, &c. Plotting of lines, triangles, rectangles, &c., according to scale. Simple object drawing extended.

Geography.—Elementary Geography to end of Europe, with thorough map drill.

History.—British American History completed,

Arithmetic.—As in Kirkland and Scott to end of chapter 7, with corresponding mental exercises.

Lessons on Nature - As in Grade VI., and with the study of specimens illustrating the stones, minerals, &c.; each class, sub-class, and division of plants; and each class of animals found in the locality. All common and easily observed physical phenomena. The Introductory Science Primer, and Health Reader No. 2 begun.

GRADE VIII.

Reading .- Reader No. 5 completed. Elements of prosody and plain figures of speech. as illustrated in reading, to be observed and studied.

Spelling.—Prescribed Speller in addition to general directions.

Grammar.—Including rules of Syntax, (omitting notes and more difficult matter in medium print). Parsing. Analysis of simple and easy complex sentences. Correction of false-

Composition.—As in Grade VII. extended. Pupils at this stage should be able to express themselves fluently and with fair accuracy in writing, for all ordinary business purposes.

GRADE XII.

The examination on this syllabus may be known as the Senior Leaving Examination of the High School. This portion of the course of study may be profitably undertaken in the lines best adapted to the staff of instructors or the demands of students in the larger High Schools or County Academies. There is in this grade a biturcation of the course into a classical side and a scientific side, with minor options leading to the certificates of "A" (classical) and "A" (scientific) respectively.

The old Grade A may be quoted as Grade A (classical.)

Those who obtain an A (scientific) or A (classical) certificate will be allowed to pass an examination on all other papers of the full syllabus than those taken previously by them, and if successful will be granted the diploma "A (classical and scientific.) For the same diploma, former Grade A teachers must also take "Psychology" and "Sanitary Science;" but their Grade A "Physics" or "Chemistry" or "Geometry" or "French" shall for this purpose be deemed the equivalents, respectively, of the papers (C) 1 or 2 or 10, or (D) 1.

Candidates for this grade of certificate who make the minimum passing aggregate but fail to pass on account of deficiency in one or more subjects, will be allowed a supplementary examination at a future terminal examination on all the subjects on which they made less than 50 per cent.; and if 50 per cent. of the maximum is made on each of such subjects the candidates shall be awarded an "A" certificate.

Changes in Authors, etc., from year to year, will be announced in the Journal of Edu-

CATION.

Comment.

Our High School system is now organized into the form of an Elementary Provincial University, with three or four grades or degrees. The provincial certificate will be equally valuable in every part of the province as an evidence of a certain degree of scholarship. The grade A is optional, and will not be expected to be found except in the largest academic institutions, and in these the classes must naturally be small. This work will be for the High Schools generally what Post-graduate work is for our universities. While the grades D, C, and B contain one year's work each, A then may conveniently be placed at two years -the average time formerly required to advance from grade B to A. It will also be observed that this examination can be passed in two annual stages, for instance, if ten or more of the twenty papers prescribed are taken at the first examination, and an aggregate of at least 1000 made, the candidate will be required to pass at the next examination only on the papers omitted or "failed on" at the first examination.

University Matriculation.

Comment.

The leading universities and colleges of the Province have agreed to accept the Grade B. or Junior, leaving High School certificate in lieu of their Matriculation examination, when the certificate indicates a pass on each subject required by the particular matriculation standard concerned. This constitutes a practical though partial affiliation of the Public High Schools with the Universities, which will save division of energy in many High Schools, and therefore tend to produce a higher grade of University candidates, while it will place the Universities in the same relation to the public schools.

TEXT BOOKS.

Comment. - In performing the duty of selecting and prescribing text-books for the Public-Schools, the Council of Public Instruction has availed itself as fully as possible of the knowledge and experience of those who are engaged in the practical work of education. The sole aim of recent modifications has been to secure, at reasonable cost, a series of texts adapted for use in schools. Change in authorized books is in itself a very undesirable thing,

The prescribing of new books is one of such importance to the country that the most extraordinary care has to be taken to make sure that the ultimate advantages of a change will more than compensate our people for the temporary loss or annoyance always involved in making a change. But change there must be. It is the essential condition of all growth:

and we ought under such circumstances to be always prepared for it.

Inspectors and teachers are reminded:

1. That the Course of Study for Common Schools encourages an economical expenditure for text-books by providing a system of oral instruction for junior classes. Too many teachers try to satisfy themselves in respect to their more youthful pupils by placing in their hands text books not needed in any case, and worse than useless when unaccompanied by proper oral exposition. A text-book should not be required for a child until he is prepared to use it intelligently.

2. That the regulation which makes it illegal and improper for a Teacher to introduce unauthorized texts, by no means hinders him from giving his pupils the benefit of other treatises to whose explanations he may attach importance. The progressive teacher will always have such aids within reach, and will so use them as to impart variety and interest to his-

instructions.

The Cauncil of Public Instruction has not deemed it necessary to prescribe maps of particular authorship for use in the Public Schools. In such well known series as those of Philips, Johnson, Mackinlay, Trustees will find an abundance of excellent material from which to select. The special character of Church's Mineral Map will tend to populatize it in many parts of the Province, while it fully answers the purposes of a general map. The minimum of Map outfit in every school should comprise the Hemispheres, Europe, North America, the Dominion of Canada, and Nova Scotia (or the Atlantic Provinces.) No High School is equipped for classical work without at least the Orbis Romanus and the Orbis notus Veteribus. [A Geological map of Nova Scotia is also being prepared by Mr. Church.]

PROVINCIAL NORMAL SCHOOL.

INTRODUCTORY.

The object of the Provincial Normal School is the professional training of teachers for service in the public schools of Nova Scotia. As the institution is maintained at large public expense the Council of Public Instruction deem it proper in every practicable way to encourage teachers to avail themselves of the advantages it offers. While attendance is not in the teachers to avail themselves of the advantages it offers. meantime directly compulsory, yet the importance and value of professional training are such as to justify the Council in ranking all licenses to be hereafter awarded one grade below that indicated by the scholarship certificate in the case of candidates not possessing such training.

REGULATIONS.

The session of the Normal School will begin on the third Wednesday in October and

close on the Thursday before the first Monday in July.

11. The following four classes of candidates for admission to the Normal School shall

be admitted without examination:

All who hold a Provincial license of any class.

All who hold the High School certificate of Crade A, B, C or D.

(c). All who have at any Provincial Examination for teachers' licenses prior to 1893, obtained an average of not less than 50 (and, if candidates for Grade A," also passed in Latin and Greek), but failed in obtaining the grade applied for through deficiency in certain

(d.) Graduates of chartered colleges.

Students shall be ranked as Senior Class, Intermediate Class, or Junior Class on the III.

following basis :-

SENIOR CLASS,—Graduates of colleges, those who hold a Provincial license of Class A or Class B, those who hold a High School certificate of Grade A or B; and those who have fulfilled the conditions of Reg. 11 (c) on the A or B syllabus.

INTERMEDIATE CLASS,—Those who hold Provincial license of Class C; those who hold a

High School certificate of Grade C; and those who have fulfilled the conditions of Reg. 11:

(c) on C syllabus.

JUNIOR CLASS,—Those who hold a Provincial license of Class D; those who hold a High School certificate of Grade D; and those who have fulfilled the conditions of Reg. 11 (c) on the D syllabus.

IV. The Senior Class shall consist of two divisions designated Senior A and Senior B.

(a). The Senior A Division shall include all graduates of chartered colleges, all who hold Provincial license of Class A, all who hold the Provincial license of Class B together with Normal School diploma of the Second Class, those who hold High School certificates of Grade B together with Normal School diploma of the Second Class, and all who hold High School certificates of Grade A.

(b). The Senior B Division shall include such students of the Senior Class as are not

admitted on some one of the preceding qualifications to the A Division.

V. (a). Students of the Senior Class, Division A, shall be admitted to the Institution on the first Tuesday in April, except such as are admitted to this class on the High School certificate of Grade A and do not hold a Normal School diploma of the Second Class who shall be admitted at the opening of the School after Christmas holidays; all shall be eligible for a First Class diploma at the end of the session.

(b). Students of the Senior Class, Division B, shall be admitted to the Institution at the beginning of the session in October, and shall be eligible for a First Class diploma at the

end of the session.

(c). Students of the Intermediate Class shall be admitted to the Institution at the beginning of the session and shall be eligible for a diploma of the Second Class at the end of March.

(d). Students of the Junior Class may be admitted either at the beginning of the session in October or on the first Tucsday in April, and they shall be eligible for a diploma of the

Third Class on making an attendance of three months.

VI. When the faculty of the Normal School reports in favor of the classification of a candidate after due tests and examinations, the prescribed period of attendance (with the concurrence of the Superintendent of Education) need not be fully required.

Note.—Diplomas of the first, second or third class shall be awarded to students of the Senior Intermediate and Junior classes, respectively, on the satisfactory completion of the work of such class: but students of the first and second classes who fell to obtain the diploma of their class may, in the judgment of the faculty, be awarded a diploma of a lower class.

VII. Students who are admitted to the institution under Reg. II (b) and who obtain a Normal School diploma at the end of their course shall be awarded a Provincial license of the corresponding class without any further examination.

VIII. Applicants shall present to the Principal a satisfactory certificate of moral character and age, dated within three months of the time of presentation.

IX. Persons intending to apply for admission to the Normal School should give notice of the same to the Principal at least one month previous to the commencement of the session.

X. The students shall lodge and board at such houses as are approved of by the Principal. Ladies and gentlemen shall not be permitted to board at the same house.

XI. Before permitting students to board at any house, the Principal shall assure himself by personal inspection or otherwise, as to the fitness of the accommodation to give physical comfort, to allow undisturbed study, and to contribute to the moral welfare of the students; and he shall, from time to time throughout the session, visit the boarding houses, maintaining such oversight as may be necessary to give him all reasonable assurance that good order and decorum are observed.

XII. All Students of the Junior Class are required to pay a library fee of fifty cents;

those of Senior and Intermediate Classes shall pay a fee of one dollar.

XIII. Travelling expenses at the rate of five cents per mile, to and from the Institution will be paid at the end of the session, to all students who obtain classification.

COURSE OF STUDY.

The work of the Institution shall be chiefly of a professional character, graded to

suit the different classes and embracing the following subjects:

1. Methodology, including the general principles of method, and review of the various subjects of the common school and high school courses with special reference to the methods of teaching these subjects.

- The school law, school organization and management.
 Psychology studied with a view to the development of educational principles underlying method and school management.
- The history of education, showing the progress of educational thought and skill. 5. The natural sciences, including the elements of geology, zoology, (insect life especially), chemistry, physics, physiology, and the science of common things in general; these
- subjects to be studied in a practical manner by observation and experiment in the field and laboratory, and with special regard to existing and prospective industries of Nova Scotia. The Provincial School of Agricultural near by with its full suit of chemical and biological laboratories shall also be utilized in this department, more particularly for the advanced students.

Drawing, music (Tonic-sol-fa), elocution, and calisthenics.

Observation and Practice in the Model School.

Students shall be given the opportunity of observing the exemplification of the principles of method in Kindergarten and Model School; and shall subsequently be required to draw up schemes of lessons and to teach classes under the supervision of members of the Normal School faculty.

Arithmetic.—All fundamental arithmetical operations with numbers, the results of which do not exceed 100, to be done with concrete and abstract numbers, accurately and rapidly.

Lessons on Nature, etc.—Power of accurate observation developed by exercising each of the senses on simple and appropriate objects. Estimation of direction, distance, magnitude, weight, etc., begun. Common colours, simple, regular solids, surfaces and lines. Simple observations on a few common minerals, stones, plants and animals. Simple songs. Hygiene and temperance.

ADVANCED PRIMARY.

Reading.—Readers No. 2 and 3 with spelling.

Language. - Oral statements of matter of lessons, observations, etc. Written sentences

with punctuation, etc. Subject, predicate, noun, verb, and their modifiers.

Writing and Drawing.--On slate and blackboard. Common geometrical lines and figures with their names, map of school grounds, copying from cards, etc. Copy book and Drawing No. 1 begun.

Arithmetic.—Numeration and notation. Four fundamental operations. Common reduc-

tion tables and exercises. Elementary idea of fractions. Rapid mental work.

Lessons on Nature, etc. - Geography of neighborhood and the use of map of province with easy geographical terms, explanation of the change of seasons, etc. Estimation of distance, measure, weight, etc., continued. Color. Study of five or six each of the common metals, stones, earths, flowers, shrubs, trees, insects, birds and mammals. Simple songs. Hygiene and temperance.

INTERMEDIATE.

Reading.—Reader No. 4 with spelling. Health Reader No. 1.

Language. - Formal compositions (simple essays twice a month), short descriptions and letters as well as oral abstracts. Simple parsing and analysis begun, with the application of the more important rules of syntax, exercises selected from reading lessons. (No text-book of grammar in the hands of pupils).

Writing and Drawing.—Copy Books. Drawing, Nos. 2 and 3, or cards. Outline drawings of common objects.

Arithmetic. - As in Kirkland and Scott to end of Chapter 6, omitting circulating decimals. Rapid mental work.

Geography.—Elementary Geography to end of Canada. Thorough drill in outlines of Hemisphere maps.

History.—Nova Scotia, to 1756 as in prescribed British American History.

Lessons on Nature.—From minerals and rock to soil, as shown in neighborhood, and say nine or ten each of the common plants, trees, insects, other invertebrates, fish, reptiles, birds, manimals, and natural phenomena, such as ventilation, evaporation, freezing, closely examined. Distribution and values of the natural products of the Province. Music, at least a half a dozen songs (tonic sol-fa notation).

PREPARATORY.

Reading. - Reader No. 5. Health Reader No. 2. Elements of prosody and plain figures of speech as illustrated in readings to be observed and studied.

Spelling.—Readers and prescribed Spelling Book, etc.

Grammar. -- Prescribed Text-book. Etymology and Syntax (omitting notes and more difficult matter in medium print.) Parsing. Analyses of simple and easy complex sentences. Correction of false syntax.

Composition. - Written abstracts of oral and reading lessons. Simple description, narra-

tive and business forms. Punctuation and paragraphing.

Writing and Drawing.-Copy books. Drawing No. 4, freehand, and No. 1, model and object. Simple drawing from objects. Construction of angles and simple geometrical figures to scale and their measurement.

Geography.—Elementary text-book with latest corrections, and thorough map drill.

History.—"British American" completed with "Brief History of England."

Arithmetic and Algebra.—Kirkland and Scott. Fundamental rules of Algebra and evaluation of algebraic expressions.

Book-keeping. - A simple set.

Music.—At least eight songs and the tonic-sol-fa notation.

Lessons on Nature. - The study by examination of the minerals, stones, earths, &c.; of specimens of each class, sub-class and division of plants; and of each class of animals, as found in the locality, with particular reference to the bearing of the knowledge on any useful industry, as agriculture, horticulture, &c. All common and easily observed physical phenomena. Oral lessons with experiments on subject matter of Introductory Science Primer.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR A COMMON SCHOOL WITH THREE TEACHERS.

LOWER.

Reading.—Primer and Readers, Nos. 1 and 2, with spelling.

Language. Story-telling by pupil. Printing or writing simple words and thoughts. Writing and Drawing .- Script letters, &c., on slate, paper or blackboard. Drawing from cards, and of easy interesting figures, plans of school grounds, &c.

Arithmetic. - Numeration, notation to 1000, and fundamental rules up to short division,

with concrete problems.

Lessons on Nature. - Power of accurate observation developed by exercising each of the senses on simple and appropriate objects, geography of neighborhood and local map. Estimation of direction, magnitude, distance, weight, measure, &c., begun. Colors. Objective study of at least a few of each class of the natural history objects in the locality.

Music.—At least three simple songs (tonic sol-fa notation).

Reading .- Readers Nos. 3 and 4, with spelling. Health Reader, No. 1.

Language. -Oral statement of matter of reading lessons and oral lessons. Simple narrative and letter writing. Parts of speech and sentence with the easier inflections and rules of syntax. Parsing and analysis of simple passages in reading lessons begun.

Writing and Drawing.—Copy books. Drawing, Nos. 1, 2 and cards, with outline drawing

from objects.

Arithmetic .- As in Kirkland and Scott, to middle of Chapter VI. omitting circulating decimals.

Geography and History.—Drill on the Hemisphere maps and elementary text-book to end Oral lessons on the leading incidents of the history of Nova Scotia. Music. - Five or six songs (tonic sol-fa notation).

Lessons on Nature. - Estimation of weights, measures, distances, &c., in connection with reduction exercises; six or seven each, of every class of natural history objects (mineral, vegetable and animal) in the neighborhood, examined and classified. Common physical phenomena observed and studied.

HIGHER.

Reading.—Reader No. 5 and Health Reader No. 2, with spelling and prescribed spelling

Reading.—Reader No. 5 and Health Reader No. 2, with spelling and prescribed spelling book, elements of prosody and plain figures of speech in passages read observed.

Grammar.—Text-book (omitting notes and more difficult parts in medium print), parsing, chalysis of simple and easy complex sentences, corrections of false syntax.

Composition.—Oral and written abstracts of interesting lessons. Fortnightly essays, including narrative, description, and general letter writing, with special attention to punctuation, paragraphing and form generally.

Writing and Drawing.—Copy books. Drawing, Nos. 3, 4 and model and object No. 1; with simple drawing from objects, and the construction of angles and mathematical figures

with simple drawing from objects, and the construction of angles and mathematical figures

Geography. - Elementary geography complete with latest corrections, and general map

drill on the Hemisphere maps.

History.—As in "British American," and the "Brief History of England."

Arithmetic and Algebra.—Kirkland and Scott, evaluation of algebraic expressions and

Book-keeping.—One simple set with commercial forms. Music. -At least eight songs and the tonic-sol-fa notation.

Lessons on Nature.—The study objectively of a number of the typical natural history objects of the locality, their distribution, value and bearing on native industries in the Province. The observation and explanation of common physical phenomena, oral lessons and experiments as in Introductory Science Primer.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR A COMMON SCHOOL WITH TWO TEACHERS.

JUNIOR (at least two divisions).

Reading .- Primer and Readers Nos. 1, 2 and 3, with spelling, and oral abstracts of interesting lessons; nouns, verbs, subjects, predicates, etc., in lessons of higher classes; writing

Writing and Drawing.—Letters, words, geometrical figures, etc., on slate, paper and blackboard. Copying from cards. Copy book and drawing books begun.

Arithmetic. - Numeration, notation, four fundamental rules, common reduction tables and exercises. Mental work of same kind.

Music. - Four or five songs with tonic sol-fa notation.

Lessons on Nature.—Practice in the estimation of all weights, measures, distances, etc., referred to in reduction tables, by guessing and testing. Study of regular solids, surfaces, and lines, colors. Observation of simple physical phenomena. Examination and classification of representative specimens of minerals, stones, etc., plants and animals to be found in Training the eyes to see everything around and the mind to see explanations or relations.

SENIOR (at least two divisions).

Reading.—Readers Nos. 4 and 5. Health Readers No. 1 and 2. Spelling and definition. Oral abstracts of lessons. Elementary grammar and analysis drill on sentences in reading lesson. Observation of figures of speech and the character of metre in poetical passages read in the advanced division.

Grammar.—Text book in advanced division only (as in Grades VII and VIII).

Composition. - Written and oral abstracts, narratives and descriptions, with attention to punctuation, paragraphing and form-at least fortnightly for each pupil-exercises of each division on alternate weeks.

Writing and Drawing. -Copy Books. Drawing, Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 1 (model and object), with lessons on mathematical construction of figures in advanced division.

Geography .- Text book (elementary) in advanced division. For all, thorough drill in the general geography of the Hemisphere maps.

History.—"British American" text book, and "Brief History of England" in advanced

Arithmetic.—Kirkland and Scott, with fundamental rules of Algebra for advanced division.

Book-Keeping .- Simple set for advanced division.

Music. -At least eight songs and the tonic sol-fa notation.

Lessons on Nature.—One daily to all pupils on one or other subject such as: estimation of weights, measures, distances, &c., properties of bodies, common physical phenomena, local representative specimens or species of the mineral, vegetable and animal world in the locality, the natural resources of the Province,—and the bearing of these on our industrial development, &c., &c., experiments, &c., as in Introductory Science Primer.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR A COMMON SCHOOL WITH ONE TEACHER.

(Ungraded or "Miscellaneous School.")

[As a general rule there should be at least four classes or division in such a school; (a) those in Reader No. 5, (b) Reader No. 4, (c) Reader No. 3, and (d) Readers Nos. 2 and 1 and Primer. The pupils in such a school must be drilled to move without the less of an instant of time, if the teacher is to be successful. There cannot be the leisure of a graded school in it.]

Reading.—(d) four lessons a day, very short, with spelling, grammar and composition questions on them; (c) three short lessons in like manner; (b) two short lessons, one from Health Reader No. 1, with the full range of questions on them; (a) one lesson (Health Reader No. 2, on alternate days), with full suite of questions covering spelling, definitions, grammac, analysis, prosody and composition, more or less partially.

Writing and Drawing.—(d) on slate or paper from blackboard or cards, during specified

times of the day; (c) same, more advanced; (d) copy books and drawing books once each

day; (a) the same, once each day.

Grammar and Composition .-- Text book only in (a) and once a day or every other day. Written compositions in (a) and (b). Class instruction or essay criticism once or twice a

Geography.—Oral lesson once or twice a week to (d) and (c) and (b). Text book twice a week (b) and (a).

History.—Oral lessons once a week to (c) and (b). Text book twice a week for (a).

Arithmetic. --- Each class to receive attention twice a day as a class from the teacher; a very few minutes at a time; (a) more time, which might vary with the difficulty of the points to be reasoned out. This will form the main subject for "seat work," while the teacher is engaged with other classes.

Music.—At least twice a day for a few minutes. Exercises short and often are more use-

ful for many purposes than exercises long and seldom.

Lessons on Nature.—Once every day so as to select during the year the most important points specified in the uncontracted course.

[In most of these lessons the whole school may profitably take part. In nearly all either the whole senior or whole junior division of the school can take part. A skilful teacher can thus give profitable object lessons to several grades of scholars at once; at one time giving a Grade V lesson, at another time a Grade VI or Grade VII. or Grade VIII lesson which will also contain enough for the observation and interest of Grade I, Grade II, Grade III and Grade IV pupils. An object lesson given to the highest class can also to a certain extent be made a good object lesson for all the lower classes. The older pupils will see more and think more. It must be remembered that the memorising of notes or facts merely stated to pupils is strictly forbidden under this head. Such memorising is pure cram, injurious instead of being useful. These lessons are intended to direct pupils how they may find out the facts and laws of the world for themselves. The lessons must be direct from nature itself only under the guidance of the teacher, who can save time in bringing the pupils to the point desired from his own more mature experience. They are intended to train the observing and inductive faculties of the pupil. In other words, to train the young to know something of the nature of the world which immediately surrounds them, and which is and will continue to be reacting upon them in one way or another. This knowledge is so much power over nature from which we have to win our material existence.]

MATHEMATICAL DRAWING.

Some attention to this department of drawing is now required in the common as well as the high school grades. Its practical utility to every one, its simplicity, and its use in preparing young pupils for the comprehension and practical application of geometry, point it out as specially necessary before the conclusion of common school work. There are simply two ideas to be mastered, -first the plotting of a line according to scale, and conversely, the measuring of lines thus plotted; second, the plotting of angles, and conversely, the measuring of the number of degrees in a given angle. Ready made scales can be used for the first; but pupils should also know how to construct a scale, at least on paper, for themselves. protractor or scale of chords, ready made, may be used for the second; but pupils should understand how to make such scales also for themselves. Without any theoretical geometry or trigonometry a common school pupil can thus solve a multitude of problems in raensuration and even navigation. And if he should choose to go on with his abstract mathematical studies afterwards, he will be able to do so with much more ease. In grades IX and X, more neat, accurate and complex work should be expected than at the County Academy entrance examination.

Where the genus alone is mentioned the teacher is supposed to select the species most available in the neighborhood. Some of these flowers are very minute, and their study will require the use of a cheap botanical lens. It is important that each student should own a lens, and be taught how to use it. Students should be exercised in drawing the small parts enlarged on the the black boards and in their note books. As a specimen of the mosses is recommended "The Common Hair Cap," Polytrichum; of the Liverworts Marchantia; of the Lichens, Usnia, Sticta or Cladonia; of the Fungi, Agaricus campestris, the "edible mushroom,—Journal of Education, April, 1888.

JOURNAL OF EDUCATION.

APRIL, 1893.

With this issue the JOURNAL OF EDUCATION appears in a new form, one which it is hoped will make it more convenient for reference and preservation. It is in size uniform with the annual Education Report, and can therefore be conveniently filed with it. In fact, the Journal contains much which is generally published in educational reports in other countries; and to consider it as a semi-annual supplement to the annual report would be doing no great violence to the technicalities.

The Secretary of Trustees is requested to give this JOURNAL with as little delay as possible to the teachers under his supervision, where in common with the Register it must be carefully kept for the use of the trustees and teachers and their successors in office.

The effort to give as much information as possible respecting the new order of things, makes this number of the Journal larger than usual. The next issue will be due in October. Although the first manuscript of this No. was sent on the 10th of March to the first contracting printer, a second firm had to be called in towards the end of April, to complete the work. Hence the lateness of this issue.

OFFICIAL NOTICES.

TEACHING DAYS.—The number of teaching days in the present term (three quarters of the year) ending in July next is 166; 58 in the first half year (or quarter), and 108 in the second half year.

ANNUAL RETURNS.—Trustees and teachers are hereby notified that public exigencies require the most prompt despatch of returns after the closing of the schools. Inspectors are strictly forbidden to wait one hour beyond the date fixed for the reception of returns at their office.

COUNTY ACADEMY RETURNS.—Of these there are two classes: 1. The returns of the department as a part of the public schools of the town, to be sent to the Inspector. 2. The county academy returns proper, to be sent direct to the education office. No academic grants will be paid until the returns are examined and passed, notice of which will be duly given to the local academic authorities.

THE OPENING DAY.—The attention of teachers is directed to the new Regulation of the Council of Public Instruction, No. 7, under the head TEACHERS. Neglecting to use at least a postal card in the discharge of this new duty may have unpleasant consequences. The Inspector should know what teacher is engaged in each section of his district. Sections from which no reports are received will be assumed to be vacant.

ANNUAL MEETING OF SCHOOL SECTION.—June 26th. Failure to perform "the duties imposed" on trustees render them liable to a fine of \$20 (Manual, Page 11, Sec. 26).

"It shall further be the duty of trustees," "To forward to the Inspector of Schools, within one week after the annual school meeting of the section, a copy of the minutes of the meeting, duly signed by the chairman and secretary thereof." [Act. Sec. 31 (11), Page 15, Manual.]—That is before July 4th.

TEMPERANCE TEXT-BOOKS.—The Secretaries of the respective Boards of Trustees and of the School Boards of the several incorporated towns and cities within the province, are hereby notified that under the "Act to Provide for the More Thorough Study in the Public Schools of the Effects of Alcoholic Drinks on the Human System," passed the 30th day of April, 1892, the Council of Public Instruction have prescribed "Health Reader No. 1" (T. C. Allen & Co., Halifax) as suitable for Grades V and VI; "Health Reader No. 2" (Allen & Co., Halifax) as suitable for Grades VII and VIII; and Martin's "Human Body and the Effects of Narcotics" (Henry Holt & Co., New York), for the High School Grades.

The law thus lays a heavy responsibility upon the Inspector, that of seeing that the spirit of the law is no where ignored with immunity.

TEACHER'S LICENSE SUSPENDED.

On September 26th, 1892, the Council of Public Instruction suspended the license of Mr. Kenneth MacLeod, a "Grade C" teacher of Victoria County, for one year from the 1st of August, 1892, on account of the charge proven, that he voted at an election after being warned of his being under age and that the Act would be illegal.

NOTES ON REGISTER AND RETURNS.

If any mistakes have been made in the entries into the Register this year they should be carefully corrected before the *Annual* Return is made out. We make the following notes suggested by some errors observed in the *Semi-annual* Returns.

- 1. Remember that the "school year" ending July, 1893, is only three-fourths of the civil year. By "annual salary" is therefore meant, the salary for nine months; and so with all the other "annual" items asked for this year.
- 2. For sex write down only the letter, not the whole word, for which there is neither necessity nor space.
 - 3. For Class also use the proper symbols.
- 4. Nos. 1 to 8 are supposed to be filled in on the day on which the school opened, as is plainly indicated. It is to be copied exactly as in the Register into the Annual Return at the end of the year.
- 5. No. 13 is the product of the number of feet the school room is in height, breadth and length. Never mind the fractions of feet.
- 6. No. 14, means, the "number of pupils for whom seats and desks are provided."
- 7. How to fill in Tables 65 to 90. (1) Suppose book-keeping to be taken up in an ungraded school for only six weeks, the teacher giving his attention to the class for an average of 15 minutes every day. That would be 75 minutes per week for 6 weeks, or 450 minutes altogether for the year. But as there are 44 weeks in the year, that would give an average of 10 minutes and a fraction per week for the year. When the fraction is less than ½ it must be rejected. When ½ or greater than ½, the next integer above should be taken, as there is no room for fractions. (2) Suppose a "ten minute" oral lesson on Patriotic and Moral Dutics is given say on the first Monday of each month. That gives 100 minutes per year. Divided by the number of weeks, 44, it gives an average of 2 minutes per week for the year, during which the teacher is employed in giving lessons under (69).

The table is checked for correctness in this way. If there are five hours and thirty minutes each day on an average during which the teacher is engaged in teaching some subject in this table, that is 330 minutes per day or 1650 minutes per week, the sum of the minutes in the table should approximate 1650. It should never be made exactly equal to the total figured from (12), because fractions are not directed to be taken into account. Exact equality therefore is not likely to occur without a tampering with some figures after they had been calculated previously from the teacher's best memory and judgment.

- 8. On page 3, "grade at beginning" while necessarily filled in as soon as the teacher can provisionally estimate the pupil's "grade" is not to be copied into the *return*. "Pupil's standing," in the *return* is simply the sum of the numbers under "Conduct and Progress" in the Register.
- 9. The exact age of pupils on the 1st day of August is asked for with several objects in view. (1) It is good to cultivate the habit of accuracy. (2) It will make the register valuable as a record of ages should other records be lost—valuable as an exact historical record from which the birth days of those enrolled can at any time be calculated. (3) By having the exact age at the beginning of the school year (a fixed date) the age of each at the end of the year or at any specified period can be found by adding a year or the specific time. (4) It is the intention of the department occasionally, perhaps every five or ten years, to find the average age of pupils in the different grades in each county and in the province for the purpose of studying certain problems. If ages are not registered exactly they are perfectly useless for the purpose of indicating minute secular variations.
- 10. Any teacher who neglects the posting up of the Register promptly from quarter to quarter, as indicated in the Register itself; or who at the end of his or her service does not complete the Register as indicated definitely at the bottom of page nine; and then makes the prescribed oath containing the words "the prescribed Register has been faithfully and correctly kept by me," shall have his or her license cancelled on the receipt of the proof of such false swearing, by the Council of Public Instruction. Before the oath is taken to the Annual Return both the Teacher and Secretary of the Trustees must have signed the certificate at the bottom of the said page nine.
- Remember that the Réturns are copies of specified portions of the Register which must be filled in exactly according to the directions; otherwise the prescribed oath cannot be taken. The new edition (for the year beginning August, 1893) will be useful in explaining some points more fully than the old Register.

Assistants.—It must be remembered that assistant teachers cannot draw any Provincial grants without making oath in statutory form as in the case of principal teachers. Such affidavits must be attached to the returns in the blank space provided for oaths of substitute teachers.

Good books on Temperance and Hygiene are recommended to our teachers. But it is possible to pass examinations in these subjects, and yet fail to carry their principles into effect. It is the duty of the trustees to see that the school building, grounds and outhouses are kept in good sanitary condition. But if they should fail in their duty the teacher is responsible if the defects of this nature have not been forcibly presented to their attention. The school building should be kept scrupulously clean. If for the beautification of building and fences in some poor sections, paint is too expensive, lime is cheap, beautiful and healthy. If outhouses are not kept inoffensive both as to odor and sight, the school buildings should be condemned, until they are made safe both as regards the public health and morals. Both teacher and section should lose the public moneys while the buildings continue, according to the Inspector's opinion, unsightly or unsafe. It is to be hoped no further legislation may be required to force any section to do its duty to itself in matters of this kind.—Journal of Education, August, 1892.

J. H. HASLAM, Special Agent of the C. P. Railway, Moncton, N. B., offers prizes aggregating \$150.00 to be competed for by the students in the public schools of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, \$50 for each Province, for the best written papers on the Canadian Northwest, including all that part of Canada west of Lake Superior except British Columbia, its resources, history, geography, etc. The amounts will be given for first prizes, and will be only open to students under 15 years of age, and the papers must be in by the 10th of June, 1893, and are not to contain more than 2500 words.

In awarding the prizes greater attention will be paid to the correctness and fullness of the information than to mere literary excellence, although that will not be lost sight of. The prizes will be awarded by a committee appointed later on. Each of the contestants must have endorsed on their papers by their teacher that they are students in a public school, not over 15 years of age, and that the composition is entirely their own work.

No conditions are imposed as to help in the preparation of the article, as it is quite competent to receive information from any source. Books, pamphlets, maps, etc., will be mailed from the C. P. R. office in

Moncton to all intending contestants who may apply for them.

It is expected that second and third prizes will be offered, a sum of ten dollars having been already received for that purpose.

PART II.

We publish here for the third time the legislative enactments bearing on education passed during the year 1892, to enable trustees and teachers to correct the old manual of the Statutes which may be in their possession.

AN ACT TO AMEND THE LAW RELATING TO "PUBLIC INSTRUCTION."

(Passed the 30th day of April, A. D. 1892.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows:

1. Subsection 15 of section 3 of Chapter 29, Revised Statutes, Fifth Series, "Of Public Instruction," is hereby repealed, and the following substituted therefor: "(15.) To appoint " qualified persons to constitute a Provincial Board of Examiners, to examine and report "upon the written exercises at the annual examination of pupils who have pursued a High "School Course of Study at the County Academies, High Schools, or elsewhere, the results "of such examinations to be used as evidence of scholarship in the case of applications to the Council for licenses to teach. The Council shall also have power to prescribe the " mode in which examinations shall be conducted, to designate the times and places at "which candidates shall present themselves for examination, and to make such further "arrangements as may be deemed necessary. The examiners so appointed shall be paid such sums as the Council may determine, and the persons appointed to conduct the ex-"amination at each station shall be paid a sum not exceeding three dollars per diem while "actually engaged in the duty."

2. Section 6 of the said Chapter 29 is amended by inserting the word "annually" after

the word "trustees" in the third line.

3. Subsection 1 of section 31 of the said Chapter 29 is hereby repealed, and the following substituted:

"(1.) To contract with and employ a licensed teacher or teachers for the section, and " where necessary licensed (or unlicensed) assistants for a period not less than one year, or "if the section be poor, not less than three months. Provided, however, that for special "cause, with the consent of the Inspector, trustees may employ a teacher for a term less "than a year."

4. Section 39 of the said Chapter 29 is hereby repealed, and the following substituted

therefor:

"The sum of one hundred and sixty-seven thousand five hundred dollars for each school " year shall be paid semi-annually, or as the Council of Public Instruction may prescribe "to legally qualified teachers employed in the common schools in accordance with law, to " be divided to each teacher in conjoint proportion to the number of days taught and to the " following scale for the respective grades or classes of license held, namely, Class A (Aca-"demic)—in the case of a principal two hundred and twenty dollars, and in the case of a "subordinate teacher one hundred and eighty dollars—when employed in a graded school "doing high school work under conditions prescribed by the Council of Public Instruction " in a section not maintaining a County Academy; Class B (first), one hundred and twenty

"dollars; Class C (second), ninety dollars; and Class D (third), sixty dollars."

5. Section 43 of the said Chapter 29 is amended by striking out the words "one-half" in the tenth line, and the syllables "semi" in the eleventh line.

6. Section 44 of the said Chapter 29 is hereby repealed, and the following substituted: "44. The amount provided to be raised annually as aforesaid shall at the close of each " year be apportioned to the trustees of schools conducted in accordance with this Chapter, "to be applied to the payment of teacher's salaries, and each school shall be entitled to " participate therein a the rate of twenty-five dollars per year for each licensed teacher " employed, and the balance of the municipal fund shall be distributed among the schools " according to the average number of pupils in attendance and the length of time in opera-"tion, but no school shall receive any allowance for being in operation more than the pre-" scriped number of days in any year."

7. Section 48 of the said chapter 29 is hereby repealed and the following substituted: "48. A sum not exceeding one-half the amount assessed as a county rate in any muni-"cipality for the support of schools may be advanced from the Provincial Treasury to the "inunicipality for a period not exceeding four months, and the municipality shall repay

"to the Province such sum out of the municipal taxes when collected."

8. Section 63 of the said chapter 29 is hereby repealed, and the following substituted: "63. The annual school meeting for the election of a trustee or trustees shall be held in "the school-house of the section, or if it be not commodious, or if its use cannot be ob-"tained, or if there is none, in any other convenient building, on the last Monday in

"June, or at any previous date which may for special reasons be fixed for any inspectoral "district, county or section, by the Council of Public Instruction, the meeting to be called by the trustees, or when none-exist, by the inspector, by notices posted in three public places within the section five days previously, signed by the trustees or the inspector,

as the case may be."

9. Section 69 of the said chapter 29 is amended by striking out of the tenth and eleventh lines the words, "which date shall not be later than the fourth Monday of October."

10. Section 72 of the said chapter 29 is amended by striking out of the eleventh line of

subsection I the word "half," and substituting for subsection II the following:

"(12). To transmit to the Superintendent on or before the first day of August in each year a statement of the annual distribution of the county fund, and also by the first day " of October a general report of his labors, noting the condition of the schools in his dis-"trict, and the means of improvement, stating the sections visited where schools did not exist and the results of such visitations, and furnishing therewith such statistical infor-" mation as the Superintendent may require."

11. Subsection 9 of section 74 of the said chapter 29 is hereby amended by striking out

the word "half" in the first line.

- 12. Subsection 12 of section 74 of the said chapter is hereby amended by substituting for the words "the half-yearly return," in the first and second lines, the words "all returns."
- 13. The schedule in subsection 12 of section 74 of the said chapter 29 is hereby repealed and the following substituted:

SCHEDULE.

I, of the Province of Nova Scotia, do swear that I have taught and conducted the school in School Section No., in accordance with law, for the period of ... authorized teaching days, from the day of ... to the ... day of ... during the school year ending July, 189 ...; that the prescribed register has been faithfully and correctly kept by me, and that to the best of my knowledge and belief the grand total days' attendance made by the enrolled pupils in the said period was.....; that my agreement with the trustees is in accordance with the law and regulations, and that there is no collusive understanding by which any portion of the agreement is to be made of no effect.

14. Section 76 of the said chapter 29 is amended by substituting for "November" in the

sixth line the word " August."

15. Section 77 of the said chapter 29 is amended by substituting for "June" in the second and last lines the word "April"; and for "November" in the last line the words

16. Section 90 of the said chapter 29 is hereby repealed, and the following substituted: "The school year shall begin on the first day of August and end on the last day of July." 17. Section 3 of chapter 31, Revised Statutes, Fifth Series, is hereby amended by strik-

ing out of the seventh line the word " half." 18. Section 4 of the said chapter 31 is hereby amended by striking out the syliables

semi" in the second line.

19. Section 5 of the said chapter 31 is hereby amended by striking out the syllables "semi" in the first line.

20. Section 3 of chapter 32, Revised Statutes, Fifth Series, is hereby amended by strik-

ing out the word "half" in the sixth line.

21. Section 4 of the said chapter 32 is hereby amended by striking out the syllables "semi" in the second line.

22. Section 5 of the said chapter 32 is hereby amended by striking out the syllables

"semi" in the first line.

23. Section 7 of chapter 11 of the Acts of 1885 is amended by adding the following

"But nothing in this section shall prevent the payment of the regular Provincial grant "to any teacher, teaching full time, whose employment and quota of pupils (not less than " an average of twenty) are not necessary to qualify for drawing the County Academy "grant payable to Trustees, where such grant is less than the maximum of seventeen "hundred and twenty dollars."

24. Chapter 16 of the Acts of 1887, and all other Acts or parts of Acts inconsistent with

this Act, are hereby repealed.

25. 'Inis Act shall come into operation on the first day of November, 1892, and for all purposes under the Acts respecting Public Instruction, the period between the said first day of November and the last day of July, 1893, shall be held to be three-fourths of a school year.

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE "MORE THOROUGH STUDY IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF THE EFFECTS OF ALCOHOLIC DRINKS ON THE HUMAN SYSTEM."

(Passed the 30th day of April, 1892.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows:

1. Appropriate instruction shall be given regularly in the public schools as to the nature of alcoholic drinks and narcotics, including tobacco, and special instruction as to their effect upon the human system in connection with the several divisions of the subjects of relative physiology and hygiene. Such instruction regarding physiological and hygienic laws and the effects of alcoholic drinks and narcotics, shall be given orally from a suitable text-book in the hands of the teacher to pupils unable to read, and such instruction shall be given to all others with text-books in the hands of the pupils, and from textbooks as well graded to the capacities of the pupils as other text-books are, and such instruction shall be given as aforesaid to the pupils in all public schools in the province.

2. The text-books to be used for instruction required to be given by the preceding section of this Act shall be prescribed by the Council of Public Instruction, who shall notify the secretaries of the respective Boards of Trustees, and of the School Boards of the several incorporated towns and cities within the Province, of the choice of the text-books so selected by them as aforesaid, and said text-books used in the primary or intermediate grades shall give at least one-fourth of their space to the consideration of the nature and

effects of alcoholic drinks and narcotics; and the text-books used in the higher grades shall contain at least twenty pages of matter relating to this subject.

3. It shall be the duty of school officers and school inspectors to report to the Council of Public Instruction any failure on the part of the trustees or the teachers of the section under their control to carry out the provisions of this Act. Upon its being shown to the Council of Public Instruction, either by such school inspectors or school officers, or any ratepayer, that any teachers or trustees have failed to carry out the provisions of this Act, any such failure shall be deemed sufficient cause for withholding wholly or in part from any such teacher or trustees, provincial or county grants.

THE MINORS' PROTECTION ACT, 1892.

(Passed the 30th day of April, A. D. 1892.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows:

1. Any person who shall sell or give, or cause to be sold or given, any cigars, cigarettes, smoking or chewing tobacco, snuff, or any other form or preparation of tobacco or opum for smoking, to any person, having reasonable cause to believe such person to be under the age of sixteen years, shall on conviction thereof, in a summary way, before any two justices of the peace or a stipendiary magistrate, be liable to a fine not greater than the sum of twenty dollars for each offence under this section; and in case of a fine, or a fine and costs being awarded, and of the same not being upon conviction forthwith paid, the justice may commit the offender to the common gaol, there to be imprisoned for any term

not exceeding thirty days, unless the fine and costs are sooner paid.

2. Any person who shall accept any money or other valuable consideration to act as the agent of any person under sixteen years of age, in procuring for such person any cigars, cigarettes, smoking or chewing tobacco, or snuff, or any other form or preparation of tobacco or opium for smoking, or shall supply to any person under sixteen years of age any such cigars, cigarettes, or other form or preparation of tobacco, or opium for smoking or chewing, on the promise of any money or other valuable consideration, shall. on conviction thereof, upon information under oath in a summary way, before any two justices of the peace or a stipendiary magistrate, be liable to a fine not greater than the sum of twenty dollars for each offence under this section, and in case of a fine or a fine and costs being awarded, and of the same not being upon conviction forthwith paid, the justice may commit the offender to the common gaol, there to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding thirty days, unless the fine and costs are sooner paid.

3. Any person under sixteen years of age who has in his possession, or smokes, or in any way uses, cigarettes, cigars, or tobacco in any form, shall, upon summary conviction therefor before a justice of the peace or a stipendiary magistrate, be subject to a penulty of not more than five dollars for every offence, or to imprisonment in the common gaol for any period not exceeding seven days, and in case of a fine being awarded, if the same is not upon conviction forthwith paid, the justice may commit the offender to the common gaol, there to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding seven days, unless the fine is

sooner paid.
