

BIBLE. THE

N the course of its seventy-nine years' existence, the British and Foreign Bible Society has issued 97,000,000 copies of the Scriptures, in whole or in part, in Secretary. two hundred and fifty languages and dialects. It is believed that altogether about two hundred and twenty millions of Bibles; or Bible portions, have been provided in printed form for the fourteen hundred million inhabitants of our globe, and at least three-fourths of these have been prepared and circulated by the Bible Society and kindred institutions, But, if we take into account that of this supply (little more be it observed, than one Bible to six persons) Protestant nations have received more than one-half we realize something of the world's remaining need of the written word of God. Among the one thousand millions of heathen, Jews, and Mohammedans, not more than ten million copies of the Scriptures in whole or in part have been circulated.

But this work, like all other great ovements in these last days, is movements in going forward with ever-increasing energy and speed, and never were there more openings for it than now. During the past year progress is reported in sixty translations.
